tural Center in Plainview. The If your canner gauge hasn't been tested in the last year, you need to plan on having it tested before you are ready to start canning. If you have a weighted gauge, you only need to clean it good, but a dial gauge needs to be tested for accuracy so your food will not be overprocessed or underprocessed.

I have arranged to schedule a pressure canner testing in Silverton on Saturday, June 26, but I must have at least 25-30 cookers before the people will come from Lubbock to do this. The cost is \$3.50 per cooker. Since our county Extension office does not have a device for testing pressure canner gauges, I will not be able to do this at any time later in the summer.

Last year I took 16 cookers to the testing clinic in Plainview. If you want to take yours, they have one scheduled June 5, at the Hale County Ag Center from 8:30 a.m. until whenever. Cost is \$3.50. But you need to be there early, since they ran very late last year.

Call the Extension Office, 823-2343, if you would like your canner tested on June 26 in Silverton. This is open to Quitaque residents or anyone in the area. If we do not have at least 25, you will have to make other arrangements for getting yours tes ted.

COMMITTEE OF TEXAS **CITIES RECOMMEND 9%** ELECTRICITY RATE INCREASE

Southwestern Public Service Company has announced it would accept a 9% rate increase recommended by the Steering Committee which represents 66 Texas municipalities served by the electric utility.

The agreement was reached following a study by the cities' rate study committee, and represents 71% of the 12.7% Texas retail rate increase requested by the company.

If approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT), the new rate would be effective July 1, 1982, and would be expected to provide additional revenues of approximately \$13.6 million annually from customers inside the cities. The agreement only covers the rates for service supplied within city jurisdictions. Rates outside the cities, which are regulated by the PUCT, would generate approximately an additional \$15.8 million annually at the 71% figure.


Ballengee said that "SPS would go along with the reduced increase because of the current economic situation which is affecting everyone. I guess we'll hurt just like everyone else," he added.


