

50th anniversary activities highlight today's ceremony

Reese's 50th anniversary will armed services committee. be celebrated during a ceremony at 10:45 a.m. Monday in front of Bldg.

"This marks an important milestone in Reese's legacy of producing the world's best pilots," Col. Bill Henny, 64th Flying Training Wing commander, said.

On hand for the celebration will be the Honorable Phil Gramm, U.S. senator; Lt. Gen. Joseph Ashy, Air Training Command commander; the Honorable B.C. "Peck" McMinn, Lubbock mayor; Roy Holmes, Lubbock Chamber of Commerce president; and David Seim, chairman of the chamber's

"We are happy to have Senator Gramm and General Ashy on hand for this historic occasion, as well as everyone else who will be in attendance", Colonel Henny added.

The activities for the celebration include Colonel Henny presenting to the citizens of Lubbock the flag flown over the base June 13, marking the 50th anniversary of the base site selection.

All the men and women of Reese are encouraged to attend.

Reese first opened up as Lubbock Army Air Corps Advanced Flying School June 26, 1941.

The field began operating in late

1941, and the training of aviation cadets began Feb. 25, 1942. Subsequently, the base became known as Lubbock Army Air School on Feb. 6, 1942, and later Lubbock Army Air Field on April 26, 1943. The base then became the Lubbock Army Air Base Jan. 13, 1948.

The base was renamed Reese AFB in memory of Lt. Augustus Reese Jr., a native of nearby Shallowater, during a ceremony in November 1949. Lieutenant Reese was killed in action during World War II while flying a combat mission in a P-38 against an enemy railroad supply train on May 14, 1943.

Members of Reese Undergraduate Pilot Training Class 91-12 will receive their wings today during graduation ceremonies in the Simler Theater.

The ceremony is scheduled for 10 a.m. Related events in the Officer's Open Mess include a graduation buffet from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m.; a parents'

social at 6:15 p.m.; and a dinnerdance at 7 p.m.

The guest speaker for the graduation will be retired Brig. Gen. Charles Duke Jr., a former astronaut.

During graduation, several awards will be presented to students and permanent-party members. Student awards include the commander's trophy (top overall graduate),"top stick" (best in flying training), academics, distinguished graduates, leadership and outstanding second lieutenant.

Other awards will be presented to the outstanding academic and flightline instuctor pilots, maintenance members and mission maker. For more information see page 8.





Lubbock slates July 4th activities

A 50-state-flag detail from Reese will march in the parade Thursday morning, kicking off the Fourth on Broadway celebration.

A bang-up Victory Parade honoring members of the U.S. Armed Forces who served during the Persian Gulf war will kick off a day full of activity marking Lubbock's Fourth of July, according to Lubbock officials.

From the time the parade starts at 10 a.m., until near midnight when the last

rocket is launched in the fireworks display, Lubbock residents will have marched and cheered and celebrated enough to satisfy every red-blooded, patriotic American for miles around. Officials will be disappointed if this is not the biggest Independence Day celebration ever staged in West Texas. The parade, led by veterans of Operation Desert Storm, will march from the Memorial Coliseum to Broadway and then head east to the Memorial Civic Center. As the parade clears Broadway, the avenue will be roped off for a huge street fair called "Fourth on Broadway." This ambitious festival will feature 90

covered booths operated by civic groups, non-profit organizations and businesses offering food, games, fun and music for every taste.

There is no admission charge for the parade or Fourth on Broadway, but individual booths will charge for their wares. For the children, there will be booths offering dart throwing, water balloon throwing, a dunking booth and face painting.

More than 60 musical acts will perform on five music stages at 30-minute intervals throughout the day. Gary Schwantz, chairman for the street fair, said, "There will be music starting at 1 p.m. and running through 7 p.m. We'll have Christian and gospel music, country and western, Hispanic, jazz and folk music, and rock-and-roll. We want this to be a celebration of the musical heritage of West Texas."

An all-you-can-eat barbecue will be held on the lawn of the Lubbock County Courthouse starting at 11 a.m. Tickets for the feast, at \$7 each, are available at United Super Markets through July 2.

At 11:30, an Early Settlers Reumon will be held in the Koko Palace, 5101 Ave. Q. Tickets for this event, which cost \$7.50 each, are available at the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, 14th and Ave. K. Col. Bill Henny will be the keynote speaker.

Citibus and local banks will provide free shuttle bus service from parking lots on the Tech campus to the parade, barbecue and Fourth on Broadway. In addition, three trolleys will provide free transportation up and down Broadway during the street fair.

Starting at 7:30 p.m., a joint concert by the Lubbock Symphony Orchestra, the Maines Brothers, and the Joe and Ricky Martinez Band will be staged on 6th Street, in the grassy area north of the civic center adjacent to the Department of Public Safety.

To top off the Independence Day activities, the city is preparing a fireworks extravaganza to begin at 10 p.m. in the same location as the music concert. Spectators may want to bring lawn chairs and blankets

The array of ribbons on his chest pays witness to his 30-plus years of service, as does the eight stripes on either shoulder.

Leaning back in his chair, CMSgt. Stephen Greenwell recalls a tense moment during his career. Assigned to a mobile radio group in Germany in 1963, he was celebrating his 20th birthday the day John F. Kennedy was killed.


"With all our 'sophisticated' communications equipment, the first word we got was that there was a full-scale attack on (Lyndon) Johnson was shot and there was still shooting (going on).

"We immediately went to full alert, with grenades on all the equipment," added Chief Greenwell. "Back then, everybody got a weapon. So we went out and guarded the antenna field fence for about a half hour until we got word of what actually transpired."

The event was one of many the 64th Mission Support Squadron executive can recall. Two conflicts are among the others.

"Of course, the Vietnam War made a big impact on everybody," the Indiana native said, draping his left arm over the back of his chair. "Now, Desert Storm has brought us back to where we were before Vietnam as far as prestige and public support goes. And it's our job to keep it there."

Recrossing his arms, he talks of the future. The father of two — along with his wife, Mary — and grandfather of three, the chief the motorcade, Kennedy was shot, retired Thursday. Going back home to "go



CHAMPUS outpatient

The annual Civilian Health And Medical Program of the Uniformed Services deductible for outpatient care increased for many CHAMPUS-eligible families April

The outpatient deductible for each fiscal year increased to \$150 for an individual, and a total of \$300 for an entire family. The previous amounts were \$50 and \$100, re-

spectively. The original law that increased the annual deductibles provided that the amount for the family members of active-duty E-4s and below would not increase, but would remain at \$50 and \$100:

"Recent congressional action directed that the deductible increase be delayed until Oct. 1 for family members of active-duty sponsors who served in the Persian Gulf war," said Carolyn Johnson, Reese health benefits advisor. "Therefore, the lower deductible rates will continue to apply to care received by these beneficiaries through Sept. 30."

June history notes

1941 — The official announcement was made in Washington D.C., that the site offered by the City of Lubbock had been selected as the location of an advanced flying school. The installation was named the Lubbock Army Air Corps Advanced Flying School.

1960 — Service Club dedicated as Mathis Service Club (now Mathis Recreation Center) in honor of 1st Lt. Jack Warren Mathis, deceased.

1973 — Primary Phase I training in the T-41 aircraft ended at Reese.

1975 — Youth Center completed.

1981 — The first part of the Base Exchange complex opened for business.

1982 — Refueling Vehicle Maintenance Facility completed.

1983 — Severe hailstorm with four inches of hail, wind gusts to 92 mph and 3.7 inches of rain hit Reese. Damage estimated at \$1,006,700; less than \$10,000 of the total damage was to aircraft.

1985 — Reese Reunion '85 held. A combination of events that celebrated the spirit of Reese and the unique cooperation between the people of Texas, especially in and around Lubbock, and those who came to here to equip, support and train this nation's military pilots.






