## Promotion boards change to once a year

According to MSgt. Abe Williams, noncommissioned officer in charge of promotions and testing, revisions are being made to the captain and major promotion programs beginning with the next captain board.

Full year groups will meet each captain promotion board starting with the calendar year 1989B board convening Sept. 25. First lieutenants with a date of rank in 1988 will meet this board.

Also effective with this board, officers promoted to captain are obligated to pinned. This commitment will run concurrently with any other active-duty commitment.

This policy has no impact on officers who have a five-year commitment for low-the-zone eligibility for promotion undergraduate navigator training or an from captain to major changes from

eight-year commitment for undergraduate pilot training.

Starting in 1990, there will be only one year of active-duty service when one captain board each year. This change will not affect pin-on time to captain. First lieutenants will still pin on captain after two years' time in grade.

# **From the Ramp**

#### "When the going gets

tough, the tough .... 'It seems like we just keep asking and asking from the mission support team. After a couple of busy months preparing for a successful inspector general visit, we ought to be

able to relax; however, the

weather had a severe impact on flying operations during that same IG preparation period. We tend to think of weather effects in day-to-day terms. What we are now faced with is an accumulation of the loss of many partial days of flying... the deficit in missions flown caused by crosswinds, low ceilings, high density altitudes (hot temps) is now well over 500 T-38 sorties...sorties we are all going to have to help make up.

The crystal ball also tells me the center runway is due to close for repairs. The work is to start June 17 and last about six weeks. As maintainers, that really has little to do with our business. It does mean that operations can't surge, probably will fly fewer T-38 aircraft at one time (i.e. a moderate cap)...to keep from saturating the T-38 runway. To catch up with this cap, we will probably need to fly more days...weekends. As we approach this challenge, we will try to work smarter, not just harder.

We did a lot of things right while the IG was on base. They certainly were impressed with the overall maintenance operation. Many of our units really smoked 'em. But we got off to a rocky start the first couple of nights - the tornado forecasts forced us into hangaring of T-38s and we had some problems with our basic postflights.

Hangaring — the way you folks jumped to the task to protect our aircraft was 'impressive. Word trickles back to Lubbock about the weather damage the Army helicopters suffered at Fort Hood (south of Dallas) over 100 helicopters damaged, repair costs tabulated in the hundreds of millions of dollars. That catastrophe reinforces our understanding of the need to hangar - it is important. What was not as impressive was our failure to maintain stringent safety practices throughout the hangaring process. In our enthusiasm to protect our birds we sometimes moved tugs too fast, forgot to wear reflective belts, failed to properly ground aircraft, etc. While I really appreciated your "can do" attitude, we need to slow down a bit and do those things right - and we will. That is easy.

Basic Postflights — a harder issue to tackle. Basic postflights are the "meat and potatoes" of swing shift. After the flying is over, swing shift guys and gals go over the aircraft with a fine tooth comb. That is our chance — maintenance's — to look at and fix the birds after they have flown a number of strenuous sorties. We must ensure that our aircraft meet command standards and are ready to go for another day's rigorous flying. Integrity demands that we perform that duty to the best of our ability.

## To move or not to move

That is the question nearly 800 Reese maintainers are facing, and have been for some time. The uncertainties involved in any major mission change which creates personnel moves cause some severe anxieties and frustrations.

Be assured that the personnel community here at Reese, Headquarters Air Training Command and Air Force Military Personnel Center are working very hard to prevent any type of family or individual hardships in connection with this transition.

Twenty-three people already have received overseas assignments during March and April. Most of these were volunteers. ATC has advised us that we can expect another drop of overseas assignments in July.

Any of you out there who want to go overseas next spring need to doublecheck your dreamsheet at CBPO customer service. Ask them to call up the data from the system, don't just check the form. We want to make absolutely certain what we have is what the Military Personnel Center has.

Another question has arisen concerning our personnel who are assigned permanent change of station to the ACE detachments. Since the aircraft maintenance functions at the bases where they are will still have military assigned, they status. have retainability for a PCS move next spring? We have 24 first term airmen in the field maintenance squadron and 53 in the organizational maintenance squadron who have normal dates of separation between January and June of next year.

Most of the vacancies in the National Guard units come open in the spring and getting the applications in before the first of the year will allow them to plug you into one of those vacancies with separation in March or April.

In summary, the overseas assignments we get in July will be the last prior to the arrival of the team from ATC and AFMPC to make the CONUS assignments. That visit is still on track for the middle to the end of August. Please help us to help you and make these moves as smooth as possible.

Don't listen to or pass on rumors. If it concerns anything at all to do with personnel actions, give us a call. The new base career advisor, SSgt. Jim Leonard, came here from Laughlin and is very Familiar with the conversion process. Call his at 3802.

If you are happy with the service you receive in the CBPO tell somebody out there. If you are not happy, then let us know (Chief Greenwell, 3445).

### to bike safety ps add

For pure relaxation and enjoyment, fic. riding a bike is hard to beat. Millions have found that not only is it economical and healthy, it's a great way for the entire family to participate in wholesome recreation.

The majority of the time you ride, you'll be sharing the road with vehicles of all shapes and sizes. Since bicycles are the most vulnerable participant in the highway system, it is in your own best interest to observe the rules and protect yourself against the carelessness of others.

#### **RIDING THE BIKE:**

See What's There ----

The first step in riding safely is knowing what traffic around you is likely to do.

Frequently looking over your left and right shoulder will keep you informed of changing traffic conditions. Most people tend to steer where they look. Practice the skill of steering straight ahead while checking for traf-

#### Be Seen -

Step two in safe bike riding is making sure that the moving traffic sees you.

For day riding, a fluorescent-colored flag on a flexible six-foot pole is excellent for drawing attention to yourself. Wearing bright-colored clothing or a reflective jacket can also help motorists notice you. This gives them more time to adjust their driving and leave you plenty of room.

When riding after dark, you must have a front lamp that gives a white light visible for at least 500 feet. A clear white reflector must also be visible from the front. A red rear reflector or tail light must be visible for at least 300 feet. Wear light colored clothes and, if possible, wear a reflective jacket. For both day and night riding, it pays to keep your reflectors clean. Listen To Traffic —

ing approaching vehicles. Be sensitive to these early signs of potential hazards. Moving In Traffic -

Because you're the operator of a moving vehicle, you must obey traffic laws. Most important to bike riders are:

 Stay on the right side of the street, near the curb. Move with traffic and watch for parked cars turning into traffic or car doors opening suddenly.

• Ride in single file when you are with others.

• Obey all traffic signs, signals, and road markings.

• Use hand signals to indicate a turn, lane change or stop.

· Walk your bike across all busy intersections.

• Do not carry packages that interfere with vision or control.

· Never weave from lane to lane or hitch a ride on moving vehicles.

· Yield to motorized vehicles about to Your exposure to the elements al- cross in front of you. Do this even when

#### Road Hazards -

Bikes are the most susceptible vehicle to changing road conditions. A hard fall can put a quick end to an enjoyable bike trip.

Be on the lookout for sewer gratings and manhole covers with openings large enough to trap your tires. Avoid loose gravel, pot-holes, and broken glass. They can cause you to lose control. Avoid wet weather if possible; moisture on the brakes may result in a longer stopping distance.

# **Services held for Reese pilot**

Memorial services were held Thursday for Capt. David M. Brandt, the pilot who died Monday after his T-38 crashed approximately two miles south of Cannon AFB, N.M.

Captain Brandt, who was in the 54th Flying Training Squadron's Pilot Instructor Program, was on a training mission when the accident occurred.

Also on board was Capt. Kevin L. Carrara, an instructor pilot with the 54th FTS. Captain Carrara received minor injuries and was admitted to the Cannon hospital for observation.

Captain Brandt, 26, was single. He was a native of Nashville, Tenn., and he earned his pilot wings at Vance AFB, Okla. His first flying assignment took him to Eaker AFB, Ark., where he flew the B-52 Stratofortress.

He arrived at Reese in April and began training for an assignment as an instructor pilot with the 54th FTS.

The accident is under investigation by a board of qualified officers.

## Hospital participates in joint exercise

According to Sgt. Kathryn Johnson, noncommissioned officer-in-charge of medical readiness at the Reese hospital, the exercise involved all aspects of medical care associated with a wartime environment.

"We spent two days training in the base theater, and that led up to a mass casualty exercise in front of the (Reese) hospital, "Sergeant Johnson said.

According to the sergeant, some of the more important aspects of the training included wartime stress, patient transportation, chemical warfare defense training, triage and

patient decontamination.


The experience of working under wartime conditions wasn't the only benefit of the joint exercise. "If the 829th were working in the same area as an Air Force hospital and we were both overrun (with casualties), it's not out of the question that we'd merge and pool our resources," said 1st Lt. Mike Keller, officer-in-charge of the 829th's Reese contingent. "This exercise gives us a chance to test that."

About 75" casualties" were treated during

the exercise. Medical personnel had to deal with injuries that were complicated, in some cases, by chemical contamination.

The training is an annual requirement for Air Force medical personnel.

The Reese hospital will take part in another joint medical exercise June 22, this time with several local hospitals. Sergeant Johnson said that volunteers are needed to play the part of casualties during that exercise. Anyone interested can contact her at 6110.



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
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



People who entered the military between July 1, 1985 and June 30, 1988, and did not have a break in service during that period have a deadline of June 30 to enroll in the Montgomery GI Bill. In order to be eligible, members must elect to take a \$1,200 reduction in pay or make a \$1,200 cash payment while still on active duty. Payments can be made by a minimum monthly allotment of \$100 for 12 months. In return, the

enrollees receive a basic payment of \$300 per month for 36 months or \$10,800 in total benefits. For more information. contact the education center, 3469.

#### **GI Bill**

Active duty and veterans who are eligible for benefits under Chapter 34 (Vietnam-era GI Bill) may attain conversion rights for benefits under the Chapter 30 (Montgomery GI Bill). Vietnam-era eligibles are basically entitled to educational assistance for a period of one and one half months for each month of service on active duty after Jan. 31, 1955, up to 45 months. Chapter 34 and benefits accumulated with it expire Dec. 31. Conversion eligibles may transfer any remaining Vietnam-era GI Bill benefits, up to 36 months, to the new GI Bill. 



Yellow labels indicate calories controlled items for people following carbohydrate or diabetic diets.


Pink labels identify foods that are fat-modified for people on low cholesterol and low saturated fat diets.

Although some items will qualify for more than one category, each label will be coded by the most prominent category color. The additional categories will be printed on the label.





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
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#### **Reese youth takes second at state**
