The Palo Duro Basin should support long-term petroleum exploration and production, Robert O. Anderson, chairman of the board of Atlantic Richfield Oil Company, said during a visit in Amarillo last week.

"The Palo Duro seems to have a good Pennsylvanian (geological) section," Anderson said. "It is all moderate depths-6,000 to 7,000 feet—and should be an ideal set of circumstances to bring in a lot of participation by both independents and majors. The land holdings are highly diversified, so they could provide good leasing opportunities to both large and small operators," he said.

Oil leasing activity in Briscoe County has slowed a lot but is still continuing. I spoke with a man last week who had leased his farm in the Whiteley area near Silverton.

Drilling continues at the Charlotte Etgen and Cogdell ranch locations northwest of Silverton. Drilling is finished at the Cogdell wildcat on the north rim of Tule Canyon, and they have been waiting for a workover rig at this

The Dorothy Bomar wildcat officially has been declared a dry hole.

Some drilling activity has been underway just outside Briscoe County in Motley County. One wildcat is on the Burleson ranch southeast of Flomot and another is on the Rex Johnson farm southeast of Turkey. The Burleson well is said to be nearing completion at about 7500 feet and the Johnson well is said to be drilling at about 3500 feet.

Upon the completion of the sampling in October, all of the data collected will be analyzed and compiled in a report which will include a five-year management plan for improving fishing recreation at the lake.

Managing reservoirs is an exacting science starting with the basic fertility of the lake and running through the food supply, the amount and quality of spawning and nursery habitat, the forage fish populations, the panfish populations, the roughfish populations, and the predator fish populations. An understanding of the very complex interactions of all of these factors is necessary to correctly manage a lake to produce better fishing.

Although this study has not yet been completed, it has been determined that the most serious problem appears to be with the lake's fish population. There is not, as most fishermen believe, an inadequate population of small gamefish, but an overpopulation of these fish, Kraai said.



Briscoe County Extension Agent STARCH BLOCKERS

The Food and Drug Administration has asked more than 100 manufacturers and distributors of "starch blockers" to discontinue marketing them until scientific testing confirms the safety and efficacy of these weight management products.

Starch blockers are prepared from raw beans, such as kidney and northern beans, and possibly unknown ingredients. The products have been advertised and sold nationwide with claims that they block or impede starch di gestion and thus help in weight control and weight reduction by preventing absorption of carbo-

Users of the products have complained to FDA of nausea, vomiting, diarrhea and stomach pains. Persons with diabetes should not depend on starch blockers in calculating their

Information supporting claims of safety or effectiveness in weight control or weight reduction has not been provided to FDA. FDA is also concerned about the safety of long-term use of starch blockers because of the lack of adequate safety testing data.

FDA, by letter, has asked the firms to discontinue marketing starch blockers and to provide the agency specific information about their manufacture and distribution. If the companies fail to comply within 10 days, FDA will then consider regulatory action against the products and Friday, July 30, at 10:00 a.m. companies.




