No advantage to separate return

In almost all situations, married taxpayers will pay more tax if they file separate returns instead of a joint return. There are several factors that need to be taken into account when considering filing separate returns.

The tax rate itself is higher for married persons filing separately. Also, if one spouse itemizes their deductions, the other spouse must do the same as no standard deduction would be allowed. Further disadvantages are the loss of any child care credit, Earned Income credit and credits for the elderly or disabled.

The greatest disadvantage of filing separate returns comes if a taxpayer is domiciled in a community property state. In this case income is considered community property and is divided equally between both spouses. For example, if one spouse makes \$10,000 and the other earns \$50,000, each would be taxed on \$30,000 of income on a separate return. The tax would be calculated at a higher rate than on a joint return showing \$60,000. Texas is a community property state, as are Arizona, California, Idaho,

By Base Legal Office Louisiana, Nevada, New Mexico, Washington and Wisconsin. If you are domiciled in one of these states, you must take community property laws into consideration when you decide what filing status to use on your tax return. Contact your Unit Tax Advisor if you need more information on this matter.

> It is also important to note that married taxpayers can file a joint return even if they have lived apart all year or even if they married on Dec. 31 of the tax year. Separated but not divorced taxpayers who cannot or do not want to file a joint may qualify to file under 'Head of Household' status. See your tax booklet, IRS publication 17, or you unit advisor for more information about his possibil-

> Remember that when determining whether you are eligible for Earned Income Credit, you MUST include all nontaxable benefits paid to you such as BAQ, BAS, VHA, or the value of Base Housing in your earned income. If you otherwise qualify for EIC but these nontaxable amounts put your earned income above the limits, you must write

NEI by line 23b of Form 1040A or line 56 of Form 1040. If you do not do this and the IRS figures the credit for you and adds it to your refund, you should file an amended return (1040X) and repay the additional refund. If you don't do this by the filing deadline (April 17, 1989), you will then become liable for penalties and interest.



To insure or not

were recently identified as having operated their automobiles without insurance. Most will have purchased coverage at one point, to get the vehicle registered, but then allow the policy to expire. This is not a great way to save money.

It only takes a momentary lapse behind the wheel of an automobile and a life's savings can evaporate. Even if the individual is not at fault, the other driver might see it that way.

It is also a crime—a class C misde-

More than a few military members doesn't take an auto accident to get caught. Texas Law requires proof of insurance as a condition to driving. A law enforcement officer can ask for proof if he stops someone for speeding, defective equipment or something else. If the policy has expired, the insurance company must report it if notified by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Also, base driving privileges are lost. The base decal and tabs will be removed from the car and the member will walk or ride on base with someone else. Off base privileges (driver's license and meanor and potential Article 15. It vehicle registration) can be suspended

by the courts on a second conviction.

Insurance premiums may be high on a vehicle, but it beats the alternatives. The alternatives are: get caught without insurance- gamble on getting civil litigation, criminal charges and lost privileges; or deposit \$55,000 in cash or securities with the State Treasurer in lieu of insurance.

Another idea is to buy uninsured motorist coverage, because someone else might be taking the risk of being uninsured.

Conservation vital to offset energ

Fossil fuels - coal, liquid petroleum and natural gas – are nothing more than the remains of plants and animals buried in the sand, swamps and seas millions of years ago. But those resources play a very important part in everyone's life. They power automobiles, light homes and offices, regulate temperatures and are vital to any nation's de-

While countries around the globe currently hold vast reserves of fossil fuels, that most certainly will not be the case in the future. Simply put, those fossil fuels will run out, something DoD planners must take into account.

fense.

In the early 1980s, known world reserves of petroleum were estimated at 670 billion barrels – about 33 times the yearly world consumption.

The United States - the largest consumer of refined petroleum products in the world - depends on foreign sources for between onefourth and one-half of its petroleum needs. Domestic reserves in the country would last only five years, said a DoD official.

Unfortunately, the memories associated with the most recent energy crisis – remember the long gasoline lines at the service stations in 1973-1974 and the high heating bills of the period? - are beginning

They shouldn't, according to Department of Defense officials. Although DoD's energy consumption is enormous - 2 percent of all the energy consumed in the United States and 80 percent of all energy used in the federal government energy conservation programs in the last 10 years have saved the department upwards of \$4 billion.

Reese has been among the Air Force leaders in conservation efforts, capturing the Air Training Command Energy Management Incentive Award in the small unit division for the past two years.

While the news about energy conservation in the DoD is encouraging, recent studies show that the country is not paying as much attention to conservation as it once did. It's probably a good idea - for individuals and the country – to look at home and at work and do the little things that can add up to big savings, both in energy and money.

Conserving energy wasn't always a big deal. Long before 1000 BC the Chinese were drilling for natural gas and transporting it via bamboo shoots to heat and illuminate the palaces of emperors. In those days, natural gas was plentiful and free, so consumption was not a problem.

Not so today. It is costly and the need to adopt conservation measures grows with each passing year. Even though Reese is one of the top energy conservationists in the Air Force, the gas and electricity energy bill here for fiscal year 1988 still topped \$2 million, said Pat Sanderson, 64th Civil Engineering Squadron financial manager.

To help hold down costs, energy experts recommend setting thermostats at 78 degrees in the summer and 68 degrees during the colder months to conserve energy and save money. The cost of keeping room temperatures above 68 degrees in the winter can be as high as 63 percent more for a thermostat set at 80 degrees. The same is true for cooling a room at 72 degrees during the summer.

Other home energy savings in-


☐ Lowering the water heater thermostat to 110 degrees.

☐ Using fluorescent lighting when possible because it uses less

☐ Turning off lights when they aren't needed and putting outdoor lights on a timer.

☐ Washing only full loads of clothes and only in warm or cold water. Be sure the lint screen and outside exhaust of the dryer are

☐ Sealing, sealing, sealing. If the water heater, windows, doors or anything else in the home leaks, seal it to prevent drafts and higher energy costs.



ATC directs 'lights on' day

have designated March 31 as "Lights on for Safety Day" throughout ATC and are asking everyone to drive with their automobile headlights on this day.

The theme for the occasion is "Don't Be Fooled, Be Seen," and its purpose is twofold: To increase awareness and to remind people of those command members who have been injured or who have died in traffic-related accidents.

Since November 1988, six ATC people have died and one sustained permanent serious injuries as a result of auto mishaps.

AF Top NCO: getting the word to the flightline

When James C. Binnicker's tenure as the ninth chief master sergeant of the Air Force is over, he wants to leave this legacy:

"Whatever I decided to do was done with the troops in mind;

"Whatever we did was good for the Air Force and not for a particular group or individual;

"Integrity was the byword;

"Credibility was real; and

"I had a genuine concern."

In explaining his duties and responsibilities, Binnicker said, "For the record, it's written down that you advise the chief of staff on enlisted matters. After 31 years, I've got an opinion on everything, and I could sit right here in this office and give advice, without ever traveling or talking to another person. That wouldn't be fair to the chief of staff of the Air Force, nor to the troops because his (the chief of staff's) decision could be influenced by my opinion. So what I bring to this position is not only 31 years of experience, but the opinions, attitudes and feelings of the enlisted people around the world." Communications Gap

Binnicker wasn't armed with a list of changes he wanted to make when he took the reins of his position in 1986. But there is something that still disturbs him - a communication gap between headquarters and the troops. With a disappointed tone, Binnicker said, "We can't seem to get the word to the troops on the flight line. Once you explain something that has caused people to be upset, they say, 'Oh, now I understand,' and walk away wondering why somebody else didn't explain it before."

Keeping the troops and their families informed about what the leadership in Washington, D.C., is doing on their behalf is one of his greatest challenges as he sees it.

"In general, we've got an outstanding system, and we take very good care of our people," noted Binnicker. "I've been trying to ensure that our system works at 100 percent peak efficiency. Whether it's on a small isolated mountaintop or a large base in Texas, our people should find similar standards of living wherever they might be." **Need for More Housing**

Binnicker is adamant about the need for better housing for married and single airmen. "The tragic thing is, young troops are getting married just to get out of the dormitories," he said. "Single people should have the kind of quarters

"Today, we have the highest quality Air Force we've ever had," said Binnicker. "And we've got to keep it."

that would make them want to stay in. We've spent millions of dollars improving our barracks, and they're absolutely beautiful - state of the art. But there are still two people living in a 180-square-foot

"Going into the 21st century, quality of life is a must. We must provide better quarters for our single troops living in the barracks. We can't continue putting two people in a 180-square-foot room and ask them to share a bathroom with other people, either down the hall or next door."

His concern encompasses married airmen, too, particularly younger enlisted personnel. "We have married E-1s, E-2s and E-3s who can't get into our quarters (on base)," said the Orangeburg, S.C., native. "I'm not saying change the policy. That would kick the senior folks out in favor of the junior folks. But I would like to see some kind of small efficiency-style apartments, condos, townhouses, cottages or whatever designed for that age group of married people.

"They need quarters badly," he emphasized. "As long as we let married people come into the military or let them get married in that age bracket, we should take care of them."

Improvements in quality-of-life issues always top the agenda when Binnicker and his counterparts from the other services testify before congressional committees. He tells Congress that retention is so good in the Air Force that it has created promotion problems. But it will not remain that way if benefits are eroded.

Retention is Good, But...

In elaborating on retention, Binnicker said, "We have some job specialties that we've historically had problems with. They're the

high-tech, high-demand jobs - avionics and engineer-type positions where expensive training is required. People in those jobs tend to go out quickly. We can't compete with industry."


The presidential commission on military compensation study that Binnicker participated in found that people with higher education are less likely to be motivated by bonuses to stay in the military. "Bonuses will help them make the decision to stay, but you've got to provide quality-of-life programs that make it more conducive to stay in," Binnicker explained. "If a person is happy with his job, responsibilities and quality of life, we'll be more successful in keeping him.

"Today, we have the highest

quality Air Force we've ever had," said Binnicker. "And we've got to keep it."

Medical Care Problems

Binnicker goes to wherever troops are stationed worldwide to keep them abreast of policies and discuss their concerns. "The kinds of issues that come up most are living conditions and a lack of medical care in some areas where they're forced to use CHAMPUS (Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services), which is a costly process for young people," he said. "Medical care is a burning issue. We've got the greatest doctors in the world; it's just that in a lot of cases, you can't get to them. And there are not enough of them."

Bush calls for defense spending freeze

President George Bush presented his fiscal 1990 and 1991 budget to Congress and asked that defense spending be limited to fiscal 1989 levels plus inflation.

This will mean a defense budget in fiscal 1990 of \$299.3 billion, down from the \$305.6 billion request made by the Reagan administration. The fiscal 1989 estimate of military spending is \$289.8 billion.

According to Dan McIntyre, wing comptroller, the estimated FY-90 budget for Reese is approximately \$36 million.

The proposed freeze will be for one year, with increases proposed in fiscal 1991, 1992 and 1993. Bush said that he would not sacrifice

American preparedness or compromise strength.

"We have been fortunate in these last eight years," he told Congress. "America is a stronger nation than it was in 1980.

"Morale in our armed forces is restored. Our resolve has been shown. Our readiness has been improved. And we are at peace.

"There can no longer be any doubt that peace has been made secure through strength," he continued. "When America is stronger, the world is safer."

Officials at the Pentagon said that within 60 days, the secretary of defense will provide details on specific programs to be cut to meet the fiscal 1990 and 1991 budget limits. A spokesman said DoD fully supports the president's budget request and will work to ensure the cuts are made without endangering America's defense posture.

In light of the defense freeze, Bush said he is asking the National Security Council staff to review defense policies "to ensure that our capabilities and resources meet our commitments and strategies."

Bush also asked Congress for multiyear procurement authority, a two-year budget cycle and legislation that will enable DoD to implement the Packard Commission recommendations.

Other proposals in the president's budget include:

 A 2 percent pay raise for civilians and 3.8 percent for the military.

· A one-year freeze in cost-ofliving allowances for civil service and military retirees.

Welch

Reduced budgets in the next few years will severely constrain future Air Force capability, the service's senior leaders told Congress Feb. 28.

Today's Air Force, however, "is better manned, equipped and prepared than at any time in history," Chief of Staff Gen. Larry Welch and Acting Secretary James McGovern told the House Appropriations Subcommittee on De-

The two noted that funding in the first half of the decade allowed the Air Force to "redress shortfalls in readiness, sustainability and force structure that developed during the

They stressed that budget reductions in the last four years, and the prospect of future cuts, "have forced us to scale back, stretch out and cancel many programs."

reductions and the markedly reduced budget levels for fiscal years 1990 and 1991, if continued, will severely constrain future capability. The result will be greater risk in deterring aggression around the globe," they noted.

General Welch and Secretary McGovern said the service has opted for a reduced force structure that maintains capabilities "to avoid the hollow force structure of the 1970s."

The two leaders said the Air Force's top priority is to recruit, train, motivate and retain quality people. Other priorities include modernization of strategic and tactical forces, maintaining high levels of readiness and sustainability, increased airlift, and space operations.

'We recognize that high-quality

"The cumulative effect of these people are needed to exploit the capabilities of this high technology," General Welch and Secretary McGovern said.

> "People make the difference between success and failure, and this is why we place the highest priority on recruiting, retaining and motivating young people," they said. adding that people represent the "foundation of our warfighting capability and serve as the key factor in our deterrence equation."

The two asked Congress to approve the proposed 3.6 percent military pay increase for fiscal year 1990 as a part of a competitive compensation package. They also sought support for adequate government quarters allowances or full entitlement to variable housing allowances, appropriate permanentchange-of-station reimbursements and quality health care.

"Without such basic entitlements, we will see a decline in the success of our recruiting efforts in the competitive marketplace," General Welch and Secretary McGovern told the lawmakers.

They noted that there is a serious decline in pilot retention rates, from a high of 78 percent in fiscal year 1983 to 43 percent at the end of fiscal 1988.

"Last year we lost nearly 800 more pilots than we produced, and the pilot retention forecast for fiscal year 1989 falls well short of the 63 percent retention rate we need to maintain a healthy, experienced force," they said.

The new aviator continuation pay bonus, the two leaders said, is a near-term fix. They urged Congress to adjust aviation career incentive pay to "restore the purchasing power lost since it was last raised in

The two leaders also proposed:

· Rail-garrison basing for the Peacekeeper intercontinental ballistic missile.

· Deployment of the B-2 penetrating bomber and transition of the B-52H force to a standoff cruise missile role.

• Procurement of the C-17 cargo

· Continuing development of the advanced tactical fighter and further production of the advanced medium-range air-to-air missile.

 Additional procurement of the multi-role F-16 and development of a follow-on to the A-10 close support aircraft.

· Full exploitation of space-based capabilities within the constraints of technology, policy and cost effectiveness. (AFNS)





ROTC cadets at Texas Tech participate in Air Force pilot screening program

Nearly 200 Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps cadets will be given a chance to earn private pilot's licenses in a new program designed to screen pilot candidates.

The Private Pilot License Screening Program, scheduled to begin June 1, will determine whether cadets have the necessary flying aptitude to successfully complete undergraduate pilot training.

Fifty AFROTC detachments have been chosen to participate in the program. AFROTC Detachment 820 cadets at Texas Tech University are eligible for this program.

AFROTC has a goal of 850 pilot candidates for 1990. Since the Flight Screening Program at Hondo, Texas, is capable of screening a maximum of 500 cadets each summer, a contract for an additional screening site would be required.

The new screening program eliminates this need and at the same time provides additional flying time, culminating in a private pilot's license at virtually the same cost per cadet.

The program consists of a private pilot license course of instruction, including ground school.

Flight schools near AFROTC units will provide a maximum of 48.2 hours of flight training, which will include a maximum of 25 hours of dual instruction, at least 20 hours of solo flight lessons, and up to 3.2 hours for completing the Federal Aviation Administration final checkride.

In addition, the local contractor will provide associated flight training materials, books and checklists.

According to Lt. Col. Tom Shaughnessy, chief of the plans and programs division at ROTC, "Statistics indicate that cadets with private pilots licenses have a higher success rate at UPT."



Bare cupboards pain Thrift Shop

"Old Mother Hubbard went to the cupboard to get her poor dog a bone. When she got there, the cupboard was bare and so her poor dog had none."

The Reese Thrift Shop looks a lot like Old Mother Hubbard's cupboard these days, but it isn't Mrs. Hubbard's dog who is doing the suffering.

Mrs. Collins noted that in addition to providing funding for the OWC charitable programs, the Thrift Shop provides a resale outlet for all base personnel and a lowcost source for all kinds of goods.

Julie Block, a Thrift Shop volunteer, expressed optimism that the number of items being brought in would pick up as people begin spring-cleaning projects.

The Thrift Shop, staffed entirely by volunteers, is open for consignments and sales every Tuesday and the first Saturday of each month from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Consignments end at 1 p.m. It is also open for sales every Friday from 10 a.m. - 2 p.m.

Those who leave items for consignment receive 80 percent of the resale made during the contract period.

Three parking slots for Thrift Shop patrons have been reserved at the North end of the MWR building parking lot so patrons do not have to cross the construction site to get to the Thrift Shop.




