Does your child know his full name, telephone number, address, parent's full name and location and phone number of where they work?

Does your child know what to do in case of an emergency (for example, call 911), and do they have easy access to a telephone?

☐ Never leave a child 5 or younger alone.

☐ A responsible school-age child may be left alone after school for an hour or so; however, this child should not be made responsible for the care of younger children.

he recent war in the Middle East precipitated a variety of psychosomatic illnesses in children and adults. The symptoms included nightmares, stomachaches, bedwetting, breathing difficulties, not wanting to go to school, disputes with other children, loss of appetite and headaches. All of these are symptoms of anxiety and they commonly occur during any stressful situations.

What should a parent do when children exhibit anxiety? First, parents must recognize that these are signals that the child needs help. Be patient when your child exhibits one of these behaviors; don't threaten, berate or call the child names. If they are old enough to express themselves, encourage them to communicate their fears, and be

Pay attention and listen carefully; then try to help. Don't ignore the signs, thinking they will go away or "he'll outgrow those fears."

Second, don't add to your child's anxieties by being anxious yourself. As the parent, you need to set an example. Maintain your composure and confidence. If your child exhibits undue anxiety, it may be because adults around him are displaying

It may be perfectly natural to be concerned about what might happen, as with the recent war. Still, the parent needs to remember that the worst-case scenario doesn't always happen, and constantly worrying out loud about what might happen will inevitably cause fear in children. How the parent copes with a stressful situation will greatly affect how the children react. So try to project a positive attitude, especially when children are around.

Third, try to maintain your regular household routine, as well as the same emotional behavior around the children. If it isn't normal to fuss over a child, don't do so now — the child will sense that something is


During times of stress, remember that you as the parent are the most important person in your child's life. Consequently, take care of yourself. Eat properly, get plenty of rest, keep busy, try to remain calm and have faith in yourself. Plan fun times for you to share with your children so you'll have good memories despite stressful times. Spend your social time with cheerful, positive-minded friends.

If you feel a need to talk to someone, a professional counselor, your physician or your pastor can be very helpful. Call on your friends for help; that's what friends are for. And make time for yourself to restore your energy and confidence.

Your children depend on you for security and love. Don't let them down when they need you.

iabetes mellitus is a chronic, lifelong disease in which your body either can't produce enough insulin or can't properly use the insulin it produces. Because each of these situations involves a different problem with insulin, diabetes is divided into two major types:

Diabetes

Wing doctor offers advice on condition

Type I, in which the individual is insulin dependent. It generally has a very early onset in juveniles, but may

Type II, in which the individual is not insulin dependent. It has an adult onset.

The type of diabetes affecting a patient will determine the warning signs which may be present. The most common warning signs associated with type I (insulin dependent) are:

Constant urination

Abnormal thirst

Unusual hunger

The rapid loss of weight

Obvious weakness and fatigue

Nausea and vomiting

As you can see, the first letters of these symptoms form the word caution. This simply means that if you start experiencing these signs, you should immediately consult with a physician.

On the other hand, type II diabetes (noninsulin dependent) usually occurs after 30, and has the following signs: drowsiness, itching, a family history of diabetes, blurred vision, excessive weight, tingling/numbness in feet, skin infection and slow healing.

If you experience any of these signs of diabetes, you should seek medical assistance immediately.

The following are some ways to keep your blood sugar at a normal level if you are diabetic:

☐ Eat a variety of foods, such as milk products, vegetables, fruits, meats, bread and cereals. Avoid excess fat, sweets and salt.

☐ Exercise helps decrease blood sugar since it makes insulin work more efficiently. It also facilitates weight loss.

The kind of exercise I recommend is the one you enjoy. Exercise should be done three times weekly and in moderation. You should ensure that extra liquid is readily available, if needed. Special care should also be given to the feet during exercise to prevent blisters or cuts.

☐ Insulin and oral hypoglycemia tablets can be prescribed to decrease blood sugar.

The most common problems observed in diabetic patients are observed in the following areas:

☐ Vision — a diabetic patient should have his eyes examined regularly because changes in vision can occur, which can range from sensitivity to light to blindness.

☐ Kidneys — malfunction of the kidneys is also associated with diabetics.

☐ Nervous system — diabetics are susceptible to partial or complete loss of feeling in the lower extremities, primarily the feet. They can also have a gradual loss of their ability to urinate.

☐ Extremities — because of partial loss of feeling, a diabetic patient should pay close attention to his or her feet. Extreme care should be given to wearing properly fitted shoes. They should also avoid dry skin in order to decrease the chances of getting a wound that may be difficult to heal.

Despite all of the complications associated with diabetes, a patient suffering from this disease can still have a normal life with appropriate diet, exercise and routine

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
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He added that although there were fewer people available to volunteer because of the maintanence conversion, people from around base were quick to pick up the slack.

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Most stop loss provisions axed

Program affected 46 wing members

With the exception of 12 officer and 19 enlisted specialties, and possibly some deployed people, most active-duty Air Force members will be free from stop loss by April 30, Air Force personnel officials said.

Officials in the Reese Military Personnel Branch explained that stop loss began Sept. 17 to assure commanders that personnel resources needed to support Operation Desert Shield and then Desert Storm would be available.

Forty-six people at Reese were affected by stop loss.

All Air National Guard and Reserve members were authorized to be released from the program March 29.

Major commands have waiver and release authority for the remaining stop loss skills, officials said.

Non-deployed individuals with skills deleted from stop loss and who are past their original separation or retirement dates can be released immediately with commander approval. They will not be involuntarily retained past April 30, but can extend up to 90 days past that date for personal adjustment and terminal leave.

Deployed individuals affected by stop loss whose original separation or retirement dates are past or in the near future should be given priority for return to home station within their unit's rotation plan.

Those with original separation or retirement dates that are before arrival at their home station can be released as soon as they return, with commander approval, but no later than 30 days after return. They can also extend up to 90 days beyond that.

People with dates past April 30 will have those dates reinstated and can also extend 90 days.

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

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


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Freeze on construction projects lifted

Way paved for several Reese facilities

once again be awarded, more than a year after the Pentagon ordered a freeze on all new military construction projects.

The change paves the way for several projects here, according to 64th Civil Engineering Squadron officials. They include the contractor-operated and managed base supply; or "COMBS," warehouse; petroleum operations complex; and centralized aircraft support system.

Deputy Secretary of Defense Donald J. Atwood lifted the freeze April 11, which had been in place since January 1990. Even though the ban has been dropped, tighter controls have been imposed to ensure that new construction projects fit longterm force reduction plans.

"Now that we have a clearer picture of how the force will be drawn down in the it is appropriate to proceed with construction projects," Mr. Atwood said.

"But we must keep a close watch on how we spend our limited construction

The military construction freeze was due to expire April 15, after being extended three times. The ban was last extended Nov. 16 for five months.

The new controls imposed by the Department of Defense are intended to continue careful management of money for projects at bases in the United States and

Under the new order, the approval of the deputy secretary of defense is needed for military construction projects:

☐ In Europe, Japan and South Korea. ☐ At military bases in the United States

New defense building contracts can coming years, we have a better idea where which have been recommended for closure or at which forces are to be realigned.

☐ At bases in the Washington, D.C., area. Construction elsewhere can proceed with the approval of the respective military service secretary or the head of the responsible defense agency.

Since the freeze was first ordered last year, DOD recommended that Congress cancel 68 military construction projects and withdraw more than \$327 million in funds already set aside for them.

The cancellations were proposed for areas where there was a high degree of uncertainty for long-term investment in facilities. Most of these projects were scheduled for overseas bases, mainly in Europe. Congress agreed to cancel 65 programs, withdrawing \$286 million in funds. (Air Force News Service)
