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

# Air power heads Mideast effort

Air strikes at targets in Iraq and Kuwait signaled the change of Operation Desert Shield into Desert Storm, the operation to force Iraqi President Saddam Hussein to comply with United Nations resolutions, including pulling his forces out of Kuwait.

President George Bush ordered the move after deciding that no progress was being made in attempts to dislodge the Iraqi forces through international diplomatic efforts. In a national address Jan. 16, President Bush said that "the world can wait no longer."

"Now the 28 countries with forces in the Gulf area, have exhausted all reasonable efforts to reach a peaceful resolution, have no choice but to drive Saddam from Kuwait by force. We will not fail."

At the same time, the president also renewed his pledge that this would not be another Vietnam. "Our troops will have the best possible support in the entire world, and they will not be asked to fight with one hand tied behind their back," the president said

"My confidence in you is total," said Army Gen. H. Norman Schwarzkopf, commander of the forces in the gulf, in a message to the troops. "Our cause is just. Now you must be the thunder and lightning of Desert Storm."

Initial reports from the early raids depict a highly successful effort on the part of the allied air forces, but Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney, in a briefing Jan. 17, urged caution in interpreting the first day's results as a blowout of Iraqi forces. He reminded reporters that this is only the initial phase of a multi-phase plan to achieve the president's goal of forcefully removing Iraqi forces from Kuwait.

The secretary said that coalition air forces had launched more than 1,000 sorties in the first 12 hours of Desert Storm, while the Navy had launched 100 cruise missiles to take out specified, strategic targets ahead of the air raids.

Two aircraft were lost in the raids, one American and one British, the secretary said

Gen. Colin Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, praised the air forces' performance but also urged caution in interpreting the apparently overwhelming victory as a collapse of the Iraqi armed forces. Operationally, General Powell said that initial reports indicate an 80-percent success rate for the missions launched in the first strikes.

In a U.S. Central Command briefing in Saudi Arabia, officials confirmed the attack had begun and said the raids primarily were aimed against military emplacements, air defense assets, and command and control targets. Officials said U.S. Air Force aircraft included in the - see "Storm," page 13

# From my perspective

ou all have worked hard during the last several months as Reese has prepared for the unit effectiveness and operational readiness inspection scheduled for Feb. 4 -

I know that Reese is prepared to show the inspectors just how good we are, and to that end, I would like to

offer some last minute inspection tips.

These tips can be grouped into four categories attitude, appearance, documentation and pride.

#### Attitude

☐ Demonstrate a sense of urgency to the inspection

☐ Be willing to "role play" if required by the exercise. This is your chance to show off your organization and what it is capable of doing.

☐ Honor the cordons when they are established around an exercise area. Equally important, if asked to participate in a cordon, do so willingly.

☐ Do not make excuses for deficiencies. Be positive and indicate proposed corrective action where required.

☐ Do not point fingers within or outside your organi-

☐ Be a good listener — you'll be amazed what you can learn from the inspector.

☐ Show the inspector those areas that you are most proud of that have improved your organization's opera-

☐ Finally, do not leave an inspector searching for an answer. If you don't know the answer, up channel the question to your supervisor. Then follow up to ensure that the inspector gets the information he or she requested.

#### Appearance

☐ A fresh haircut, a clean and well-maintained

uniform, along with polished shoes and boots, project a professional image.

☐ Proper military courtesy is vital. Salute when appropriate. Stand up and/or come to attention when higher ranking officers come into your work area. Demonstrate the pride that you have in your job.

☐ Finally, be helpful. Offering a cup of coffee to an inspector is good manners and helps to "break the ice."

#### **Documentation**

Items that need updating include:

☐ Checklists, especially those associated with Air Training Command Regulation 55-6 and your own functional area of responsibility.

☐ Appointment letters.

☐ Approval authority letters.

☐ Bulletin boards and safety boards.

☐ Policy letters.

Operating instructions and continuity folders.

Plans. Lesson plans for training.

☐ Files.

#### Pride

☐ Clean your work area. Windows and desk tops should be cleaned along with the tops of filing cabinets.

Remove unnecessary items from walls. Trite cartoons, posters in poor taste and various types of unframed papers taped to walls detract from the working

☐ Cabinets and book shelves should be clean, orderly and free of clutter.

☐ Where appropriate, framed pictures and tasteful posters along with potted plants make work areas more livable.

#### First impressions

Although these tips appear to reflect common sense and good manners, experience has shown that they are often lacking during inspections. First impressions, whether good or bad, are lasting. A good attitude generally reflects a good working environment and pride in your operation. A sharp-looking work force sets the tone for a proper attitude and connotes a professional approach to accomplishing the mission.

These tips, coupled with an already motivated unit under strong leadership, will aid you in receiving the superb rating I know that you all deserve.

### **Carelines**

As wing commander, I need to hear things "from YOUR perspective." Your inputs and suggestions can help Reese remain the pacesetter in the command.

If you see something good, call me. If you have a problem that you feel needs my attention, call me. First, however, consider using your chain of command. You may remain anonymous if you wish, but those who leave their name and number can get a direct response to their call. Call can be made to the Careline 24 hours a day at 3273.

#### Smoking in ATC

# **Threatcons**

## Potential for terrorism calls for increased vigilance, awareness of surroundings

errorism can strike any time and anywhere, no matter where you are. "Because of our current situation in the Middle-

East, the potential has increased for terrorist activity," said Col. Dale Landis, TAC's deputy director of security police.

Countering the threat, according to Capt. Tom Smart, begins with each and every Air Force member. Captain Smart, a TAC anti-terrorism staff officer, added that "every Air Force member is responsible for protecting our key resources — equipment and people."

"It all starts with awareness," he said. "If all Air Force members increase their awareness to a situation, it makes it all the more difficult for a terrorist to succeed. Awareness leads to detection, which leads to decisive action."

Captain Smart said that part of the Air Force's plan of awareness is a system of four threat conditions — alpha, bravo, charlie and delta. Each level of condition increases security procedures on and around each installation.

• Threatcon alpha: A general warning that there is a possibility of terrorist activity, but the nature and extent are unpredictable.

. Threatcon bravo: Warning that there is an increased and more predictable threat of terrorist activity even though no particular target has been identified.

☐ Threatcon charlie: A warning that an incident has occurred or intelligence reports indicating that some form of terrorist action is imminent.

☐ Threatcon delta: A terrorist attack has occurred or intelligence reports have indicated that terrorist activity against a specific location or person is likely. "When a threat condition is implemented, there will be

signs at all base gates displaying the current condition," said Captain Smart. "As security police increase their vigilance, so should each and every member of that base. If you notice something peculiar, don't hesitate to notify the security police."

At Reese, people who see something suspicious should call the law enforcement desk at 3332/3333.

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

# Smoking presents vast array of health hazards

smoke and I feel fine, but I have this cough that never goes away, and I can't even go for a walk anymore without having a hard time breathing." Does this sound familiar to you? Maybe not,

but it describes the complaints of many smokers who come to the 47th Flying Training Wing Hospital at Laughlin every day.

The connection between smoking and how they feel isn't as obvious to them as it is from the viewpoint of health care workers.

Let's talk about some facts. In 1965, 52 percent of men and 34 percent of women were smokers. Today, about 30 percent of men and 25 percent of women are smokers.

These statistics show that people are gaining knowledge about the health effects of smoking and are kicking the habit. But so many more still risk their health every

Common smoking hazards and disadvantages include:

☐ Heart diseases: Smoking is the No. 1 factor of the majority of people having heart attacks at an early age. Smoking causes constriction of heart vessels and increases the need for oxygen to the heart muscle.

Respiratory disease: Chronic obstructive

pulmonary disease is caused by the destruction of the air sacs in the lungs and the accumulation of tars. Common symptoms are not being able to get enough air to the lungs. Also, bronchitis and pulmonary infections are by far more common in smokers.

☐ Cancer: Smoking is the No. 1 cause of lung and throat cancer. Eighty percent of all lung cancer is directly related to cigarette smoking. It also contributes to

esophagus, gastrointestinal,

bladder and

prostate cancer.

☐ Smoking during pregnancy: Lower birthweight is more common among mothers who smoke during pregnancy. Smoking will constrict the placenta vessels. This will decrease the blood flow to the baby, causing lower than average birth weight.

☐ Economy: A smoker will spend an average of \$700 a year, \$14,000 in 15 to 20 years and more than \$20,000 in 30 years on cigarettes. Imagine what could be done with this money. Think of the vacations, cars, education, a down payment on a house it could buy.

Smokers have an increased cost of health and life insurance. In addition, hospital visits are more frequent among smokers, mainly because of respiratory infections.


So why smoke? Cigarettes contain nicotine, a highly addictive drug. It causes a physical and psychological dependency, but you can stop it if you really want

Just think, you don't have anything to lose and a lot to gain from quitting. It is still not too late and you will feel happier and healthier.

> Remember this. Eighty to 90 percent of smokers want to quit.

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
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

# Know what to do when called upon

Once you are assigned to a cordon position, the cordon guard may not leave the post until instructed to by the cordon supervisor. No one, regardless of rank or position, may enter or exit a cordon (except BEET and command inspectors).

All entries or exits through a cordon must take place through the entry control point, or ECP.

Individuals stopped on their way to work and told they cannot enter an area because a cordon is established must wait until entry is granted. However, if possible, cordon guards may suggest alternative routes around the cordon.

Finally, everyone is responsible for letting families know what to do if they approach a cordon.

What actions should you take if someone attempts to walk through the cordon and will not obey you when you are performing your duties as a cordon guard? With minimum force, you should restrain the individual and try to signal the cordon supervisor. If media members, such as newspaper or television reporters, request entry, deny it. Media representatives must be escorted by a public affairs person at all times.

Supervisors cannot take action against their people who are late because they were not allowed to enter a cordon area or were acting as cordon guards. The supervisor can verify the cordon information with the security police.

In summary, everybody should be patient and let the cordon guards do their job. They are attempting to protect lives and property.

Respect the cordon boundaries. And remember, as a cordon guard, you cannot refuse the duty, cannot desert your post, and cannot allow anyone (except BEET or command inspectors) to enter or exit the cordon except through the Entry Control Point.

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
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# Used Cars

It's not just the car that can be a 'lemon'

ike the car it covers, a used-car warranty can be a good deal — or a real lemon.

To avoid having to live with the sour taste of

the lemon, it pays to check the warranty as carefully as you check the car itself. Dealers don't have to offer warranties for used cars, so the buyer's first step should be to make sure the price does include a warranty.

About half of all used cars are sold without a warranty.

While private sales are not regulated, the Federal Trade Commission requires that all dealer-sold cars carry a sticker that shows whether the car is being sold with or without a warranty.

But even if with a warranty, consumers should compare carefully because used car warranties vary greatly among dealers. Find out what systems are covered on the car and for how long. Ask how much of the repair cost will be your responsibility. The most common is a split-cost warranty, with you paying half the repair costs and the dealer paying the other half.

Read the written warranty carefully, making sure it is as extensive as the salesperson described. From a legal standpoint, the salesperson's promises are worthless unless you have them in writing.

Some dealers offer more protection than the law requires, but consumers can't count on the dealer's generosity alone. If a dealer is willing to do more than the minimum required by law, that's great. Just be sure to get those promises in writing at the time of the sale.

If you buy a car without a warranty, or "as is," you assume all responsibility for servicing and repairs, even if the car doesn't run once it leaves the lot. The dealer is not

responsible for repairs on cars sold as is.

One possible safety valve is to find an independent mechanic who will do a "buyer's check" of the car's mechanical systems. A thorough check usually will cost around \$30, but it's money well spent if it saves you from pie-in-the-sky promises.

Finally, as you consider purchasing a used car, keep these points in mind:

☐ If you are buying from a dealer, ask for the name and address of the previous owner. Try to speak with the owner before making a decision.

☐ Check for recalls by calling the National Highway Traffic Safety hotline at 1-800-424-9393. If a recall on the model exists, you will be sent a card that can be sent to the manufacturer to learn if the car has been repaired.

☐ Never buy a car without taking it for a test drive that includes some hard acceleration, quick stops and parking.

☐ Avoid buying a model that is no longer in production. Parts often are difficult to find and may be expensive. (Air Force News Service)

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



# General Powell reflects on civil rights leader's impact

An outspoken admirer and student of Martin Luther King Jr's. teachings, Army Gen. Colin Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said King's work played a vital role in his becoming America's top general.

"It's always hard to describe the impact Dr. King had on this nation, as well as on my life," said General Powell. "He was a man of great courage, willing to go to the very end; put everything on the line, for what he believed in. That's what impressed me the most, and the fact that his contributions were not just for African-Americans, but for all

"Dr. King fought the second

Civil War. The first Civil War was fought 100 years earlier, but he led all Americans in the second Civil War, which freed America from the chains of oppression that still existed in this country through the 1960s."

Lauding Dr. King's contributions to the nation, General Powell said the civil rights leader was "instrumental in breaking down barriers to opportunity to such an extent that I've been able to get to where I am." The general cited King's example of moral courage, fighting for what you believe in, not being distracted from what you think is right and doing right. "That influences me and shapes the way I look at my life and my responsibilities as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff," he said.

tandem with the words of our Declaration of Independence: 'And for the support of this declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of divine providence, we mutually pledge to each other our lives, our fortunes and our sacred honor," General Powell said.

"In other words, he was prepared to put everything on the line for things that were dear to him and meant something to him — what he believed in. I don't know if anybody can make a better statement than that," said the general.

"He was such a great spokesman, and his sermons, speeches and teachings are significant and are going into the pantheon of great American literature.

"We use his words wherever possible to communicate to our young people the meaning of his life," General Powell continued. "And not just black history things. What he did for the whites of America is as great as what he did for blacks. That's why it's so correct for this to be a national holiday and why all Americans should

study what he did and what he meant."

General Powell never met Martin Luther King Jr., but one of his most treasured possessions is a large portrait of the civil rights leader that was given to him when he was commander in chief of Forces Command in 1989.

"It's a portrait given to me by Mrs. King when I visited the Martin Luther King Jr. Center for Creative Non-Violence in Atlanta shortly after I arrived at Forces Command," said General Powell. "It's a beautiful portrait of our leader with an expression beneath the painting that says, 'Freedom is an expensive thing.' It's in my personal study at home. I see it every morning and continue to be moved by Dr. King and the contributions he made to this nation."

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# The man and his life: A wealth of historic events, contributions to all cultures

Jan. 15, 1929: Born to Rev. and Mrs. Martin Luther King Sr. in Atlanta, Ga. ☐ Feb. 25, 1948: Ordained a Baptist minister, and later installed by his father as pastor of Dexter Avenue Church, Montgomery, Ala., on Oct. 31, 1954. □ Dec. 5, 1955: Led historic boycott in Montgomery, following the Dec. 1 arrest of Rosa Parks, a 42year-old black seamstress who refused to give up her seat on a city bus so a white man could sit. Elected president of the boycott organization, the Montgomery Improvement Association. Bus service to black neighborhoods suspended on Dec. 10. On June 4, 1956, U.S. district court rules that racial segregation on city bus lines is unconstitutional. ☐ February 1957: Elected president of the newly founded Southern Christian Leadership □ Sept. 20, 1958: Stabbed in the chest while autographing his book, Stride Toward Freedom: The Montgomery Story, in a Harlem, N.Y., department store. ☐ Feb. 2 – March 10, 1959: Guest of Indian Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru, studied Gandhi's techniques of non-violent resistance. ☐ March – April 1963: Arrested for leading sit-in demonstrations to protest segregated restaurants in Birmingham, Ala. Wrote famous "Letter from Birmingham Jail" while imprisoned. Book, Strength to Love, published that June. ☐ Aug. 28, 1963: Led march on Washington, D.C., the first large integrated protest march, and delivered "I Have a Dream" speech on the steps of the Lincoln Memorial. Afterward, met with President John F. Kennedy in the White House. Seat belts factor in Fourth Street crash

## Reese sergeant involved

Seat belts really do save lives. So was the case for a sergeant who walked away Monday night from what Reese Safety officals called a major automobile accident.

At about 10 p.m. Monday, three cars -- two traveling westward and one traveling eastward on Fourth Street -- collided at the intersection of FM 179, according to MSgt. Danny Bergen, 64th Security Police Squadron Law Enforcement Section noncommissioned officer.

The sergeant, who was driving a sub-compact car, was trailing behind the other westbound car. As the three cars -- each driving about 45-50 mph -- were nearing the intersection, the military member attempted to pass the westbound ing that no one was severly injured hitting the side of the eastbound car, all had the common school set belts really can save said Sergeant Bergen, referring to lives, but only if they're used propthe Lubbock Police Department's accident report.

A passer-by stopped at the main gate to notify officials of the accident. Two SPs headed to the scene and found the drivers standing beside the 'mangled' mess of cars. Following a call from the SPs, the Reese Fire Department, 64th Flying Training Wing Hospital and

Reese Safety Division, along with the LPD and Emergency Medical Services arrived on scene to assess and assist with the situation.

Except for some cuts and bruises to the sergeant's face, all parties appeared to be uninjured. "Looking at the vehicles in the accident, it's amazing that no one was-hurt," Sergeant Bergen said, recalling that one car's driver-side door could have been opened by someone in the passenger seat.

Charles Gerrior, Reese ground safety manager who later arrived on scene, referred to the sergeant's car by saying "there wasn't enough left of the vehicle to salvage."

The scene, according to safety officials, could be rated as a major accident. Based on the damages sustained, they said it was surpriserly, safety officials added.

"Wing members are reminded that while they are enjoying this three-day weekend, do so safely," said Mr. Gerrior. If going away for the weekend, wing members should be sure to get plenty of sleep before driving long distances and always avoid drinking and driving, he added.



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

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
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
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# Blacks in the gulf

## General Powell responds to criticisms

Critics are sounding off about the high percentage of black combat troops in the Persian Gulf. They say black Americans will suffer a disproportionate number of casualties if war breaks out in the Middle

Blacks make up 13 percent of the general population and 20 percent of the Armed Forces — about 30 percent of the Army, Nearly 29 percent of active Army members in Saudi Arabia are black, according to Pentagon statistics.

"People who criticize the number of African-Americans in the military don't tell you what one is supposed to do about it," said Army Gen. Colin Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. "I don't think anything needs to be done about it. If people who are willing to serve are qualified to serve and serve well, let them serve.

"I'm proud of the fact that blacks, other minorities and whites have chosen to serve their nation, for whatever reason — patriotism, to get a better education, to learn a skill or to change their life patterns," General Powell said prior to Wednesday evening's events. "We should be thankful that we have such dedicated young people."

He noted that before Operation Desert Shield started in August, people were saying to him: "My goodness, if you try to make the Army smaller because the budget's going down and with all that's happened in Europe, you're not going to cut back or deny opportunities for minorities, are you?"

"Now that Desert Shield has come along and we once again find that the world is a dangerous place and that our Armed Forces may be called upon to go into combat, people are saying: 'Don't you have too many minorities in the ser ices?' The answer to that is, let those who wish to serve, serve. I know of no way to deny service to any particular racial or ethnic group that wishes to serve the country.

cans especially, the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps have been avenues of progress where you could go and there were fewer barriers in the way," General Powell emphasized. "Getting ahead is based on your performance and your own ability. That's why so many minorities have come into the military and stayed. If we were not providing that opportunity, they wouldn't have stayed."

"For minorities, black Ameri-

"If there is armed conflict in the Middle East, I don't think you'll see a disproportionate number of Blacks or other minorities killed. We don't want war. I don't want to see any Americans killed - black, white or any other minorities.'

# Storm updates

#### Promotion testing affected

The Air Force has revised enlisted promotion testing procedures and other promotion-related policies due to Operation Desert Storm.

The procedures apply to people scheduled to deploy as well as those already deployed, officials at the Air Force Military Personnel Center said. Airmen who were deployed to the Middle East during the last testing cycles to senior master sergeant and staff sergeant will be allowed to test outof-cycle when they return to their home bases. When they return, airmen will be given 30-45 days study time to prepare for testing in addition to 30 days to take care of personal matters.

Deploying members eligible to test during the January-March cycles to technical sergeant and master sergeant will be given every opportunity to test before their departure, officials said. People should test a minimum of 14 calendar days before deploying, allowing sufficient time for personal

Anyone unable to test during the appropriate testing cycle will still remain eligible for promotion, but will not receive an overall promotion score until testing is completed. Once the test is com-pleted, these people will be given supplemental promotion consider-ation. Their total score will be compared against the promotion cutoff score for selectees in their Air Force Specialty Code. Airmen supplementally selected for promotion will receive back pay and an adjusted date of rank.

Air Force members supporting Desert Shield, but not deployed to the Middle East, will be tested within the scheduled testing cycle.

In some cases, deployment may interrupt training and prevent an airman from receiving an upgraded Air Force Specialty Code skill level before the promotion eligibility cut-off date. Commanders may grant waivers in these cases if the airman was making satisfactory progress in upgrade

Provisions have also been made for promotions to senior airman below-the-zone. Quarterly records-only boards will be conducted at a member's home station and the results passed on to the deployed member's unit.

#### Reserve extensions

As U.S. military forces prepared to drive Iraq from Kuwait with the passing of the Jan. 15 U.N. deadline, the Pentagon called for an extension on tours of reservists now in the Middle East.

Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney said he planned to ask the president for authorization to extend reservists' tours for Operation Desert Shield.

If the president agrees with this request, it would give the Defense Department authority to continue beyond 180 days the period of service for Reserve units already on active duty, and allow the military to call up more than 200,000 Reserve troops, the Pentagon said.

Speaking on the operation before it became Desert Storm, Secretary Cheney said everything would be taken into account to minimize casualties should war break out in the Mideast

"We obviously would use our strengths against our adversary's

"I want to emphasize, this will not be an absorption of either command into the other," Secretary Rice said following the Jan. 10 consolidation announcement. "In private business terms, this will be a double liquidation with a new company formed from the assets of the current commands."Our goal is to integrate the talents and capabilities of the two existing commands into one, imploring the strengths of both."

The new command will manage 14 bases, including Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio, which will be its headquarters. (Air Force News Service)
