## **Tornado Funnels Dance**

Tornado funnels danced over illo earlier in the afternoon. Silverton and the surrounding area Tuesday afternoon, sending many residents hurrying to storm cellars and basements.

Wayland Fitzgerald watched two funnels with tails which almost touched the ground just southwest of his home in the Rock Creek community about the middle of the afternoon.

Then about 4:30 p.m. a large white funnel formed just south of the City of Silverton and skirted the town on its northeasterly course. Several times tails dropped out of the cloud, stayed a few minutes, then quickly disappeared. As the cloud passed to the southeast of town, the tail apparently whipped closer to the ground in the area where the Fogersons have their hog pens and knocked out a window at the Tom Burson home. Sometimes the funnel appeared to have two or three tails.

Some hail fell, ranging from pea to near golfball size.

Apparently the cell containing the funnel which Silverton residents watched was the same one that later did some tornado damage in Hall County. The amount of damage in the rural area near Memphis was difficult to assess cable having been cut in Amar-

#### **Self Promoted To** Football Coach, Athletic Director

Marvin Self, former athletic standout for the Silverton Owls, has been promoted to head SHS football coach and athletic ditector to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Joe Stubblefield.

This is according to an announcement by Superintendent of Schools O. C. Rampley, who also said that Russell Allen Gee will be the new head boys basketball coach. Gee will replace Mike Underwood, who resigned following the basketball season.

Gee, 31, is originally from Hobbs, Texas. He attended Cisco Junior College and earned his degree at Angelo State. He is married and has a 21/2 year old son. He has six years of coaching experience at Brady, where he is at this time, Merkel and Richland Springs.

Kelly Braisher, who is scheduled to graduate from Wayland Baptist University this month, has been named the new girls' head basketball coach.

Braisher was the top shooter from the field for the Flying Queens last season which saw the WBU cagers finish fourth in the nation. She averaged over 11 points a game in shooting over 58 percent from the floor. She was also the No. 2 free throw shooter (71 percent) and led the team with 103 points from the charity stripe.

In her four-year career at Wayland, the 5'11" Braisher shot 59 percent from the field in scoring 716 points and pulling down 325 rebounds.

Briscoe County Extension Aging agricultural weather advisor- Coastal Bend. ies for use by producers in the county. The advisories are coming from Dr. Bill Dugas, Assisand Agricultural Meterology Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service stationed at Blackland Research Center in Temple, Texas. Dr. Dugas has established an automated weather station in the county, located 11/2 miles west of Silverton.

Information from this weather station and other National Weather Service observing locations in the county are incorporated into agricultural weather advisories which County Agent Kiker disseminates each week. The weather station collects information on soil temperatures, air temperatures, precipitation, relative humidity, wind speed and sunshine.

The objective of the program is to assist producers in making management decisions, especially those related to weather and climate. The advisories will give producers information as to status quo conditions concerning crops and soil moisture and this information, in conjunction with National Weather Service forecasts, will increase the information base with which producers have to make decisions.



#### Money Available **Through Great Plains Program**

Funds are currently available for new cost-share contracts in the Great Plains Conservation Program. Those interested should contact the Soil Conservation Service in Silverton to see if they are eligible.

Over the years the Great Plains Conservation Program has assisted Briscoe County farmers and ranchers in planning and applying Conservation Practices on over 318,000 acres of land. A total of 194 contracts have been completed and several active contracts are currently in progress.

John Crowell, Disrict Conservationist in Silverton, says that the new contracts must be on land that has not been in the program in the past. This is somewhat of a problem since over 60% of the county has been in the program previously.

Stopping soil erosion will be the main objective of the new contracts. Priority will be given to those applications for terraces, diversions, waterways, dams, and any other practice that has a direct effect on stopping erosion. However, all applications will be considered, including those for brush control and other related range practices.

Anyone interested in applying for the program should contact the Soil Conservation Service in Silverton this week, 823-2320.



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


