## New assignment system a success

The top student in Reese Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 91-09 was the first in Air Training Command to select an aircraft assignment under the new assignment se-· lection process.

Capt. Dennis Pearson got first pick under the new Pilot Management Program assignment selection process, which was implemented April 5 as the five command UPT bases linked up to allow students to choose their aircraft assignments.

Reese students combined to select three trainer, five fighter, one bomber, one tanker and eight transport assignments.



#### Merit assignment system

Beginning with Reese Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 91-09, the Air Force has changed the student assignment system to one based on merit. The students will be ranked based on their flying, academic and leadership accomplishments during the UPT program and will then choose their assignment based on their ranking within the class.

The merit assignment system replaces the previous system which was not clearly understood by the students. This new system is easily understood and recognizes the students' achievements during UPT.

The new system provides a choice — in both aircraft and assignment location — to each student. The assignment selection is conducted in an "National Football League Draft" format with all five UPT wings participating in a conference phone call.

## Who goes first?

The process begins with a drawing to determine which wing selects first. After the top student at the wing which wins the draw makes his assignment selection from those available, the process continues with the top students at the other wings making their choices in wing alphabetical order. The process continues through as many "rounds" as needed, based on the wing with the highest number of graduates. "Byes" are used at certain points in the process to ensure there are no inequities resulting from the variation in the number of graduates among the wings.

## Reese student makes history

The first merit assignment selection was conducted April 5 with Class 91-09 making their assignment selections. Reese won the draw and got the first pick. Capt. Dennis Pearson made history when he made the first pick under the new system — an F-15 at Eglin AFB, Fla.

The whole process went smoothly and the feedback from the students was very positive. The new assignment system accomplishes its goal of being easily understood and providing the students a choice based on merit!

☐ Discuss rules before entering the store.

☐ Bring a nutritious snack for child to eat during the shopping trip.

☐ Bring a story book for the child to look at.

☐ Reinforce appropriate behavior. Talk with him, play with him, engage him in the decision-making process. Encourage him to talk, watch, listen and think.

☐ Role play at home on how to act in the grocery store. Go when you are rested, as well as when the child is rested. Don't wait until the end of a tiring day.

☐ Stop unacceptable



(Editor's note: This week's "One on one" is with Col. Robert Negley, the new 64th Flying Training Wing deputy commander for Operations, and was conducted by SSgt. Mike Breslin, Roundup editor.)

What are some of your impressions as you take over as the new DO?

On first impression, the wing seems to have very good spirit and lots of enthusiasm.

Also, I've had several chances to visit in the local area my first week, and to meet some local civic leaders who were out here for graduation Friday and for Monday's change-of-command ceremony. The relationship between the base and the community seems real strong.

This past Friday (April 5), pilot training students throughout the command got their aircraft assignments under the new selection system. How did things go here, and how will the students benefit from the different options they have under the new system?

The main reasons we've gone to the merit assignment system are because the old system wasn't really understood by the students and it didn't provide the students a choice of assignments. Now, they understand the system and we can give them a choice of their assignment based on their performance.

Last Friday went very well. The selections were done through a conference call between all the pilot training bases — sort of like a National Football League draft. They start out the selections with a drawing to see which base picks first each round, and Reese was first this time.

The whole process only took 30 minutes, and there were about 88 assignments to be taken. All the students had a few days beforehand to look at a list of available aircraft, and they came ready to make their selections.

The reaction of the students here has been extremely positive. They know that they're going to get the assign-

ment they earn. If they do very well during training, they'll get one of their top choices; if they are at the middle of their class, they'll probably get a choice in the middle of their list;

Recently, Class 91-08 was redesignated as 91-09 and their graduation was slid back; in addition, it was announced that we were going back to a six-week cycle for undergraduate pilot training classes. How do these changes fit in with the force restructuring that's going on, and what effects will they have here?

With pilot production requirements decreasing, we would have ended up with extremely small classes if we stayed with the three-week cycle. At Reese, we've produced about 350 pilots per year in the past; now it's coming down to around 200. The cycle change will allow us to train more efficiently.

There will be some impact on bases like Reese, as the fewer trainees will reduce the need for instructors, support people and so forth. However, the quality of student inputs should improve as selectivity increases and instructors have more time for more individualized instruction. Thus, the quality of training will probably be even better than it is now.

specialized UPT here? Are all the necessary arrangements for its implementation going well?

Yes, everything is going very well. The syllabus of training is ready, and the new T-1 aircraft appears to be on schedule. We should see the first one in November, and some more are due early next year. The first simulator is also expected early next year.

Also, on a related note, we originally were going to classify people into a fighter-bomber or tanker-transport track before they even started T-37 training. That's changed — they won't be identified for their track until they finish T-37s. Once, SUPT starts, the students will select their track (either fighter-bomber or tanker-transport) based on their merit order of performance in T-37s, similar to the new merit assignment system.

Having just come from Air Training Command headquarters, you're familiar with the "big picture." How would you evaluate the state of UPT in general as it undergoes so many dynamic changes?

Generally, UPT is in very good shape -- all our UPT wings are accomplighing their mission goals. As I mentioned, the biggest impact of the changes will be the smaller class sizes. What that will translate into will be the Air Force's ability to be more selective than ever in picking pilot candidates. A natural spinoff of that may be lower attrition rates. Not that the rates are particularly high now, but attrition rates are historically lower when pilot production is lowest and only the best candidates are getting in the program. The bottom line is that we'll continue to produce the best pilots in the world.

Anything to add?

I was at Reese about 14 years ago, both as an instructor and as chief of CBPO, and it's great to be back. There's been a real nice welcome from everyone here, and I'm looking forward to working with all the people in the wing.





# Pieces of the Culsular Puzzle

Continued vigilance is a must

A s most of us know, warming relations between the Soviet Union and the United States have not decreased the foreign intelligence threat. However, many people still do not realize that the Soviets are only one of many nations interested in our information and technology.

Procedures for protecting and handling classified information, and standards for personnel who are eligible for access to that information, are critical issues for each of us. Familiarity with our security programs through education and experience will help counter the threat.

Foreign intelligence agencies direct most of their efforts toward "open source collection." Agents gather information from news reports, magazines, the Library of Congress, Privacy Act requests and so on. If one considers a particular classified project as a puzzle, the open source data forms are the border of the puzzle. To prevent completion of the puzzle, we have security initiatives such as the Communications Security, Operations Security and Information Security Programs.

While COMSEC and OPSEC deal with protection, handling and controlled release of any sensitive information, the information security program deals exclusively with classified information. COMSEC and OPSEC,

therefore, contain elements of information security.

An integral part of the information security program is the Personnel Security Program, which deals with the people who are eligible for access to classified information.

As with any people-oriented program, education and training are essential to the information and personnel security programs. Security education training is conducted in three phases: accession training, indoctrination training and recurring training.

Accession training is conducted during basic training, or one of the officer training programs. Indoctrination training is given shortly after people arrive in their new unit. This training is tailored to the needs and requirements of the unit. Recurring (annual) training is tailored to the needs of the individual, and is based on duties involving classified information. Supervisors are responsible for ensuring subordinates receive recurring training.

Our security programs are primarily designed to deter espionage, not catch spies. We must all realize that we are subject to foreign intelligence efforts.

Remember to report any suspicious contacts or requests for information to the Air Force Office of Special Investigations (3414). Understanding our individual roles in national security encourages involvement and awareness, which are essential to deterrence as well as to good security programs.



# CHAMPUS

CHAMPUS officials explain details of 'adjunctive' benefits, dependent dental plan

he Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Uniformed Services "adjunctive" dental benefit (available to all CHAMPUS-eligible persons) is very limited, according to Reese health benefits officials.

The only time dental care is covered is when it's a necessary part of medical treatment that is covered by CHAMPUS. This is called "adjunctive" dental care.

For example, an oral surgeon may have to remove broken teeth as part of the medical treatment for an injury. Or, a medical problem might require that a patient be admitted to the hospital for dental work, as in the case of a person who has a blood disorder being hospitalized so that any-bleeding caused by the dental work can be stopped. In the latter case, CHAMPUS pays only for the hospital part of the bill, not for the dental inpatient care — and for any care that is medical, not dental.

In such cases, you must get approval in advance from the CHAMPUS dental claims processor before you get adjunctive dental care from a dentist.

To get approval for dental care related to a covered medical problem, send a filled-out CHAMPUS claim form (Department of Defense Form 2520); a statement from the physician about the condition (if a physician is involved); and a statement from the dentist saying why you need the care, what care you need and how much it will cost, to: "Blue Cross-Blue Shield of South Carolina, P.O. Box 100599, Florence, S.C. 29501-0099."

Also, remember the CHAMPUS dental coverage discussed above is completely separate from the uniformed services' Active-Duty Dependents Dental Plan.

The dependents dental plan is not a CHAMPUS benefit. It's a Defense Department insurance program that offers basic preventive and restorative dental care to the enrolled families of active-duty sponsors in the seven uniformed services.

On a related note, the families of activated reservists and National Guard members may not sign up for the dependents dental plan unless their sponsors are ordered to active duty for a period of at least two years.

'Keeping an eye' on health is the key

any of us take our vision for granted and do not realize that routine eye examinations are essential for maintaining our eyesight. We rely on our vision to complete even the simplest tasks every day and may not appreciate it until a problem develops.

School-aged children should have annual eye examinations; parents should be alert to common symptoms of visual problems such as eye strain, headaches or blurry vision. Also, parents should observe their children for signs of visual problems. Examples of these signs may include squinting, an eye that crosses in or out, or eyes that move independently of each other.

Adults should have eye examinations at least every one or two years, or as directed by their optometrist or ophthalmologist. In addition to determining if visual problems are present, the doctor also evaluates eve health for problems such as glaucoma and cataracts.

Glaucoma is a condition in which the fluid pressure of the eyeball is abnormally high. If this condition is not detected and treated, the visual nerve becomes damaged, resulting in a permanent loss of

Cataracts are usually due to a normal aging process in the eye. The crystalline lens is a clear structure in the eye; over time, however, the lens becomes yellowed or cloudy due to ultraviolet radiation from the







## Six receive **Articles 15**

The first quarter of 1991 showed an upward trend in Article 15 actions taken at Reese as a result of Uniform Code of Military Justice

According to the Reese Legal Office, six members received Article 15 punishment in the first quarter.

☐ One Article 15 was issued to a second lieutenant for violation of Articles 107 and 134, for making false official statements and failure to pay a just debt. The punishment included 60 days restriction to the limits of Reese and forfeiture of \$700 of pay per month for two months (\$500 of the forfeiture per month was suspended for six months).

☐ Another Article 15 was issued to a staff sergeant for wrongful disposition of military property of a value of less that \$100, in violation of Article 107. The punishment consisted of a suspended reduction to sergeant and forfeiture of \$50 pay.

☐ Another Article 15 was issued for a violation of Article 92 of the UCMJ — dereliction in the performance of duties. Punishment for the violation included a reduction in rank from senior airman to airman first class and forfeiture of \$224 pay.

☐ Two Article 15s resulted from failure to go, in violation of Article 86. The punishment imposed in one case included a suspended reduction in rank from sergeant to airman first class and forfeiture of \$50 pay per month for two months. The punishment in the second case was not suspended because the serious nature of the second offense also included failure to obey a lawful order.

☐ A final Article 15 was issued for writing worthless checks in violation of Article 123a. The punishment included reduction in rank from senior airman to airman first class, 45 days extra duty and 45 days restriction to base.

The San Antonio native has been assigned to Reese for one and one-half



Erickson, transport; 2nd Lt. Paul Harris, fighter; 2nd Lt. Troy Hook, transport; 2nd Lt. Andreas Jucker, fighter; and 2nd Lt. James Kimbrough, transport.

To ensure that each UPT graduate will get the chance to fly, the Air Force developed a complementary career pipeline called "banking."

Some graduates will enter the bank for 24 - 36 months in nonflying roles. Up to 700 command graduates may elect to be banked from now through fiscal 1992.

After banking, each will receive approximately eight weeks of refresher training at a UPT base, and can expect as many as eight years of uninterrupted flying duty.

Students will be rank ordered and earn selection position within the assignment draft primarily through their performance in the cockpit. Seventy percent of the students' ratings are based on flying airplanes. Ten percent comes from academics and 20 percent from flight commanders' ratings.

"The reaction of the students here has been extremely positive," said Col. Robert Negley, deputy commander for Operations. "They know that they're going to get the assignment they earn."

newed sense of cooperation among all base organizations,"

## **DOD** travelers can expect assistance

Department of Defense travelers who experience problems once they have left their home station should be advised they can expect service from any DOD transportation office or commercial travel office under contract to the military

Reese transportation officials said that in most cases reservations or tickets may be changed even if the tickets were purchased from a different travel company or at a different installation. Each contractor will work with the traveler to arrange new transportation, providing appropriate orders support the change. Charges for any other service not authorized on the orders must be paid by the traveler. If direct ticket interchange is not possible, new tickets or reservations may be required.

DOD travelers should be pro-

vided full and complete travel service from any DOD transportation office anywhere, regardless of service affiliation or permanent duty station. The office that makes the original travel arrangements should supply travelers with a toll-free telephone number so changes can be made over the telephone, if neces-

A trip to the airport should not be required to change reservations or tickets, according to 2nd Lt. David Patton, Reese traffic management officer. However, it is sometimes to the traveler's advantage to go directly to the airport to save time.

Any difficulties the traveler experiences should be reported to the local installation transportation officer or traffic management officer. For Reese passenger service information for official travel, call
