## REPORT OF INSPECTOR ON HASKELL HI SCHOOL

The State High School Inspector visited the Haskell High school about one month ago. Below is the report of this visitor.

If the requirements of this report are met it will require about \$5,000 more for the support of these schools from local taxation than we are getting at present. These requirements will have to be met or the classification and affiliation of the Haskell High school will be lost.

If we had not had good luck this year we would have had a deficit of about \$2,500 in our expense account at the end of this school year.

We received a refund of \$2,500 in interest on the High school bonds this year that saved the schools. It will require \$2,500 more money if these three extra teachers are secured next year.

In order to secure the \$5,000 additional support for the Haskell schools property values in Haskell will have to be raised about \$400,000. Are the people of Haskell ready for this additional tax for their schools?

State Department of Education, High school division, Austin Texas. Report of school supervisor on Haskell High school, M. H. Brasher Superintendent, O. E. Patterson President of Board, Dated March 7, 1924. Supervisor Margret Cotham.

1 That at least two other teachers be added to the elementary faculty for the school year of 1924-25, and one to the High School faculty. The present crowded conditions cannot be permitted, if the school is to remain on the classified list. One room has an enrollment of more than fifty, two others have enrollment of more than sixty. Forty-two is given as the minimum number in any room.

The Haskell High School has a gratifying number of affiliated units of work and is asking for more. If the present status is to continue, more careful attention must be given to the requirements of the Department of Education and to the recommendations of visiting supervisors. It seems a waste of effort for a school to lose the credit it has gained, when sufficient teaching force would guarantee the safety of this credit.

2 That unless this addition to the teaching force be provided, and the Department of Education so notified by October 1, 1924, the Committee on Classified and Accredited High Schools be asked to withdraw classification from the Haskell High School, and cancel all units of affiliation.

3 That the library be further increased by the addition of the following items:

a. Standard fiction required for outside reading.

b. Anthologies to supply tenth and eleventh grade students.

c. Six copies of Johnson's "The Private life of the Romans" for reference in the Latin department.

d. Enough supplementary reading for the elementary grades to meet the minimum requirements of \$25.00 per room.

4 That credit in English history be withdrawn since this course has been discontinued for two years.

5 That all material submitted for accrediting receive careful consideration.

6 That commendations be given for the following additions to the general equipment:

a. \$200.00 worth of books for the library.

b. \$200.00 worth of equipment for the laboratory.

c. A set of dining room furniture for the home economics department.

7 That further commendation be given the quiet orderliness of the student body, and the generally excellent type of class work being done.

## SCHOOL NEWS

They are doing as they please, running the streets all afternoon after school and until late at night. They are not interested in their school work. All they are interested in is having a good time. These children are sowing to the wind and they will reap the whirl wind. The lack of parental control and the permission to loaf and run the streets and go automobile riding unchaperoned is the curse of this age and we and our children are going to pay very dearly for it after it is too late. We are going to reap what we sow. If some of our parents would talk with some of our peace officers they would learn something that would startle them. I am afraid they will learn these things after it is too late. The children control the parents in many homes. Because of the lack of parental control the foundation of our home and our church and our nation are gradually undermined. Unless there is a change we are going to put on sack cloth and ashes and bow our heads in heart broken sorrow and shame. God is going to hold us responsible for this. The Bible teaches very plainly the necessity of parental control and training your children but the trouble is that many of us do not read and study our Bible and ask God for help and guidance in training our children during these dangerous and troublesome times. This laxity of parental control of the children on the part of many homes renders the task very difficult on the part of those parents that do control their children.

Parents you had better know where your boys and girls are at all times if you want to keep them safe and un-

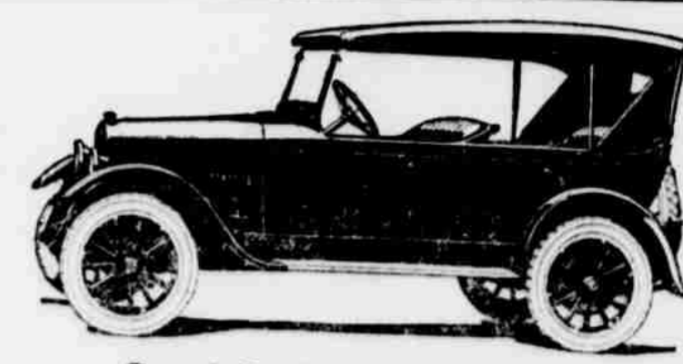

A very close examination was made but no sign of the grasshoppers could be seen in Mr. Montgomery's pasture. We next drove to the home of J. W. (Walter) Nany for whom Mr. Trice had done some terracing a few days

before. Mr. Nany was himself working on his windmill but Mr. Folks who was running the plow was preparing ground for planting. Mr. Nany's farm is very level but he is using the terraced rows just the same, in order to hold the water which falls on the ground, that it might not so quickly run off carrying the best part of the soil with it. 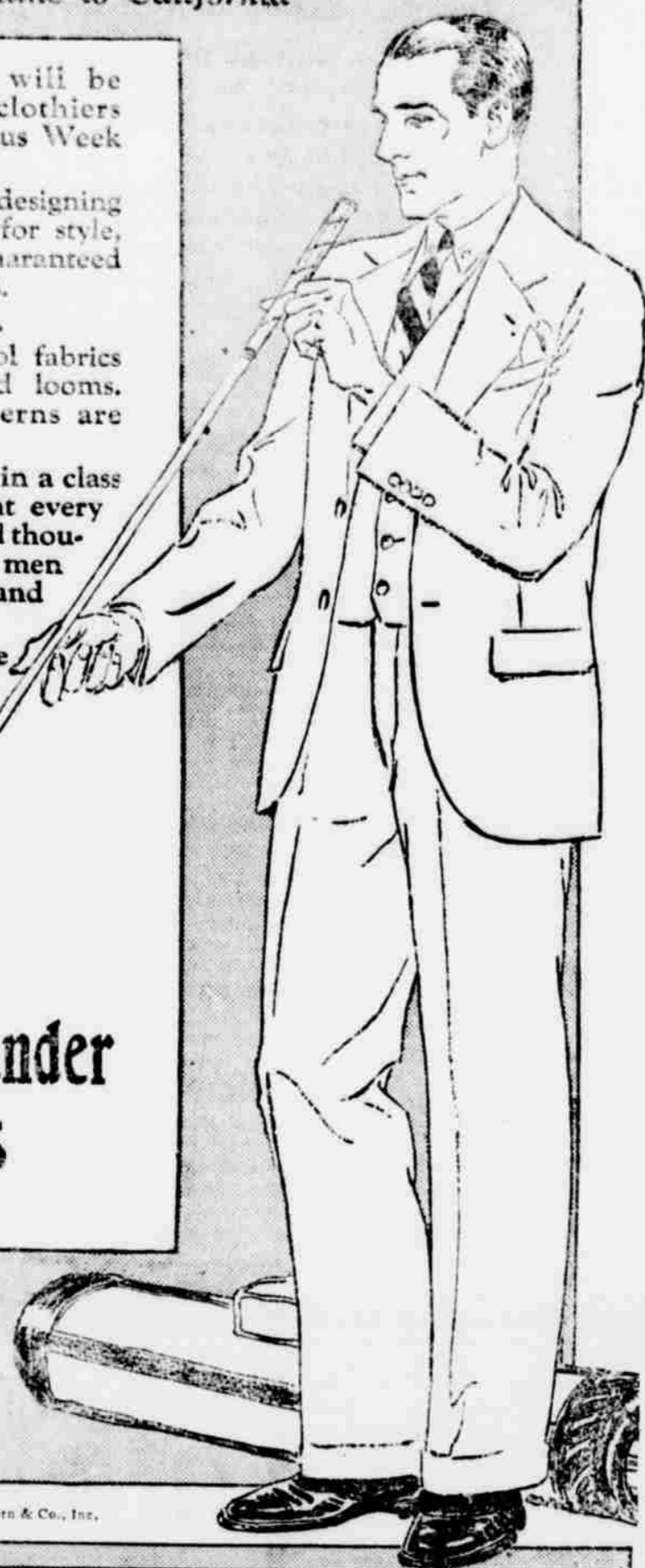
