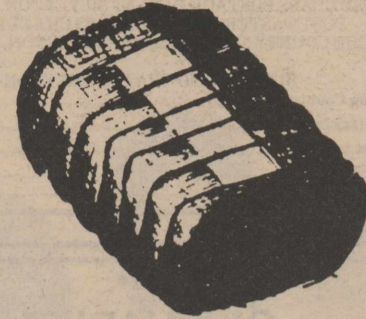

Funeral services for O. C. Maples, 69, were conducted at 2:00 p.m. Tuesday at the First Baptist Church in Silvertown. Officiating were the pastor, Rev. Jerry Miller, and Earl Cantwell, minister of the Rock Creek Church of Christ.

Interment was in the Silvertown Cemetery, with arrangements made by Schooler-Gordon Funeral Directors.

Mr. Maples died Sunday afternoon at St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo where he had been transferred from Swisher Memorial Hospital in Tulia by ambulance earlier in the day. He was admitted to the Tulia hospital on Saturday.

Born July 3, 1915 in St. Jo, he moved to Briscoe County in 1926. He married Ila Faye Boyd in 1938 in Matador. She died October 18, 1980.

Mr. Maples operated a Phillips 66 service station in Silvertown for a number of years, and served the City of Silvertown as city marshal and nightwatchman from 1970 until 1978. After his retirement, he had driven a school bus for the Silvertown Independent School District.

He was a member of the First Baptist Church in Silvertown.

Survivors include a son, Dyrle Maples of El Campo; two daughters,

Mrs. David (Reba) Tipton of Silvertown and Mrs. Harrell (Sheila) Minyard of Dennison; a sister, Mrs. Wayne Yocum of Amarillo; and seven grandchildren.

Last Thursday evening, Silvertown was the fifth rural community to organize a chapter of the State Parent-Teacher Association this year. Fifty-four interested parents and teachers were inducted as members.

The meeting was opened by Cindy Comer and the invocation was given by Larry Comer. O. C. Rampley spoke on the importance of encouraging the children to do anything they wish to attain and the strength of the family and school.

Pat Lewis, District P-TA president, told of the benefits that P-TA can give to the students, the parents and teachers. Programs on drug and alcohol abuse, both of which are very current in society today, are just two available through P-TA.

Dixie Surrat, State P-TA secretary, also spoke on the importance of parents and teachers working together for the well being of the student. She stressed the fact that communication is the essential element in the home between parents and child and in the school between parents, teachers and students. The basic purposes of P-TA

are to promote the welfare of children and youth in home, school, community and place of worship; to raise the standards of home life; to bring into closer relation the home and the school, that parents and teachers may cooperate intelligently in the education of children and youth; to secure adequate laws for the care and protection of children and youth; to develop between educators and the general public such united efforts as will secure for all children and youth the highest advantages in physical, mental, social and spiritual education.

After the by-laws were read and adopted, dues were set at \$2.00 per member per year.

Officers elected were Raye Smith, president; Vicki Bean, first vice-president; Connie Smith, second vice-president; Tisa Whitfill, secretary-treasurer, and Ramona Martin, reporter.

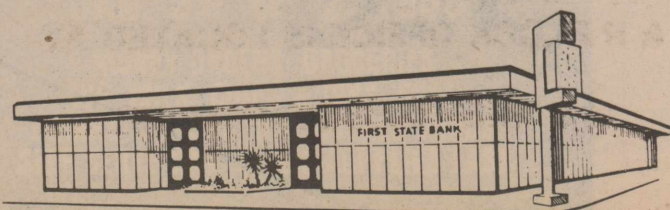

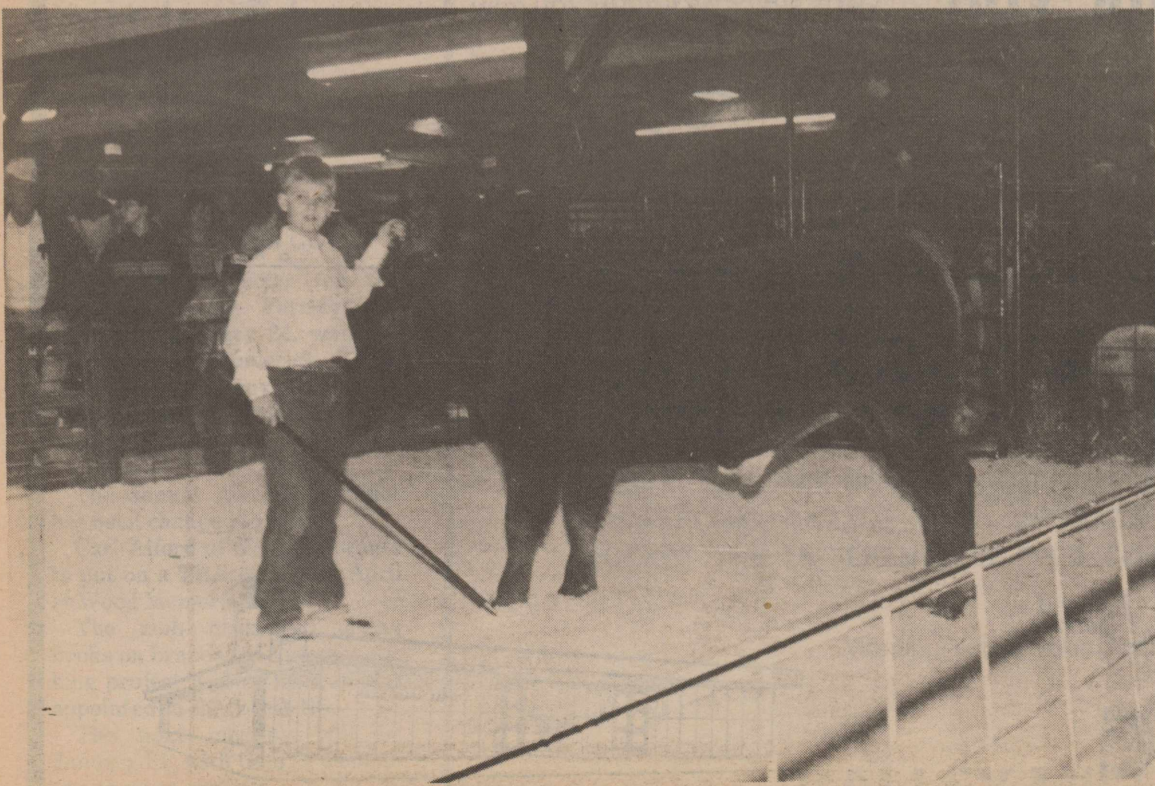
