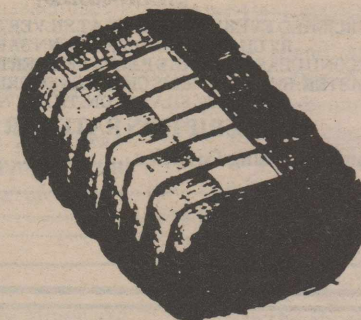

Playoff Tentatively Set For Tuesday

A playoff game between the Valley Lady Patriots and Silverton Owlettes has been tentatively scheduled for Tuesday, February 14, at the Hutcherson Sports Center on the campus of Wayland Baptist University in Plainview. Game time is 6:30 p.m. This game would determine the district champion and runner-up, both of whom will advance to the bi-district playoff.

This game will be necessary if both Valley and Silverton girls win their games this week.

Adult admission tickets will be \$2.00 and student tickets will be \$1.00. District passes will be honored.

Locals Split With Hedley, Lose To Valley

Silverton's Owls and Owlettes split a pair of games with Hedley on Tuesday night of last week, but when Friday night rolled around, the teams from Valley were very hot and the locals were cold, and the Owls and Owlettes both lost.

If the Valley and Silverton girls win their games this week, they will be involved in a playoff for the district championship on Tuesday night of next week. This is merely to determine which team is the district champion and which is the district runner-up. Both will represent the district in the bi-district games with Nazareth and Sudan on Thursday night of next week, but which team (Silverton or Valley) will play which team (Nazareth or Sudan) will have to be decided in case the round robin does end in a tie with Silverton having won the first half and Valley having won the second half.

"Some of our girls have been sick this week," said Coach Kelly Braisher, who missed some time from school due to illness herself last week and really wasn't feeling up to par early this week.

The Owlettes had to come from behind to beat Hedley 58-51 Tuesday night of last week, and the Owls finished on the short end of the 59-46 score.

Alesha Patton led the offense for the girls with 16 points, while Lee Ann Durham caged 13 and Suzann Settle popped the nets for 10 points. Other scoring was by Tammi Edwards, eight; Angie Lowrey, seven, and Lisa Lavy, four points.

Jack Hightower Files For Re-Election

Congressman Jack Hightower announced this week that he has filed for re-election to Congress from the 13th District.

Hightower has served the 13th District as a member of the U. S. House of Representatives since 1975, through five Congresses and three Presidents. Prior to his election, Hightower served in both the Texas House and Senate, and as District Attorney.

"The people of our District have been good to me and my family," Hightower said. "I've worked to promote bipartisan, conservative, common-sense solutions to our National problems. I'm proud of what we've been able to do for the people of this District and for the Nation."

Through his work on the House Appropriations Committee and its key Subcommittees, Hightower has been able to effect millions of dollars in savings for the taxpayers.

"I want to make government work for people, not against them," Hightower said. "In this Congress, we've had the nay-sayers whose only contribution has been to vote 'no' on everything, and be for nothing, and we've had those on the other side who want government to do more and more for everyone at whatever cost. Neither of these extremes provide the solutions to our National problems. I have worked with other constructive members to try to create sensible

agreements in Congress on legislation the President will sign, and which will be good for the country."

Hightower pledged to continue to "vote to protect Social Security, to reduce wasteful Government spending and to promote a balanced budget."

Hightower is a member of the Defense and Agriculture Subcommittees of the House Appropriations Committee, and has received numerous leadership awards from agricultural, defense, small business and budget-cutting groups during his tenure in Congress.

A "Congressional Quarterly" analysis of Hightower's voting record since his first election rated him a consistently high 75 to 89 percent conservative. Hightower's voting attendance record has been one of the best in Congress, averaging 93 percent for his nine years in the House.

"I keep an open door to my office and take great satisfaction in helping people with their particular governmental problems. That's one of the most fulfilling aspects of the job," Hightower said.

A life-long resident of the 13th District, Hightower was born in Memphis and has been a Vernon resident for some 33 years. He and his wife, the former Colleen Ward of Tulia, have three daughters and one granddaughter.

OBITUARIES

CLARICE SERENA DOUGLAS

Funeral services for Clarice Serena Douglas, 83, were conducted at 10:00 a.m. Wednesday, February 8, at the First United Methodist Church in Silvertown. Officiating were Rev. Royce Denton, pastor of Parkland Baptist Church in Clovis, New Mexico, Rev. Jene Greer, pastor of the First United Methodist Church in Silvertown, and Earl Cantwell, minister of the Rock Creek Church of Christ.

Mrs. Douglas died at 10:00 a.m. Monday at Methodist Hospital in Lubbock where she was taken by the Silvertown Volunteer Ambulance Service on Wednesday morning of last week.

Mrs. Douglas was born April 11, 1900 in Bell County, and was the daughter of J. C. and Mattie Riggs Whiteley. Mr. and Mrs. Whiteley and their eight children moved to Briscoe County in two covered wagons in April 1901, and settled in the Lakeview Community southwest of Silvertown.

The children attended the Lakeview School and the family received its mail at the Reeves Post Office.

Clarice Whiteley and Watson Douglas were married June 2, 1923 while sitting in a Model T Ford car in front of the Methodist Church in Tulia. They moved to Mobeetie where Mr. Douglas and his brother-in-law operated a hardware store. Later they moved to Umbarger and both Mr. and Mrs. Douglas were employed by Joe Friemel Mercantile Store and Post Office.

In 1930, they moved to Whiteley Switch to care for her parents and his mother. They operated a grocery store and he managed an elevator there until 1943.

During a time when oil exploration was going on in that part of the county, Mrs. Douglas served family-style meals for the drilling crew and so many came for meals that her husband put up a sign on the Floydada highway advertising Clarice's ranch-style meals.

The family moved from Whiteley to Silvertown to be closer to school in 1944. In 1945, they purchased the funeral homes at Silvertown and Quitaque and built the Douglas Funeral Home and Flower Shop. They operated the first flower shops in Silvertown, Quitaque and Turkey. Later they

added a flower shop in Tulia. Mr. Douglas died September 28, 1956, and Mrs. Douglas continued to operate the family business until 1965 when she retired. She had continued to take telephone messages for the funeral home and operate rental property until the day she entered the hospital.

She was preceded in death by seven brothers and sisters, Viola Haynes, Jennie Penn, Ruth Foster, Albert Diviney, Jim C. Whiteley, Madeline Stark, Irene Ayres and Tom Whiteley.

She was a member of the Methodist Church.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. Charles Wayne (Joni) Mayfield of Bryan; four grandchildren, Zane, Dayne, Traci and Staci Mayfield, all of Silvertown; and several nieces and nephews, including Mrs. Patsy Herrington and O. R. Stark, jr. of Quitaque.

Pallbearers were Randy Stark, Scotty Stark, Max Ham, Gilmore Denison, Jack Haynes and Bill Denton.

Naaman, a "great man," commander of the Syrian army, was a leper (2 Kings 5). A captive maiden from Israel served Naaman's wife and urged that a "prophet" in Samaria could heal the captain. Naaman went to Jehovah's prophet (Elisha). He was told, "Go and wash in the Jordan seven times, and . . . thou shalt be clean." The warrior "went away in a rage." However, cool heads reasoned with him until he did, indeed, dip "seven times in the Jordan . . . and he was clean."

In gratitude, he offered rich gifts to Elisha, but he refused.

Naaman departed, but Gehazi,

Elisha's servant, greedily and secretly (he thought!) ran after the Syrian and made up a story about an emergency need for silver and raiment.

Gehazi then returned to Elisha, lying a mile a minute! But the prophet saw right through his furtive servant, and he asked, "Is it a time to receive money, and . . . garments, and oliveyards and vineyards, and sheep and oxen, and men-servants and maid-servants?"

A thought-provoking question! It is a waste of time to have one's "hope set on the uncertainty of riches" (1 Tim. 6:17). It is a time "to awake out of sleep" (Rom. 13:11-14), "redeeming the time" (Eph. 5:16) in scriptures-guided spiritual alertness.

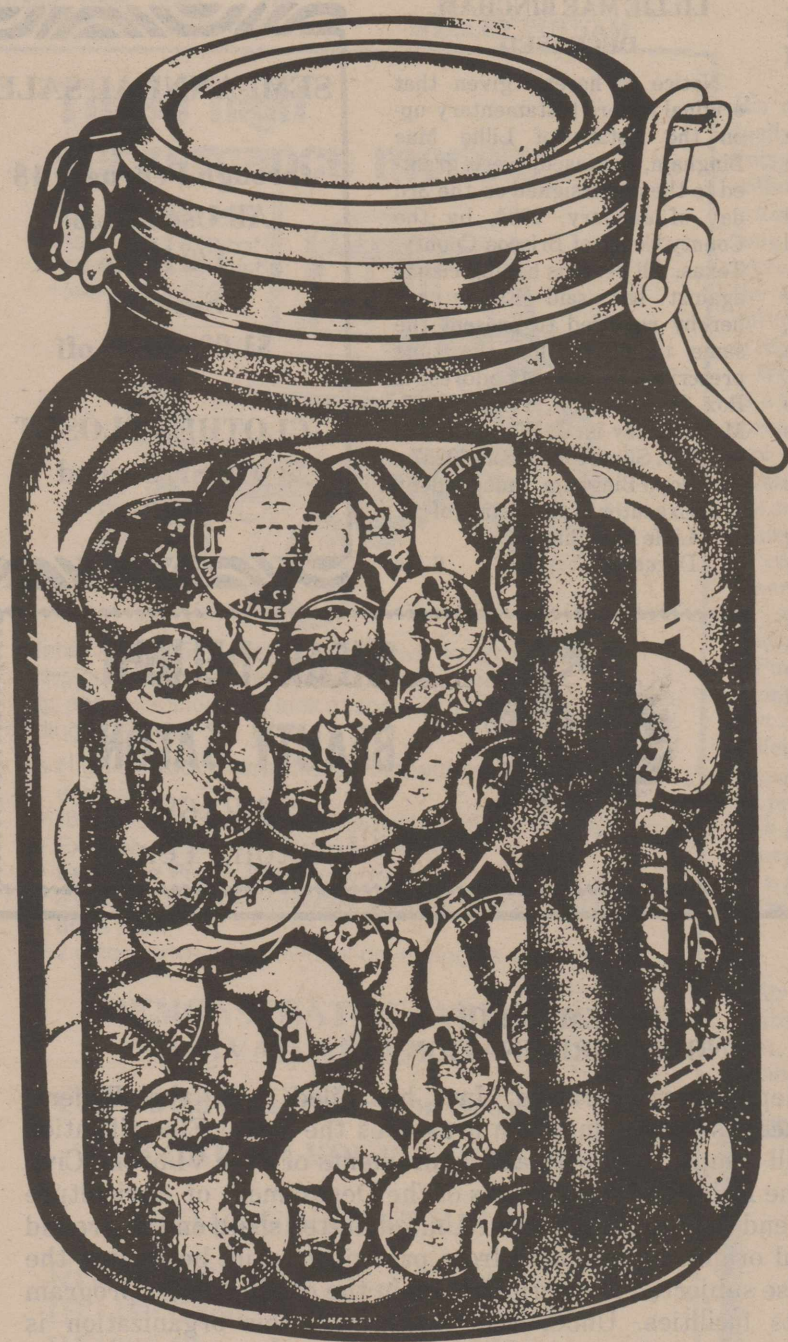

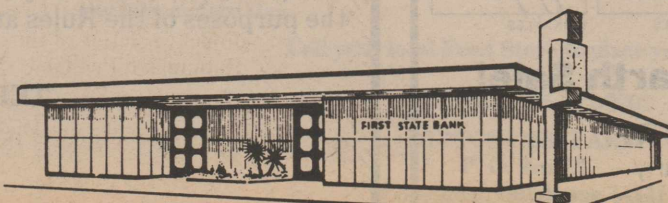

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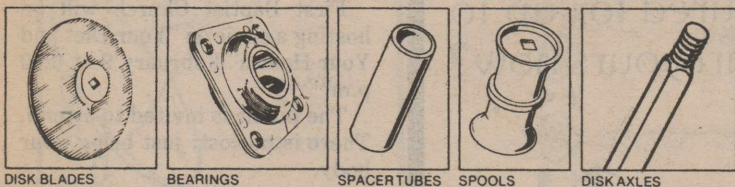
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The Scientists Tell Me...

Recent Migrants Can Aid State's Continued Growth

Since 1970, Texas has had nearly 2.25 million people move here from other parts of the nation, according to U.S. Census Bureau estimates. That's more people than the 13 colonies had at the time of the Revolution.

What are these new Texans like? How do they feel

about their new home and do they feel they have benefitted by moving here?

These and similar questions were part of a recent state-wide survey conducted by the Department of Rural Sociology in the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Texas A&M University.

"The results of the survey indicate that persons who have migrated to the State

in the past 7 years are likely to make major contributions to the State's continued growth," according to Dr. Steve H. Murdock, head of the Department of Rural Sociology.

"Over 89 percent of these migrants were in the most productive ages of 19 to 54, nearly 40 percent were managers, or in other technical occupations, over 20 percent had come to the state to work in the energy or manufacturing industries, over 32 percent were college graduates and nearly 25 percent had incomes over \$40,000 per year."

These migrants not only

had very positive characteristics but they also are generally happy with their new homes. They rated local governments, schools, health services, job opportunities, shopping opportunities, housing and recreation more positively than did long-term residents of the state, according to Murdock.

In addition, over 64 percent rated their new communities as above average in terms of overall amenities.

Finally, over 57 percent of the migrants, (compared to 36 percent of long-term residents), felt that they were financially better off

in 1983 than in 1982.

Overall, then, the results of the survey indicate that recent migrants to the State have characteristics that will contribute positively to the State's future development and have found the State to be a desirable place to live and work. It appears that most migrants have found that their positive expectations about Texas have been fulfilled, Murdock concluded.

DRAPERY CARE TIPS

You can avoid throwing money out the window if you use proper care in choosing and using draperies. Here are a few hints.

When you buy drapes, ask for totally preshrunk fabric. Ask about the colorfastness of the fabric and its resistance to fading from light and atmospheric exposure. Linen drapes usually last longer.

Read all the care instructions that accompany your purchase. Ask for them if they are not offered and share this information with your drycleaner when the drapes are cleaned.

To prolong the life of your draperies, clean them frequently, at least once a year, and vacuum regularly between cleanings. Rotate draperies if possible to vary light exposure. Protect draperies from moisture, such as rain through an open door or window or condensate on the window panes.

Many drapery fabrics are surface printed rather than dyed. Some of these colors, especially very deep or

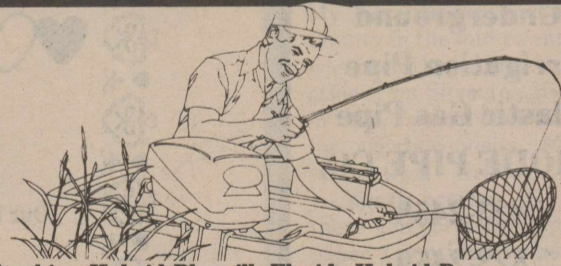


You can keep your draperies looking better longer if you vacuum them regularly.

bright colors, are not colorfast. This type of color failure is the responsibility of the manufacturer. Often the color loss is unobjectionable, but it is wise to have all matching draperies cleaned at once, so any dulling of color is uniform. Matching bedspreads and furniture covers should also be cleaned at the same time.

A free brochure with other important facts about draperies is available from many fine member drycleaners. It is published by the International Fabricare Institute, and called "Selecting and Caring for Your Draperies."

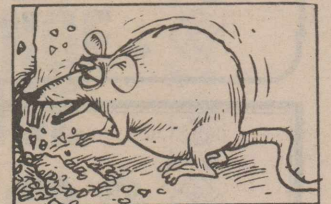

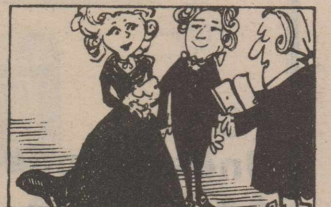
