Troy Oliver Buried In Arkansas

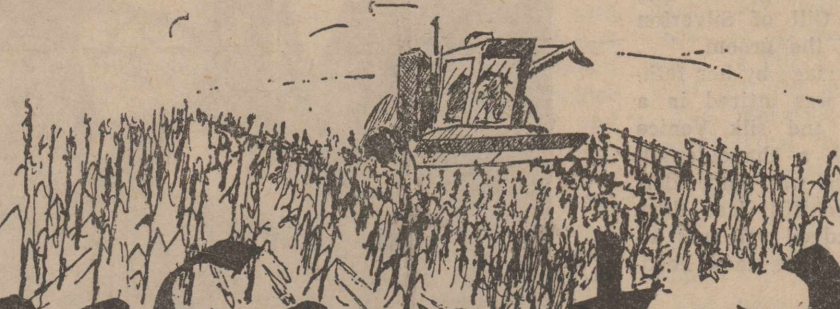

Owls Lose Last Game To Valley

Silverton's Owls closed out their football season at Valley Friday night by losing 42-12 to the Patriots.

The Owls took the opening kickoff, and looked good as they marched downfield. QB Shane Reagan completed a pass to Clifford Clardy which was good for a first down on the Valley 35. Jim Forbes rushed for five, then another pass to Clardy moved the ball to the 24.

Reagan passed to Warren Jarrett for a touchdown with 10:22 remaining in the first period, but this was nullified by a procedure penalty against the Owls. Reagan carried for a first down on the Patriot 10, then the Owls moved to the one on a pass interference call against Valley.

The Owls failed to score, and the ball went over to the Patriots on the one. The Owl defense held, and the Patriots punted to their own 30. Reagan passed to Clardy for the score with 6:06 showing on the first-quarter clock. The extra point was missed, and the Owls led 6-0.

Valley charged back through two first downs and scored with 3:55 still to be played in the first period. They kicked the PAT and led 7-6.

The Owls punted on their next fourth down, and the Patriots scored on their sixth play with 1:14 remaining on the clock. They kicked the extra point, and held a 14-6 lead.

The Owls made another first down on a completion to Clardy, but were forced to punt on the next series. Valley punted to end their next series and the teams traded a couple more punts. The Owls completed a pass to Craig Patton, but it lacked some being enough for a first down and the Owls punted to the Valley 39, from where the Patriots drove in for a score three plays later with 4:50 to be played in the second period. The PAT kick was good, and the Patriots had extended their lead to 21-6.

Reagan completed another pass to Craig Patton on the next series, but it wasn't enough, and on fourth down the ball was centered over the punter's head and rolled around in the end zone before he picked it up and ran to the one.

Valley scored, added two extra points on a pass, and led 29-6 with 2:50 still remaining.

The Owls came back with a first down run by Craig Patton and a pass completion to Clardy, but the Owls were penalized 15 yards and were forced to punt. Valley made a first down before fumbling and seeing the Owls recover. Valley intercepted an Owl pass before the first half ended.

Drilling To Start Soon On McWilliams Place

An intention to drill has been filed for a wildcat by STD Drilling Company which will be known as the No. 1 Guy McWilliams.

This location is 2200 feet from south and 467 feet from the east line in Section 146, G&M, BS&F survey, nine miles east of Silverton. Permitted depth is to 9000 feet.

Drilling is nearing completion on the Bomar-Griffin wildcat north of Silverton, and is said to be below 7000 feet at the James Davis location south of town.

There are pumps in both the Cogdell wildcat on the north rim of Tule Canyon and the Sojourner-drilled Cogdell well. The south well is said to be pumping 30% oil.

The Charlotte Etgen well is still being pumped, and the pump has been removed from the G. Mayfield well.

CITIZENS ASSISTING IN CUTTING DOWN ON GAME VIOLATIONS

Thanks to the 67th Legislature and the hard work of some of the citizens of this state, there is another tool available to assist in apprehending persons committing flagrant violations of the game and fish laws. It is called "Operation Game Thief."

A committee made up of persons with an active interest in game and fish conservation meets in April and October each year to make reward payments. "Operation Game Thief" has been in existence for only one year, and has already paid several rewards. One of the rewards went to a caller who reported a game violation that resulted in the arrest of 13 violators who had killed 1,327 doves in one day. The fines for this one tip amounted to \$13,390.

To date, over 400 calls through the "Operation Game Thief" program have been received with 170 convictions obtained. Most of these calls are to report violations that wardens would not have found without their assistance.

In the Silverton-Quitaque area, many hunters who reside elsewhere come to hunt wildlife, and there is only one warden to patrol the farms, ranches and lakes, so if you are interested in protecting the wildlife, you can help by reporting any violation.

A person who has information pertaining to a violation can call the warden of this area or a toll-free number, 1-800-792-GAME, and give the information to a 24-hour dispatcher. The caller is eligible for a reward if an arrest and conviction is obtained. If anyone is interested in more information about this program, you can call Barbara Pigg, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, or the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Farmers May Receive Advance 1982 Crop Deficiency Payments

The Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1982 requires the Secretary of Agriculture to make 1982 advance deficiency payments available to eligible producers.

These payments are to be made using 70% of a projected deficiency rate. Calculations will be made by multiplying the farm yield times 9.7 cents per pound for cotton, 10.5 cents per bushel for corn, and 12.6 cents per bushel for grain sorghum.

The results of this calculation will give you your per acre payment rate. This rate times planted acres will give you the amount of the advance payment that can be made.

Because this money will be subject to income tax if taken in 1982, all producers are to be given the option of taking or rejecting the payment this year. A letter is being mailed to producers this week that will give an opportunity to request the advance payments for each farm. Wheat deficiency payments will be made in December, and this will be the total payment for that crop. Producers will not have the option to reject this payment.

Predatory Animal Control District Organized Recently

The Briscoe County Predatory Animal Control District was organized at a meeting October 28. Officers elected are Johnnie Burson, president; Don Burson, vice-president, and Larry Jarrett, secretary.

It was decided that Briscoe County will pay \$2,000 on the salary of a government trapper to help control coyotes, and that Briscoe County producers will pay \$3,000.

Contracts have been mailed to producers, and these can be taken to the First National Bank in Quitaque, First State Bank in Silverton, or to the County Extension Office in Silverton.

Former Resident To Have Novel Published

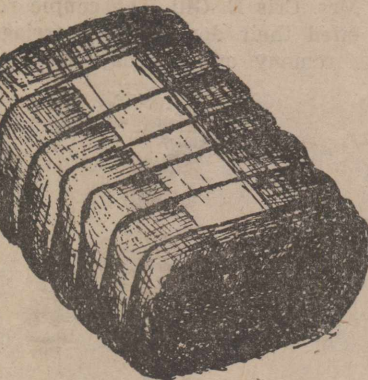
The Briscoe County News recently received an advance copy of "Sandstone," a brand-new novel by Robert Rhode which is scheduled for publication on November 15, 1982.

The reviews show that this book has been warmly received. It is a terrific western by a first-time novelist.

A bank robbery by a young and beautiful woman, Elizabeth Castle, opens this unusual novel. With the assistance of a troupe of four other show girls, her natural inclination is to leave town in a hurry. On the getaway trail they meet Seth March, a wandering cowhand who suddenly finds himself holding the bag, a bag of \$50,000 from the holdup. From here on the story continues at a fast pace when the girls are apprehended by the marshal. Then when a ruthless bounty hunter enters the picture and wants to take the troupe back to Tucson, Seth March must finally take sides.

Robert Rhode developed his western heritage in the cattle and farming area of Briscoe County. He is a graduate of Silverton High School and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Carman Rhode. Until recently he taught various cultural and literature courses in the humanities department of a college in Tennessee, and currently teaches part time while concentrating most of his energies on writing and restoring his old Tudor home. Now living in Memphis, Tennessee, his lifestyle and values of independence and self sufficiency mirror those of the heroes about whom he writes. This is his first published novel.

The book is dedicated to Mari and Carman Rhode, "who taught me how to tell the good guys from the bad."

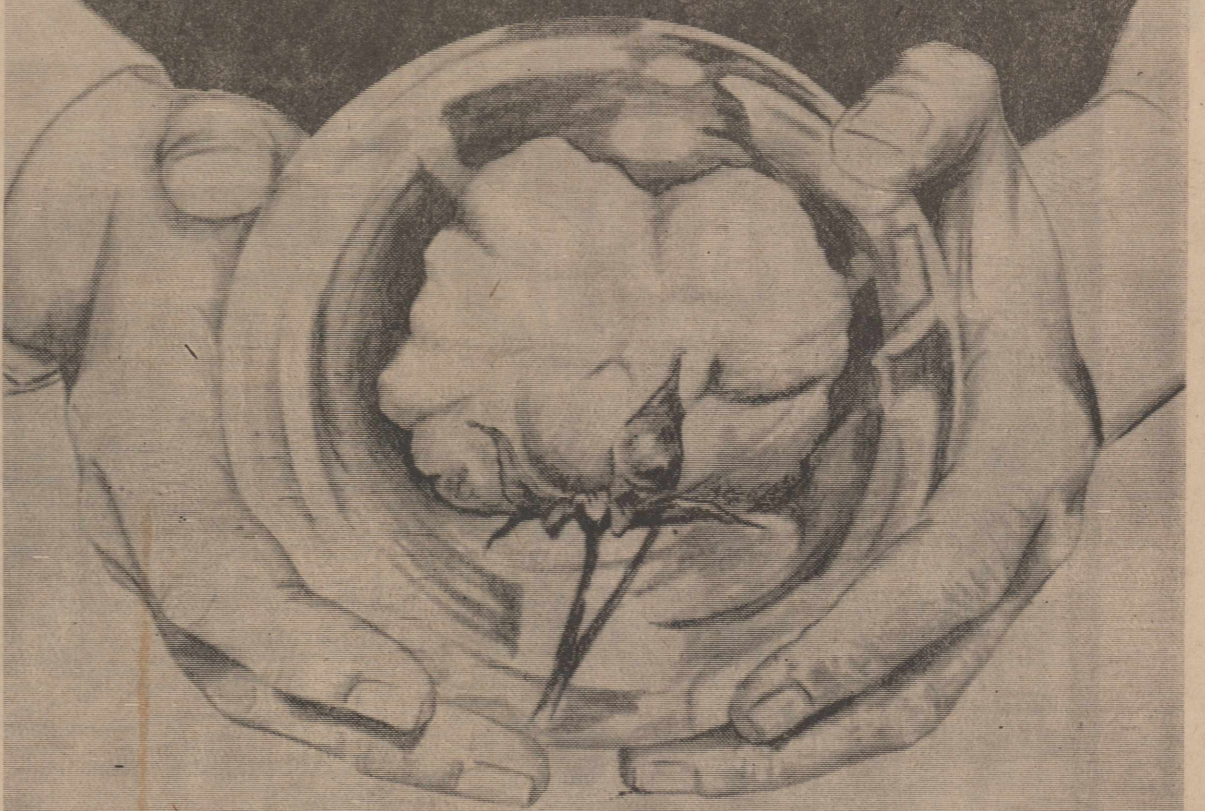
