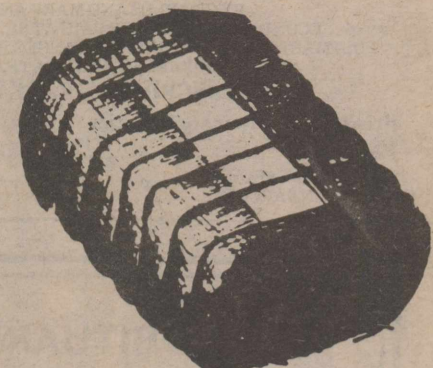

She has been elected to Who's Who in THS.

TO BE HELD AT
TEXAS 4-H CENTER

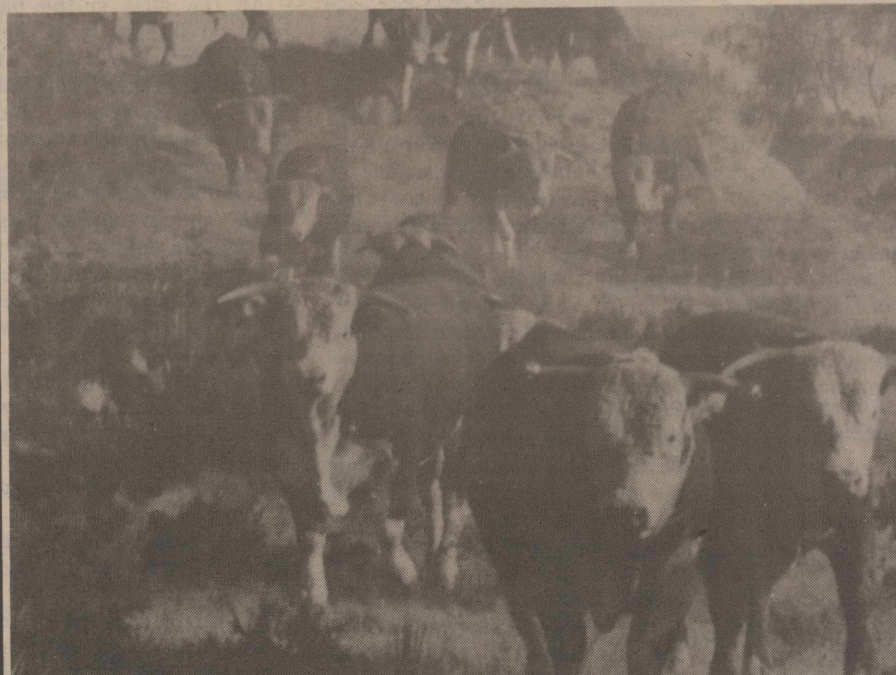

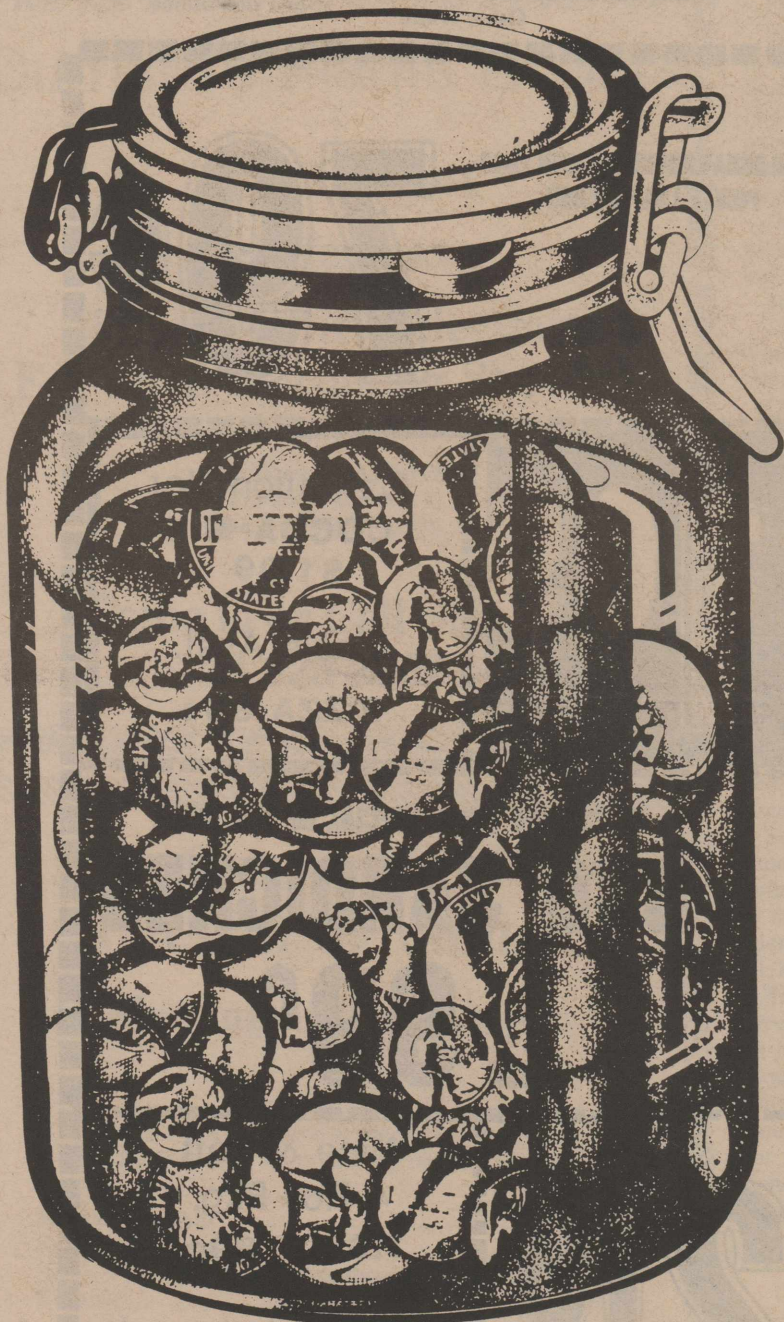

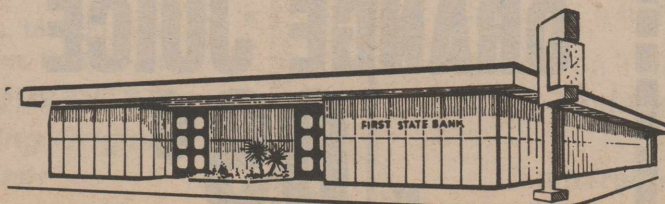

Morrison Re-Elected As Director Of Soil Conservation District

Murry Wayne Morrison of Quitaque was recently re-elected to the Caprock Soil and Water Conservation District board of directors, representing zone five of the district.

The purpose of the Caprock SWCD, with headquarters in Briscoe County, is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowners.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

As one of five individuals serving on the district board of directors, Morrison will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

In other areas of leadership, Morrison is active in the Quitaque Church of Christ and serves on the school board for the Valley Independent School District.

In Texas there are 201 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal subdivision of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCDs do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the districts are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

Organized in 1945, the Caprock SWCD has been serving Briscoe County for over 38 years. Current members of the district board of directors include C. L. Sutton, Don Burson, Jarus Flowers, Murry Wayne Morrison and Jimmy Myers. The district board meets every first Thursday of each month at 7:30 p.m. in the Soil Conservation Service Office in Silverton. The public is invited

to attend and provide input on conservation programs for Briscoe County.

USDA ISSUES 1983-CROP

SOYBEAN LOAN, PURCHASE RATES

Basic county loan and purchase rates for 1983-crop soybeans grading No. 2 were issued recently by Everett Rank, administrator of the USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conser-

vation Service. Rank said the basic 1983-crop soybean rates are based on the national average loan and purchase rate of \$5.02 per bushel.

Changes in the area-to-area relationships, prices received by farmers, trends in production and results of the loan and purchase program resulted in the following adjustments from 1982 rates:

—Louisiana and South Carolina were increased three cents per bushel.

—Kentucky, Maryland, North Carolina and Virginia were increased two cents per bushel.

—Montana was decreased four cents per bushel.

—Colorado, Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota, Texas and Wisconsin were decreased three cents per bushel.

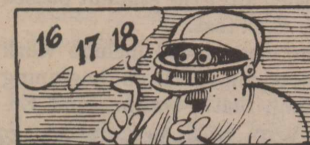
—New Mexico and Nebraska

were decreased two cents per bushel.

—Arizona was decreased one cent per bushel.

No changes were made in the discount schedule, but low moisture premiums are discontinued for 1983 soybean loan rates to be in line with current market practices.

Conservation Emphasized In 1984 Feed Grain Program

Secretary of Agriculture John R. Block has announced a 10 percent acreage reduction for "acreage conservation reserve purposes" for the 1984 feed grain program. Program signup period will be January 16-February 24, the same as for the 1984 wheat program.

"I am referring to the 1984 program as an acreage conservation reserve to give special

emphasis to the administration's objective," Block said. "We want to encourage farmers to place their more erosive land into conservation uses while continuing to balance supply and demand during 1984. The current payment-in-kind program accomplished this, and our goal in 1984 is to encourage a continuation of this very important conservation practice."

Block said participation in the 1984 program is a way in which farmers can control over-supply situations similar to what they have just faced. "It will also provide a degree of insurance for farmers against price fluctuation and adverse weather conditions," Block said. "The point is, it is not always in the farmer's best interest to plant fence row to fence row."

Regular Commodity Credit Corporation price support loan and purchase rates, per bushel, will be: corn, \$2.55; sorghum, \$2.42; barley, \$2.08; oats, \$1.31; rye, \$2.17.

Other 1984 feed grain program provisions include:

—To be eligible for price support benefits, a producer must agree to limit corn, sorghum, oats and barley acreage planted for harvest to not more than 90 percent of the farm's feed grain base and devote to an acreage conservation reserve an acreage of eligible cropland equal to 11.11 percent of the 1984 planted acreage. As under the 1983 program, two bases will be established, one for corn and sorghum and the other for barley and oats.

SEARCH AND RESCUE SEMINAR HELD HERE

OCTOBER 1-2

Paramedics and Emergency Medical Technicians from throughout the Texas Panhandle participated in a two-day search and rescue seminar October 1-2 at Camp Haynes near Silverton.

The course was designed to teach the pre-hospital medical

personnel. The basic techniques for conducting search and rescue operations, how to package and move patients injured in field emergencies, and how to coordinate resources in emergency operations. The emergency medical teams were taught principles of tracking, compass use, landing of helicopters, and emergency locator signaling for downed aircraft.

Sheriff's Department personnel have the responsibility for coordinating ground operations in the State of Texas. In many of these instances, they need support from emergency medical personnel who are trained in search and rescue tactics. Fifty certified ambulance personnel attended the course, sponsored by the Silverton Emergency Medical Service Association and Panhandle Emergency Medical Service System.

The instructors for the course were Rick Goodman and George MacLeod, both nationally certified and recognized experts in the field of mountain rescue and downed aircraft recovery.

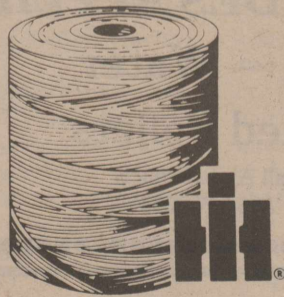

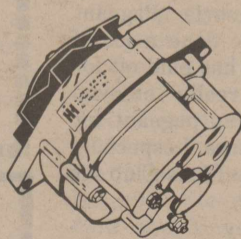

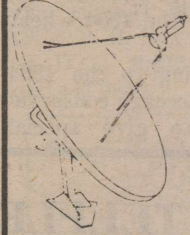
