Wing reorganizes

Test effort aims at streamlining

A reorganization of units in the 64th Flying Training Wing became official during ceremonies Tuesday in front of wing headquarters.

Reese is the Air Training Command participant in a servicewide reorganization test aimed at increasing efficiency.

Under the change, there are now two main groups that comprise the wing. They are the 64th Operations Group and the 64th Support Group, that along with the 64th Medical Squadron, make up the wing. All remaining squadrons and flights are aligned under one of the two groups (see organizational chart, page six).

The reorganization seeks to streamline the way things are done, according to the base's focal point for the test.

"One of the things the reorganization does is reduce the management structure of the wing," Col. Ford Barrett said. "In doing so, we give the taxpayer more 'bang for

the buck' by bringing the management structure into balance with the work force.

"Of course, this is most important in bringing our budget under control. While we haven't been tasked specifically to address manpower costs in the past, those costs are receiving attention today. We need to ensure each dollar spent can be measured in output."

Several other benefits are expected from this change. They include:

- **Functional grouping** — The reorganization brings similar functions together under the same units, thus increasing everyone's understanding of their responsibilities and the responsibilities of their co-workers.
- **Unity of command** — Each person will be held accountable to one person only.
- **Span of control** — A commander's ability to

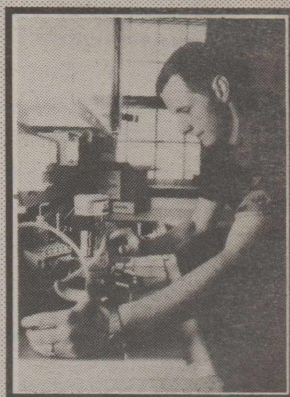

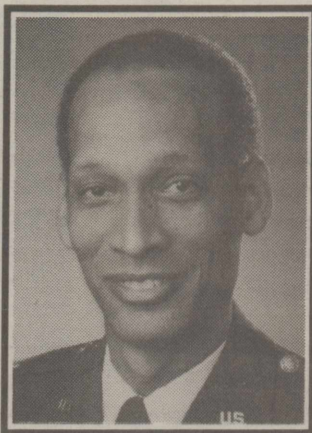


ATC AWARD WINNER

Change is a word that sometimes strikes terror in the hearts of people. If not terror, then at least apprehension. The wing has just undergone a significant change in how it's organized and, to some extent, how we all do business.



On May 15, Supply, Transportation, and Logistics Plans combined to become the 64th Logistics Support Squadron.

Change need not be synonymous with bad news. In this case, there are several potential benefits that could result from the reorganization. Eliminating management layers shortens and clarifies lines of communication and enhances maximum use of people and their talents. This is important when manpower levels are undergoing intense review as is the case today.

An additional benefit to the consolidation is that decision-making will happen at lower levels than before.

Again, the reorganization provides an opportunity in that it gives those with responsibility equivalent authority. This usually is commensurate with individual and unit needs.

The reorganization may also prove to be an important first step in examining how we do business, not only in the new squadron, but the group and wing as well. Efficiencies could be numerous if we are willing to examine new ways of doing business and not be content to stay on the beaten path of familiarity.

The Logistics Support Squadron will continue to do collectively everything the units did individually before the reorganization. Yes, things have changed, but one thing hasn't, and that is our commitment to providing the wing with the finest support possible.

New appointment system increases patient satisfaction

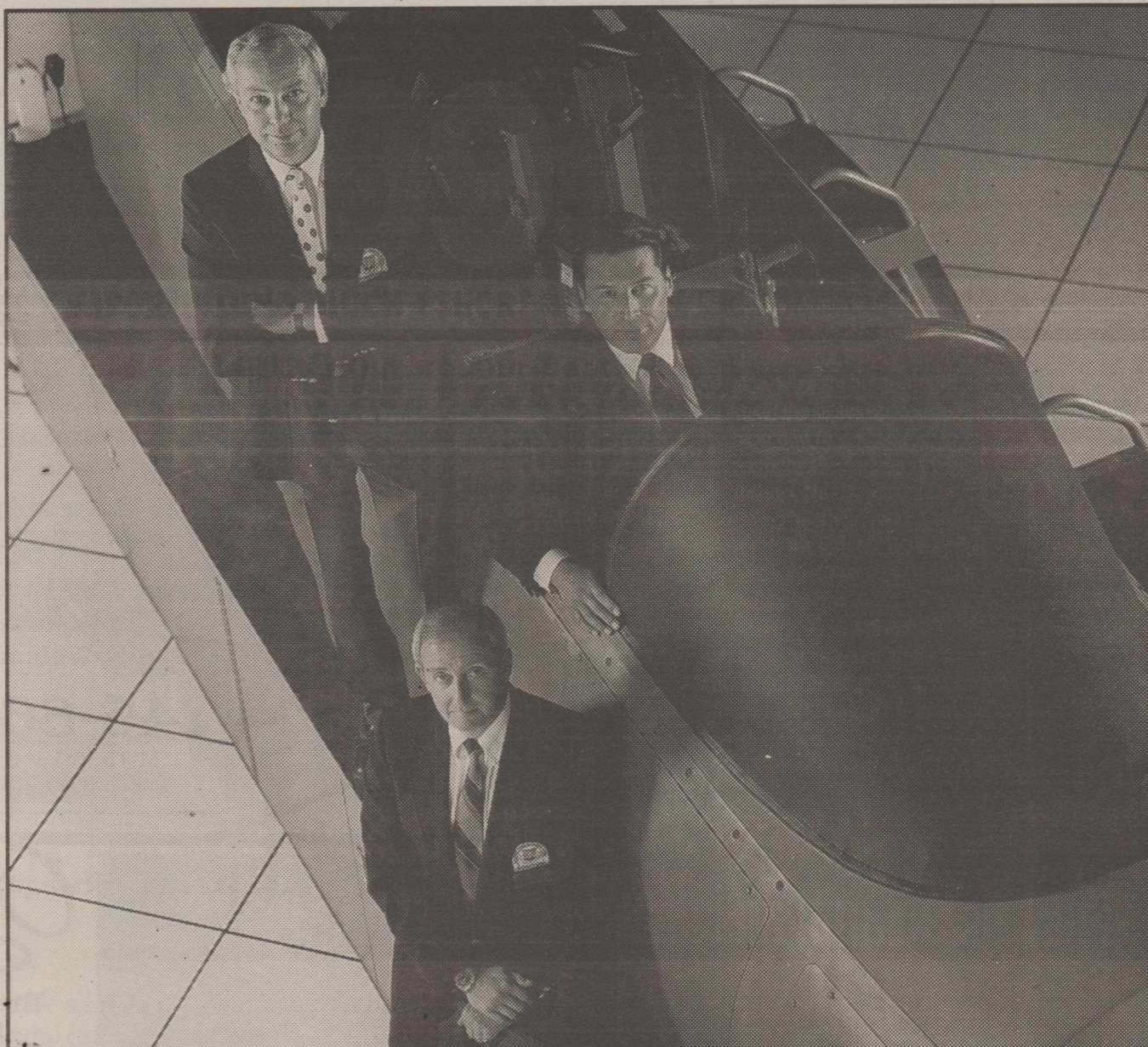

TQM

"TQM" is here.

Total quality management is not a new concept or style of leadership. In fact, it has been around since just after World War II when an American named Edward Demming helped Japan establish a program to improve the quality of their industrial production base. We all know what happened after that.

It's been slow to catch on in the United States, but the 1980s proved to be the growth years for Demming's philosophy. The Department of Defense picked up on the concept around 1986, and it has been growing steadily every since.

Total quality management is a broad concept that encompasses the best available management technology for the "systems age." It is characterized by these functional elements:

- Quality is achieved through prevention.
- Quality is defined by each customer.
- Educated workers team up with managers.
- Problem solving is done by "project action teams."
- The focus is on the process (system).

Proven concept aims to increase efficiency

Change is accomplished within a strategic plan that is managed daily.

TQM provides organizations with the capability to meet the challenges and manage the process of change itself.

The procedures are too complex to explain in this short article, but two words above drive the program. The goal is customer satisfaction (the customer is anyone you provide a service or product for — supplies to aircraft maintenance, a newspaper to readers, paycheck to a worker), and is applicable to any unit of any size in the wing. Everyone has a customer and is a customer of someone else.

Which brings us to the second key word — process. If you want to improve the service or product to your customers, you

must first find out what they need. Then you examine how you are now providing this service or product to determine what changes need to be made.

It's important to remember that improving the process (and keeping your customer happy) is a continuous program that needs to be reexamined, remodeled, reworked and modified. In other words, you can't assume any fix is permanent. You must strive for improvement all the time.

The 64th Flying Training Wing now has a TQM working group that is developing a "master plan" that will outline the purpose, the sources of information and the wing structure for implementation so we all can use the TQM methodology to improve our efficiency and productivity.

Some of you have already experienced the TQM environment and know what it can do. If so, don't wait for the wing. Get started and share the results with the rest of us. For those of you who have not had the opportunity to work with TQM, I recommend you start at the base library. They have books, videotapes and audio tapes on TQM and a broad range of quality-related topics. In fact, you can ask the librarian to see the TQM list developed by the working group. It's a good way to get started and it doesn't cost you anything but time — time well spent.

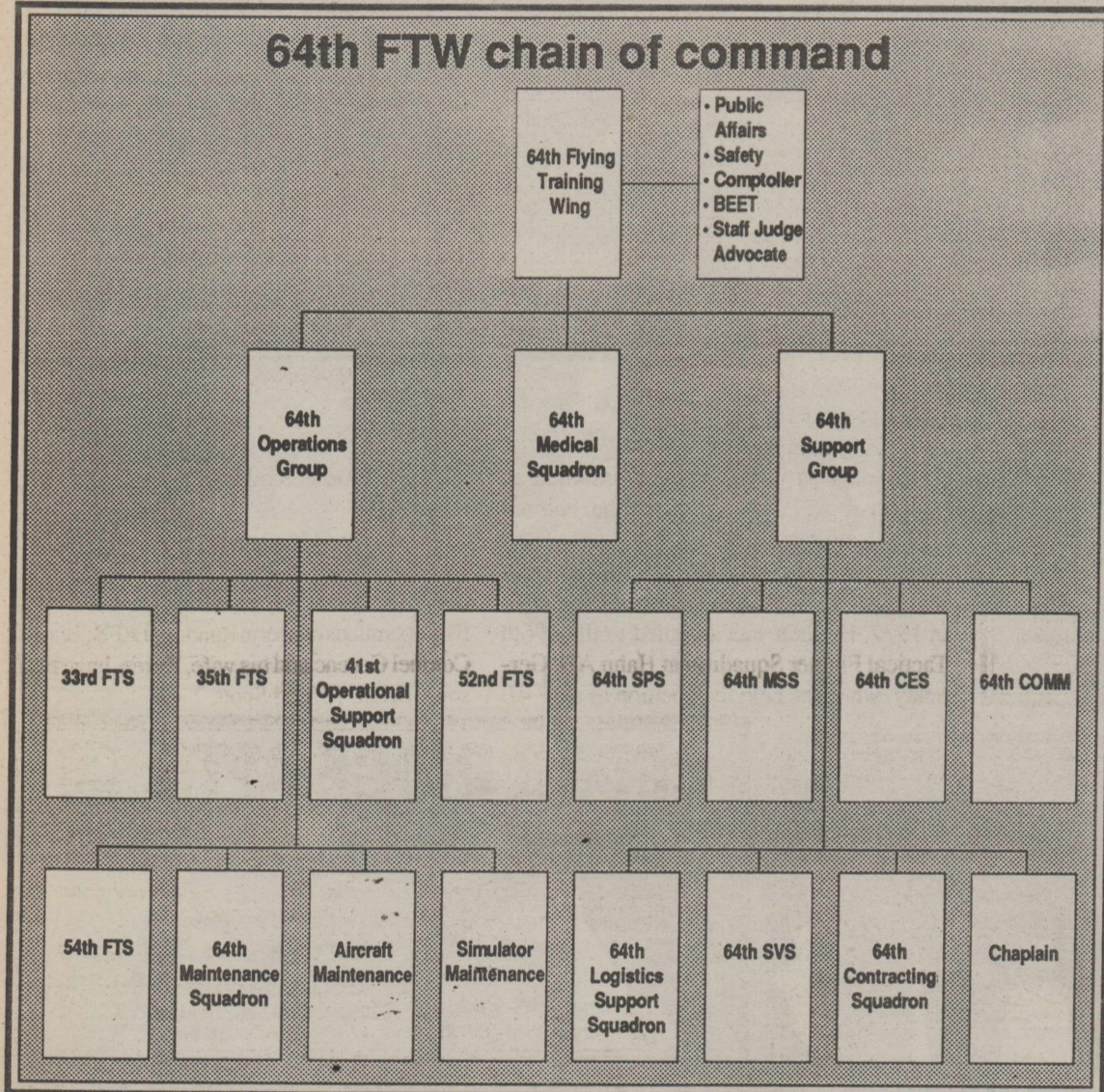

control the people and resources under him or her is dependent on the complexity of the mission. The reorganization is expected to create more effective span of control for the unit commanders.

Delegation of authority — The new structure will eliminate organizational "layering" by delegating decision-making authority to the lowest reasonable level. This will also streamline organizational structure and simplify administrative procedures.

Decision-making requirements — The structure of organizations will be such as to promote more rapid decision-making.

During the year-long test, the wing commander will continually evaluate the status of the new structure and its effectiveness. Reports to the command will be provided monthly. Near the end of the test period, ATC will conduct a unit effectiveness inspection of the wing.

The results will be compared to the most recent UEI here, which was done while the old wing structure was in place.

Each wing member will play a key part in the test's success — but not only because of the work they do.

"For this to be successful, we're going to need inputs from everyone on how we can do things better," said Col. Bill Henny, 64th FTW commander. "This test provides an opportunity for our people to make recommendations on how things can be streamlined, how they can be made more efficient, and how we can reduce the manpower required to produce the product — our Air Force aviators."

"There are a lot of people looking at Reese to see how this test goes. This is a great chance for people to give us feedback on how we can improve, and I hope they will," the colonel concluded.

Wing members, spouses briefed on reorganization

Col. Bill Henny met Monday night with the commanders and spouses from all of the units assigned to the 64th Flying Training Wing. He took the opportunity during this meeting to discuss the reorganization at Reese and to provide his thoughts on what is to be expected.

The theme was the presentation were the twin needs of running the organization more efficiently while at the same time protecting the people at Reese. According to the colonel, these needs are intertwined because of the ongoing budget reductions in defense.

As budgets come down, something has to give — it could be the size of the organization or it could be the support to the people. As Colonel Henny explained, the purpose of this reorganization is to

determine whether we can maintain a high level of readiness and support to our people while at the same time cutting costs.

The elimination of unnecessary layers of bureaucracy provides the opportunity to trim costs without harming either service or readiness.

Colonel Henny asked for the support of the commanders and their spouses in explaining the changes to the whole Reese family and ensuring that the goal of protecting people was met. The colonel specifically asked commanders to be very careful in their reorganized units to make certain that everyone — both old and new — is made a part of the organization and provided with the support they need to make the adjustments to a new way of doing business.

aircraft commander and unit plans/readiness officer.

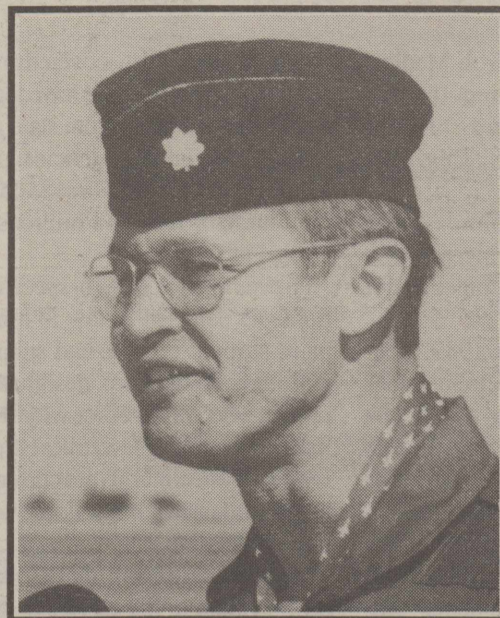

A member of the 64th Medical Squadron has captured the Air Training Command Junior Bioenvironmental Engineer Achievement Award.

"His professionalism, demeanor and superb officership provided the leadership and direction necessary to establish sound surveillance programs and to rebuild the confidence in the BES throughout Reese."

The lieutenant was praised by command officials as aggressive, indispensable and unmatched during a disaster exercise during the last unit effectiveness inspection.

Lieutenant Bell discovered problem areas, which would have led to a notice of violation from state and federal regulatory agencies. His actions saved the Air Force \$16,000 in contractor fees and millions of dollars in fines.

In reviewing design specifications, he detected a flaw in a new paint stripper process and submitted recommendations designed to protect workers Air Force wide from risk of exposure to severe heat stress. His recommendations are currently being evaluated for Air Force wide implementation.

His contributions to the base have been evident in his service as vice president of the company grade officers council. He was the wing support company grade officer of the quarter April-June in 1990.

Lieutenant Bell is an active member of the community. He participated as a judge in the South Plains Regional Science Fair, and also contributed to a high school student's research paper titled "Ozone Layer Diminishing".

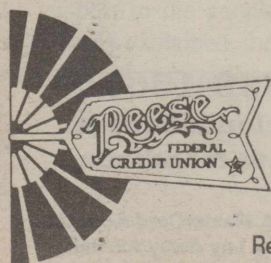
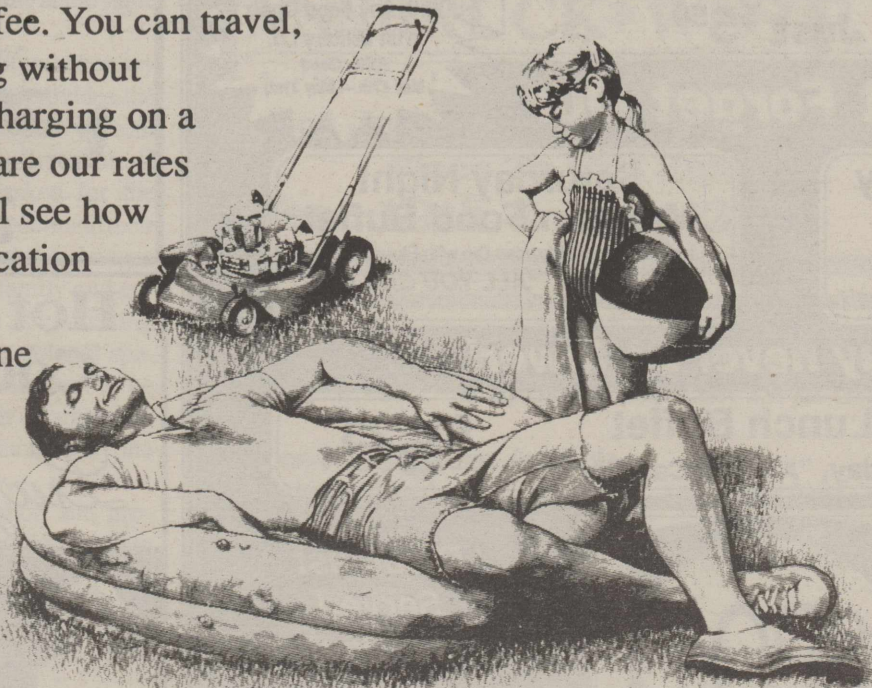

In the championship game, Stauffer outplayed Verville, 15-8 and 15-6, to

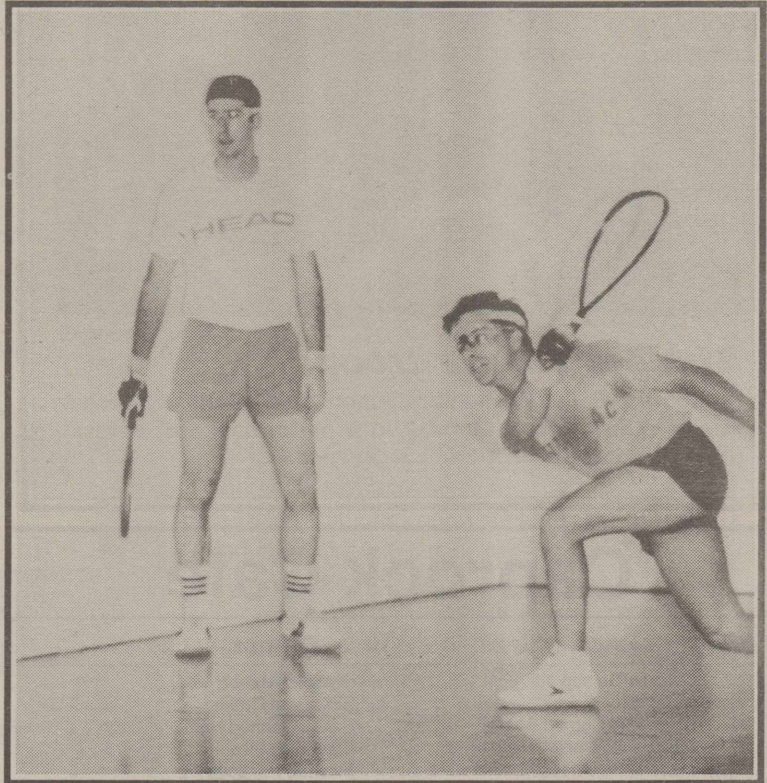
win the men's open crown.

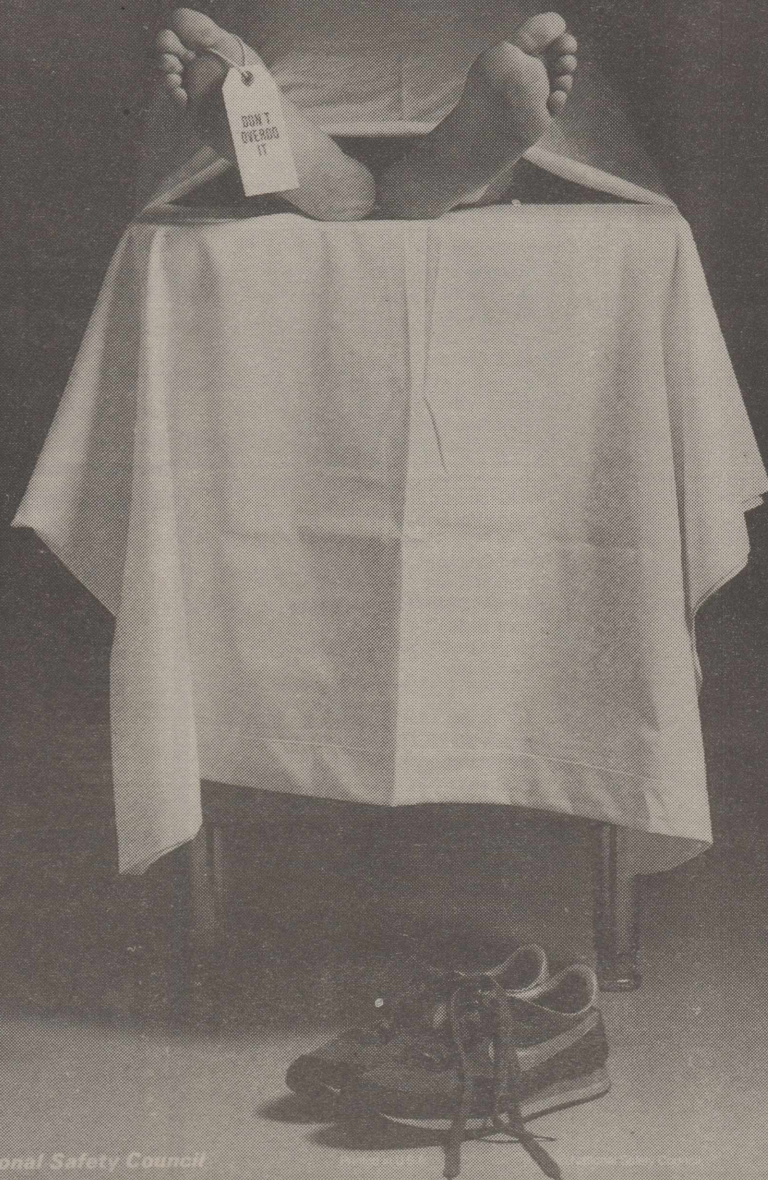

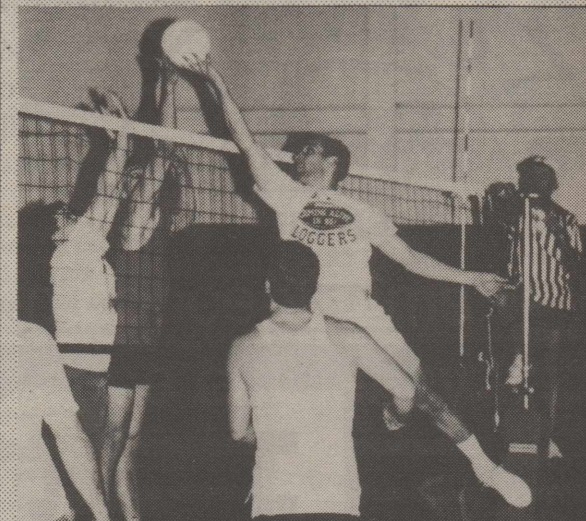

The safe way to lift

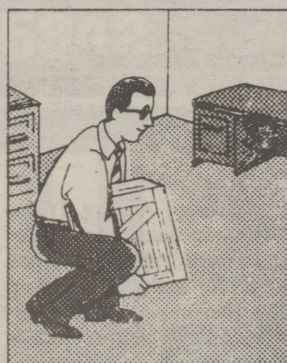

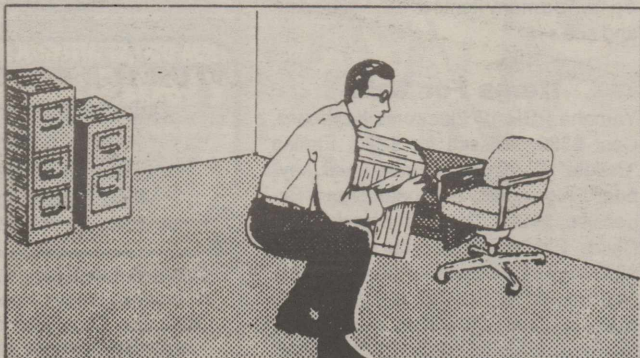
1. Visualize the Lift
The first step in safe lifting is thinking. "Can I lift it by myself?" "Can I hold it close to my body?" If the load is manageable, follow the remaining tips.



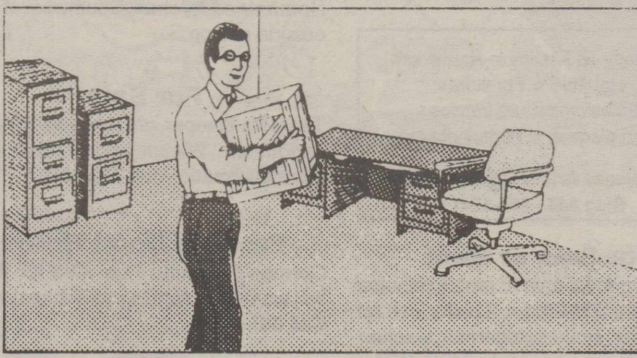
2. Tuck Your Pelvis
By tightening your stomach muscles, you can "tuck" your pelvis to keep your back's three curves in balance.



3. Bend Your Knees
Bend your knees instead of your waist. Let the large muscles in your legs support your back and carry the weight.



4. "Hug" The Load
Try to hold the object you're lifting as close to your body as possible, as you gradually straighten your legs to a standing position.



5. Avoid Twisting
Twisting while you lift or carry increases the load on your spine and can lead to serious injury. To avoid twisting, be sure that your knees and torso are facing in the same direction when lifting.

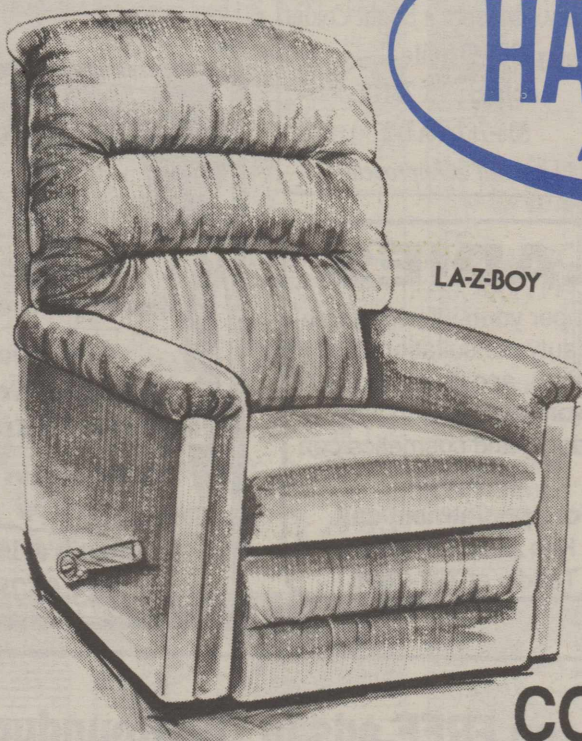
