

## 1981 Sorghum, Corn Loans May Be Extended

Additional marketing flexibility is being offered to corn and grain sorghum producers. This is a six-month optional extension of the maturity date for all outstanding and unsettled 1981 crop corn and grain sorghum loans.

Because market prices for these two commodities are depressed, it is in the best interest of CCC to give producers additional marketing time before redemption or forfeiture of loans is required.

Any request for extension of time must be in writing and can be filed no earlier than 60 days prior to the maturity date of the existing loan. Interest on the extended loan shall continue at the rate of the loan being extended.

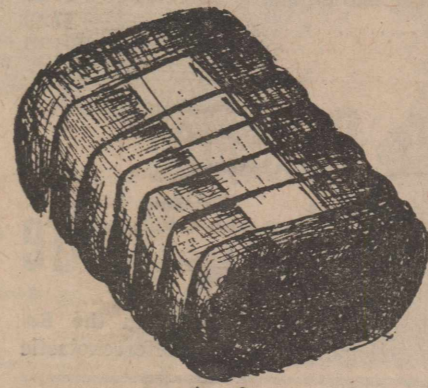
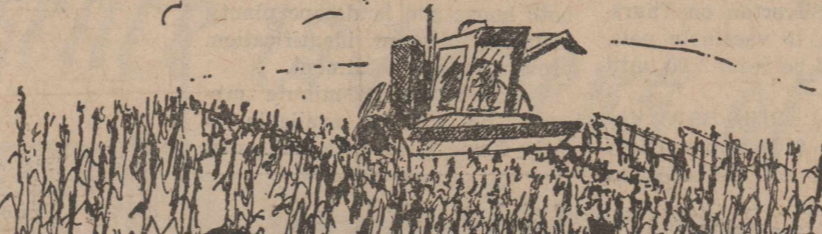
She married H. J. Bailey December 7, 1912 in Grand Prairie. He died January 1, 1967 in Amarillo.

## Running Is A Family Affair For Regional Gold Medalist

Running is a family affair for Jeni Denton, regional gold medalist in the metric two-mile event. Five mornings a week she and her father, the Rev. Royce Denton, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Silverton, leave home at 6:00 a.m. and run 2.7 miles before Jeni returns to deliver papers for the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal. Her day has been underway for hours when she reports to class at 8:30 a.m.

An interest in athletics comes to Jeni and her dad from her grandfather, the late Loran Denton, who was a school administrator at Turkey and who had tennis and track among his special interests. Her older sister, Janie, played college basketball for the University of Texas before transferring and becoming a stand-out player for the Wayland Baptist University Flying Queens. Janie and her husband are now coaching at Idalou.

Just about all of the ten children of Rev. and Mrs. Denton have been interested in athletics. Rev. Denton ran track in high school and college, so running was a part of his life long before Jeni joined three years ago. They have run together almost every day since this time last year.

A junior in Silverton High School, Jeni was a state qualifier in the 3200 meter run last year. She didn't have the best time going into the regional event this year, but by running a very good race managed to edge out the girl from Nazareth who had the best time going into the Level-land showdown.

In Quitaque's Precinct 2, there is a three-way contest for County Commissioner between the incumbent, Jack Chandler, and challengers Bennie Brown and Al Ramsey.

There is also a contested race

at Quitaque for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 2, between incumbent Dick Taylor and challenger Dale Ramsey.

All Briscoe County Democratic Primary voters will find a contest between incumbent Foster Whaley of Pampa and newcomer to politics Doyle Middlebrook of Shallowater on their ballots for State Representative, and a race between incumbent Lloyd Bentzen and Joe Sullivan for U. S. Senator.

Uncontested races on the local and district level in the Democratic Primary will be (all incumbents) Jack Hightower of Vernon, for U. S. Congress; Bill Sarpalus of Hereford, State Senator; Fred W. Mercer, County Judge; Bess McWilliams, County and District Clerk; Mildred J. Reid, County Treasurer; Barbara Pigg, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1.

Rank said copies of the rates have been sent to state and county ASCS offices and also are available from the cotton, grain and rice price support division, USDA - ASCS, P. O. Box 2415, Washington, D. C. 20013.

The national average loan and purchase rate for wheat is \$3.55 per bushel, 35c above the 1981 rate. The county rates are for wheat grading No. 2 or better.

Some adjustments have been made from the 1981 rates to reflect these differences. The Arkansas, Illinois and South Dakota rate has been increased one cent, Ohio and Oregon rates two cents and Arizona, California and Washington rates three cents. Further adjustments were made by decreasing the Idaho and Texas rates two cents, Kansas, Michigan and Nebraska rates three cents and the Colorado rate four cents. Farmers should check with their county ASCS office to see whether their county rates have been affected.

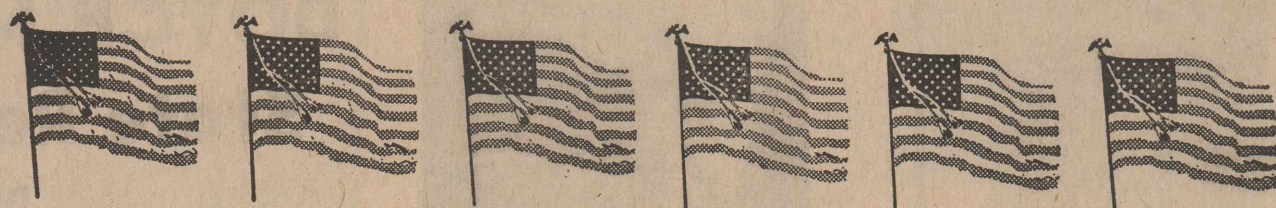

**Time Is Right For  
Brush Control**

Small mesquite are a growing problem on native range on the high plains. Scattered trees are growing bigger and are getting thicker. Control of this problem will never be cheaper than it is right now. Two methods of treatment done by local ranchers on their pastures have looked good.

L. B. Garvin, jr. used a tree plow mounted on a farm tractor to uproot small trees on his pastures. He plans to use the plow for maintenance in the future.

Zane Mayfield says that he killed 90% of the mesquite that he treated with diesel oil applied as a basal spray. He treats some trees every year and plans to do the entire ranch.

Both of these methods let the rancher use his own labor and equipment. Both can be done any time of the year. Cost-share assistance is available if 5% of the ground is shaded. Contact the Soil Conservation Service office in Silverton for more information on treating undesirable brush.

If you pay property tax in the State of Texas, there is one important date to remember. April 30 is the last day to file applications for exemptions and to render your property. Several types of tax relief measures are available to Texas taxpayers, but they do not go into effect automatically. Applications must be made to your new county appraisal district, or to local tax offices in appraisal districts which have postponed implementation. Check with the appraisal district or local tax office to find out where to file renditions and applications for tax relief.

School districts offer a residence homestead exemption to all homeowners and additional exemptions to persons who are 65 or over or disabled.

Counties offer homestead exemptions on their farm-to-market road or flood control tax rate, and may offer optional exemptions to the disabled and elderly.

Cities and other jurisdictions may offer optional exemptions for the disabled and elderly.

All jurisdictions offer an exemption for certain disabled veterans on one designated property. All may offer an additional exemption of a percentage of the value of your homestead. Productivity valuation is available in all jurisdictions to qualified farmers and ranchers.

Remember, exemptions and special valuations are not effective automatically. Applications must be filed this year by April 30. While late applications for exemptions may be accepted in some instances, the burden and expense of proving a good reason for filing late rest on the taxpayer. You can avoid any inconvenience and fully protect your rights as a taxpayer by rendering your property and applying by the April 30 deadline.

Contact your appraisal district or local city, county or school tax office for more information on available exemptions. Further details about the property tax system in Texas and how it works for you are contained in a pamphlet by the State Property Tax Board called *Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities!* Get a free copy at your appraisal district or local tax office, or contact the State Property Tax Board in Austin.

**ORDINANCE NO. 280**  
**AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE LICENSING OF ALL DOGS WITHIN THE CITY OF SILVERTON, TEXAS PREVENTING DOGS FROM RUNNING AT LARGE ON SCHOOL PROPERTY; PROVIDING A PENALTY AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.**

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SILVERTON, TEXAS:**  
**SECTION 1: License and Vaccination Required**

All dogs and cats four months of age or older which are kept, harbored, or maintained within the corporate limits of the City shall be vaccinated against rabies and licensed. Cat and dog licenses shall be issued by the City of Silvertown upon payment of the required fee for each cat or dog. The license fee for cats and dogs shall be \$1.00. Before a City License will be issued, the owner of the cat or dog must present a certificate from a licensed veterinarian showing that said cat or dog has been vaccinated within the preceding twelve (12) months.

**SECTION 2: Tag and Collar**

Upon payment of the license fee, the City shall issue to the owner a license certificate and, in the case of a dog, a metal tag having stamped thereon the year for which it is issued and number corresponding with the number on the certificate. Such tag shall at all times be securely attached to a collar or harness around the neck of the dog. In case a tag is lost, a duplicate will be issued by the City upon presentation of the receipt showing the payment of license fee for the calendar year. Dog tags shall not be transferrable from one dog to another, and no refunds shall be made.

**SECTION 3: Impoundment of Cats and Dogs**

Any cat or dog not wearing a collar or harness to which is attached a metal license tag and a tag furnished by the veterinarian showing that said cat or dog has been vaccinated against rabies shall be impounded by agents of the City of Silvertown, or any Peace Officer or their representatives, in the place provided for that purpose. If any cat or dog impounded under this section, or following sections, is not called for by owner within 72 hours the cat or dog shall be

destroyed humanely or placed for adoption. Provided however that the owner of any cat or dog impounded unless said cat or dog is the subject of a complaint filed with the City, shall be permitted to repossess such cat or dog prior to the time it is destroyed or adopted upon the payment to the City of the following:

A pound fee of \$5.00 will be charged for all impoundments of cats or dogs. An additional \$10.00 fee will be required for the second impoundment and an additional \$25.00 fee will be required for the third impoundment within a twelve (12) month period. If either valid license or vaccination, or both, are lacking on the cat or dog, the required license or vaccination must be obtained. In addition to the above charges, if the cat or dog is not picked up within seventy-two (72) hours, a \$5.00 fee will be charged for each twenty-four (24) hour period thereafter. If license or vaccination are not current, the owner shall be required to pay for these items. The owner shall be given a receipt for the vaccination payment which can be redeemed by his veterinarian by submitting the receipt. Failure to obtain the vaccination within forty-eight (48) hours of reclaiming shall authorize reimpoundment.

**SECTION 4: Confinement of Certain Dogs and Cats**

No cat or dog of fierce, dangerous, or vicious propensities, and no female dog in heat, whether licensed or not, shall be allowed to run at large, or upon the premises of any person other than the owner. If any such dog or cat is found running at large in violation of this provision it shall be taken up and impounded and shall not be released except after payment of the fees provided in prior sections herein. It is further provided, that if any dangerous, fierce or vicious dog or cat, or a dog or cat that is in season, is found running at large and cannot safely be taken up and impounded, such dog or cat may be slain by any City agent or any policeman or law officer.

**SECTION 5: Quarantining of Rabid Dog or Cat or Animals Which Have Bitten Persons**

Every dog or cat that has rabies or symptoms thereof, or any animal that bites, scratches or otherwise attacks any person or persons within the city limits, shall be, at the discretion of the City, upon complaint of the injured person, either immediately and securely confined by the owner, or one having custody, or by the City, by tying with a chain of good quality or by placing in a good pen for a period of 10 days, in such a place that no person or animal may be bitten by it, and there held subject to inspection from time to time so as to be able to determine whether said animal is affected by rabies, or said animal shall be quarantined and held for a like time in any veterinary hospital approved by the City after which time the dog shall be examined by a licensed veterinarian and may then be released in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance. The owner of said dog or cat pays all veterinary charges and for veterinary day care.

**SECTION 6: Tampering With Pound**

It shall be unlawful for any person in this city, without proper authority, to break into, open, pull down the enclosure or make any opening into any pound or enclosure belonging to or used by the City for the purpose of impounding or keeping therein any animal or fowl, including dogs, cats, or other common household pets, or to turn out or release any of the same from any pound or enclosure or cause to be done or aid and abet in the doing of the same.

**SECTION 7: Public Nuisance**

Any cat or dog or any animal which molests pedestrians or passing vehicles, or attacks other animals, or repeatedly trespasses on school grounds, or damages private or public property, or repeatedly barks, whines, or howls in an excessive, continuous fashion shall be a public nuisance and shall be impounded as set forth in Section 3 of this ordinance.

**SECTION 8: Penalties**

Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor

**Land May Be Taxed On Agricultural Use Value**

Is the land you own being used for agricultural purposes? If it is, then you may be eligible for tax relief on that property.

According to Mrs. Carlye Hill, chief appraiser for the Briscoe County Appraisal District, qualified landowners have the option of applying for agricultural or open-space land valuation on their property.

She said that two constitutional amendments provide for the taxation of land on its agricultural use (or productivity) value.

and shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$200.00. If any violation be continuing, each day shall be a separate violation and shall be deemed as a separate offense.

**SECTION 9:**

If any part of this ordinance shall be held invalid, such part shall be deemed severable and the invalidity shall not effect the remaining parts of this ordinance.

**SECTION 10:**

All other ordinances of the City of Silvertown that are in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

**SECTION 11: Emergency**

The fact that many people live within the City Limits of the City of Silvertown, Texas, and that there is an urgent need for protection against dogs and other animals of the canine species, and for the peace of mind and public safety of the citizenry of said city, it is hereby ordained that the foregoing ordinance is an emergency measure and since such emergency exists, this ordinance shall go into effect immediately upon its passage.

In other words, taxes would be assessed against the productivity value of the land instead of what the property would sell for in the open market.

Mrs. Hill indicated that the legal basis for this valuation is found in the Texas Constitution, Art. VIII, Sec. 1-d. She added that several criteria must be met in order to qualify under this section. Some include:

—The land must be owned by a natural person (does not include corporations, partnerships, agencies or organizations);

—The land must have been devoted exclusively to agricultural use for at least three years prior to the year application is first made;

—Annual application is required of the owner;

—Owner must file a sworn statement each year he applies, attesting to the land's agricultural use;

—The chief appraiser must determine that the landowner qualifies and must approve the application, and,

—The agricultural business conducted on the land must be the owner's primary occupation and source of income.

Mrs. Hill said another form of alternate valuation available to qualified landowners is that of open-space land valuation. Effective since 1979, it provides for the valuation of agricultural and timberlands and ecological laboratories. She added that the legal basis for this form of land valuation is in the Texas Constitution, Art. VIII, Sec. 1-d-1.

Several conditions must be met in order to qualify under this section, including:

—The land must have been devoted principally to agricultural use for at least five of the last seven years;

—The land must be involved in a qualifying agricultural use.


—The land must be used for agricultural purposes to the degree of intensity generally ac-

cepted in the area, and, —The chief appraiser must approve the application.

In 1982, once an application for 1-d-1 open-space valuation is filed with the chief appraiser and approved, a landowner will not be required to submit another application so long as the land qualifies. The chief appraiser, however, may request that a new application be filed.

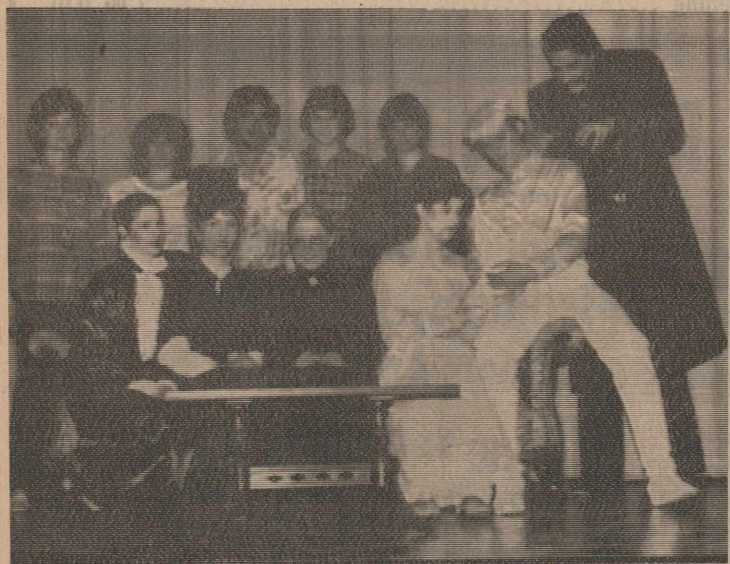

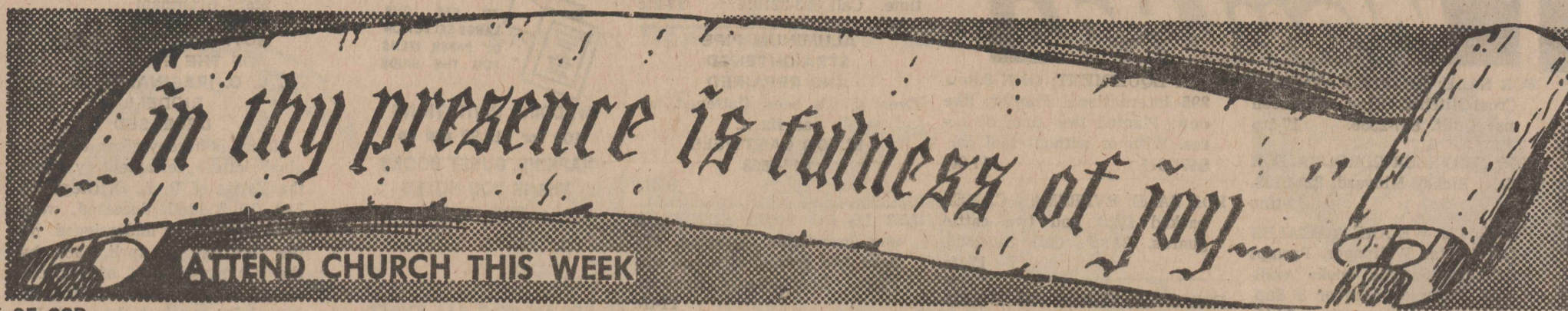

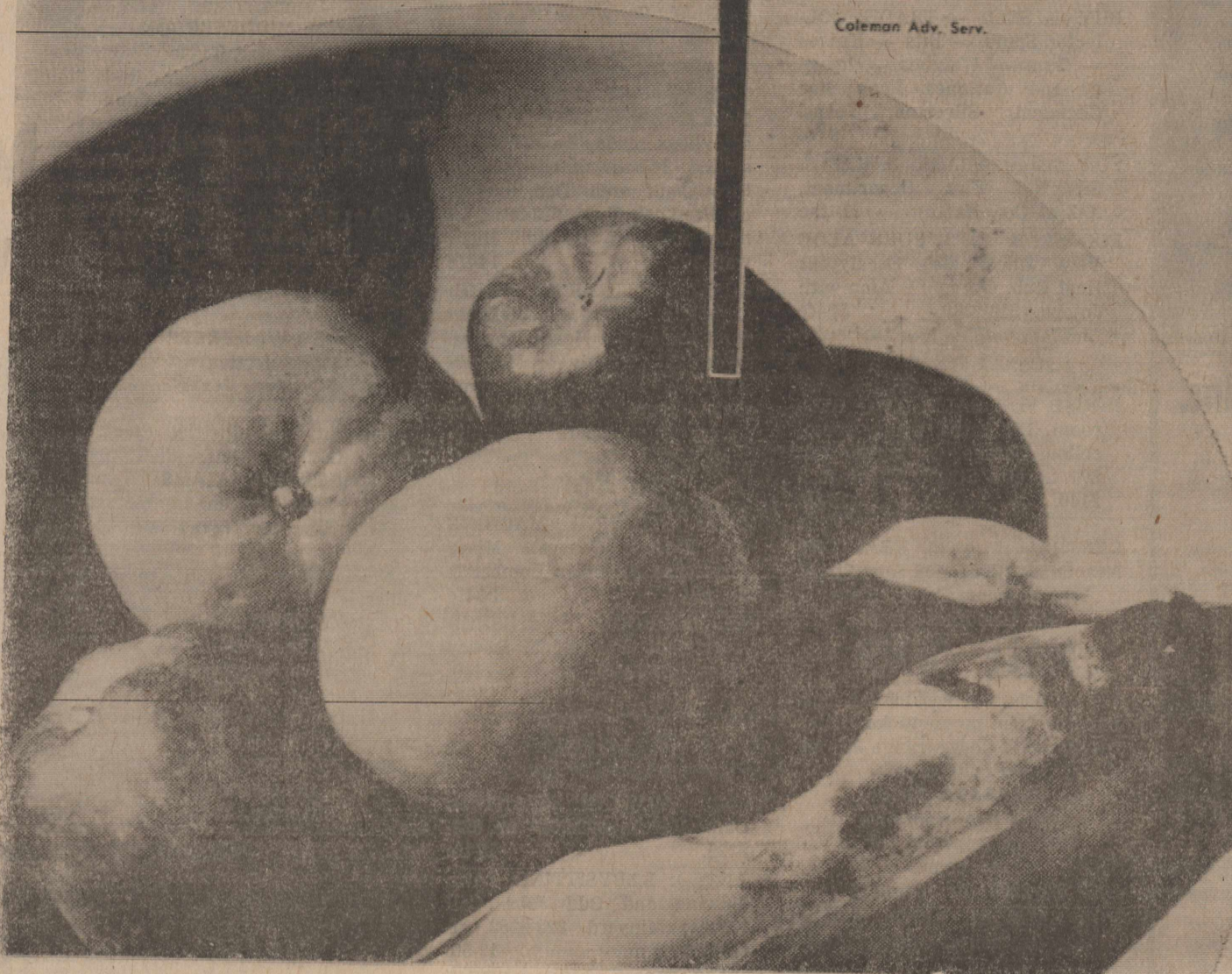
