Across the Air Force, 6,325 members out of 32,338 were chosen. This resulted in a selection rate of 19.55 percent service wide.

Officials urge early arrival during weekend open house

Any Reese military, civilian or Lockheed employees planning to attend the open house this weekend will not have a parking or admittance priority due to traffic, according to Lt. Col. Loren Stendahl, air show coordinator.

The only traffic that will be allowed on Fourth Street beyond FM

179 will be people with valid military ID cards, handicapped stickers/plated and buses.

All others will be directed to turn right at FM 179 and Fourth and sent to the parking area north of the base, where a shuttle bus will be available.

"People will not be given prior-

ity admission for medical attention unless a true emergency exists," said Colonel Stendahl. "Saying that a person needs aspirin just won't cut it."

The Lubbock Police Department/ Department of Public Safety will determine what is a bona fide emergency.

Make financial future a hassle-free success

The good things in life don't come easy. People want the best for their families even if it means struggling to balance a career, home life and the whirlwind of activities in which children involve their parents.

As if getting through today weren't hard enough, we are constantly being urged to plan ahead and save for the future.

When one takes into account the steady escalation of college expenses — something most people consider fundamental to the success of their children — the need for being prepared becomes obvious. Luckily, preparing to meet college expenses just became a little easier.

The parents' friend is a financial instrument too often neglected these days — U.S. savings bonds. Once considered stodgy, and certainly not on the cutting edge of investment products, savings bonds have been — for 50 years — a constant friend Americans could count on.

And now they're even better. The interest on savings bonds can be totally tax free if they are used to pay tuition and fees at a qualified institution of higher learning.

For the parent facing system overload, savings bonds are nearly perfect. They can be purchased automatically through payroll savings.

In order to be eligible for the tax exclusion, bonds should be registered in the parent's name — not the child's — and the purchaser must be at least 24 years of age. Also, the bonds have to be redeemed within the same calendar year that tuition and fees are paid and certain income requirements must be met during that year. For 1991, the income limitation for a full exclusion is a modified adjusted gross income of \$62,900 or less for joint filers

(\$41,950 for single taxpayers) with a benefit phase out for joint filers with incomes between \$62,900 and \$94,350 (\$41,950 and \$57,700 for single filers). Income limits will be adjusted for inflation annually.

Another interesting wrinkle of the new program is that it applies not only to a child's secondary education but to the parents' own higher education as well.

If the filer's projected income is too high to qualify for this tax exclusion, parents can still benefit by buying bonds for their children's education. Bonds purchased in a child's name with a parent registered as beneficiary (not co-owner) will also yield tax advantages. For a child under 14, only the interest and dividend income in excess of \$1,000 is taxed at the parent's rate. If the child is 14 or older, all income is taxed at the child's rate. Depending on the child's age and expected future income, one may choose between annual and deferred reporting.

Whichever method is chosen, and whether one qualifies for the tax exclusion or not, savings bonds still maintain all of the traditional benefits that have endeared them to the American parent for half a century. They are always free from state and local income tax, and they are guaranteed by the full faith and credit of the United States. Savings bonds are also guaranteed against theft, loss or destruction. And if this isn't enough, the interest rate on savings bonds is tied to the market when they are held five years or more, with a guaranteed minimum rate to protect them from a prolonged market decline.

With the convenience and peace of mind that an investment in savings bonds provides, planning for the future will be even easier than getting through today.

Thank you for your interest and concern in the support of recycling paper products.

I have talked with Lila Andermatt, commissary officer, regarding stocking recycled paper products. She informed me that the commissary has stocked such items and that to date they have two sources. Kimberly -Cark has the Hi-Dri paper towels, and Marcal has paper towels, single and three roll, and dinner napkins. Ms. Andermatt said that with such an outstanding introductory price, the products sold out sooner than they had anticipated. They have another order due in within the next 10 days, so you should find them on the commissary shelves again very soon.

As a reminder to help recycle, you may reuse your clean, undamaged grocery bags when shopping at the commissary.

Ignoring stop signs

On two occasions as I was leaving the base to go to Reese Village, I saw a vehicle coming from the north on War Highway speed through the intersection, ignoring the posted stop signs. I think that some people may think that the stop sign only applies to those making a right-hand turn into the base.

Thank you for your call concerning the safety of all our people. When the new turn lane was made on War Highway, we quickly discovered the stop sign was no longer effective in its new location. We have painted stop lines on each lane with the word "STOP," and have lowered the stop sign and placed it in the middle of the road. Hopefully, this will resolve the potential problem. Security police continue to monitor this situation and take proper action when and where appropriate.

I am an active-duty female. I would like to see military spouse day observances offer something for the male spouses. I think a makeup and fashion show leaves out our male spouses.

All of the morning activities offered on Military Spouse Appreciation Day were appropriate for either gender. Separation rollback, release programs to begin in July

The Air Force has instituted fiscal 1991 date of separation rollback and voluntary release programs for first-term airmen stationed in the continental United States, according to SSgt. Kerry Eason, consolidated base personnel office reenlistment and separation section.

This year's programs are expected to help meet reduced end-strength requirements with some 2,800 separations in July. This is the 10th consecutive year the Air Force has used enlisted early re-

lease programs.

A date of separation rollback program will move fiscal 1992 separations into fiscal 1991 for first-term airmen who are ineligible to re-enlist. People in this category with a separation date between Oct. 1, 1991 and March 31, 1992 will separate in July.

Unit commanders may request exemption of personnel for mission degradation. Airmen may apply for exemption based on hardship reasons.

Some people are exempt from

this program, including airmen currently serving or subsequently deployed to the Middle East in support of Operation Desert Storm, and airmen serving in Zone A selective re-enlistment bonus skills, according to Sergeant Eason. People in certain critical Air Force speciality code skills, including medical and dental personnel, are also exempt. Exempt airmen will re-enlist or separate on their normal date of separation.

Postal costs decentralized

The responsibility for budgeting and paying for postal expenses in Air Training Command is being decentralized from Headquarters U.S. Air Force to local bases beginning Sept. 16, according to local communications officials.

"We no longer have an unlimited pot of money to draw from for postal expenditures," said SSgt. Brian Turner, chief, administrative communications. "It is the responsibility of each unit to make every effort to use the least expensive mail service available that will meet time and security requirements."

"When you have to budget and pay for sending official mail, it makes you aware of how much it

really costs," said Col. Lawrence F. Monsour, the ATC director for information management. "Decentralizing the postal budget will give local commanders direct control of their postal dollars and provide an incentive to save, helping them to better align responsibility with accountability."

Previously, the Air Force came under the postal service's "penalty mail system." It allowed the Air Force to charge postal expenses and pay for them quarterly. In fiscal 1990, ATC's postal bill was more than \$6 million. That amount was dwarfed by the Department of Defense's overall postal costs for fiscal 1990 — \$265 million.

Now, most DOD agencies will use the U.S. Postal Service commercial system. It requires all transactions between the post office and user be cash, check, money order or an advance deposit trust account.

ATC has more than 2,000 offices considered small-volume mailers that will be affected by the changes.

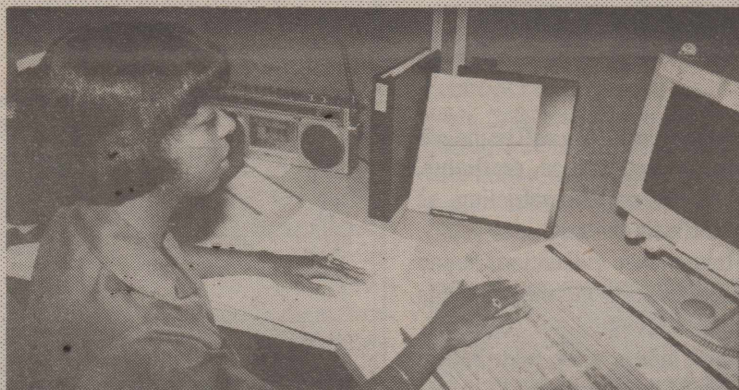
"Think about what you are mailing," said 1st Lt. Susan Samuel, chief, Information Management Flight. "If you are not sure of the most economical way to send mail, contact us. Every little bit saved counts."

'Top Flight' competition tests wing's preparedness

Be prepared.

How well pilot training wings in the command adhere to that motto is being tested today during the first "Top Flight" competition at Laughlin AFB, Texas.

Under way since Thursday, the competition is something of a descendant of "Torchlight," but with a major difference. Aircrews and maintainers were given little time to prepare for the competition — Reese's pilots, for instance, weren't selected until Tuesday morning.

In addition, the competitors and aircraft were selected at random by the command, not the individual bases. As such, Top Flight should be a more accurate barometer of the day-to-day mission capability of pilot training wings than Torchlight, which allowed wings to pick their best performers and gave teams plenty of time to prepare.

Each team consists of a T-37 and T-38 side. A total of eight pilots and 10 maintainers make up the Reese squad.

According to Capt. Michael Weldon, one of Reese's Top Flight coordinators, each pilot flies one sortie during Top Flight.

"Two of them fly (on each side) a formation sortie and the other two

will fly what's called a composite sortie," he said. "They [composites] go up and do aerobatics, stalls, instrument approaches and that sort of thing."

Composite sorties are done separately, as opposed to the formation flying. Also, all flights are being done with command flight examiners,

said they will be judged on aircraft appearance, preflights, launch recovery and refueling, as well as a written exam.

Maintenance evaluations began Thursday, while all the flying is taking place today.

Team spirits were high before they headed to Laughlin.

"I expect we'll do real well," said 1st Lt. Steve McCartney of the T-37 team. "We fly these missions daily with the students, so it's something we're familiar with."

The lieutenant did note there would be more pressure involved during the competition, since the command examiners would be on board.

"We'll try to handle it," he said with a grin.

The same confidence was mirrored on the maintenance side. Tommy Melton, a T-38 crew chief, said that the maintainers would also be doing things they do every day. A newcomer to command competition, he said he was "definite" the team would do well.

Results of the competition were expected to be available late today.

Future Top Flights will be rotated around pilot training bases in the command.

Search and rescue

Hundreds of times each year, thousands of Civil Air Patrol volunteers search for, find and rescue people who have either been lost or involved in an aircraft accident. Thousands of these cadets and senior members are also trained in emergency first aid techniques. In 1988, 1989 and 1990, Civil Air Patrol volunteers were responsible for saving the lives of more than 200 people.

CAP celebrates 50th

Reese is not the only flying organization celebrating its 50th anniversary of service this year.

The Civil Air Patrol got its start during World War II when a group of concerned civilian pilots organized under the Office of Civilian Defense on Dec. 1, 1941, and later became an auxiliary of the Army Air Corps.

During the war, the CAP aided the Army Air Corps by flying tow-target missions, manning administrative posts on air bases, conducting search and rescue activities, and conducted — in its best-known World War II mission — the German submarine coastal patrol.

After German submarines had sunk 204 vessels, seriously disrupting the transport of war material to allied forces fighting in Europe, it was time for the civilian volunteers of the Civil Air Patrol to step in.

These volunteers passed the test by sighting 173 subs and actually sinking two.

After the war, there was little need for coastal patrols, but because of its excellent record of service, Congress decided to make the Civil Air Patrol a permanent auxiliary of the newly formed Air Force.

In May 1948, the organization became the official auxiliary of the Air Force.

The Congress gave the Civil Air Patrol three new missions: emergency services, aerospace education and cadet training.

The Reese CAP squadron was established in October 1989. The local squadron is composed of younger cadet members ranging in age from 13 to 21, with older senior officers 18 and older. The volunteers meet once at week at Reese to conduct training in their missions.

"Our squadron goal is to become mission ready," said Capt. Joe Mims, squadron commander and also a local welder and private pilot. "We want the local pilots to know that they can count on us." CAP flies four out of every five air search and rescue missions for the Air Force.

In addition to search and rescue, the CAP also has a cadet program designed to develop youth into dynamic aerospace leaders. First Lt. Mark Cheslow, an instructor pilot with the 54th Flying Training Squadron at Reese, got his start in CAP.

"I like what the CAP did for me," said Lieutenant Cheslow. "It gave me an introduction to the military and aviation. My squadron in

Virginia gave me a flight solo scholarship."

Lieutenant Cheslow, who is also the CAP squadron deputy commander for cadets, said that the squadron has a good corps of cadets to work with. The cadets are involved in aerospace classes, leadership classes, community service and physical training.

A local dental assistant and squadron personnel officer, Capt. Jo Ann Ridgway, said, "Reese has supported us quite a bit, but we still need donations of camping equipment, safety equipment, and search and rescue equipment."

Captain Ridgway's husband, Lt. Col. Gene Ridgway is also a member of the squadron. Colonel Ridgway is a retired Air Force KC-135 pilot. The Ridgways live in Brownfield, Texas.

In observance of the CAP's 50th anniversary, the squadron will have an information booth and a static display of a Cessna 177 Cardinal search and rescue aircraft at Reese's open house this weekend. They will also provide water for the open house participants.

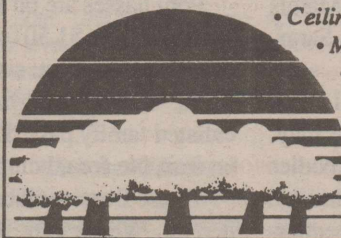

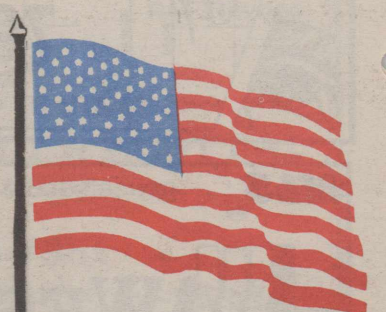
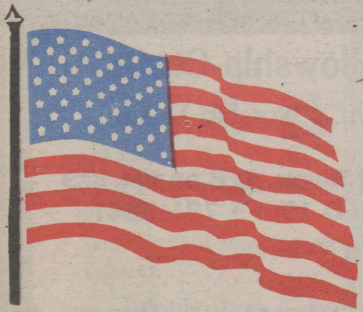
