

Sunday power outages planned

Power outages are planned Sunday throughout the base and Reese Village. The outages are part of an upgrade and maintenance project.

In a related matter, phone service on the base (excluding housing) will be out for 20 minutes to one hour, beginning at 6 p.m.

The main part of the outage will be from 1-4 p.m., when all facilities without generator back-up will be without power.

□ **Phase one (1-4 p.m.)** — entire base and Reese Village. During this time, the following facilities will shut down — Main Exchange, Class Six Store and Service Station.

□ **Phase two (outages begin at 1 p.m.; end times listed separately)** — Dormitory 320, Dormitory 420 and Main Exchange — power resumes at 6 p.m.; Arts and Crafts Center, Child Development Center and Consolidated Support Facility (Bldg. 230) —

power resumes at 8 p.m.

□ **Phase three (1-8 p.m.)** — Hangar 82. The Caprock Cafe will operate on generator power during its outage, and hot meals will be served from 7 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and 4-5:30 p.m.

64th Services Squadron officials said that the basic surcharge for that day has been waived, and that the dining hall will be open to all wing members and their families.

The Library, Mamma Reesione's, Windmill Lanes Bowling Center and Auto Hobby Shop will be closed all day Sunday.

Also, officials in 64th Air Base Group indicated that the Shopette will be open from 7 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and from 4:30-10 p.m.

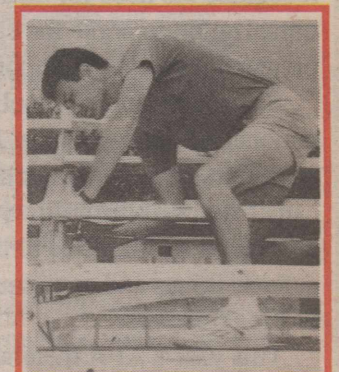

Reese NCO shines at academy

A member of Detachment 11, 24th Weather Squadron earned the Commandant's Award and was a distinguished graduate at the Electronic Security Command Noncommissioned Officers Academy.

TSgt. Robert Figuly, assistant chief, weather station operations, was presented the awards April 25 at Goodfellow AFB, Texas.

"PME is the key for quality Air Force leaders," said Capt. Gary Gumm, Det. 11 commander. "Sergeant Figuly, by winning these

awards, clearly shows how seriously he considers the importance of maintaining a top NCO force."

The Commandant's Award is presented to the student who, in the opinion of the commandant, is the best leader in the class. Staff and student evaluations are used in the selection. Distinguished graduates are those students in the top 10 percent of the class.

"When the students arrived, a lot of them didn't have a clue about teamwork," Sergeant Figuly said. "Some people didn't want to

play as a team at first, but eventually everyone got together. All 69 students that started together graduated together."

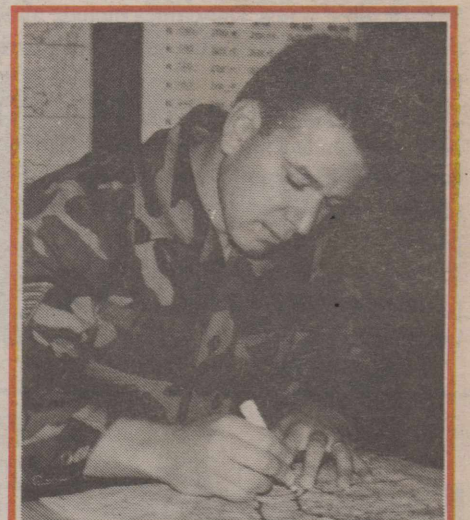
The sergeant said a lot of stress was put on the class, and that the academics were the hardest part.

"The curriculum included lessons in situational leadership. There weren't hard and fast rules to follow in a given problem -- we had to apply Air Force management techniques, which included 'good ol' common sense."

The New Jersey native is no

stranger to awards at PME. While attending NCO Leadership School, he captured the John L. Levitow Honor Graduate Award and the class speaker award. In addition to PME success, he was forecaster of the year for 1986 and 1987 at Giebelstadt AAF, Germany and detachment NCO of the year in 1989.

He has been in the Air Force for 14 years and stationed at Reese for three. He and his wife, Judy have four children: Bobby, 10; Matt, 7; Jenna, 5; and Brendan, 2.



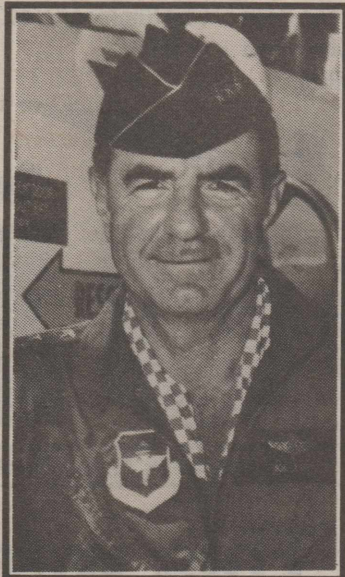

bicycles. After the initial purchase of a good quality bicycle and helmet — costing anywhere from \$400 - \$700 — the only money you spend is for optional gear.

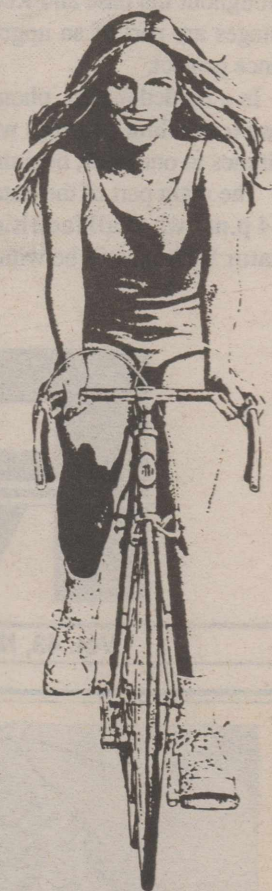

BACK to basics

Tips can keep you standing tall

Your back is the main supporting structure of your entire body. Along with your muscles and joints, it allows you to move (sit, stand, bend, etc.) and to bear weight. But the back is also a delicate, finely balanced structure that can be easily injured if we don't care for it properly.

Knowing the basics of back care can make the difference between a healthy back and an aching one.

The back or spinal column is composed of 24 moveable bones called vertebrae. Between each vertebra is a cushion-like pad called a disc which absorbs shock. These vertebrae and discs are supported by ligaments and muscles that keep the back properly aligned in three balanced curves.

When any of these various parts become diseased, injured or deconditioned, back problems and pain are almost certain to follow.

A healthy back is a balanced back -- your cervical (neck), thoracic (chest) and lumbar (lower back) curves are all properly aligned. (You know your back is aligned properly when your ears, shoulders and hips are "stacked" in a straight line.) A healthy back is also protected and supported by flexible "elastic" discs and well conditioned muscles.

A number of physical conditions, such as curvature of the spine (scoliosis), arthritis and herniated (ruptured) discs can cause back pain, but the majority of backaches are due to poor posture and weak supporting muscles. Improper posture places excess stress on the spinal column. Over time, poor posture can lead to sudden or recurrent back pain.

Weak muscles contribute to, and are often responsible for, poor posture since they cannot adequately support the spinal column.

Once you understand how your back works, and what can go wrong, you're ready to start taking care of your back -- for the health of it.

By using proper posture (when you sit, stand, lift, recline and move) and by exercising the muscles that support you back, you can prevent the most common causes of backaches.

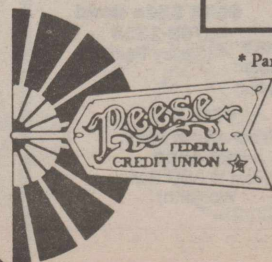

CES project eliminates potential base hazard

Reese will complete a project aimed at eliminating potential contaminants in power pole transformers.

In 1984, a program began to test all oil-filled electrical devices on base. Officials from the 64th Civil Engineering Squadron said that of the base's 700 transformers, 351 (those containing oil) were tested for polychlorinated biphenyls, a fire-resistant, heat transfer agent better known as "PCBs" that are used in the electrical industry from 1929 until 1982.

During the testing, 39 transformers came up positive, meaning the transformers contained levels of PCBs considered toxic by the Environmental Protection Agency; therefore, they posed a health risk.

According to Frank Castaneda, the base environmental manager, a large area of land or other objects can be contaminated if a transformer contaminated with or containing PCBs is left leaking or opened to the environment.

The last of the 39 transformers testing positive will be changed Sunday, in conjunction with the power outage on base.

The work will end the seven-year project.

The EPA directed in 1982 that the transformers with PCBs should be taken out of service after their useful life. The agency also issued other restrictions regarding PCBs.

The Air Training Command goal is to have all of the transformers containing PCBs removed by 1992.

Airman convicted of theft, conspiracy, solicitation

A wing member was convicted by general court-martial earlier this week of conspiracy, solicitation, and theft of a diamond owned by an area civilian.

The conviction was based on the confession and guilty plea entered by SrA. Peter L. Dudley, 41st Flying Training Squadron.

Reese legal officials said that the civilian had advertised the diamond for sale, which was valued at \$6,250. After meeting the owner, Airman Dudley unsuccessfully solicited another member of his organization to substitute the real gem for a fake.

Afterward, he obtained the assistance of another civilian, who accomplished the exchange. However, the owner discovered the loss shortly thereafter and called the local police. Airman Dudley and his accomplices were apprehended while still in the neighborhood.

For these offenses, Airman Dudley was sentenced to 15 months confinement with \$200 per month pay forfeiture (totaling \$3000), a bad conduct discharge and reduction to E-1. Legal officials said that such separation from the military service also forfeits certain benefits that are administered by the Veterans Administration.

SAC base hit hard by Kansas storms

Sixteen people were injured and more than 100 buildings damaged or destroyed when a tornado hit McConnell AFB, Kansas, about 6:20 p.m. April 26.

The tornado that hit McConnell was one of a series to touch down in the central plains April 26, tearing a path of destruction through Oklahoma and Kansas. Other spring storms caused considerable damage in northeastern Texas and northern Louisiana.

There were at least 22 fatalities in Andover, Kan., five miles northeast of McConnell, located just outside Wichita.

No military members were among the dead in Andover, nor were there any deaths reported on base.

The tornado destroyed the McConnell base hospital as well as the community center, gymnasium, arts and crafts center, auto hobby shop, NCO club, bowling alley and credit

union.

Buildings damaged include 103 on-base houses, billeting, base exchange, elementary school, Burger King restaurant, legal center, bank, dormitories and the dining facility.

There was no damage to the aircraft, and none of McConnell's operations and maintenance facilities were damaged. Aircraft at the base remain mission capable.

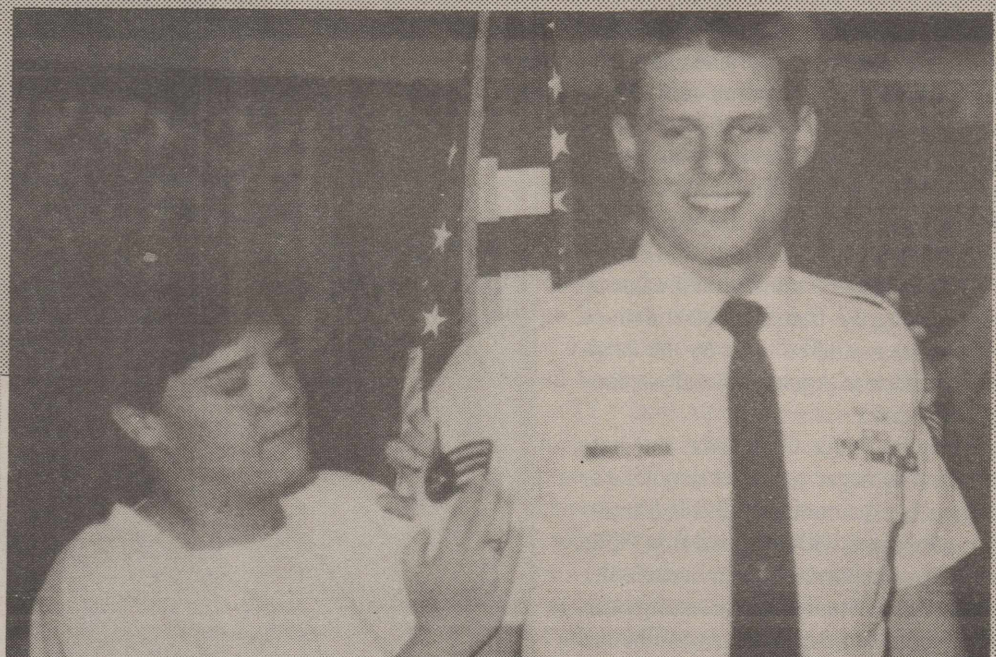
Nine of the injured people at McConnell

were hospitalized but released by April 28.

An emergency relief center has been set up at the base youth center to handle relief efforts, base spokesman 2nd Lt. Mike Garcia said in a news release.



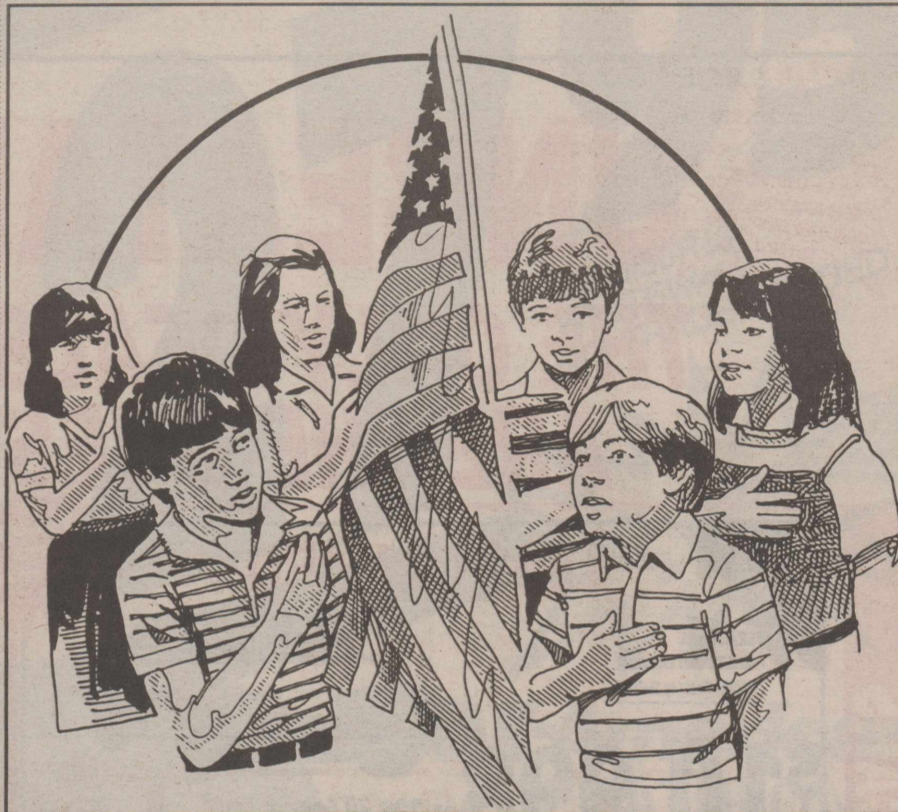

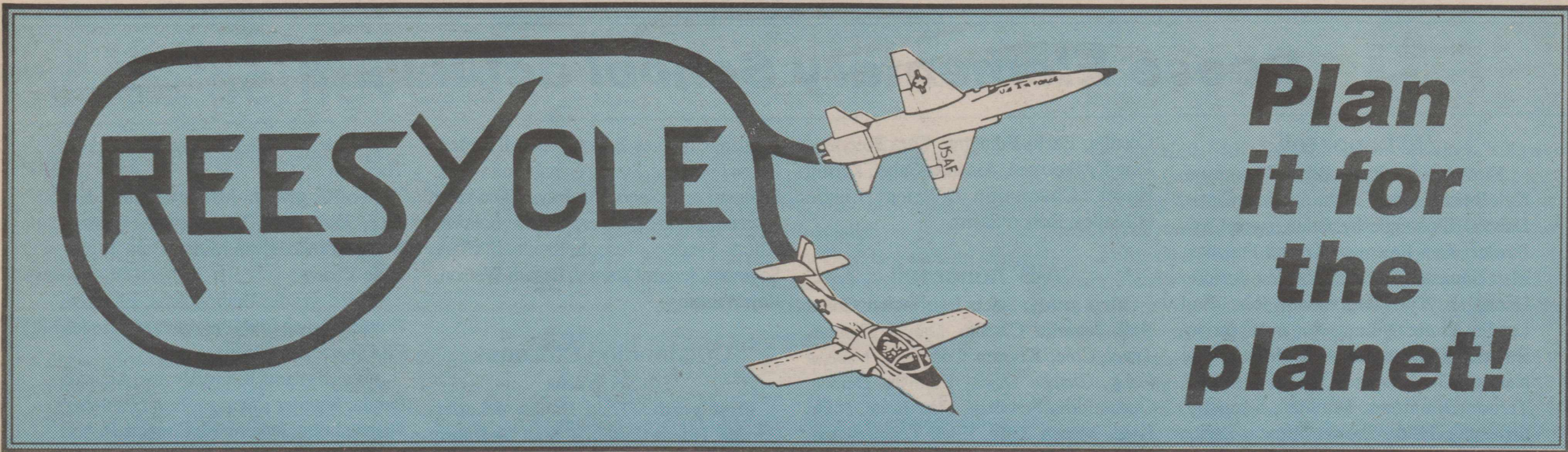

Retirement rules ease for colonels

Lieutenant colonels and colonels may now apply to retire at their current rank with two years' time in grade instead of three, officials at the Air Force Military Personnel Center said.

Personnel officials also said that prior-enlisted officers may now retire as officers after eight years of commissioned service instead of 10 years. Some medical officers are excluded from this program.

Previously, officers who did not serve at least 10 years of commissioned service had to retire at their highest enlisted rank, according to the Reese Military Personnel Branch.

Personnel officials say the Air Force has been authorized to implement this reduced statutory requirement to help lower the number of officers on active duty. Both revisions are authorized by the fiscal 1991 Defense Authorization Act.

In the change for lieutenant colonels and colonels, applications submitted in conjunction with the seven-day option program will not be considered. First Lt. Sean Hassett of military personnel here said that the seven-day option allows a person seven calendar days after initial notification of an assignment to either accept the assignment or to decline and choose to retire.

Officers are eligible to apply for retirement now and will leave the Air Force by Sept. 1. Local personnel officials say applicants who have active-duty service commitments, such as for a permanent-change-of-station move, professional military education or training, will include in their application a request to waive the commitment.

Eligible officers include those in all career areas except the medical corps and biomedical science corps.

If an officer is impacted by stop loss and there are compelling reasons that require retirement before completion of three years' time in grade, an exemption request will be processed through major command channels.

An example of legitimate reasons for exemption include hardship cases or officers working in

jobs that are no longer mission essential.

The authorization act limits the number of people who may retire with this reduced time in grade to 2 percent of the total number of officers authorized in each grade.

Personnel officials do not expect this ceiling to limit the number of lieutenant colonel applications the Air Force can support. They say there is a relatively small number of people who would be eligible when compared with 2 percent of the total number of lieutenant colonel authorizations.

Some 234 waivers under this provision may be granted for lieutenant colonels in fiscal year 1991. About 347 lieutenant colonels will be eligible this fiscal year to apply for a waiver to retire with two years' time in grade.

Typically about 15 percent of those eligible for a program like this will submit an application, officials said. Therefore, they expect to be able to consider all applications they receive from lieutenant colonels.

However, this is not the case with colonels. Based on the colonel end strength, 95 waivers under this provision may be granted. About 830 colonels will be eligible to apply. Based on past experience, AFMPC expects about 124 applications.

To minimize the impact of force reductions in fiscal 1992, personnel officials say the first priority will go to colonels who will have three years' time in grade in fiscal 1992 and who wish to retire in fiscal 1991.

These applications will be processed at AFMPC on a first-come, first-served basis until June 1.

If the limit is not met from these applications, AFMPC will consider applications from colonels who will obtain three years' time in grade this fiscal year and who wish to retire with less than three years' time in grade. These applications will be considered after June 1 on a first-come, first-served basis.

The Reese-Frenship Baseball Pony League is in need of umpires and sponsors in all age groups. The regular season will start Monday with two games at Reese and Casey Fields.

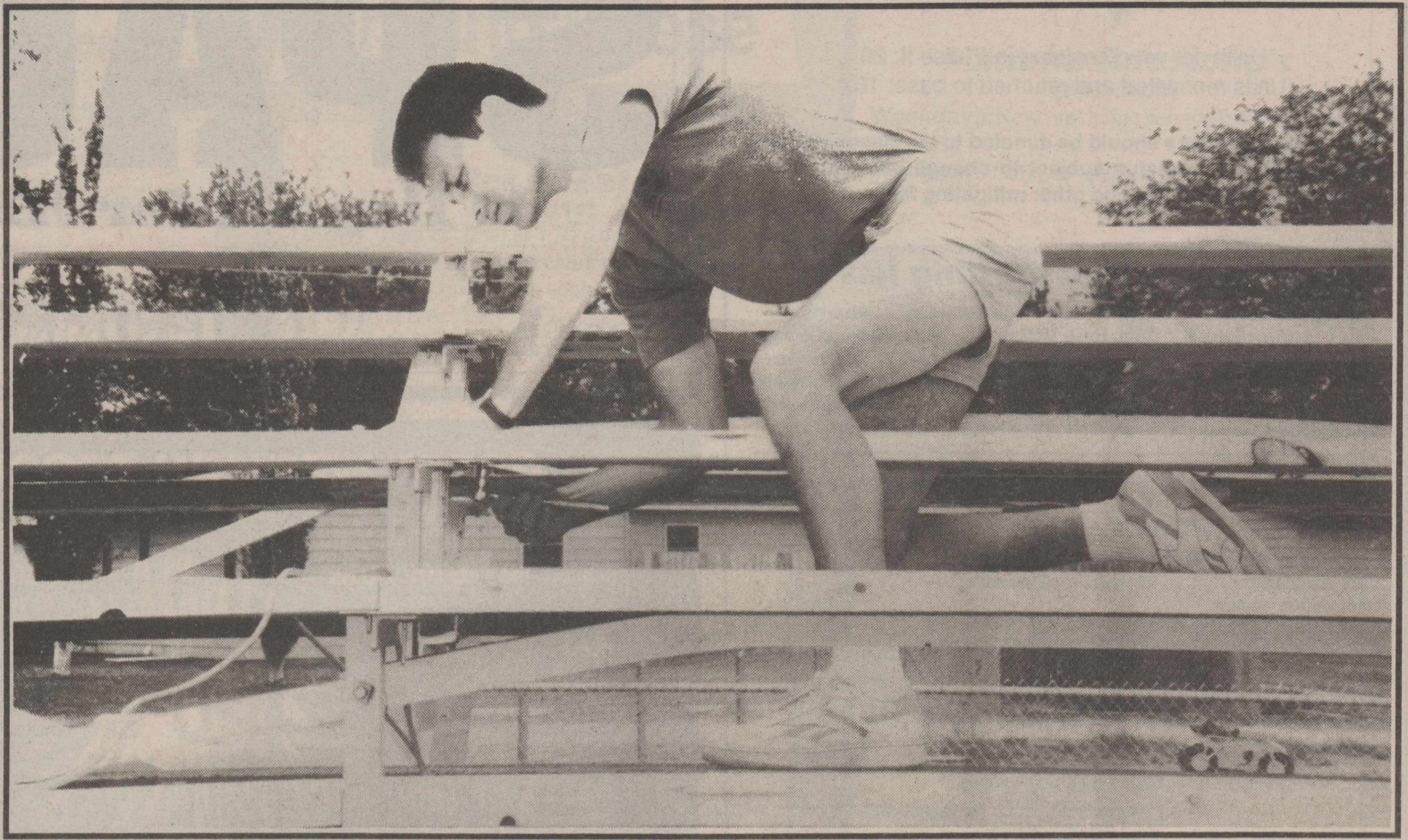
