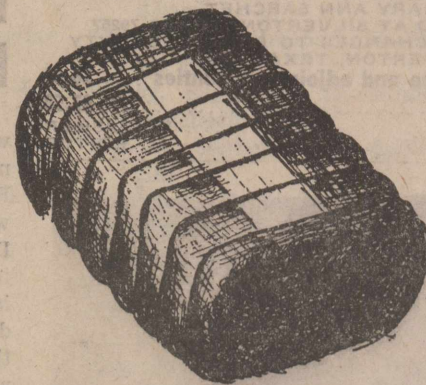
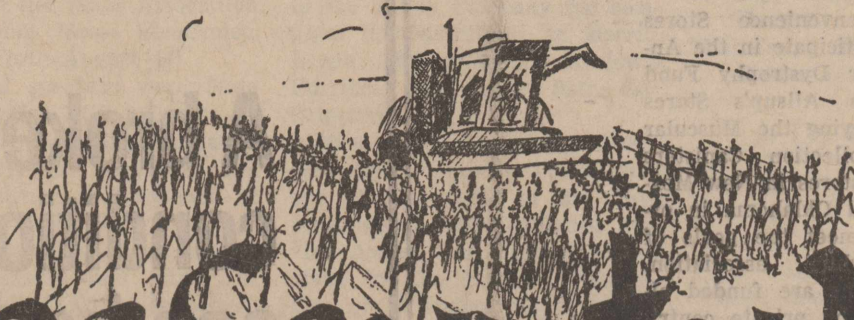

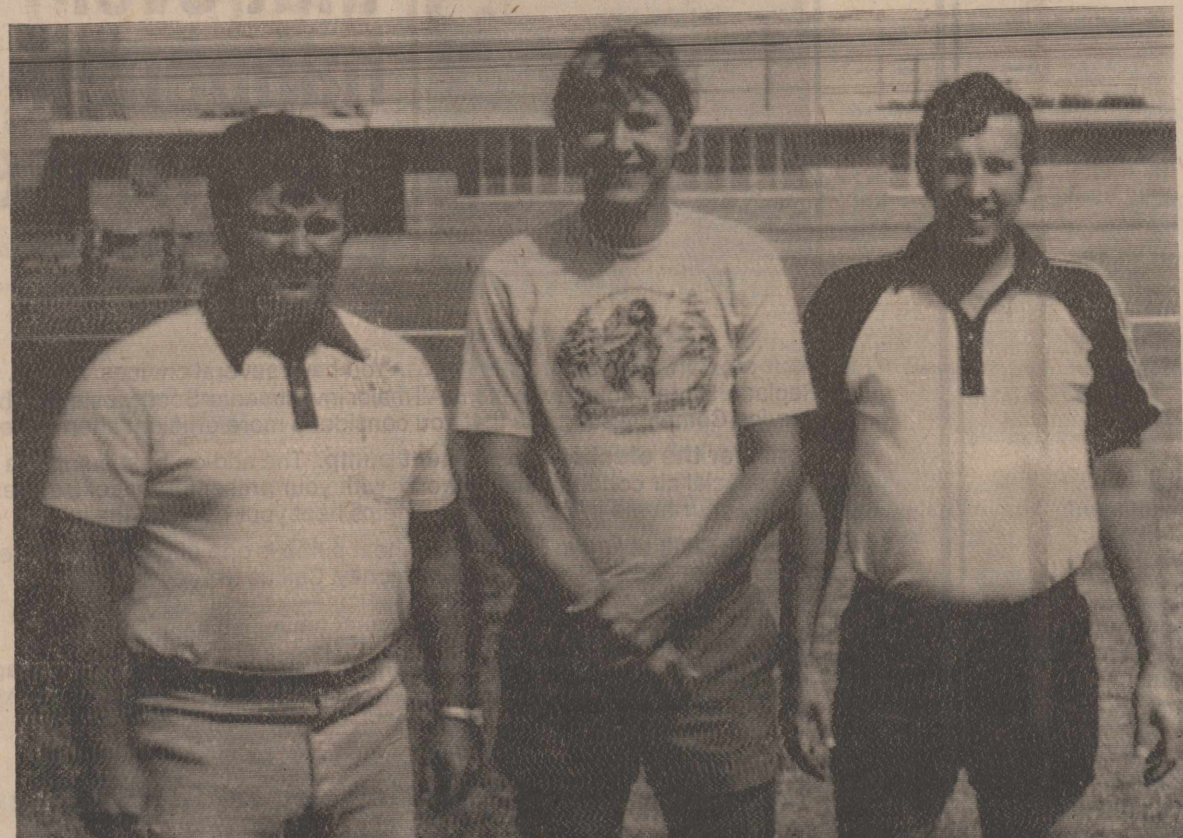
Plainview Concert Membership Renewal Invitations In The Mail

Recently Mrs. Ford returned to Silverton to attend the 50th anniversary reunion of the graduation class of 1932.

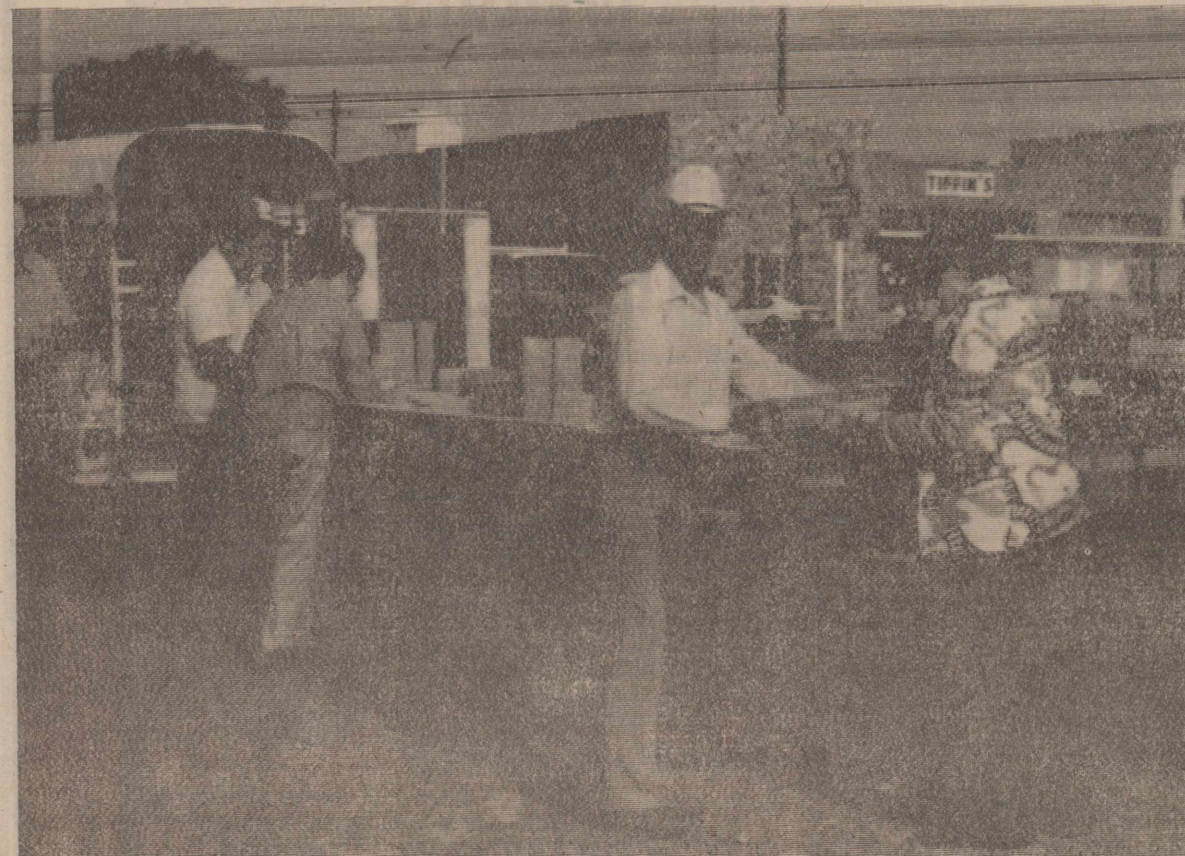
Lallie Haynes was the only pupil in Mrs. Ford's 1921 first-grade class to continue in Silverton Schools and graduate with the Class of 1932.

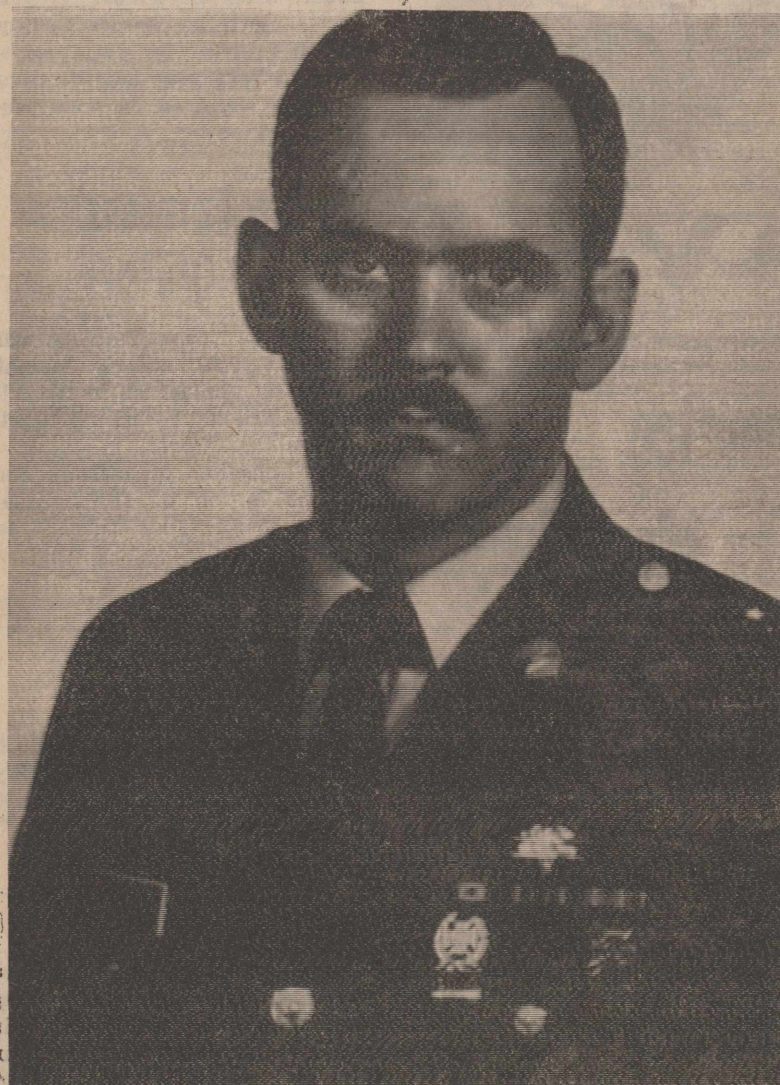

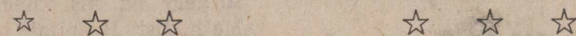

For Flight Training

A native of Silverton has been selected by the Army to attend helicopter training.

Specialist Five Moses D. (Danny) Thompson, son of Moses D. Thompson, now of Yelm, Washington, and Dorothy A Cusic, currently in Anchorage, Alaska, will be attending the Rotary Wing Aviator Course at Fort Rucker, Alabama.

Thompson is the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Brookshier of Silverton.

Currently an optical laboratory specialist at Brooke Army Medical Center in San Antonio, Thompson recently completed the Expert Field Medical Badge (EFMB) Course at Brooke and was one of 22 individuals out of 300 aspirants to receive the badge. He did so well in the course that he was appointed training noncommissioned officer in charge of the following class.

Thompson will first attend the Warrant Officer Candidate Military Development School at Fort Rucker and then will enter the aviator course there.

Thompson attended Silverton High School for two years and was graduated from Highlands High School in San Antonio. He has taken courses at Regis College in Denver, Colorado and at St. Philip's College in San Antonio.

In addition to the EFMB Course, his Army training has included the Optical Laboratory Specialist Course, the Basic Non-commissioned Officer Course, the Basic Medical Specialist Correspondence Course, the Patient Care Specialist Correspondence Course and the Warrant Officer Rotary Wing Correspondence Course.

A veteran of five years active duty, Thompson has been one of Brooke's outstanding soldiers. He was selected Soldier of the Month in June 1981, then won the April-May-June Soldier of the Quarter honors and topped this off by being selected Soldier

of the Year for 1981. In conjunction with being chosen Brooke's Soldier of the Year, he was awarded the Army Achievement Medal and a plaque from the Noncommissioned Officers Association.

But that was not the end for Thompson; he was subsequently chosen to represent Brooke in the Armed Forces Week Greater San Antonio Chamber of Commerce Outstanding Noncommissioned Officer competition.

Thompson's wife, Gracie, is the daughter of Manuel and Francisca Del Bosque of Beville. He will be reporting to Fort Rucker in September.

Brooke is the second largest of the eight medical centers operated by the U. S. Army Health Services Command. The center operates 700 beds in three hospitals for the care of medical, surgical and psychiatric patients.

Brooke also provides outpatient care for eligible personnel in 75 specialty clinics. Activities here cover almost every phase of patient care, medical training, postgraduate medical education and medical research.

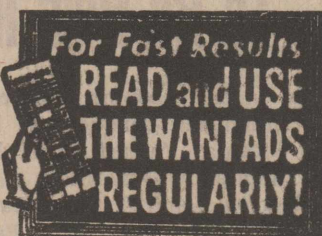

Allsup's To Participate In Fund Raising Drive

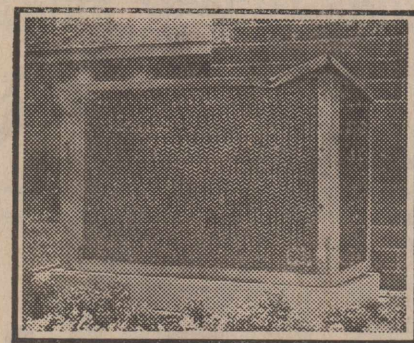

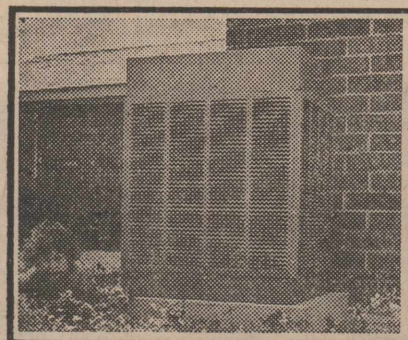

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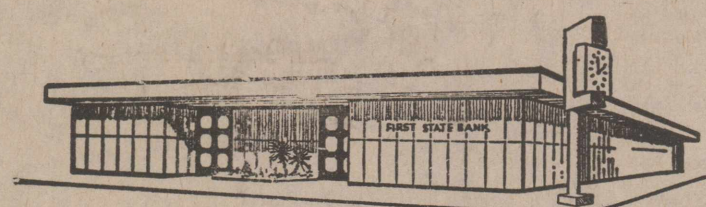
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Texas Association Meeting

LINE FROM LYNDIA

Lynda Fogerson Briscoe County Extension Agent Most of us think we couldn't live without our clothes dryer, but this appliance uses quite a bit of your home energy load. To make your clothes dryer more energy efficient, follow these simple techniques:
—First, read the use and care booklet for your dryer to learn what your dryer can and cannot do.

—Next, help the dryer do what it was designed to do by extracting as much water as possible from the clothes before placing them in the dryer.

—The third, and one of the most important steps, is to clean the lint filter, the outside vent and the dryer motor. Clean the lint screen after each load and check it before putting in another load. You will be amazed at how much faster your clothes will dry if you have not been in the habit of doing this. The warm air must be pulled through the lint screen in order for clothes to dry. If this airflow is blocked by a heavy lint buildup, it takes much longer for clothes to dry—thus using more energy.

Clean the outside vent every month and make sure the "flapper" opens and closes freely. Vacuum lint from the motor housing three or four times a year. Follow your manufacturer's instructions for this. You may also find an accumulation of dust, dirt and "grainy" particles in the motor housing back of the lint screen. I find this requires the vacuum cleaner nozzle to clean out every few months.

Additional tips for making your dryer a more energy-efficient appliance are:

—Don't mix heavy fabrics with light ones.

—Don't add wet items to a partly dry load.

—Run only full dryer loads, but don't overload. Overloading takes a longer time to dry the clothes and can result in wrinkling.

—Tumble clothes in the dryer to help remove wrinkling, since this will decrease human and electric energy otherwise needed for ironing.

—Drip-dry individual items and very small loads in the bathroom or on a porch rather than using the dryer.

—Dry loads one after another to take advantage of "leftover heat."

—Don't open the dryer door unnecessarily.

—Remove items to be ironed while they're still damp and dry such items together in one load if possible. (I know many people don't iron, but I still do.)

—Don't over-dry clothing. Remember, permanent-press fabrics absorb less water than natural fibers so they require less drying time.

—Dry clothes outdoors on a clothesline whenever possible.

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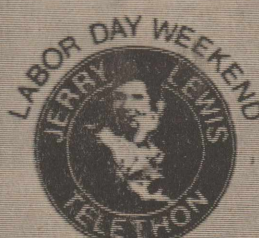
