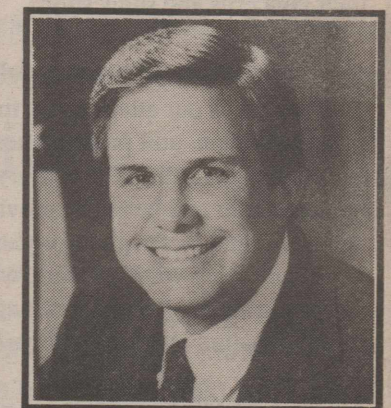

Alcohol, parenting don't mix

According to the Child Protective Services, Lubbock branch, a child is abused every 47 seconds. Three children a day die because they are beaten so severely.

In 1988, 77 Texas children died due to abuse. In 1989 this number rose to 94.

In Lubbock County, there were 396 confirmed victims of child abuse from September 1989 to August 1990. In that same period, two of these children died. Since August, another child has died. Many of these incidents of abuse (or even death) are alcohol related.

Do these statistics sicken and sadden you? They should.

Across the country, more and more stories like these are serving as grim reminders of the way some people treat their children. Being a legal drug, alcohol is so widely used that many feel they understand all its effects on the body and mind. Many times they do not.

The effects for both parents and would-be parents can be dramatic. If parents are having problems coping (even if they don't have children), alcohol is seen as temporary "feel-good" escape from the harsh realities of living.

But alcohol, being a depressant, directly affects the central nervous system and soon impairs thinking and judgment.

In this state, angry or emotional parents may act out in ways they would not if sober. In particular, married people with children may angrily respond to a child in an

inappropriate fashion, and later regret the consequences.

Children do not understand this behavior, nor do they have the words to describe how they feel. Feelings are hurt, and relationships suffer.

Even prior to birth, babies are at risk if parents choose to drink.

Below are some myths about pregnancy and alcohol and the reality behind them:

□ **Myth:** "Beer and wine are O.K."

□ **Reality:** Both beer and wine contain alcohol — a drug. The U.S. surgeon general advises expectant mothers not to drink alcohol or take any medicine containing it.

□ **Myth:** "I can stop when I start looking pregnant."

□ **Reality:** By the time you start "looking pregnant," you

may be a few months along. You should stop drinking as soon as you know you're pregnant. The first few months of pregnancy are the most important. This is the stage in which the baby is developing its vital organs. Damage done then lasts for the rest of your child's life.

Experts in the field of child abuse and alcoholism stress public awareness and education as their key weapon in this struggle. If parents (and would-be parents) know about the choices they're making, they are much less



likely to risk the health of their child.

Whether used before or after birth, parents are advised to use caution with alcohol. The consequences for parents and children can be lifelong. So if you choose to drink, drink responsibly and safely for your child's sake.

Parents and others concerned are asked to call 3789/3901 for more information about child abuse or Fetal Alcohol Syndrome.

From YOUR perspective

At 30 mph, my motorcycle accelerated around the corner of Fourth Street and War Highway.
At 40 mph, I passed by Reese Elementary, pushing my engine even harder.
At 65 mph, with the wind slapping my face and legs, I put the housing area behind me.
At 80 mph, with FM 179 just ahead, I tried to get a bit more power out of my cycle. The fields on either side of me flashed by as I surged toward the intersection, trying to beat out the oncoming traffic.
One-quarter mile later, at 0 mph, the only thing flashing by me was my life.

The weather in the Reese-Lubbock area has been unpredictable of late, but one thing is for sure — motorcycle season is upon us once again.
With it comes the potential for accidents, and wing safety officials are stressing the need for good safety practices.
"There are several things that riders must do before they hop on a motorcycle," said Lt. Col. David McIntosh, chief of the Reese Safety Division. "This includes things like getting the proper training, wearing protective gear, observing traffic laws and so on."
One key aspect of riding a motorcycle is being aware of the defensive attitude riders must maintain.
"Cyclists have to remember that they are often just not seen by people driving four-wheel vehicles," said SSgt. Anthony Stone of ground safety. "It's imperative that they be on guard when they ride."
Some tips that safety officials offer for wing motorcyclists include:
□ Always wear full protective gear. A helmet with a full face shield or shatterproof goggles, long trousers, shoes that cover the entire foot and gloves are required on and off base for military people, as is reflective material on the back and front of the upper torso during hours of darkness. Also, a long-sleeve shirt or jacket is highly recommended.
□ Headlights must be on at all times.
□ On base, all two-wheeled vehicles must have brakes and fenders in the front and rear, as well as two mirrors.

This is in addition to the equipment required by state law.
□ Motorcycles must have a valid state inspection sticker. On a similar note, cycles should be kept in top condition.
□ As with other vehicles, alcohol and motorcycles don't mix.

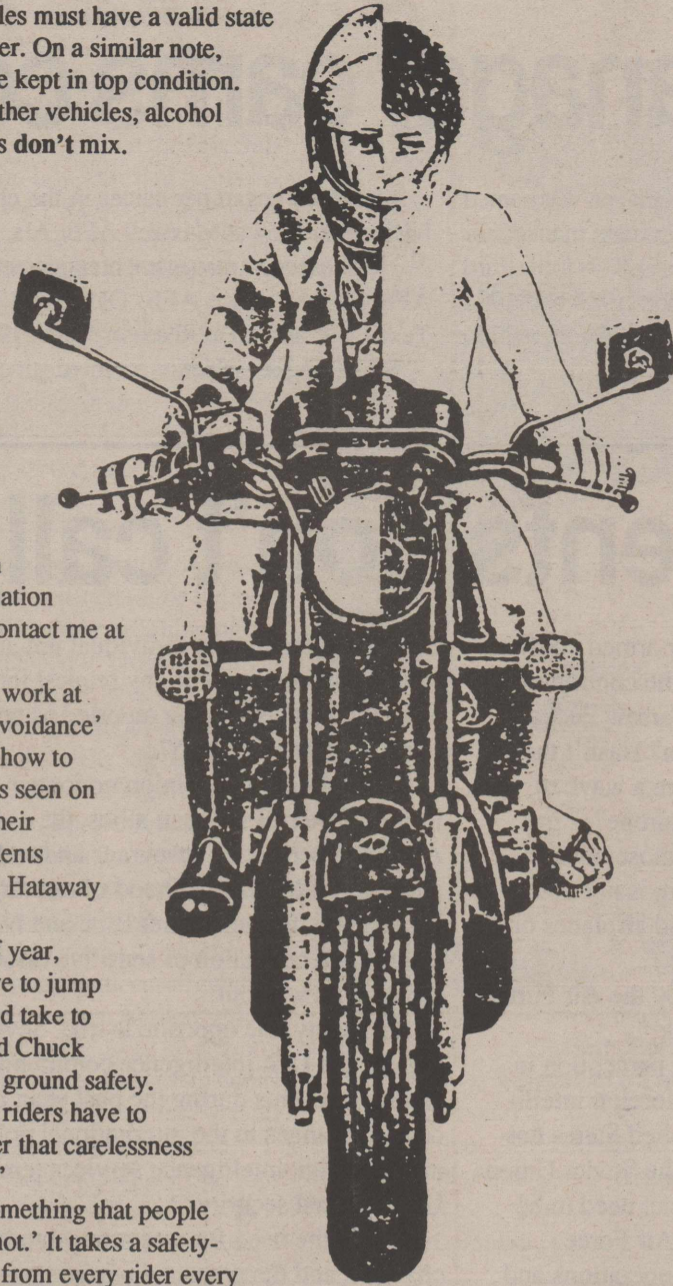
"Most motorcycle accidents involve riders who don't have proper training," said Jon Hataway of safety. "People who require training (in accordance with Air Force Regulation 127-7) should contact me at 6108.

"Riders who work at their accident 'avoidance' skills and know how to make themselves seen on the road lower their chances of accidents drastically," Mr. Hataway added.

"This time of year, many people love to jump on their bikes and take to the roads," added Chuck Gerrior, chief of ground safety. "That's fine, but riders have to realize the danger that carelessness can put them in."

"This isn't something that people can do in 'one shot.' It takes a safety-oriented attitude from every rider every time he or she gets on the road.

"That's what prevents accidents," he concluded.

OOM manager earns commander award

Pauline V. Reed, installation club manager, was named Air Training Command's civilian open mess manager of the year (under 1,500 members category). This is the third time she has won this command honor (1984 and 1986 were previous). She won the Air Force level competition in 1984 as well.

Ms. Reed began her career in the club management business in 1954 at Maxwell AFB, Ala.

Her subsequent management assignments include Webb AFB, Texas; Vance AFB, Okla.; and Randolph AFB, Texas. She arrived at Reese in March 1981.

Regarding her selection for this distinction, "I wouldn't

have gotten this award without having such great employees — they deserve the recognition more than I do," said Ms. Reed.

"They are the driving force behind me," she concluded.

World events don't call for less vigilance

We have just witnessed a major armed conflict in the Persian Gulf. So why the continuing concern about the defunct Warsaw Pact and its would-be sponsor, the Soviet Union? Hasn't the Berlin Wall been torn down? Isn't there a wave of democracy sweeping across Eastern Europe?

Yes, good things are happening to those once oppressed, but the U.S. security posture is not determined only by an adversary's tanks and airplanes or its political system.

This issue was recently addressed by the Air Force Chief of Staff, Gen. Merrill A. McPeak.

"I am concerned there is a growing perception in the Air Force that the threat posed by foreign intelligence services directed against the United States has lessened since the dramatic events in the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe. Air Force personnel need to be mindful that this threat continues and Air Force weapons systems, research programs, operations and plans remain a prime target for espionage.

"They must also know that any request for Department of Defense information, regardless of

classification, by any individual not authorized to have the information or any request through other than official channels is to be reported as prescribed in Air Force Regulation 205-57.

"While the Soviet Union no longer dominates its former Eastern European allies, the espionage threat to Air Force personnel, resources and technology is not abating. With less likelihood of military hostilities between the former Soviet Bloc and NATO, the clandestine collection of sensitive information might seem on its way out.

"In reality, the opposite is true. Several key findings by the U.S. intelligence community, based on studies of events during the past year, disclosed that despite changes in the international political environment, foreign intelligence services remain a threat to U.S. national security.

"Also, the need for western technology has not changed, and the present environment emphasizing international cooperation and collaboration facilitates the foreign intelligence collection process.

"The Air Force will continue to be a prime target of

foreign intelligence efforts to collect information. This is especially true in view of the current activity in the Persian Gulf where adversaries are attempting to gather data about our capabilities.

"Commanders at all levels must reinforce awareness of this threat and emphasize the reporting requirements of AFR 205-57. This program provides an important vehicle for identifying, neutralizing and exploiting the foreign human intelligence threat directed against the Air Force."

Whatever our job and however we support the Air Force's mission, we all must remain diligent in promoting our nation's security. Contacts with persons from "criteria" countries and unauthorized requests for DOD information must be reported to the Air Force Office of Special Investigations. At Reese AFB, AFOSI Detachment 1025 may be contacted at 3414. Remember, a defensive posture promotes national security.

A member of the Reese Life Support Branch earned the 1990 Air Force Life Support Senior NCO of the Year Award.

"I was surprised when the wing commander told me I had won the award," said MSgt. Enrique Benitez. "Since I didn't even know that I had won the ATC award, I wasn't aware that I was up for the Air Force award." He has also won Air Training Command's Life Support Senior Noncommissioned Officer of the Year Award for two consecutive years.

In addition to his award, Sergeant Benitez received a personal congratulation from Lt.

Gen. Joseph Ashy, ATC commander, during the general's visit to Reese Wednesday.

"Sergeant Benitez's strong leadership and outstanding managerial ability have earned him respect and admiration from both his peers and superiors throughout the command," said Col. John Block, former 64th Flying Training Wing deputy commander for Operations. "He has also earned a commandwide reputation as an outstanding life support senior NCO who gets things done right the first time."

□ He served as acting first sergeant for the 41st FTS on numerous occasions.

Sergeant Benitez represents the Air Force in a professional manner in the Lubbock community, according to operations officials. He has been involved with the Special Olympics for eight consecutive years, helping handicapped children achieve self esteem through athletic competition. Sergeant Benitez is currently

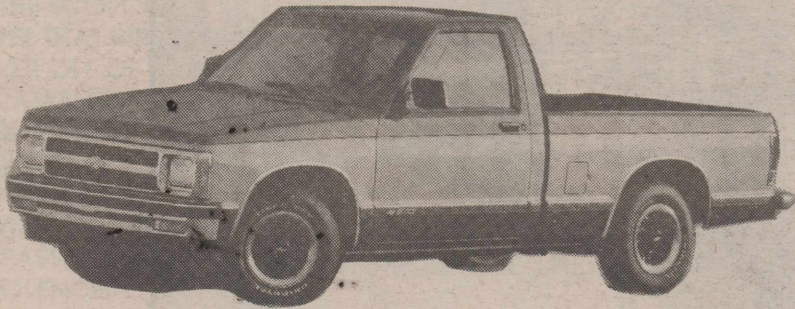
working on his associates degree in survival and rescue operations from the Community College of the Air Force.

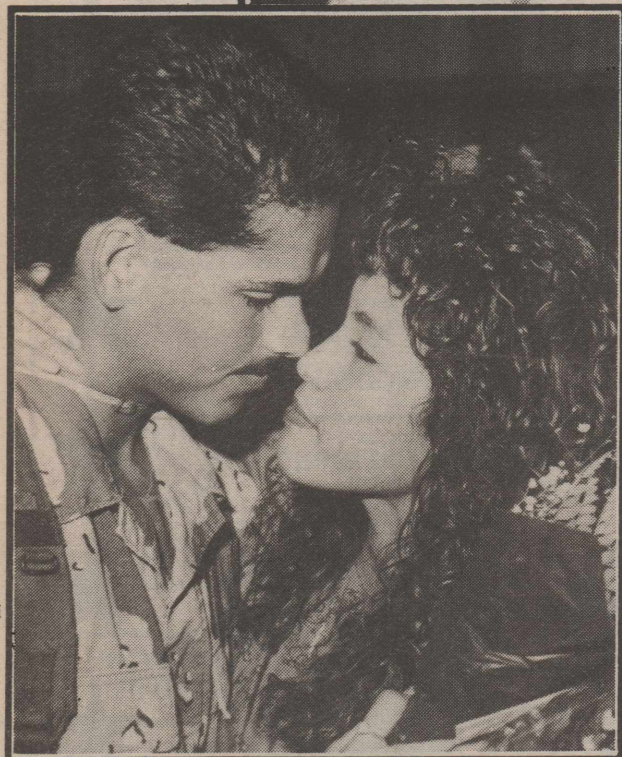

Tax Tips offered for military

Tax filing can be a confusing task. But Operation Desert Storm has clouded the picture even more than usual.

Here's a quick rundown on filing dates for 1990 federal tax forms, along with some updated tax information for servicemembers who have been in the Persian Gulf area. Tax officials in the Reese Legal Office say there might be more changes to federal taxes for the operation's servicemembers.

Stateside-based service members

Federal income taxes for 1990 are due no later than April 15. Individuals may request a routine four-month extension. Though the Internal Revenue Service will grant the extension, any tax due must be paid by April 15 to avoid interest and possible penalties.

Overseas-based service members other than Desert Storm

Federal income taxes for 1990 are due no later than April 15. Military members stationed overseas are eligible for an automatic two-month extension for filing federal tax forms. A statement must be attached to the tax return explaining how the taxpayer qualifies for the extension. An extension may

be requested, but interest must be paid on any federal taxes from the April 15 deadline to the date the taxes are paid.

Operation Desert Storm members

The federal tax situation for individuals serving in the Persian Gulf area may change, but as of early March:

□ Individuals and their spouses have at least 180 days following departure from the combat zone to file their 1990 federal tax returns. According to IRS officials, pay earned in 1990 in the Persian Gulf area is taxable.

□ Military pay drawn during January 1991 is tax free for enlisted servicemembers and warrant officers. For commissioned officers, the first \$500 of pay per month is tax-free. This applies only to 1991 federal taxes and only while the individual served in the Operation Desert Storm combat zone, which as of Jan. 17, was defined as: Persian Gulf, Red Sea, Gulf of Oman, Gulf of Aden, the portion of the Arabian Sea above 10 degrees north

latitude and west of 68 degrees east longitude, and the total land areas of Saudi Arabia, Kuwait, Iraq, Oman, Qatar, Bahrain and the United Arab Emirates.

Because Congress passed legislation making the combat zone retroactive to Aug. 2, military pay received prior to January 1991 may be declared tax exempt. Local tax officials said this decision has not been made yet.

□ The combat zone rules also apply to individuals physically stationed outside of the combat zone who are providing direct support to Operation Desert Storm and are drawing imminent-danger pay.

□ If a servicemember is eligible for combat zone exclusion, all federal and state withholding taxes are not automatically deducted. This can create a tax problem for a commissioned officer. To alleviate possible problems, an individual can authorize special withholding of income taxes.

Members of Reese Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 91-07 will receive the wings of an Air Force pilot during ceremonies today in the Simler Theater.

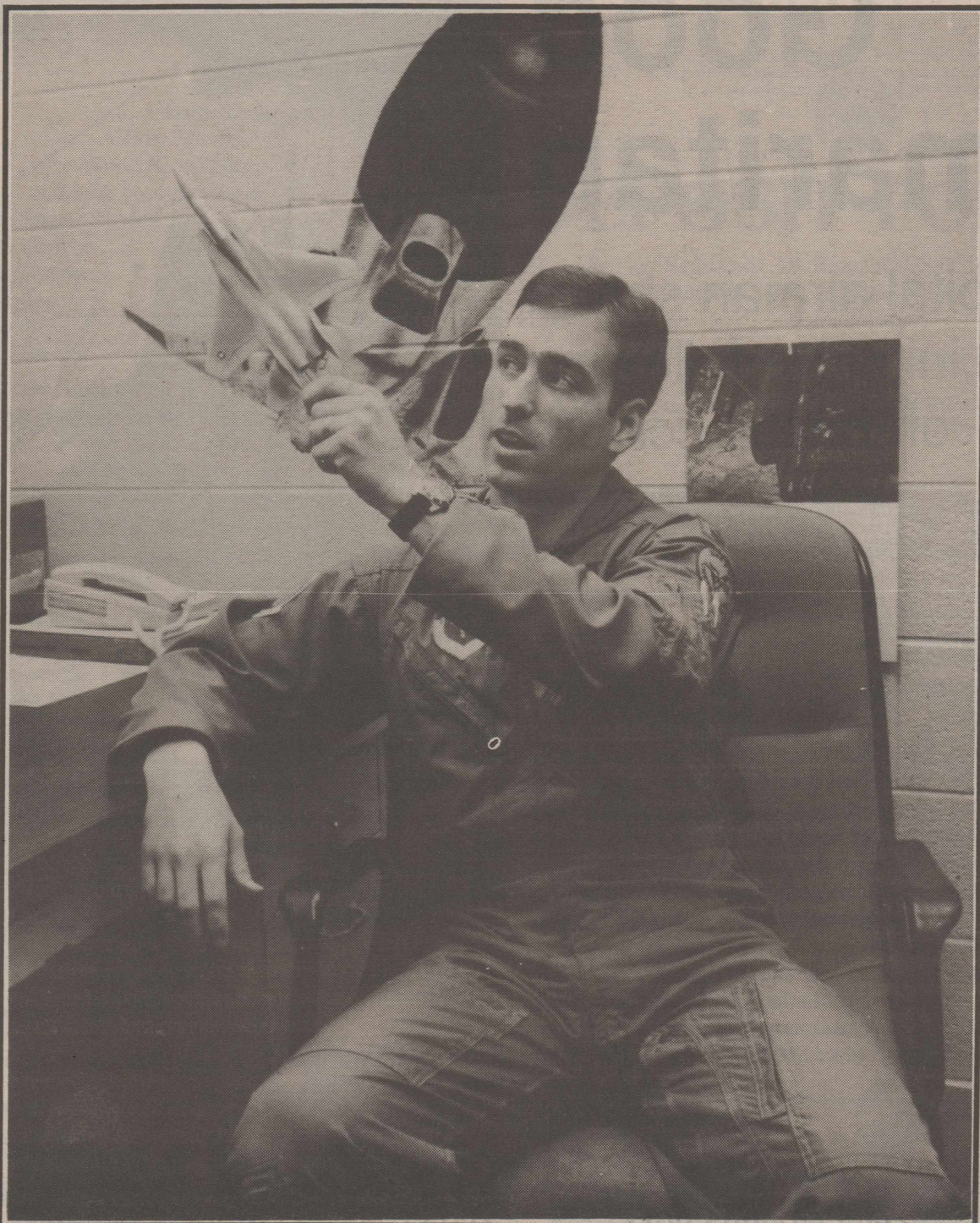
During the graduation ceremony, the Honorable Larry Combest, congressman, 19th District, will address the class.

Hospital airman shows poise, initiative following off-base accident

Around midnight March 14, A1C Kenneth Whillock, 64th Flying Training Wing Hospital, was on his way home, thinking he would be in bed by 1 a.m. Unfortunately, as he was approaching the 19th Street and Boston Avenue intersection, he saw two cars crash in front of him.

"I got out of the car and started to cross the street, assessing the scene. I noticed the driver had been thrown under the dashboard, but had managed to get back into the sitting position," he said. "The passenger crawled out of the car and was lying on the ground."

After a quick assessment of both victims, Airman Whillock proceeded to the second vehicle. After making sure the two females there were not injured, he went back to the first vehicle and stabilized the passenger. While he was stabilizing the passenger, a bystander called 911.

Since Airman Whillock was at the scene, he helped Emergency Medical Service para-

medics apply the cervical collar to one of the victims and placed her on the spine board. After loading that victim, he helped put one of the females in the ambulance for transport to the hospital.

"I started notifying the parents of the two people that lived out of town when we arrived at the hospital," said Airman Whillock.

"I am extremely proud of Airman Whillock," said SMSgt. Diane Leaton, Hospital Nursing Services superintendent. "I was impressed with his ability to apply principles and techniques that he is still in the process of learning," she added. "He just recently completed emergency medical technician training and is awaiting his national registry exam results."

"I am pleased with the teamwork he displayed with the local EMS paramedics. Their comments to me were nothing but commendable," added Sergeant Leaton.

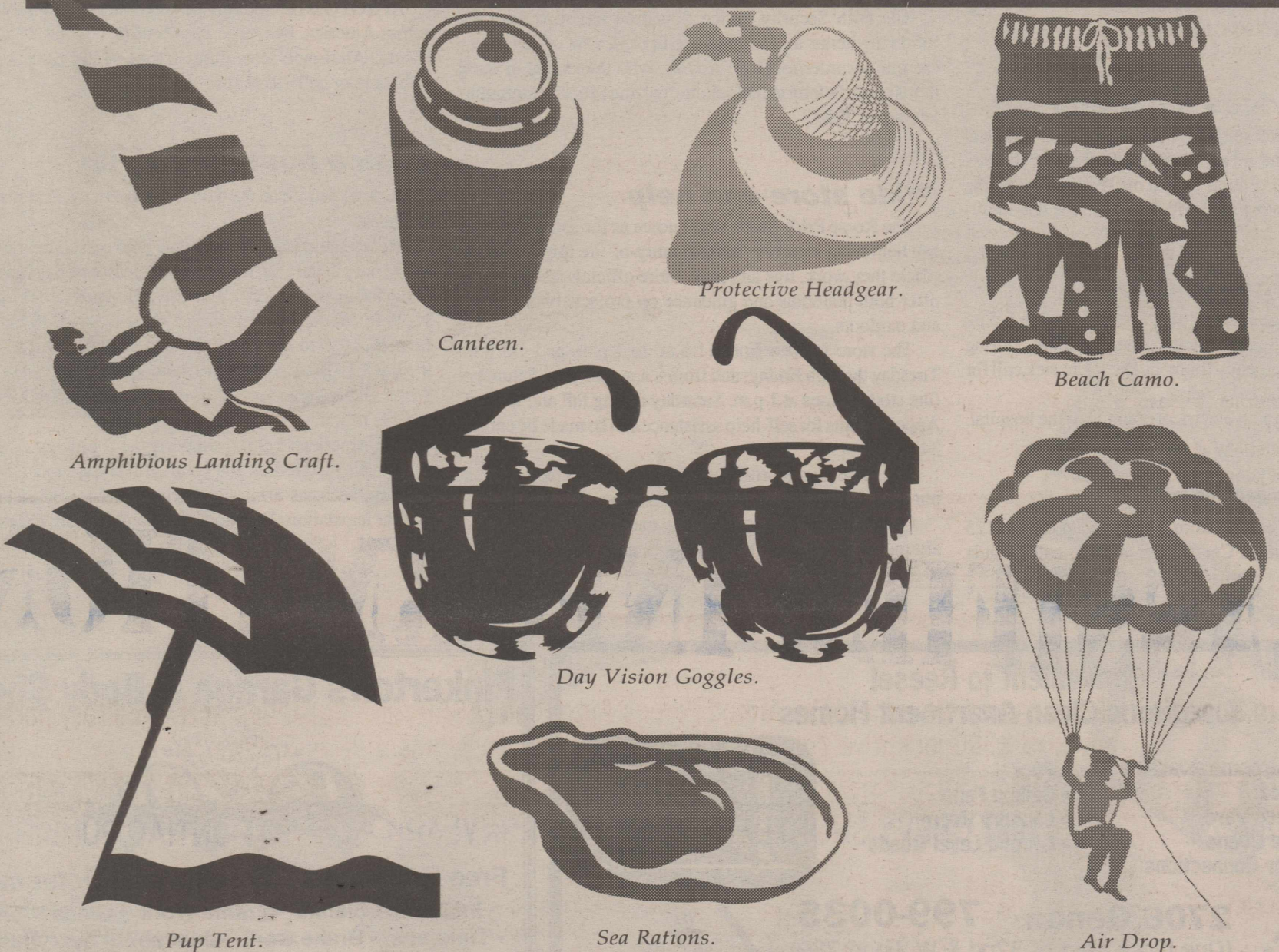

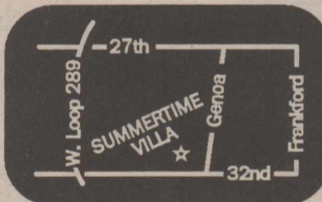

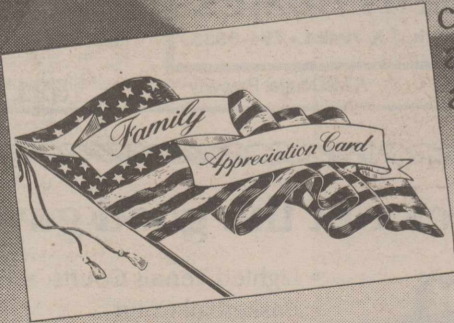

"These qualities personify the Texas Special Olympics athletes, as well as the coaches, volunteers, families, contributors and corporate sponsors who make the games a reality."

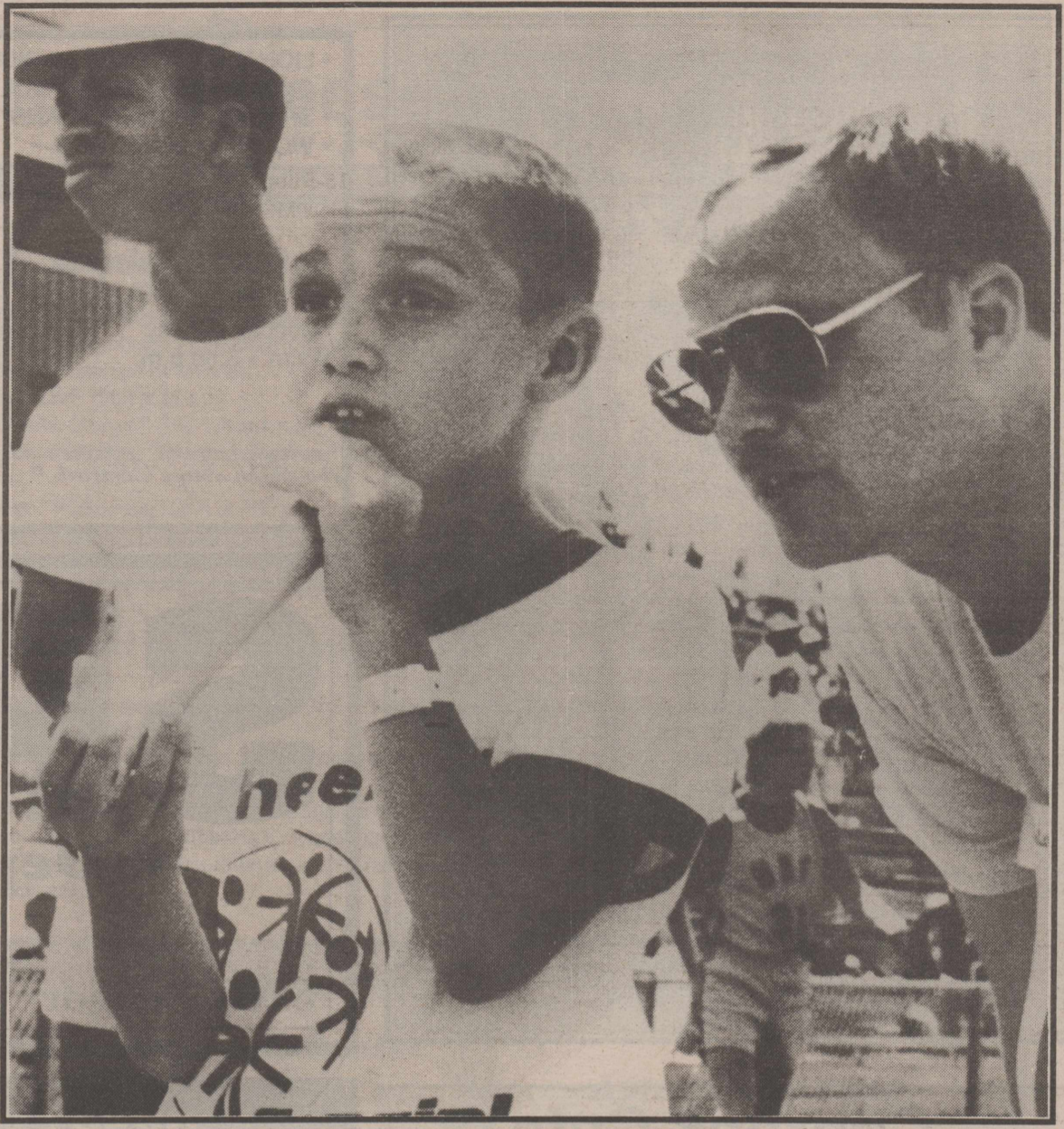
"Perhaps the best part of being a volunteer is that the giving is not one way," added 1st Lt. Abbie Luck, another Reese project officer.
