Wing pitches in for heart patient

In the spirit of community relations, and with a desire to lend a helping hand, members of the 64th Flying Training Wing spearheaded an effort to raise money for Lubbockite Walter Voight's Heart Fund.

Second Lts. Tony Bukata and Chris O'Neil of the 54th Flying Training Squadron's "F" Flight became aware of the heart transplant cause via a local radio station announcement, which said \$80,000 was needed.

Reese part of command study

Contract, civil service options eyed

Texas, in a series of studies by Air Training Command to determine if nearly 800 support jobs at the two bases can be performed more cost effectively by civil service or civilian contractor employees.

The 778 jobs are in administration, audiovisual, supply, transportation, civil engineering, morale, welfare and recreation, services and telephone operations.

The studies will be conducted by base management engineering teams and will determine whether the jobs will be executed by civil service or civilian contract employees. Conversion to either civil service or contractor operations is scheduled to take place April 1, 1995 at Reese, while Goodfellow is set to change April 1, 1994.

The use of civilian services to perform support type functions in

Reese will join Goodfellow AFB, the Air Force is determined on a case-by-case basis in accordance with the Office of Management and Budget's Circular A-76, according to wing officials.

> "If a military unit, such as a tactical fighter or combat engineering squadron, must deploy to a combat zone to execute its mission, then it has to be made up of military members, said Col Ford Barrett, wing deputy commander for Logistics and Resource Management. "However, if military support organizations don't have taskings to deploy and fight, then the potential exists for these services to be converted to civil service or contracted

The colonel added that the decision on whether or not to contract out is based on fiscal savings to the taxpayer.



From my perspective

hese are both exciting and challenging times for our base and our people. I want to address some of the challenges because I think it is important that every member of the team understands where we are headed, and what actions are under way.



Civilian issues

Many of you are

aware that Reese was tasked to reduce 50 civil service positions effective July 1 as part of a servicewide manpower reduction. Upon identifying those positions, we were subsequently tasked with reducing another 18 civilian positions by Oct. 1. However, only 13 of the original 50 slots are currently filled. The earliest we might have to displace individuals is Oct. 1.

I appreciate that some of our civil service team may be uneasy. It is important, however, for everyone to realize that we are working this issue hard to minimize personal disruptions. I will hold a meeting to inform our civilian personnel of planned actions at 11 a.m. May 20, in the Simler Theater.

Cost comparison study

Air Training Command has selected Reese (along with Goodfellow AFB) for a series of studies (conducted by management engineering) to determine if support jobs can be performed more effectively by civil service or contractor employees.

The decision on whether or not to contract out support jobs in administration, audiovisual, supply transportation, civil engineering, morale, welfare and recreation, services and telephone operations will be based on fiscal savings to the American taxpayer.

The conversion to either civil service or contractor operations isn't scheduled until April 1995.

The assignment process

Recently, we provided coverage concerning the new undergraduate pilot training assignment process. I am extremely pleased with how our folks went into the new assignment selection process with an open mind.

Most realize how this pilot management program has created a more equitable and understandable process that rewards performance. I am confident that tomorrow's Air Force and its pilots will benefit from today's initiatives.

Contract simulator instructors

We are now well into the conversion from active-duty simulator instructors to contract simulator instructors (CSIs). As of today, we have certified five contract instructors in the T-37, and four in the T-38. Currently, we are qualifying about five instructors each month, and will soon have a total of 31 CSIs. Combined, they will be instructing nearly 4,000 student simulator sorties by the end of this fiscal year and over 12,000 during next year.

The program has worked well in other services (and commands). The contract instructors will provide the same quality simulator training as that provided by our activeduty instructor pilots. Nearly all of our contract instructors are former military pilots with IP experience.

This initiative will afford our "blue-suit" instructors more quality time with their students on the flightline and will also help to reduce the IP duty day to less than 10 hours.

Major construction

Now that the freeze on construction has been lifted, the

way has been cleared for several Reese facility projects. We are excited because these new facilities will greatly enhance the infrastructure and mission of our base. For example, in preparation for the arrival of the T-1A, a \$4.1 million hangar will be constructed along with a "COMBS" (Contractor Operated and Managed Base Supply) warehouse, as well as a modification to the Flightline Centralized Aircraft Support System (CASS). In addition, a \$665,000 petroleum operations complex, a new transportation management facility and a new auto hobby shop are on the horizon. We also hope to continue with the final phase of renovation to our base housing.

Wing reorganization

The 64th has been chosen by ATC to be reorganized — we are the test base for the command. We will activate the new organization on the 15th of May.

In essence, this is an opportunity to streamline our current mode of operation by eliminating organizational "layering" — thereby enhancing our decision-making process at lower levels within the wing. From a taxpayer's perspective (which we all are), this will afford "more bang for the buck" because it balances the management structure with the work force.

In doing so, the reorganization effort should show a direct line of responsibility and accountability from the commander to the working level, thus alleviating layers of middle managers.

The opportunity is here for us to do things better and more efficiently. We will improve not only our mission capability, but also the quality of life for our working force and their families. Every member of this wing is important and has good ideas on how we can do things better and more efficiently. So, during the ensuing weeks and months, I ask each of you to help mold and perfect this great wing. Not often do we have an opportunity to structure and build a more efficient organization — today we have that opportunity. Our efforts will set the pace for ATC wings, and will ensure that we continue to train tomorrow's best today in a smaller, but smarter and better Air Force.

Two-wheeled fun: Cycling recreation calls for choice

Some people want to ride a bike, but aren't sure what bike to ride. With road bikes, mountain bikes and hybrids to choose from, how do you know which is right for you?

Road bikes are lighter than mountain bikes and have larger frames. The characteristic curved "drop" handlebars lower the body to a more aerodynamic position to increase speed. Narrow, high-pressure tires have low rolling resistance, again giving you the edge on speed. When equipped with puncture-resistant kevlar®-belted tires, they do well in West Texas. Most road bikes have 12 or 14 gears suitable for most riders.

Even road bikes come in different styles. Racing types are built with thinwalled tubing for less weight and generally have a shorter wheel base to add quickness and agility in handling. However, they also offer harsher rides. The longer wheel base on touring models add to stability and soften the

ride. Touring types are also built to carry heavy loads. Mountain bikes have smaller frames and are usually 10

pounds heavier than the average road bike. The wide knobby tires and flat handlebars increase stability on rough terrain and give better traction in muddy areas. These are strictly off-road bikes, however. When riding a mountain bike on a paved road, those fat "knobbies" have so much rolling resistance that riding may not be the pleasure it was designed to be. To ease steep climbing, these bikes are generally equipped with 18 or 21 gears.

A popular new bike is the hybrid. With the lighter frame and large tires of a road bike, speed is an option. Coupled with the flat handlebars and "granny gears" of a mountain bike, hybrids capture the best of both types of bikes. Because they are easily equipped with racks and bags,

these bicycles make good commuting

A word about cost — you may be taken aback by the \$400 - 700 it

> costs for a good quality bike, but a poor quality bicycle may never let you know how easy cycling can be. The extra cost will be money well spent. Remember this is no more than two or three car payments.



Sergeant Miller was also recognized for his work in the community.







Former wing commander earns ATC annual honor

A former wing commander at Reese has been cited as Air Training Command's elder statesman of aviation for 1990.

Retired Maj. Gen. Dudley

Faver, commander of the 64th Flying Training Wing from January 1964 to June 1966, was credited for for his support of aerospace power both during and since his 32-year active-duty career.

A native of Sweetwater, Texas, General Faver has stayed active since his retirement through his ties with the Air Force Association, Retired Officers Association and Order of Daedalians.

Having worked at numerous installa-

tions and with numerous aircraft, the general pointed to recent events in the world as evidence of the "tremendous strides" aviation has taken since his active-duty

"Just look at Desert Storm," the general said. "The command and control involved so many different air forces and aircraft sorties, yet it was all executed precisely. The advances in our technology are obvious."

He said the Air Force has the highest quality people ever in the history of military services, calling the all-volunteer force "better trained and educated than ever."

Talking about his recognition as an aviation statesman, the general was quick to thank wing and command officials for remem-

> eral. "I appreciate the fact that people would take the time to examine my contributions."

Looking at what lies ahead for military aviation, General Faver looked at readiness as being more crucial than ever to victory in any future conflicts.

"I don't think we'll have the preparation time we had in Desert Storm — we'll have to 'keep our powder dry,' as it were."

He also said that airlift capa-However, it wasn't just the bility and keeping highly trained people on hand would be the key, and he added that if we kept our technological edge in the future, top-notch people would have to be on hand to handle such weapons systems.

General Faver currently teaches management at the college of business at Texas Tech, where he also works with the Moms and Dads Program.

Rated officer assignments change

signment openings for rated officers and will soon expand the new system to include all officer as-

Changes to the Air Force Officer Assignment System now allow for more flexibility and give officers a greater say in their career development, Air Force personnel officials said.

"We are committed to provide a system which is less rule-driven, provides greater individual choice and responds to officers' career goals," said Col. Timothy Titus, director of assignments at the Air Force Military Personnel Center. "This new 'customer oriented' assignment system identifies openings, advertises the openings on an electronic bulletin board and then fills those openings with volunteers."

A rated officer assignments opportunities listing is available on electronic bulletin boards for those units which are already hooked up to the pilot retention hotline.

SSgt. Kerry Eason of the Reese Outbound Assignments Unit said that people without access to the modem hookup will soon be able to get the same up-to-date information from the Consolidated Base Personnel Office.

Officials expect CBPO information lines to be operational in

Information for each listing includes job title, Air Force specialty

The Air Force is advertising as- code, a short job description, necessary qualifications, authorized grades, duty location, report date, application deadlines, and an AFMPC point of contact and phone number. Each listing also has a tracking number people should refer to when calling AFMPC.

The previous assignment system was consistently identified as an irritant in surveys filled out by officers leaving the Air Force.

Over the past few years, about half of those surveyed said the assignment system was their primary source of irritation. Chief complaints cite an inflexible, ruledriven system which does not allow an individual any say in assignment decisions.

"We're listening, and we realize the system needs to change," Colonel Titus said. That change starts with a new assignment phi-

"The new philosophy is simple - there's a volunteer for every assignment," the colonel said. "Our job is to let people know where these open jobs are and to match individual career aspirations with these openings."

The old system worked with a set of rules for rated assignments that were "really inflexible," he said.

"For instance, we used to move people after a three-year tour, give or take a day, regardless of their desires.'

Career decisions didn't allow

for much more flexibility. "We managed flying careers by having everyone fill the same type positions, regardless of their goals."

The new system gives people more choices. "We're telling people, 'It's your career — set your sights and become an expert at your current job to lay a foundation for your next job," Colonel Titus said.

But the new system will not be a free-for-all, he cautioned. "Assignment decisions must still pass a sanity check," the colonel said.

Time-on-station requirements will still be restricted due to funding. Also, overseas tour lengths will remain the same to provide stability and continuity for those

People won't be moved unless there is an opening, and jobs will be filled by people with the right amount of experience and at the right time.

"Performance is still the key. and commanders will continue to provide recommendations to help people with their career planning," Colonel Titus said.

"The main point about assignments is the Air Force is listening, and we are improving the quality of the system. If we don't do it, call the AFMPC hotline at DSN 487-5475 and the commander will see to it you get an answer."

In related news, 10 military positions at Reese will be affected when 75 such positions at eight ATC bases are converted to contract operations effective April 1, 1992.

These 75 positions are in base operations, both in airfield management and flight data maintenance functions. Bases involved besides Reese include Columbus and Keesler AFBs, Miss.; Laughlin, Randolph and Sheppard AFBs, Texas; Vance AFB, Okla.; and Williams AFB, Ariz.

These direct conversions fall under the Defense Management Review process, which evaluates the use of existing-resources to ensure they are used to the Air Force's best advance. It also keeps with govern-

ment policy or relying on the private sector, if cost effective, for products and services when an in-house national defense capability isn't reauired.

A formal retreat is scheduled for Wednesday.



SUGGESTIONS FOR PREPARATION OF LUNCHES

- 1. Freeze a small can of juice and pack it with your lunch. As it thaws, it will keep everything cool.
- 2. Use a hearty, satisfying bread, like whole wheat, pumpernickle, oatmeal or rye. For variety, try buns, bagels or pita bread.
- 3. Freeze sandwiches for the week. Frozen sandwiches save last minute preparation and stay safe longer in hot weather. Meat, chicken, turkey and peanut butter freeze well. Mayonnaise does not freeze.
- 4. Wrap vegetables like lettuce and tomatoes separately in a baggie. They will stay fresher and won't make your sandwich soggy. You can add them just before eating.
- 5. Meat sliced thin and stacked is easier to bite than one thick slice on a sandwich.
- 6. Spread margarine or mayonnaise to the edge of the slice of bread so the moist filling won't make the bread soggy.
- 7. Score an orange and wrap in clear plastic to make peeling
- 8. Cut sandwiches in quarters, they are easier to eat.
