Joe Arnold of Silverton has been named to the President's List at South Plains College for the 1982 spring semester.

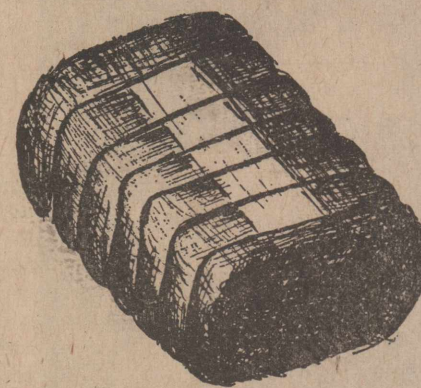
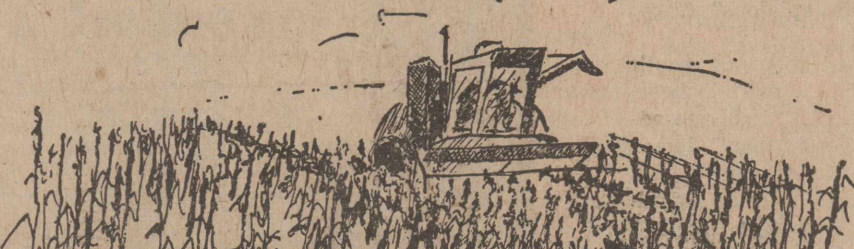

CANNER TESTING

With our nice rains everyone should have a good start on their gardens and be ready to harvest a "bumper crop" this year. That means canning and freezing all you can't eat or give away.

PRODUCERS INVITED TO SCOUTING WORKSHOP

Cotton, corn and sorghum producers in Briscoe County are receiving a special invitation this year to take part in the annual High Plains Scout Training Workshop to increase the effectiveness of their pest management programs.

The workshop will be held Tuesday and Wednesday, June 1-2, at the Hale County Agricultural Center in Plainview.

If your canner gauge hasn't been tested in the last year, you need to plan on having it tested before you are ready to start canning. If you have a weighted gauge, you only need to clean it good, but a dial gauge needs to be tested for accuracy so your food will not be overprocessed or underprocessed.

I have arranged to schedule a pressure canner testing in Silverton on Saturday, June 26, but I must have at least 25-30 cookers before the people will come from Lubbock to do this. The cost is \$3.50 per cooker. Since our county Extension office does not have a device for testing pressure canner gauges, I will not be able to do this at any time later in the summer.

Last year I took 16 cookers to the testing clinic in Plainview. If you want to take yours, they have one scheduled June 5, at the Hale County Ag Center from 8:30 a.m. until whenever. Cost is \$3.50. But you need to be there early, since they ran very late last year.

Call the Extension Office, 823-2343, if you would like your canner tested on June 26 in Silverton. This is open to Quitaque residents or anyone in the area. If we do not have at least 25, you will have to make other arrangements for getting yours tested.

center is on U. S. 87 Business Route south of Plainview.

The workshop, conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, was first held in 1973 to train scouts in the pest management programs conducted by Extension. In subsequent years, it has expanded to include scouts employed by consultants, aerial applicators, and others, as well as producers who want to learn how to scout their own fields for insects. The workshop focuses on perfecting skills in identifying crop pests and making timely pest management decisions which can protect investments and yield and hold down production costs.

The June 1 session opens at 8:30 a.m. with Dr. Pat Morrison outlining the scope for the workshop and explaining pest management concepts. Also on the morning program are Dr. Dale

Pennington, Extension soil chemist; Dr. James Supak, Extension cotton agronomist; Dr. Robert Berry, Extension plant pathologist; and Dr. Jim Leser, cotton Extension entomologist.

The afternoon program will include Dr. Kirby W. Huffman, Extension agronomist; Dr. Pat Morrison, Extension entomologist, and Allen E. Knutson, Castro County Extension Agent - entomology, who will discuss corn and sorghum pests.

The June 2 session, beginning at 9:00 a.m., will focus on scouting procedures and reports. Instructors will be County Extension Agents - entomology Greg Cronholm of Hale County and Allen Knutson.

During the afternoon, participants will receive practical training in insect identification and scouting procedures during a field session.

Congressmen, Senators, agriculture committee staffers and farm lobbyists. Congressman Hightower received calls from farmers in Colorado, Iowa and several other farm states. The purpose of the call-in was to compile survey results on the growing farm depression that could be forwarded

to the Congress and the White House in the hopes of speeding aid to farmers. Hightower helped organize the House Farm Crisis Group and has introduced emergency farm relief legislation which is being considered by the House Agriculture Committee.

Southwestern Public Service Company has announced it would accept a 9% rate increase recommended by the Steering Committee which represents 66 Texas municipalities served by the electric utility.

The agreement was reached following a study by the cities' rate study committee, and represents 71% of the 12.7% Texas retail rate increase requested by the company.

If approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT), the new rate would be effective July 1, 1982, and would be expected to provide additional revenues of approximately \$13.6 million annually from customers inside the cities. The agreement only covers the rates for service supplied within city jurisdictions. Rates outside the cities, which are regulated by the PUCT, would generate approximately an additional \$15.8 million annually at the 71% figure.

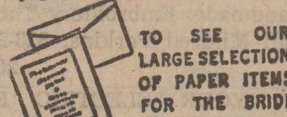
Company president Bert Ballengee said "SPS agreed reluctantly because the combined revenues of \$29.4 million from city and rural customers is less than had been requested, less than is needed, and less than is justified by today's high money costs and

the commitment the company has made to its customers to change to coal as the fuel source in new power plants."

Ballengee said that "SPS would go along with the reduced increase because of the current economic situation which is affecting everyone. I guess we'll hurt just like everyone else," he added.

Southwestern Public Service primarily provides electric utility service to a population of more than one million in a 45,000 square mile area of the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas, Eastern and Southeastern New Mexico and the Oklahoma Panhandle and Southwestern Kansas.
