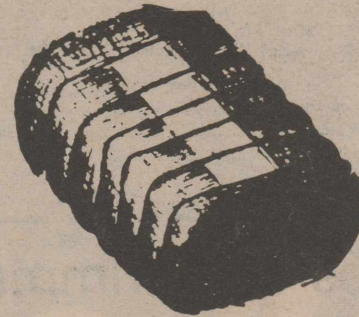

All Around The Town

Teachers take heed! These were rules for teachers issued in 1872.

1. Teachers each day will fill lamps, clean chimneys.
2. Each teacher will bring a bucket of water and a scuttle of coal for the day's session.
3. Make your pens carefully. You may whittle nibs to the individual taste of the pupils.
4. Men teachers may take one evening each week for courting purposes, or two evenings a week if they go to church regularly.
5. After ten hours in school, the teachers may spend the remaining time reading the Bible or other good books.
6. Women teachers who marry or engage in unseemly conduct will be dismissed.
7. Every teacher should lay aside from each pay a goodly sum of his earnings for his benefit during his declining years so that he will not become a burden on society.
8. Any teacher who smokes, uses liquor in any form, frequents pool or public halls, or gets shaved in a barber shop will give good reason to suspect his worth, intention, integrity and honesty.
9. The teacher who performs his labor faithfully and without fault for five years will be given an increase of twenty-five cents per week in his pay, providing the Board of Education approves. Those rules are pretty strict. Take a gander at the rules for teachers in 1915.
 1. You will not marry during the term of your contract.
 2. You are not to keep company with men.
 3. You must be home between the hours of 8:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. unless attending a school function.
 4. You may not loiter downtown in ice cream stores.
 5. You may not travel beyond the city limits unless you have the permission of the chairman of the board.
 6. You may not ride in a carriage or automobile with any man unless he is your father or brother.
 7. You may not smoke cigarettes.
 8. You may not dress in bright colors.
 9. You may under no circumstances dye your hair.
 10. You must wear at least two petticoats.

Food Stamp Benefits Increased November 1

The 1.3 million Texans participating in the Food Stamp program received increased benefits beginning November 1, it was announced by Martin Dukler, Deputy Commissioner for Programs of the Texas Department of Human Resources.

Dukler said the increase in food stamp allotments will average about \$3 a month for a four-person household. Allotments vary with size of households and family income.

Authority to increase the allotments is contained in a joint Congressional resolution passed

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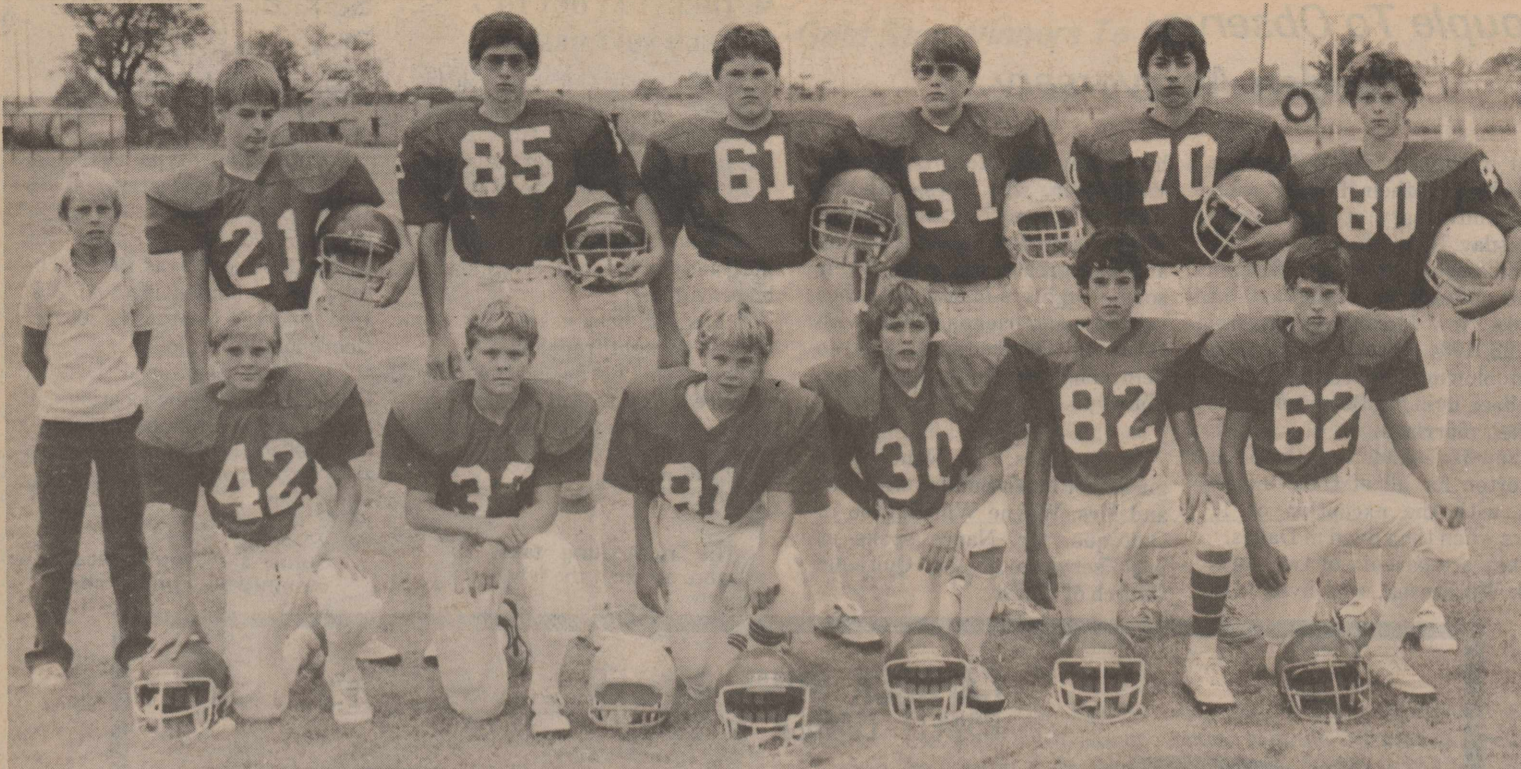

Junior High Owls Finish Football Season Undefeated

Silverton's Junior High Owls have just completed a perfect football season under the direction of Coach Rick Agee.

They finished their season at Whitharrel Friday night by putting together an offense of 238 yards while allowing only 85 yards by their opponent.

The rushing comparison was 235 yards to 76, and the passing yardage was three for the Owls and nine for Whitharrel.

Neal Edwards carried three times for a gain of 80 yards and two touchdowns. Clay Mercer scored one touchdown on a five-yard rush. Mark Auston carried the ball five times for a gain of 48 yards and one touchdown. Denny Hill rushed five times for a gain of 23 yards and one touchdown.

Jamie Frizzell rushed four times for a gain of 19 yards; Peter Martinez, one for 10; Bryan Ramsey, one for six; Jon Pigg, two for 10; Frank Lowrey, one for 19; Brad West, two for 15.

Tackles recorded by the players were Neal Edwards, 12; Peter Martinez, 10; Jamie Frizzell, Clay Mercer and Denny Hill, seven each; Frank Lowrey, five; Brad West, three; Kendal Min-

yard, six; Jon Pigg, nine; Mark Auston, eight, and Bryan Ramsey, four.

Coach Agee is as proud as he can be of his boys for posting an undefeated season. He has compiled the following statistics on the players and team.

The Junior Owls rushed for 1595 yards this season, an average per game of 265.5 yards. Total passing yardage was 283 yards, an average of 47.1 per game. The team had a season total offense of 1878 yards, an average of 312.6 yards per game.

Neal Edwards carried the ball 53 times for a gain of 582 yards, averaging 10.9 per carry, and 11 touchdowns. Jamie Frizzell rushed 39 times for a gain of 346 yards, an 8.8 average, and nine touchdowns. Timmy Wheeler carried the ball 19 times for 123 yards, 6.4 average, and two touchdowns.

Peter Martinez rushed seven times for 115 yards, a 16.4 average, and two touchdowns. Bryan Ramsey rushed 25 times for 93 yards, a 3.7 average, and one touchdown. Frank Lowrey rushed five times for 74 yards, a per-carry average of 14.8, and one touchdown. Denny Hill carried 10 times for a gain of 43 yards, a 4.3 average, and one touchdown. Clay Mercer rushed three times for 13 yards, a 4.3 average, and one touchdown.

Mark Auston rushed five times for 48 yards, a 9.6 average per carry, and one touchdown. Jon Pigg carried three times for 13 yards, a 4.3 average. Brad West rushed twice for a gain of 15 yards, a 7.5 average, and one touchdown. Kendal Minyard rushed one time for a gain of two yards, a two-yard average, and one touchdown.

This was a total of 172 times rushing for a 9.3 yards per carry average and 31 touchdowns.

In passing statistics, Kendal Minyard completed 10 of 19 aeriels for a gain of 104 yards, Neal Edwards completed eight of 17 for 104 yards, and Denny Hill completed three of seven for 75 yards.

The Owls held their opponents to a total of 321 yards, a 53.5 per

game average, this season. Their opponents made a total of 265 yards passing, averaging 44.1 yards per game. The total offense for their opponents was 586 yards, or a total of 97.6 yards per game.

Peter Trevino got 57 tackles, an average 9.5 per game; Neal Edwards, 48, an average of eight; Jamie Frizzell, 43, an average of 7.1 per game; Clay Mercer, 48, an average of eight per game; Frank Lowrey, 36, an average of six per game; Brad West, 27, an average of 4.5 per game; Kendal Minyard, 30, an average of five per game; Bryan Ramsey, 13, an average of 2.1 per game; Jon Pigg, 16, an average of 2.6 per game; Mark Auston, 16, an average of 2.6 per game; Timmy Wheeler (who played in just four games), eight, an average of two per game.

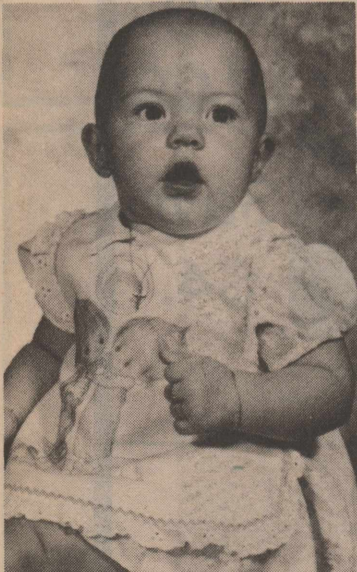

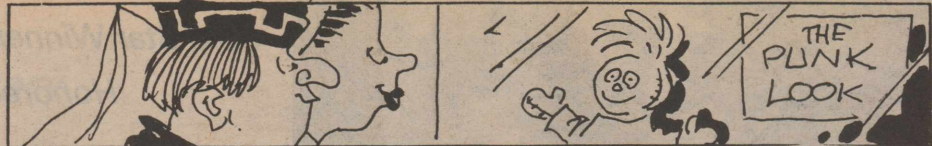
Whitharrel made 11 first downs and had eight penetrations, as compared with three first downs and two penetrations for the Owls.

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Senator Sarpalius To Hold Education Forum Saturday

Senator Bill Sarpalius announced today the scheduling of an "Education Forum" to discuss the recently passed Education Reform Act and other education issues in preparation for the upcoming regular session of the legislature.

"With the recent implementation of House Bill 72, the school reform law, and House Bill 246, the curriculum reform law, we are keenly aware of the various problems and misconceptions that have arisen throughout the educational community with respect to these two comprehensive Acts," the Senator said.

Prior to the recent special session, Sarpalius met with a number of teachers and administrators to discuss the recommendations of the Select Committee on Education. Additionally, he invited all teachers and administrators to a forum to discuss these proposals. Unfortunately, attendance was poor when this forum was held.

"We understand that the Education Reform Act is not a perfect document; in fact, there are certain provisions in the Act that we opposed, specifically with respect to competency testing and inadequate funding of the proposed career ladder

program. It is our intent to rectify these and certain other issues in the upcoming regular session of the legislature," the Senator added.

"With a goal of the best possible education for the children of Texas, we are again seeking input from the educational community so that we may work together to fine tune the Education Reform Act," the Senator remarked. Sarpalius said that he and his staff have traveled throughout the Panhandle in order to solicit the advice and opinions of experienced teachers and administrators. He added, "Sadly, it is impossible to meet with all ninety school districts of the Panhandle in the short time remaining before the next regular session."

Senator Sarpalius said he plans to hold a forum at 3:00 p.m. Saturday, November 17, at Caprock High School in Amarillo.

All concerned parents, teachers and educators, as well as the general public, are invited to attend.

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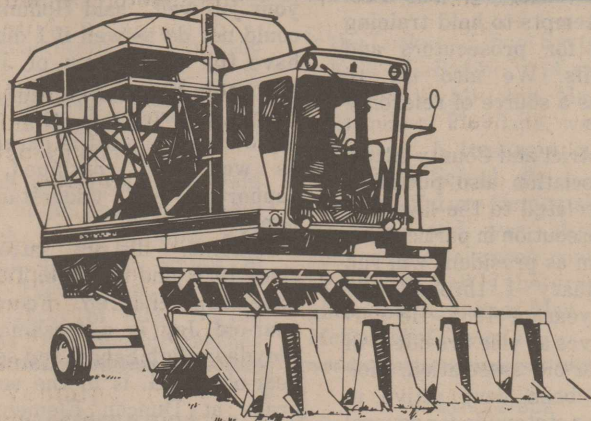
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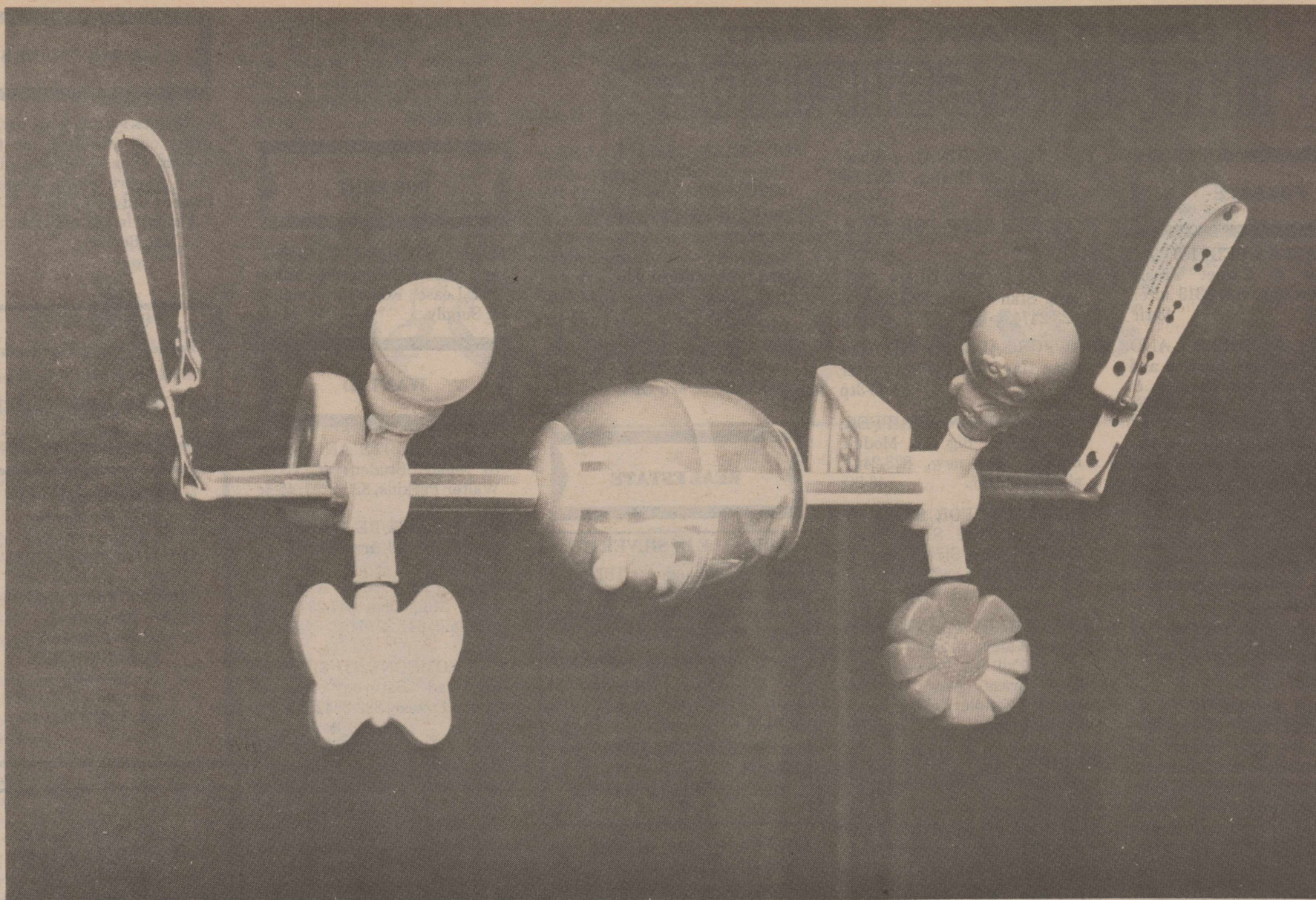

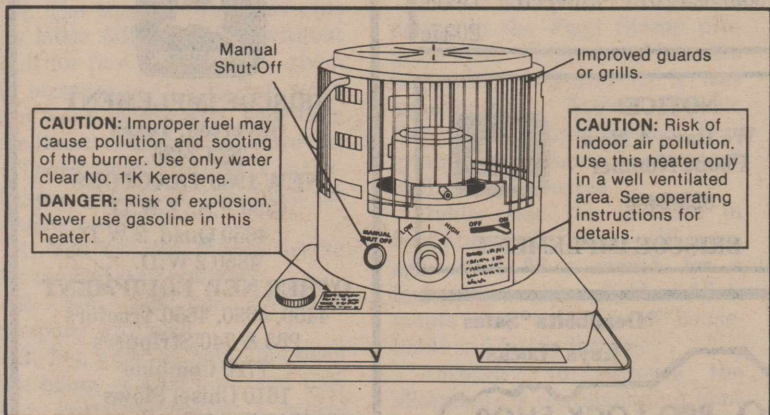
Consumer Product SAFETY ALERT

FROM THE U.S. CONSUMER PRODUCT SAFETY COMMISSION, WASHINGTON, D.C. 20207

Under laws administered by CPSC, an estimated 325 million potentially hazardous products have been called back from the marketplace and consumers since 1973 (when CPSC was created). Most of these were voluntarily recalled by manufacturers who established programs to repair or replace the products, or to refund the purchase price.

New Safety Features for Kerosene Heaters



Consumers who are planning to buy a kerosene heater for the coming winter should first check state and local building codes and fire ordinances to determine if kerosene heaters are permitted to be used, cautions the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission. In some communities it may be illegal to sell or use kerosene heaters.

Heaters that meet the voluntary standard's new requirements, which became effective March 15, 1984, have additional safety

features not necessarily present on heaters manufactured before that date. Look for these added safety features when purchasing a kerosene heater. These newer model heaters have improved guards or grills that reduce the risk of accidental contact burns. These new heaters are also equipped with a manual shut-off device, which allows for a quick shut-off during emergency situations such as high flaming in the wick/burner area of the heater. Also identifiable on the newer heaters are cautionary labels

that stress the use of water-clear 1-K kerosene as the ONLY fuel for the heaters, and NEVER gasoline. Be sure the heater has been tested and approved by a nationally recognized testing laboratory and is correctly sized for the area you wish to heat.

Increasingly, heaters are now being equipped with a positive wick-stop mechanism which prevents the wick from being retracted to a hazardously-low setting. Ask for this important safety feature.

There are a number of safe practices you should follow when using a kerosene heater. The Commission urges you to follow these safety rules:

1. Use only water-clear 1-K kerosene as fuel for your heater.
2. Always place the heater at least three feet from combustible materials.
3. Use the heater only in rooms open to the remainder of the house.
4. Do not use the heater in areas where flammable vapors are present, such as around gasoline and some paints and solvents.
5. Set the wick height according to manufacturer's directions. Never turn the wick down low because it may produce very high internal heater temperatures which may pose a fire hazard.
6. Do not let children operate or refuel heaters.
7. Do not leave an operating

heater unattended. Never have the heater turned on when you sleep.

8. Do not move, service, or refuel your heater while it is operating or still hot.
9. Refuel the heater outdoors away from flammable materials.
10. Store kerosene away from your living area, preferably outdoors, in a well-marked container, and out of the reach of children.
11. If you have breathing problems, consult a physician before you use a kerosene heater.

If you already own a kerosene heater and plan to use it again this heating season, you should follow not only the above safety rules, but also these additional ones:

1. Rinse the tank and reservoir with water-clear, 1-K kerosene ONLY, especially if heater is dirty or was stored with fuel in it. NEVER RINSE WITH WATER! DO NOT USE OLD KEROSENE! Return the kerosene used to rinse the heater and any old kerosene to a service station for disposal.
2. Inspect the operation of the wick mechanism and emergency shut-off device to assure that both operate correctly.
3. Inspect the wick for tar deposits. If the wick has hard crusty deposits, it needs to be cleaned or replaced to prevent possible flare up. (Follow the

manufacturer's instructions for wick cleaning and replacement).

4. Replace the ignition glow plug if the filament is broken or badly deformed. Replace batteries if necessary.
5. Check the burner chimney for any carbon deposits and carefully remove any deposits with a rag or brush. Replace damaged or broken chimney components such as wire coils, wire domes, or glass collars.
6. Any other problems with your kerosene heater should be corrected by trained personnel. Check with your dealer for the location of the nearest authorized service center.
