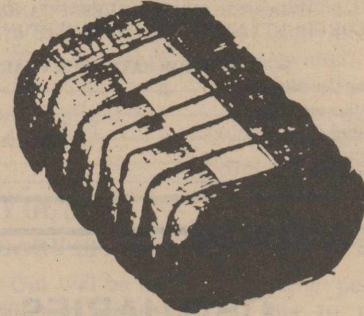

Vehicle Use Logs Required By IRS

Remember the good old days (last year) when you could buy a car and write off a good portion of it for business expense? This was oftentimes done without really good record keeping, and unless you were audited, no one really knew the type of records you kept.

Thanks to the Tax Reform Act of 1984, all of this has changed. Effective January 1, 1985, you must keep a contemporaneous (at or near the time of use) mileage and expense log of when and how you use your business car. The use of your automobile for business purposes must be proven based on the records you keep.

Don't confuse this with the method you use for deducting vehicle expenses. You still have the option to use: (1) Actual cost method where you can deduct the Investment Tax Credit (ITC) and Depreciation (ACRS), interest expense if the car is financed, operating expenses such as gas, service, parts and insurance; or (2) Standard mileage method where you can deduct total business mileage of 20.5 cents for the first 15,000 and 11 cents over 15,000, ITC, interest, and subsidiary fees such as parking fees.

The purpose of the Vehicle Use Log is to prove what percentage of time the auto has been used for business and the number of business miles put on your car.

There are two reasons for maintaining a log. First, a tax-return preparer can sign a taxpayer's tax return only if the taxpayer certifies in writing that adequate records exist. Secondly, failure to maintain a log is now grounds for the IRS to assess a negligence penalty against the taxpayer.

Failure to keep the log will result in the loss of all deductions and credits associated with the vehicle. Any mileage not accounted for as business use is assumed to be personal use.

Driving to and from work is not deductible.

Leased vehicles will be treated in the same manner as owned vehicles.

Record your odometer reading on January 1, 1985 and December 31, 1985.

These rules apply to all expenses of owning and operating a vehicle so be sure to keep records on gas, oil, repairs, insurance, licenses, etc.

The new law applies to all vehicles used in a business that are susceptible to personal use

including automobiles, pickup trucks, vans, jeeps, delivery vehicles, farming vehicles, etc.

The log books must be retained with your business records for six years.

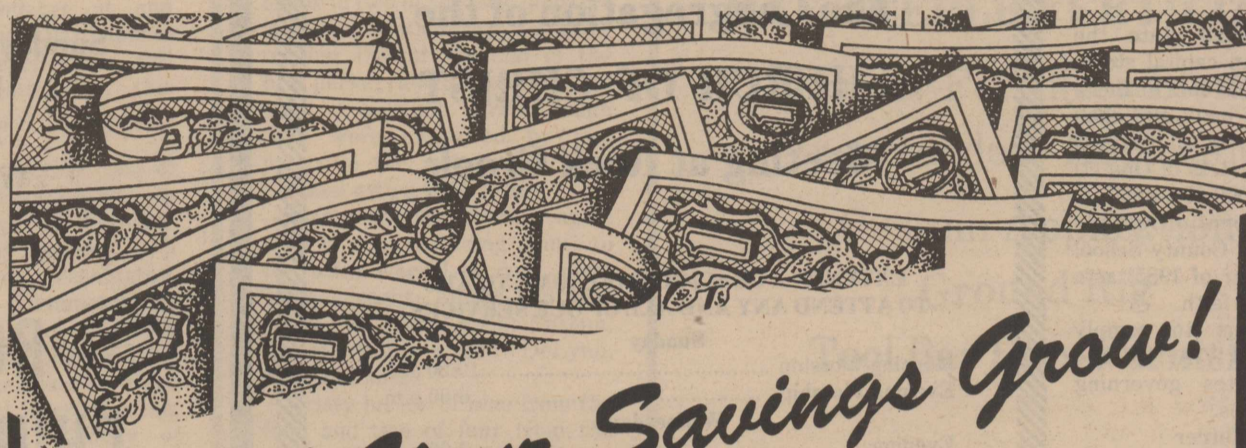

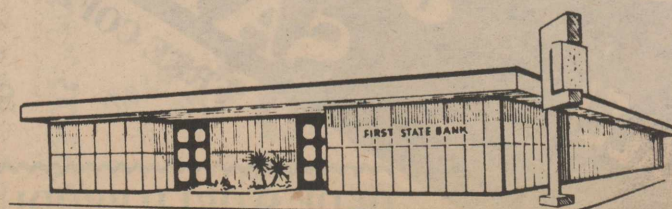

Owlettes Defeat Clarendon To Win Consolation

Silverton's Owlettes defeated Clarendon 48-36 to win the consolation trophy at the Claude Tournament last weekend. This

gives the girls a 4-7 record for the season as they look to the start of district play Friday night at Lakeview.

In their first game of the tournament, the Owlettes lost to Claude 65-29. Kristy Fogerson led the scoring with eight points, followed by Shavonne Lowrey, six; Alesha Patton and Melissa

Stone, four points each; Lee Ann Durham, three; Tonnette Miller and Kim Burson, two points each.

Kristy hit three of five field goals and two of four shots from the line, and caused one mistake by the opponents.

Shavonne hit two of eight from the field and two of two from the line.

Alesha, back in action after re-injuring her knee before Christmas, hit two of four field goals and was zero for one at the line. She was credited with a steal and also caused the opponents to make a mistake.

Melissa hit two of three from the field.

Lee Ann hit one of six from the field and one of three from the line, and was credited with a steal.

Tonnette hit one of two from the field.

Kim hit one of one from the field and was zero for one at the line.

The Owlettes outscored Clarendon in two of the four quarters in the consolation final, and after trailing 13-6 at the end of the first period rallied to lead by one point at halftime. Even though they were outscored by two points in the last period, they finished with a 48-36 lead.

Kristy led the scoring again with 14 points. Adding points to the score were Lee Ann, nine; Melissa, eight; Alesha and Shavonne, six points each; Suzann, three; Tonnette and DeLynn, one point each.

Kristy hit six of nine from the field and two of four from the line, while scoring 29% of her team's points.

Lee Ann hit four of sixteen from the field and one of two from the line, was credited with an assist and two steals.

Melissa hit four of seven field goals and was zero for one at the free-throw line. She caused the opponents to make two mistakes.

Alesha hit three of six from the field, was credited with a steal and causing the opponents to make a mistake.

Shavonne hit two of five from the field and two of two from the line, and was credited with causing the opponents to make an error.

Suzann hit one of seven from the field and one of seven from the line. She was credited with an assist and caused the opponents to make two mistakes.

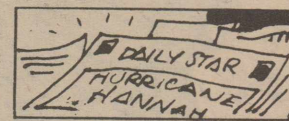

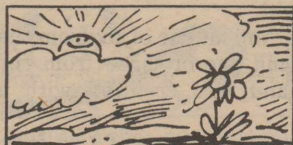
The workshop will help teachers learn how and what to write

Bullock Again Trims Estimate Of State Revenues

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday again trimmed his estimate of available state revenues to keep pace with plunging world oil prices.

"The official Biennial Revenue Estimate I'm sending the Legislature next week reflects not only the \$256 million cut we expected to make in December, but another \$129 million on top of that," Bullock said.

"This shouldn't come as a surprise to anybody who has watched OPEC lose its fight to hold up oil prices or to any Texan who witnessed a disappointing 1984 Christmas retail season," Bullock said.

"In September we felt oil prices would drop to \$27 a barrel and hold there. That price is not holding and this estimate is based on a drop to \$25 a barrel next year and to \$24 a barrel in 1987," Bullock said. "This is a grim situation but it might get worse before it gets better."

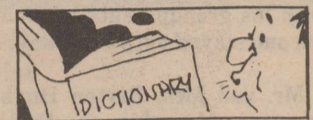
