McCormick Operating Company has filed an intention to drill a wildcat well which will be designated as the No. 1 W. M. Cogdell. The proposed depth is 8300 feet.

The location is 933 feet from north and 2173 feet from west line of Section 192, Block G&M GC&SF survey. This is eight miles northwest of Silverton.

The Bomar wildcat has been drilling and testing near 8000 feet.

The weather continues to plague cotton farmers in this area. About 12 inches of rain has fallen during May and June, with no end in sight. Nighttime temperatures continue to be cool.

Some of the crops have been flooded or hailed out. Lillian Lindsey told me earlier this week that most of the crops that were insured by Farmers Union have received 100% damage.

Rains have been heavier in the area northwest of Silverton at the Doug Forbes place, and lighter on the north side of Tule Canyon.

About 2½ inches of rain has fallen during the past week at Lake Mackenzie, and the lake level has continued to rise slightly. It is getting close to the highest level that it has ever been. On Thursday night of last week a wind and hail storm at the lake accompanied more than an inch of rain. The hail wiped out our grape crop at the lake, and hail combined with wind to do a little damage at the lake office and home of the Neil Taylors, where a TV antenna and door were blown down.

In Silverton, the official rain measurement as recorded by Fred Strange during the week just ended amounted to 3.08 inches. Of this, 1.33 inches fell Thursday, 1.65 on Friday and .10 on Sunday. A light shower crossed town Tuesday night.

What farmers need now is some hot, dry weather. And, yes I know, after two or three weeks of hot, dry weather we'll be begging for some more rain and mountain-like temperatures.

**Ambulance Service Members Recognized By PEMSS**

Three members of the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service have received special recognition by the Panhandle Emergency Medical Services System for outstanding treatment of a patient on April 15, 1982.

Anthony Kingery was chosen as Paramedic of the Month for June, and Jerry Patton and James Edwards were chosen as Emergency Medical Technicians of the Month for June. They were nominated for the honor by Paramedic Lynn Frizzell and Secretary - Treasurer - EMT Helen Strange, who are also members of the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service.

In recommending the three for recognition, Frizzell and Mrs. Strange said that the superior pre-hospital treatment on A. W. James is believed to be the reason he is alive today.

The emergency call was received at 2:00 p.m. on April 15, 1982 to the accident site seven miles northeast of Silverton where Mr. James was working in a hydraulic bucket with Swisher Electric Cooperative on high voltage lines. Mechanical problems had resulted in his falling approximately 35 feet.

Upon arrival, patient assessment showed multiple chest injuries. He had a flail chest and was developing pneumothorax with subcutaneous emphysema which had progressed from the chest into the neck and upper arms. A cervical collar was applied. Chest sounds showed diminished sounds bi-laterally with great respiratory difficulty. Patient had blood completely obstructing his nasal passages and also blood in his mouth. Patient's mouth was suctioned to facilitate breathing, and he was placed on high concentration of oxygen at 15 LPM.

Vital signs upon arrival showed a pulse rate of 120 per minute,

respiration of 30 per minute and blood pressure of 120/60. Patient was found to have a suspected fracture of the left femur, a traction splint was applied, and patient was placed on a scoop stretcher. Patient was loaded into the unit where he was placed on EKG monitor and IV was started.

Patient was transported to the Briscoe County Clinic in Silverton but this facility did not have chest tube capacity. Enroute it was confirmed by radio that Swisher Memorial Hospital had capacity to place chest tube in patient. It was determined that patient could not survive without a chest tube because of the distance to the Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center.

The unit stopped in Tulia where Dr. L. S. Foreman placed a chest tube in left side with a water seal type appliance. Patient was transported on to the AERC at Northwest Texas Hospital. Enroute patient developed pneumothorax in the other lung.

The patient spent approximately three weeks in the intensive care unit. At this time, he has returned to his home and is continuing to improve.

Kingery is serving his second term as president of the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service. Patton is a charter member of the ambulance service and is also a charter member of the Panhandle Association of Emergency Medical Technicians. Edwards is one of the newest EMTs in the local ambulance service, having finished his training in December of 1981.

PEMSS congratulated the three medical volunteers and said, "we commend you on your efforts to make the slogan, 'A system to save a life,' a reality." The Silverton Ambulance Service is very proud of these and its other volunteers.

## Springer Is Head Of Fusion Research Group

Berl M. Springer, board chairman and chief executive officer of Southwestern Public Service Company, is the new president of the Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation.

The Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation (TAERF) is a non-profit research organization created to advance knowledge of energy, particularly nuclear energy. The foundation was formed in 1957 by the investor-owned electric utility companies of Texas.

TAERF is a primary supporter of the Fusion Research Center at the University of Texas at Austin. The Center houses one of the largest university experimen-

tal fusion programs in the world, and its group of theoretical physicists is considered among the best. They are searching for ways to control nuclear fusion

reactions for the production of electric power.

Nuclear fusion is the source of the energy of the sun and stars. It is distinctly different from—in fact, the opposite of—nuclear fission, the process used in nuclear powered plants. Fusion reactions join, rather than split, nuclei of atoms. Harnessing the tremendous energy of fusion reactions to produce electricity would make available an almost unlimited supply of energy.

A likely fuel for fusion reactions is deuterium, which is low cost, clean, and abundant. Deuterium is available in water—which covers four-fifths of the earth.

A pitcher of ordinary water, researchers say, contains in its deuterium the energy equivalent of the electricity used in one year in a typical American home. The deuterium in a swimming pool of water could furnish all the electric energy needs of a city for a year.

However, many obstacles remain to be overcome in developing fusion technology. A primary problem is containing incredible heat generated by fusion reactions.

TAERF funds which support the research at UT-Austin are matched several times over by federal funds. But the TAERF support insures that the interests of the customers of the electric utilities in Texas are served: The support influences the direction of the fusion research program in ways that should eventually produce the most efficient and lowest cost electrical power.

Springer was elected TAERF president May 29. He is a native of Memphis, and an industrial engineering graduate of Texas Tech University. He started his SPS career as a draftsman in 1948. He later became a statistician - engineer, rate engineer, and rate manager, and in 1969 was elected vice president of rates and budgets. He was named executive vice president in 1972, and joined the board of directors in 1974. He was elected chairman of the board and chief executive officer in January of 1982.

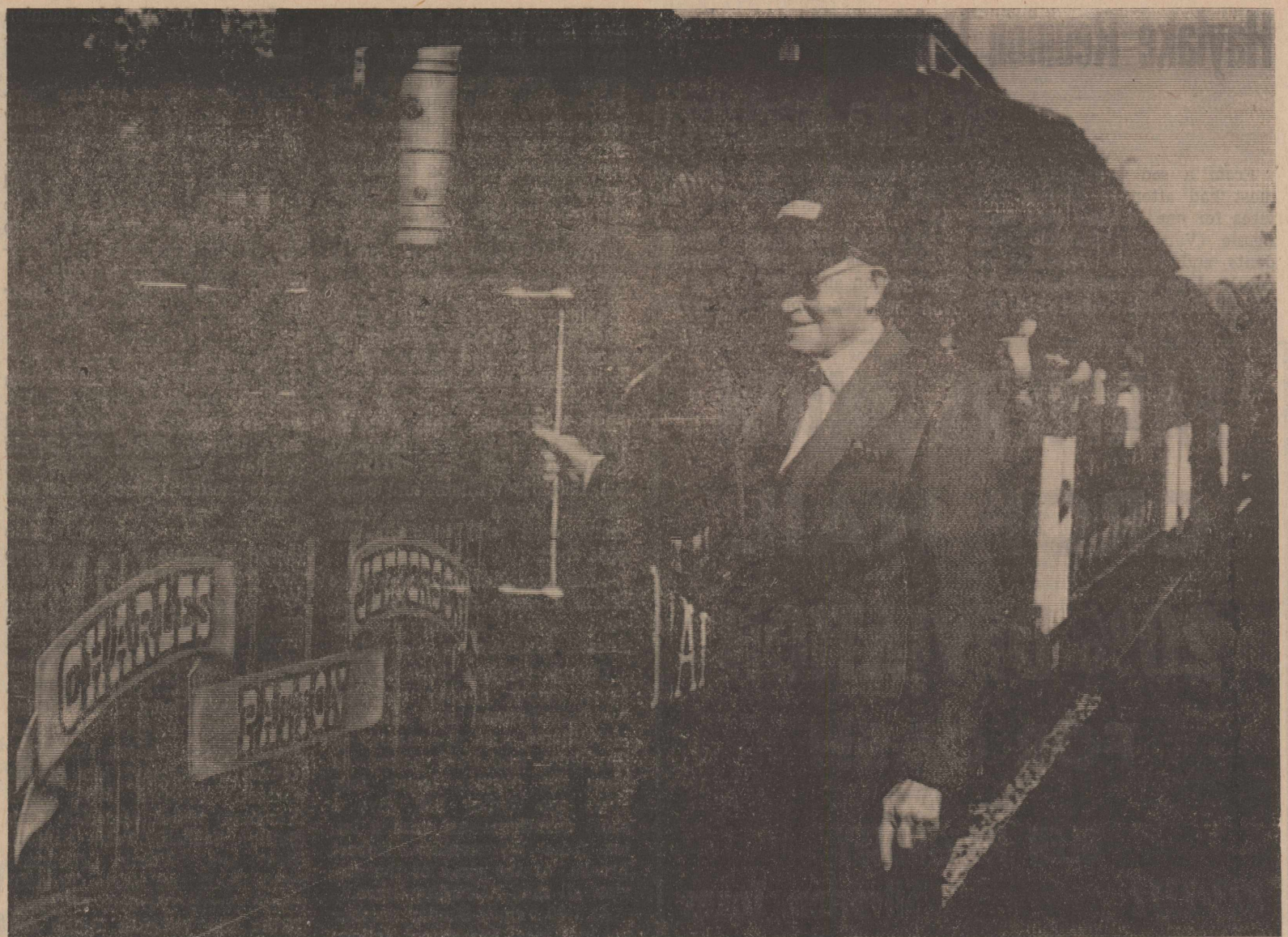

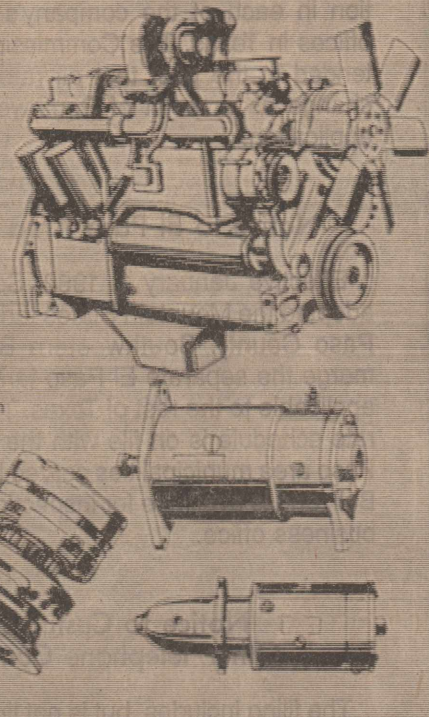

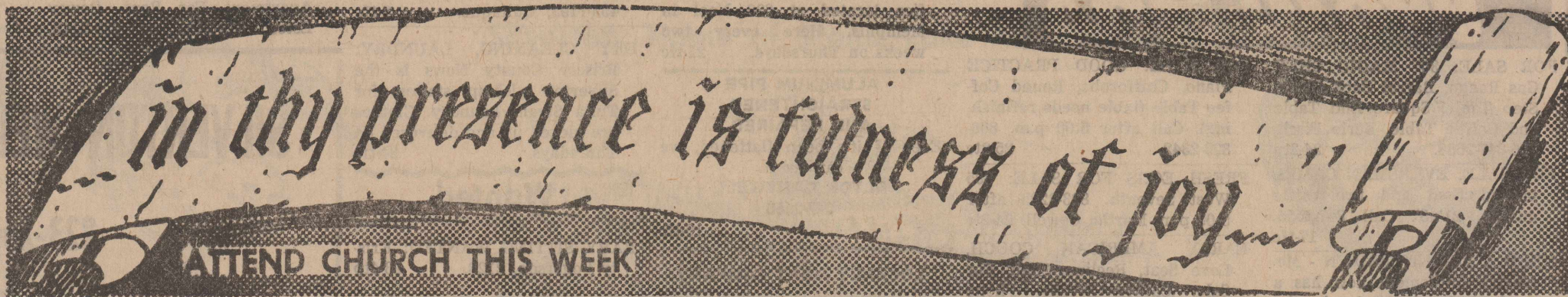
