Severe Weather Hit Briscoe

Briscoe County, one of the areas hardest hit by the severe summer weather, can appreciate the significant role Texas Farm Bureau played in securing some \$350 million in disaster assistance for a 75-county area of West Texas, says Riley Harris, president of the Briscoe County Farm Bureau.

"We are most appreciative of the program," Harris said. "We are especially pleased with Farm Bureau's part in the disaster assistance.'

Texas Farm Bureau entered the picture very soon after the heavy rains and hail began to pound West Texas in mid June. TFB President Carrol Chaloupka monitored the situation closely, keeping in touch with county Farm Bureau presidents such as

Finally, on June 29, just about 10 days after the severe weather hit, Chaloupka wrote to Agriculture Secretary John Block, requesting that he use his "discretionary authority" to make disaster payments to the cotton and grain farmers who sustained

South Plains by Deputy Secretary of Agriculture John Ford.

On July 8, Chaloupka met privately with Block at his Washington office, stressing the seriousness of the farmers' plight. Chaloupka advised Block that the federal assistance.

Relief came rather quickly after that Washington trip. On July 15, less than a month after the severe weather struck, Block William Clements who was awaiting word on federal assistance at the Lubbock Civic Center.

Block announced that his office was providing between \$350 and \$400 million for 75 counties in West Texas and four each in New Mexico and Oklahoma.

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

The steam-driven turbine rotor at Tolk Station, our new coal-fired plant near Muleshoe, Texas, whirls at such great speed that if it were placed on the highway, it would travel the 125 miles from Lubbock to Amarillo in about 6 minutes. Other interesting facts about the power plant, which

began generating electricity in July: At the speed the main steam — which drives the turbine — travels through the pipes, it could finish the Boston Marathon (26 miles) in about 12 minutes. At maximum output the turbine produces about 728,000 horsepower. It can provide power for 5,430,000 hundred-watt light bulbs.

The primary fuel for Tolk Station is a low-sulphur, high-heatvalue coal from the Black Thunder Mine near Gillette, Wyoming. Southwestern Public Service made the decision to buy this coal because the low-sulphur rating means we can comply with certain requirements of the Clean Air Act without installing extremely complex and extremely expensive pollution-

We'll turn things upside down to benefit our customers. Here's an example: We use a "rotary dumper" system to unload the railroad cars which carry coal to Tolk. The cars are unloaded one by one. Each is attached to a large wheel that literally turns the car upside down, pouring out the coal.

The system allows us to use lighter weight coal cars. So our freight cost is lower, and so is the fuel cost adjustment our customers pay.
