Summertime is fun time. A time to enjoy the outdoors, participating in sporting and recreation activities.

A great number of Reese military and civilian members will also be using their summer to travel on vacations, visiting new places, families and friends.

Normally everything turns out the way we plan and we return to our homes after a ball game or a long trip safe and sound.

Some wing members may not be that lucky. We will probably have some accidents this summer.

Most summer accidents can be avoided if the people involved take that extra few minutes to look around for the danger signs.

The majority of accidents occur due to fatigue, overextension of physical limits, poor physical conditioning for the activity involved, driving too far or fast in a limited amount of time, and over-consumption of alcohol.

A single one of these factors usually does not cause an accident.

Normally when the accident is investigated, a combination of several factors turns out to be the cause. Usually a simple decision, precaution or change of plans would have been enough to "break the chain" of events that led to tragedy.

This summer, take the time to plan for safe sports, recreational activities and vacation trips. The extra time taken before you start out may make the difference.

The bottom line--summer safety is up to you.

Fire and children: a fatal attraction

As a controlled item, heat is one of the greatest of all tools. But let the heat become the master and tragedy often results. Over 12,000 lives are claimed by fire each year in the

In addition, fire maims and injures more than 300,000 persons each year. All too often the tragedy and scars remain with them the rest of their lives.

About 560,000 fires are reported each year. From 1981 - 1986, the U.S. Fire Administration reported that between 25 and 40 percent of all fires were set by children. In some areas of the country, this figure is as high as 70 percent.

Most experts say that the best way to understand a child's firesetting is by looking at the context and motivation for the behavior. There are basically four types of firesetting, and for each type, a different strategy is used to attempt to stop or reverse the behavior.

Curiosity is the first type. It usually occurs with boys 3-7 years old. The curious child may set a fire in a closet, under a bed or outside. Because the child does not understand the consequences of his or her action, the fire can cause major damage.

The best treatment is through positive fire safety educa-

Crisis is the second type. It usually occurs with boys 5 - 10 years old. A child could be using fire as a "cry for help" to show his or her inability to cope with a sudden change of lifestyle or a traumatic incident. The child will usually set fire to someone's clothing or other possessions. Treatment is usually counseling and education.

The third type is delinquency, and usually occurs with boys and girls 10-14. Fires are set in dumpsters or in dry grass with the intention to vandalize. The fires are usually set to impress peers or out of boredom or defiance. Treatment could be restitution for damages and, again, positive education.

The fourth type is problem children. Usually 7- to 12-yearold boys with a history of school and social problems are the arsonists. Fires are usually set in or around the home. Often, there is no clear cut motivation for the firesetting. The best treatment is positive counseling and education.

The Reese Fire Department has a supply of free burn prevention literature and pamphlets available. Also, upon request, a specialized orientation is available using Sparky the friendly fireman, Matches the clown, Freddie the robot, and a host of firefighters. 

Common sense, self-control focus of safety

Summer can be a deadly time of year. Since 1989, eight members of Air Training Command have died between Memorial Day and Labor Day. Fortunately, none of these were at Reese.

Common sense and self control could make this summer fatality free also. Lt. Gen. Joseph Ashy, ATC commander, is urging commanders and supervisors to warn their people of dangerous summertime activities that might end in disaster.

"We must make every attempt to informthem of the risks they face and the precautions necessary to prevent regrettable, preventable mishaps," General Ashy said.

"Discipline and common sense are key to success in preventing senseless loss of life and personal injury. If our supervisors understand that leadership is a 24-hour-a-day proposition, we'll be accident free."

During the months of summer, death or injury is statistically much more likely to happen after a person leaves

their duty section.

Since fiscal 1985, only four ATC members have died in ground accidents while at work, but 85 have lost their lives in off-duty accidents.

That loss of life directly impacts ATC's ability to carry out its mission. "Every member of this command is individually important to our continued mission accomplishment," General Ashy explained. "Their safety, both on and off duty, must be our primary concern.

"One of the things I've learned over the years is that the buddy system really can help. When we observe someone not using the best of judgment, we should help out right then."

Frequently, off-duty accidents happen when people are doing something they've looked forward to all winter, explained Col. Clyde E. Ziegenhorn Jr., the director of safety in Hq. ATC's inspector general office.

"People overextend themselves. They try to do things they haven't done in a year," Colonel Ziegenhorn said. "If they'd approach off-duty activities like they do their on-duty activities, the number of mishaps would

"Most mishaps are preventable," he added. "Sometimes prevention may be as simple as individual awareness."

General Ashy added that safety programs built to fit the needs of ATC's people on and off the job have the potential to save lives during the summer of '91.

The command's director of safety agreed. A package developed by ATC's safety directorate outlines summer safety topics and ideas for commanders and supervisors.

"We're encouraging ATC's safety offices to augment this package with topics relative to their base's needs," Colonel Ziegenhorn said.

Beginning in May, the supervisor's safety and zero-injury goal package has selected a monthly on-the-job and off-the-job theme. The on-the-job theme for July, for example, is noise control. July's off-the-job theme is recreation safety.

In addition to the package's monthly theme, each calendar week carries a safety message on topics that include exercising, travel safety, work-related hand injuries and child safety seats.

Officials from the Air Force Inspection and Safety Center at Norton AFB, Calif., reminded Air Force members that safety programs succeed when commanders and supervisors are actively involved at all levels.

Colonel Ziegenhorn added that, with supervisor involvement, summer need not be filled with risk.

"The summer of 1991 can be a great time if safety is consciously used," he explained. "We can make this summer enjoyable and accident-free." (ATC News Service)

More UPT slots to open

ROTC commissionees and cadets recently reclassified from undergraduate pilot training slots to non-flying specialties will get a second chance at UPT, Air Force officials said.

Budget restrictions, downsizing of the military and a 25-percent reduction in aircraft caused a corresponding reduction in the training pipeline, they said. This necessitated a lower UPT production rate, leading the Air Force to reclassify many fiscal 1990, 1991 and 1992 ROTC UPT candidates waiting to start pilot training.

these reclassified officers and ca-

dets a chance to enter UPT between fiscal 1991 and 1996, provided they remain physically and professionally qualified.

Air Force Military Personnel Center and Air Force ROTC officials will notify all affected officers and cadets of the policy change. They will have the opportunity to come on active duty in a variety of non-rated positions. Then, based on a schedule managed by AFMPC, they'll enter UPT if they still meet the physical requirements and have

their commander's endorsement. Those who have already sepa-The Air Force will now give rated or are in the process of separating or transferring to the Air Force

Reserve or Air National Guard will be given the chance to come on active duty and wait for a UPT slot, officials said.

The AFMPC schedule will be driven in part by the need to enter those officers into UPT by age 27.5. Consequently, some will enter training in fiscal 1991-1993, officials said. The majority, however, will start UPT between fiscal 1994 and

About one year prior to scheduled UPT entry, these officers will get a letter requesting a current flight physical and their commander's endorsement for entry into pilot training. (Air Force News Service)
