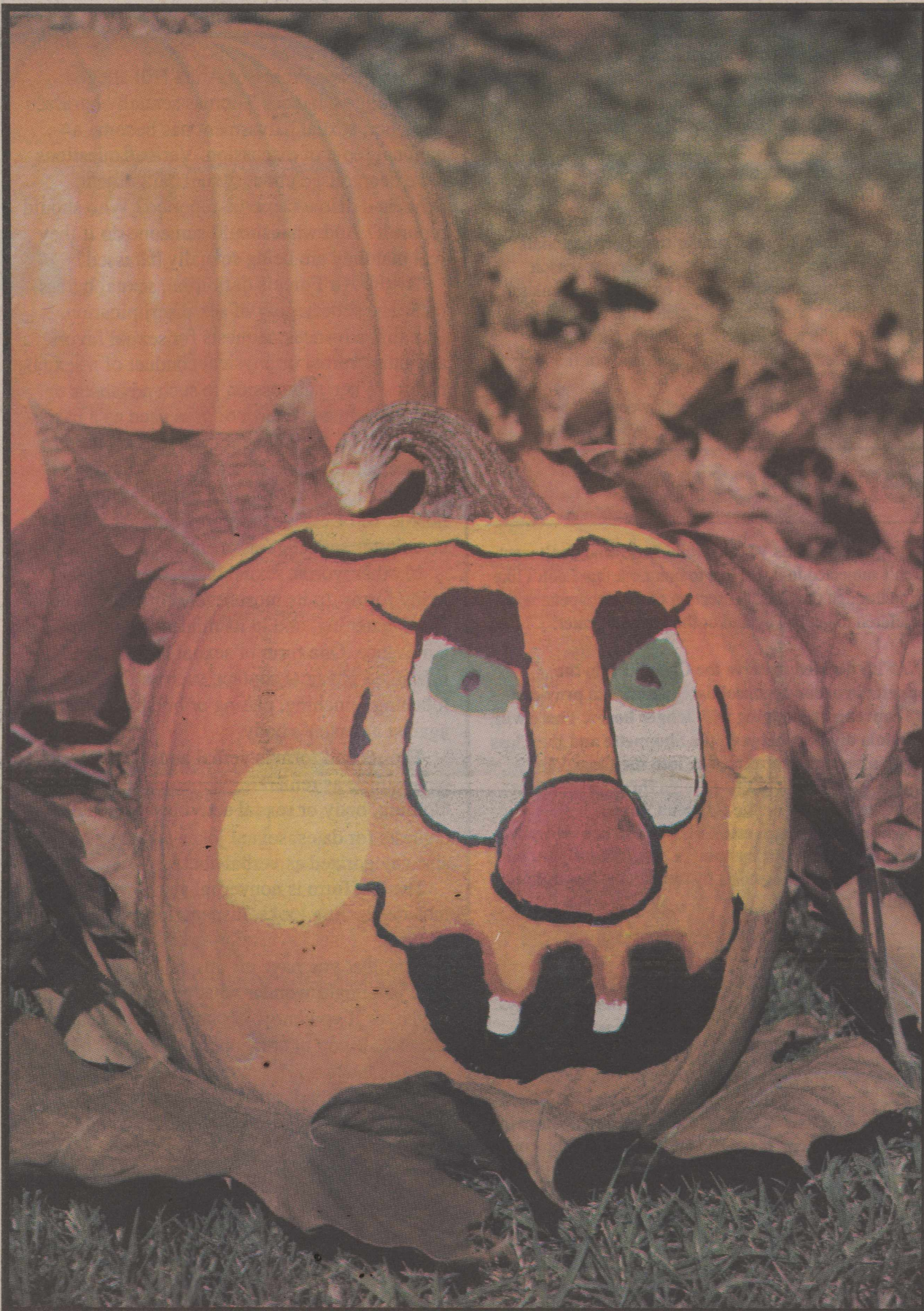

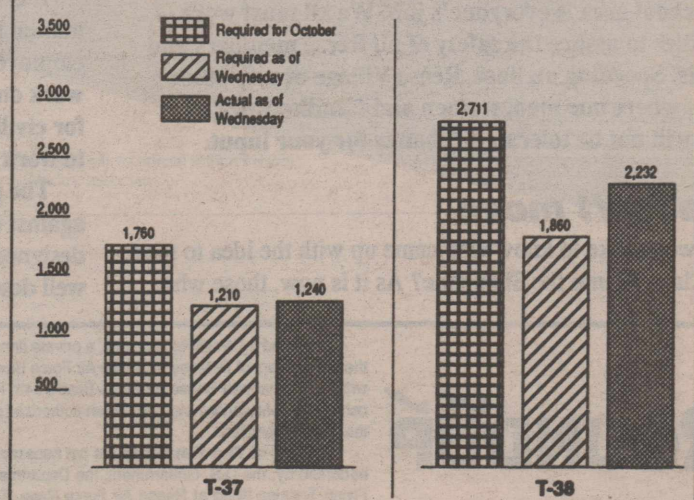

Fire tips douse Halloween 'fear'

Witches aren't the only things stirring as Halloween nears.

Painful burns and even more tragic accidents are waiting to pounce on youngsters carrying candle-lighted pumpkins or dressed in flimsy, flammable costumes.

According to the National Fire Protection Association, the greatest hazard at Halloween is the potential of clothing fires.

Some residents may put carved pumpkins in the yard or on porches and put lighted candles inside them. They look pretty, but they pose an extreme danger to children.

Many costumes are home made and have no fire retardant material whatsoever. It only takes a second for some costumes or clothing material to ignite from an exposed flame.

Even though elementary school children are taught to stop, drop, and roll, if the potential is taken away by not using candles in pumpkins, it lessens the danger. Candles can also be knocked over by trick or treaters, or by wind and ignite nearby combustibles.

Guidelines that should be given serious consideration are:

□ Costumes should be labeled "fire retardant" if purchased ready made. Remember that costumes that

were originally purchased as "fire retardant" may have lost that capability if they get wet or have been washed.

□ Avoid costumes with flimsy fabric, loose flowing sleeves and voluminous skirts. Especially beware of the traditional billowing robes of ghosts and witches, made of yards and yards of worn sheets, which easily catch fire when exposed to flames or sparks carried by wind.

□ Costumes should be short enough that youngsters don't trip on them, and of light colors so the wearers can be easily seen by motorists.

□ The safest disguises are "natural" masks, usually cosmetic make-up. If commercial masks, wigs and beards are worn, they should be marked "fire retardant." Avoid fibrous "hair" which obscures the child's vision.

□ Use a flashlight. Never use a lighted candle to illuminate a pumpkin. Keep children away from fireplaces, sparks and other sources of heat.

□ Halloween decorations in the home should also be "fire retardant." Be especially careful with colorful leaves, corn husks, hay and similar tinder dry materials used in typical decorations. The use of harvest season decorations is strictly prohibited in base facilities unless they are made of "fire retardant" materials.

□ Finally, it is wise to have an adult accompany younger children on their Halloween rounds of the neighborhood.

Have fun, but be safe. Happy Halloween.

I would like to know who came up with the idea to move the Class VI into the Shoppette? As it is now, those who

AAFES decided to move the Class VI into the Shoppette in order to consolidate facilities to provide more convenient shopping with longer hours. There will be gondola dividers between the Shoppette and the Class VI, with a separate entranceway into the Class VI section. Children will not have to go through the Class VI to get to Toyland or the Garden Center.

The combined Shoppette/Class VI will provide more efficient service for our customers. AAFES will also be able to lower operating costs by having one less building to maintain on base.

Goal Day

Goal Days are being abused. There is no reason for every single military member to be off on these Goal days. They have had four or five of these in the past three months. Between hospital/dental appointments, TDY, and earned leave the military average three months out of every year off. The civilians only get five weeks off after fifteen years of service. Every time there is a goal day we have to take leave. I think command should look at this problem because the civilian work force is in rebellion.

Goal Days are designed to reward the entire base populace who have worked hard throughout the year to enable the wing to meet stringent flying training and operational taskings. This often involves working evenings and weekends around a hectic pace throughout the normal work week. In addition, exercise taskings and operational deployments claim their share of a military member's off-duty time.

Allowing our wing people to have a day off is appropriate compensation and a good way to say thanks for the extra effort.

The wing has taken two goal days in the past three months, 29 July and 30 September.

It is true that federal civilian employees must take annual leave in order to enjoy the goal day. Not all employees opt to take the day of leave, as some choose to work on goal days. A liberal leave policy is encouraged for civilian employees, but civilian employees may report to work if they choose.

The goal day is certainly not intended to discriminate against our hard-working civilian employees; rather, it is designed to offer all of our people an opportunity for a well deserved "break in the action."

Social actions defines harassment

Ever since Professor Anita Hill alleged Judge Clarence Thomas sexually harassed her, sexual harassment has become a national topic of discussion. Various questions have been raised about sexual harassment: What is it? How can it be reported? Who should report it? And what should someone do if they feel that they are being sexually harassed?

By the Air Force's definition, sexual harassment is a subcategory of sex discrimination. It is sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature. When submission to such advances or requests is made a term of or is used as a basis for career or employment decisions affecting that person, or interferes with an individual's performance by creating an intimidating, hostile, or offensive environment, this also constitutes sexual harassment.

In other words, sexual harassment can take many forms. In its most severe form it can be job threatening, and in its mildest it may just be a nuisance. One form of sexual harassment is unwanted physical contact; such as rubbing, touching, pinching, patting or brushing up against a person's body.

The second form is verbal abuse, which can be as subtle as remarking about a person's clothing, body or sexual activities. Repeated requests for dates, sexual jokes and slurs are also categorized as verbal abuse.

The last form is nonverbal abuse, which includes leering looks, disparaging cartoons and pictures.

Now that you have all this valuable information, you might wonder what to do if it happens to you, or if you know it's happening to someone else. If you or someone you know is being sexually harassed, it your responsibility to tell the alleged offender that the type of behavior he or she is exhibiting is totally unwanted and unacceptable.

If he or she continues, you may file a formal complaint with Social Actions.

Remember—you don't have to be the person actually being harassed to speak up. Your knowledge and confrontation of an issue can prevent it from becoming a problem and a formal complaint.

Hangar Line Road work continues

Section I of the Hangar Line Road construction has been broken down into three phases, according to 64th Civil Engineering Officials.

However, the entire road between the fire station and "N" Street will be closed until completion of all phases of construction are complete.

"The project will replace a surface that has been there for over 20 years," said James King, Reese pavements engineer. "The project will be

completed ahead of time if the weather stays nice."

During the three phases, the contractor will also be installing curbs, gutters and preparing the surface for paving.

Phase I of the construction will be from "N" Street south to Bldg. 955. Phase II construction will be done between Bldg. 955 south and Bldg. 75.

After its completion, the third

phase, Bldg. 75 south to First Street will begin.

Upon completion of the three phases, Hangar Line Road will be closed completely for approximately one week for final paving and striping.

All three phases of section I construction will take approximately three-six weeks, according to Mr. King.

Upon completion of Section I,

section II construction, from the fire department to First Street, will begin.

To accommodate foot traffic around Hangar Line Road during the construction, three designated pedestrian walkways have been set up. One is located south of Bldg. 955, one across from Hangar 82, and one across from the bowling alley (Bldg. 21).

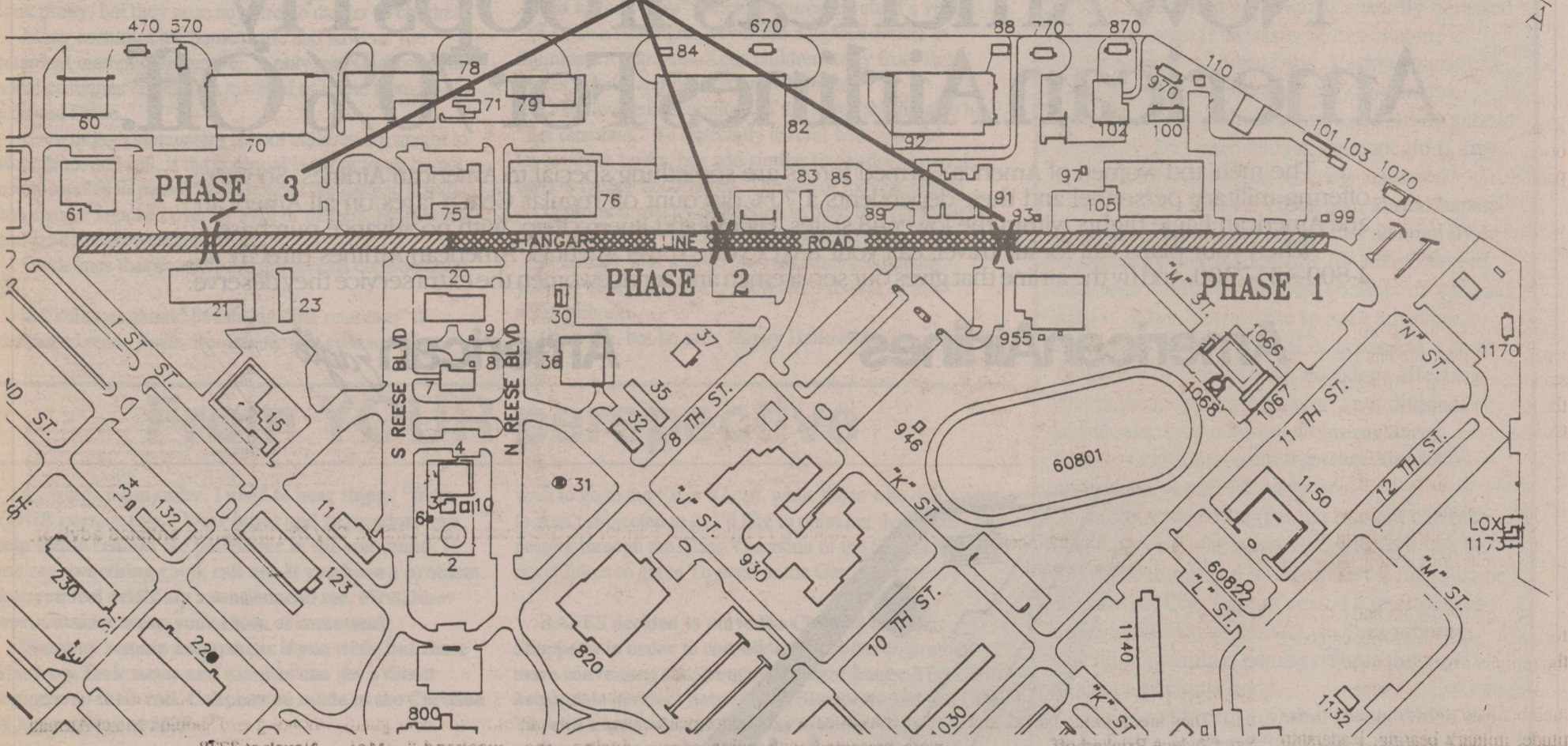
"Under no circumstances should

anyone cross the construction area anywhere except the designated crossings," said Mr. King.

Additionally, Reese Blvd. between Hangar Line Road and "J" Street will be designated as a two-way street during the project. The only vehicle crossing with Section I construction is in front of the fire department.

Students give Reese 'international' flavor

Settling in at a new base can be tough for anyone, especially when the base is in a foreign country. Several Reese UPT students are currently training in a foreign land —

Texas.

There are seven international students on Reese — five from Spain and two from Singapore. Helping them adapt to their new environment is the responsibility of Capt. Madge Morris, 64th Operations Support Squadron.

As international military student officer, the captain is responsible for monitoring their progress and handling any personnel matters the foreign officers might encounter as they work at their "two-part" mission.

"The students are here to learn to fly, but they're also here to learn

about American culture," she explained. Part of the cultural learning process includes a trip to Washington, D.C., to visit Congress and Arlington National Cemetery, among others.

Not everyone who comes here from an allied nation goes to UPT. In

the past, some have worked in the supply and safety fields.

The biggest challenge is working with foreign military members is the language barrier, according to the captain. They do go through the Defense Language Institute at Lackland AFB, Texas, before arriving here, but there can be minor language gaps sometimes. Of course, cultural differences sometimes arise.

"You have to learn to bend, to respect their customs," the captain said. She added that helping them observe religious requirements and dealing with occasional bouts of homesickness are frequently part of her job.

Her efforts don't go unappreciated.

"We didn't study [flying] in English before coming here," said 2nd Lt. Javier Martinez of the Spanish air force, who is a member of UPT Class 92-05. "So it was kind of hard studying in a different language, and getting used to the way American people behave."

He added that the international military student program has helped him overcome his initial difficulties in adapting; several of his Spanish classmates echoed that sentiment.

Despite the occasional language or cultural problem, Captain Morris finds working with the allied officers to be rewarding.

"I love this job," she said. "I like learning about different cultures, and with this job, you get to talk with them one on one."

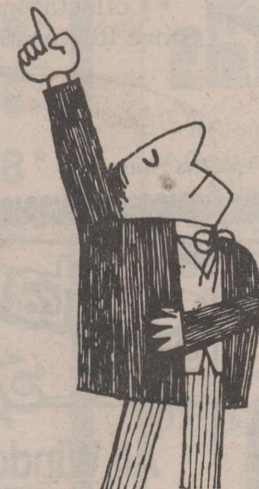

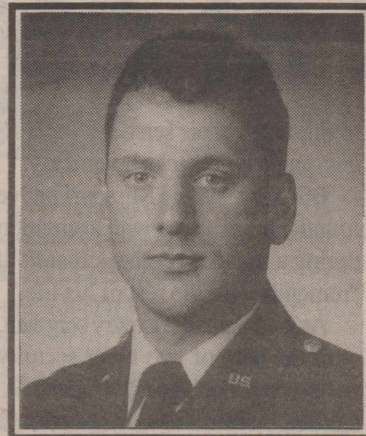

tantly, that integrity is the rock-bottom core of officership.

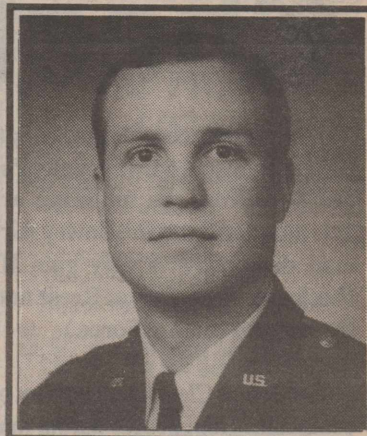

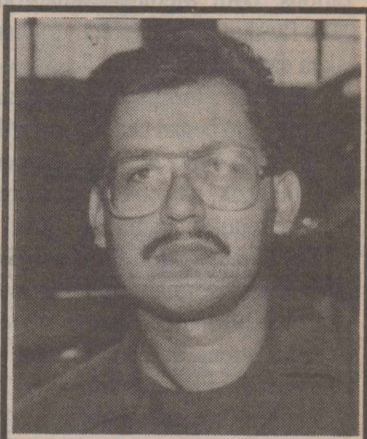

Check at gate is worth the wait

(Editors note: According to SMSgt. Darrel Johnson, 64th Security Police Squadron, the following article adapted from the Lowry Airman demonstrates why gate ID checks are necessary at Reese and throughout the Air Force.)

Sgt. James Clevenger gets a lot of complaints from people during random identification card checks.

It's time consuming, people have

to dig under their seatbelts for wallets, and traffic backs up quickly.

But Sept. 19, the Missouri native found himself faced with a situation during a random ID check that he'll "remember for the rest of his life."

At 7:45 a.m., the Lowry sergeant, with the help of two other security policemen, apprehended Jaime A. Garcia, believed to be wanted in a 1985 Albuquerque, N.M. homicide.

According to TSgt. Phil Swaim,

Sergeant Clevenger's supervisor, Mr. Garcia was driving a friend to work through the First Avenue and Quebec Street gate when he was stopped during a random check.

Sergeant Clevenger asked Mr. Garcia for a driver's license and car registration. When the suspect could produce neither, the Lowry SP followed normal procedures, asking Mr. Garcia for his name and date of birth.

The murder suspect gave a birth

date and the name Jaime Arenivat Garcia. Given that information, Sergeant Clevenger called SrA. Greg Harrington, flight desk sergeant, who checked Mr. Garcia's name on the Air Force Law Enforcement Terminal computer.

AFLET's database allows Lowry SPs access to the National Crime Information Center and Colorado Crime Information Center.

The computer file on Mr. Garcia showed he is wanted for a March 3, 1985, shooting death of an Albuquerque man. He had posted a \$50,000 bond as a result of that charge - and then left New Mexico without facing trial.

"He was listed as armed and dangerous," said Sergeant Swaim. The computer also said Mr. Garcia had a distinctive tattoo on his right arm.

Once Sergeant Swaim learned a possible murder suspect was being detained, he and SSgt. Mark Tabone

rushed to assist their fellow SP at the gate.

"I asked him to step inside the gate shack and to keep his hands out where I could see them," said Sergeant Clevenger.

Once the other SPs arrived, Sergeant Swaim checked Garcia's arm for the tattoo. It matched the description given on his criminal file.

Mr. Garcia was then handcuffed and taken to security police offices. He was turned over to Denver police an hour later.

This situation isn't unique to Lowry.

Sergeant Johnson notes that Reese security police frequently apprehend people who are wanted or have outstanding warrants.

"We don't want to frustrate drivers entering the main gate," he said, "we just want to ensure the safety of all wing members."

It's flu shot time again!

Several recent cold spells remind us that both the fall time and flu season are upon us. With this time of year comes flu shots.

Although we can't do anything to keep the leaves from turning colors, or the temperature from nose-diving, we can do something about influenza—and do it now.

According to Capt. (Dr.) John Dzik, officer in charge of immunizations, 64th Medical Squadron, "The flu shot is most effective when taken early in the season."

This year's influenza immunization program began Oct. 21 and will run through Nov. 22. According to Captain Dzik, all active duty members are required to get the shots.

The immunization clinic will begin site visits Monday. Check with your orderly room for dates and times of vaccinations, and don't forget to take your shot records with you.

Those with medical waivers prohibiting the flu injection (such as pregnancy, allergy to eggs, etc.) must present the waiver to the immunization members to avoid a no-show notification.

During site visits the clinic will be closed in the afternoon Oct. 28, 30, and Nov. 1, 4, 6, and 7. It will be open in the mornings for patients.

It will be closed all day Oct. 29 and 31, and Nov. 5. The last base organization will be visited Nov. 8. Also, Nov. 8 the clinic will be open to patients and those active duty who missed the site visit.

After the active duty vaccinations are completed, the clinic will

offer flu shots Nov. 13-15 to civilian personnel employed at Reese. "We encourage civilians to get a shot, as their being ill with the flu can impact on our overall mission," said Captain Dzik.

Starting Nov. 18, the flu shot will be available to all dependents and retirees as long as the vaccine is

available. "We have made a sincere effort (based on last years numbers) to insure there is plenty of vaccine to go around to all eligible," he said. The clinic is always closed on Tuesday.

In other first round action, 64th Operations Support Squadron defeated the 64th Communications Squadron, 19-15 and the 64th Logistics Squadron

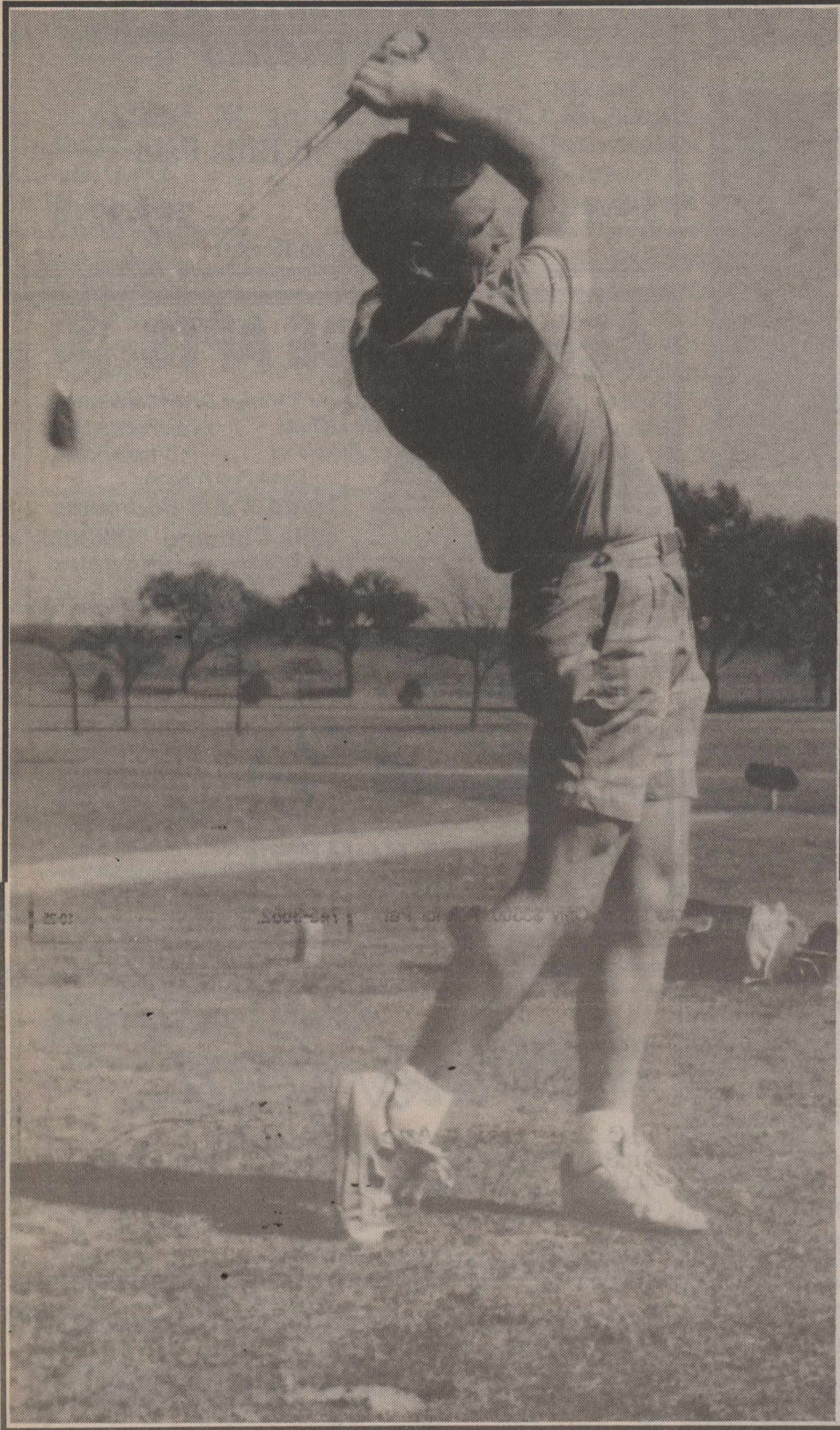
defeated the 35th FTS, 21-7.
