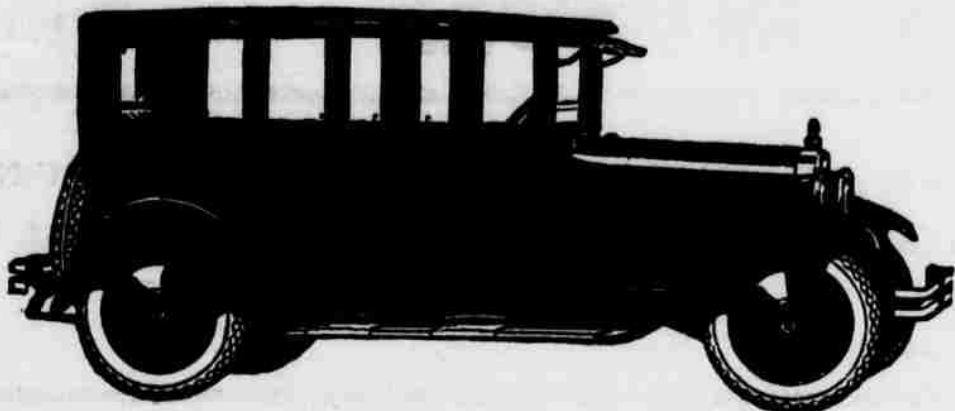

Thanksgiving Dinner

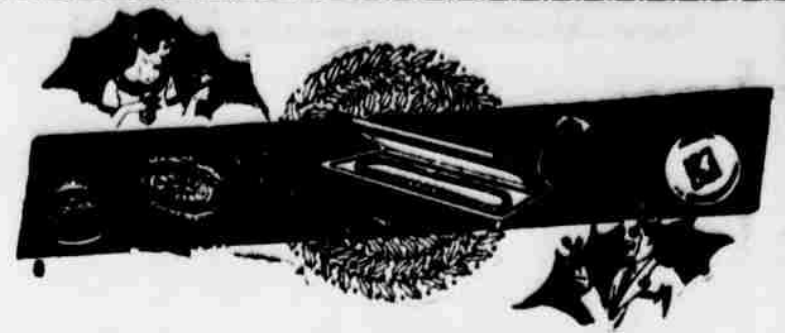

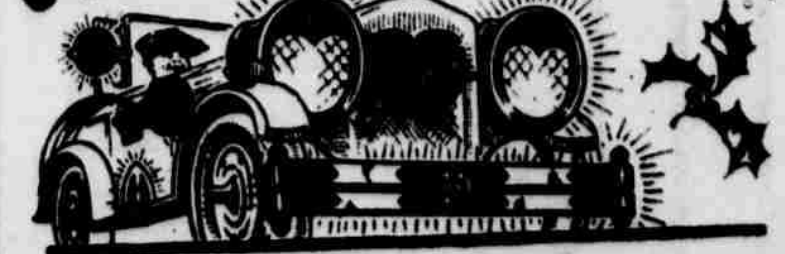
