# Reese trains tomorrow's best today IG CONCURS!

Displaying the enthusiasm, pride and esprit de corps that was evident throughout 10 days of effectiveness and readiness inspections here, a capacity crowd jammed the Simler Theater for Thursday morning's formal outbrief.


Those on hand rang bells, blew horns and cheered loudly as the outbrief opened with a series of video presentations depicting Reese people accomplishing the mission. Maj. Gen. Robert S. Delligatti, Air Training Command vice commander, called the outpour of wing enthusiasm "awesome."

Brig. Gen. Chalmers R. Carr Jr., ATC inspector general, praised 64th Flying Training Wing personnel for their performance during the unit effectiveness and operational readiness inspections and for the contributions Reese has made to Operation Desert Storm.

"You can be very, very proud of your accomplishments," said General Carr. "You...graduate approximately 350 pilots here each year." The general also said Reese should take pride in "not only the 39 people deployed from the wing, but also in the knowledge that approximately 20 percent of the pilots flying in Desert Storm are Reese graduates."

General Delligatti also praised the wing during the outbrief, noting that the "true measure" of a unit's performance isn't defined in colorcoded ratings, but in the performance of those it has trained. The general emphasized the effectiveness of that training is being demonstrated by all specialities, opera-

# From my perspective

id you ever wonder why you didn't do so well on a promotion, professional military education or college test? The answer is quite simple. . .lack of preparation. The myth that one can "grease through" a test based



upon gaming the system is a weak method for attaining academic success.

#### Skills develop differently

Skills that are tested tend to develop at different rates for different people. Nevertheless, the extent of this development regarding testing procedures is dependent upon the time and effort devoted to it. Although there is no panacea for years of studying neglect, the soundest preparation for test-taking is continuing education and a considerable amount of outside reading.

Being physically and mentally alert are major factors which contribute to one's success on a test. Consequently, a good night's sleep before examination day will enhance your chances of doing well (as opposed to an all-night study marathon prior to testing). Eliminating distractions during the test is essential so that all attention is focused upon the directions, questions and the general format of the test itself.

#### Anxiety: good or bad?

Examinations and anxiety often go hand-inhand. Some anxiety can enhance one's mental alertness. However, excessive anxiety can be counterproductive and have a detrimental effect upon test results. Therefore, to alleviate this "crisis," knowing what to expect is the best preparation.

Pacing oneself during an exam by watching the clock is necessary at times, since some types of questions are more time consuming than others. Answer some of the easier questions first, and then go back to the ones that may require more deliberation. Not only will answering the easier questions help to build one's self confidence, but clues may be revealed that will provide a broader scope for answering the "toughies."

#### To guess or not to guess

This method will help narrow down the questions that you are truly uncertain of. Then one must determine whether guessing is advantageous. For example, if there are four options to a question and you know that two of them couldn't be correct, your chance of getting the right answer from the remaining options is greatly increased.

Useful strategies regarding the aforementioned are essential for today's Air Force professionals, since promotions and career development depend so largely upon one's success regarding PME, promotion tests and college/academic endeavors. The key to excellence requires the bottom line — PREPARATION!

#### Security at the school

The school's principal informed security police that measures have been taken at the school to increase security. They include increased entry control and monitoring of visitors.

Principal Dan Newberry added that your concern is a topic of concern throughout the Frenship School District, and that additional measures will be taken as circumstances warrant.

There have been no threats to area schools. However, our SPs are working closely with local authorities (who have jurisdiction over the school area) to ensure security at Reese Elementary.

# 'Brushing up' on dental habits

here's more to choosing a toothbrush than deciding whether blue or green best complements the bathroom towels.

The major challenge is to sift through the overwhelming assortment of brushes available and select the one that will do an effective job of preventing dental disease.

Look at what you have to choose from — brushes with hard, medium or soft bristles, nylon bristles, "natural" bristles, straight handles, curved handles, handles bent at every angle and heads in shapes and sizes galore.

How do you decide which is the "right" brush for you? Here are some recommendations from the Reese Dental

☐ Select a brush with soft, end-rounded or polished bristles. Soft-bristle brushes are less likely to injure your delicate gum tissues during brushing.

☐ Factors such as size, shape and color are matters of personal preference, but you should be able to reach every tooth surface with your brush. In general, smaller brushes can reach and clean teeth most effectively. Children need small brushes — brushes made especially for them are available.

☐ Manual or electric? Both are equally safe and effective. Select the type you're most comfortable with and you'll brush more thoroughly and regularly.

☐ If you wear dentures, look for special denture brushes. They clean dentures more effectively because their bristles

are arranged to conform to the shape of the dentures. If your store doesn't have denture brushes, use a regular soft-bristled brush; brushes with stiff bristles can damage the plastic in the dentures.

Buy a new toothbrush at least once every three months. As soon as brush bristles become frayed and worn, they can't do their job. Once you've purchased your brush, use it at least once a day with a fluoride toothpaste.

The American Dental Association offers these guidelines for proper brushing:

☐ Angle the brush against the gumline at about 45 degrees.
☐ Move the brush back and forth with short strokes.

using a gentle, scrubbing motion.

□ Brush the outer surfaces of each tooth, keeping the

bristles angled against the gumline.

Use the same method on the inner surfaces of every

☐ Scrub the chewing surfaces of the teeth. Let the bristles work into the grooves.

☐ Finish by brushing your tongue to help freshen breath and remove bacteria.



# We all play a part in pollution and its prevention

The possibilities are as endless as the number of sources, and even though there is no deliberate attempt to wreck the environment, the resulting pollution is exactly the same.

Of course, the simplest solution is the surgical one the removal of the problem by stopping its cause. However, you and I know the likelihood of success in that option. Humans are creatures of habit, and knowledge or awareness is often not enough to make a difference.

What's needed is a fundamental change in the concept of what trash is — what can actually be considered normal, non-recyclable waste versus what is toxic waste. Perhaps then, when it comes time to dump something on the ground, or in the trash can, a light will flash that says, "Hold on, this isn't trash — this is toxic waste."

Otherwise, the 240 million gallons of used crankcase oil we Americans dump each year (22 times more than the Valdez spilled in Alaska) will continue to pollute, rather than become recycled.

So what can you do to make a difference? The Reese Auto Hobby Shop will take your old oil and the 64th Civil Engineering Squadron will take any other hazards such as old paint, pesticides or cleaning products. Just call to arrange your delivery (3142 for the oil, 6202 for anything else), and you will already be making a big contribution toward reducing nonpoint source pollution in our area.

In addition, you can follow the directions given with pesticides and exercise caution when working with paints, strippers or any other chemical solvents. As a final suggestion, try to replace products containing hazardous chemicals with ones marked "Environmentally Safe" on the label. These products have been approved for normal disposal, and are properly considered "trash."

The good thing about all of this is that we have changed our habits before. As a nation, we have focused our attention on the declining health of our environment to the extent that problems are being addressed and, occasionally, even solved. If we sincerely want to stop this type of pollution, we can. If, on the other hand, we allow it to continue, the mess Iraq has left for the world may one day be dwarfed by the disaster we leave for our children.

He also manages 20 base agencies involved with the information security program.


"Sergeant Towe's 'can-do' attitude is contagious and his contributions to both the military and civilian communities have enhanced the Air Force image," said the captain.

# CCAF changes requirements

Three changes to Community College of the center; materials are available to help stuthe Air Force degree requirements went into effect last month, including a revision in the way College Level Examination Program test scores are credited.

The changes took effect Jan. 1 and make CCAF degrees more obtainable for many active-duty Air Force, Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve enlisted members, officials in the Reese Education Center said.

For CLEP tests, students will now be awarded credit at the recommended American Council on Education test score level, regardless of test date. Some students will now receive credit for CLEP tests previously taken but not accepted for CCAF degree

Another change increases the limit of testbased credit from 24 semester hours to 30. Testing is free to military members through dents prepare.

The third change to CCAF degree requirements is with the six semester hour leadership, management and military studies, or "LMMS," degree program component.

Any version of Noncommissioned Officer Leadership School or the four semester hour version of the NCO Academy by correspondence will satisfy the LMMS requirement in all current CCAF catalogs.

This is provided the student does not have any other LMMS credit at the time of registration.

Shortfalls in semester hour requirements must be satisfied through program electives.







#### Legal warns of conflicts

Everyone who is a member of the military will eventually leave the service in one way or another. When they do, the Reese Legal Office warns that there are many "legal landmines" for the unwary, some of which carry criminal penalties

Legal officials said that Air Force Regulation 30-30, which covers some of these laws, prohibits people from participating in their government capacity in any matter that they, their family, or an actual or potential future employer has a financial interest.

The regulation also discusses rules for pursuing employment. It states that people cannot participate in any matter on behalf of the government involving an organization with which that person is pursuing a job or has an arrangement concerning future employment, when that organization has a financial interest.

Legal officials added that this employment issue deals with both employment after leaving the Air Force as well as off-duty jobs while still with the service. Anyone with questions on this issue should call legal at 3505.

#### Refills available by phone

The pharmacy in the 64th Flying Training Wing Hospital now has a telephone prescription refill system.

To use the system, pharmacy customers should:

□ Call 6507, and give name, telephone number, name of the drug and the number of the prescription. Be sure to give the number of the most current prescription for that medication; older numbers get cancelled out of the system. There is no need to provide quantity or other prescription directions, hospital officials said.

☐ When picking up refills, bring the bottles/labels for the medication requested.

Once picked up, check the label for the number of refills left. Once they are used up, a new prescription will be required.

Refills called in before 9 p.m. will be ready after 10 a.m. the next day. Refills called in after 9 p.m. will take two duty days to complete. Any prescriptions not picked up within two days will be returned to stock.

#### Recruiters needed

All applicants should have between four and 16 years total active federal military service, meet a minimum physical profile, project outstanding appearance, bearing and con-

About 450 qualified noncommissioned officers are needed to enroll in recruiting school in fiscal 1991. So far, only 157 have graduated or have been scheduled to attend.
