

Prevention is key to eliminating burns, scalding in the kitchen

Imost every family has experienced some situation in which someone was scalded or was involved in a situation which had a burn risk potential.

Scald injuries, associated with the kitchen, are very common, and children and the elderly are most frequently the victims.

Children under the age of two are injured usually as the result of some other person's actions. As the child becomes older, the cause of injury is more commonly associated with their own action. A lack of experience, knowledge and understanding are commonly associated with these burn injuries.

Adults, especially the elderly, may encounter situations which present a burn risk as a result of not knowing that such a risk may exist. This is not often true among young families or in situations where people encounter items and equipment with which they are not familiar.

Injuries can be prevented and the risk-producing situations controlled. The following are some methods of addressing scald burn risk potentials in the kitchen.

☐ Keep all hot items at a safe distance from a child. Keep the child at a safe distance from all hot items by using playpens, high chairs, and the like.

☐ Create a safe zone for children! Keep pot handles turned in or to the back of the stove.

Use pot holders. Use pot mitts when picking up hot pots and pans.

☐ Secure loose sleeves with an elastic band or use short sleeve garments while cooking.

☐ Test all heated food before giving-it to a child or placing it within their reach.
☐ Read and follow the

directions especially when using microwave ovens and other appliances.

☐ Read the appliance manual and the directions for heating on the food package or container.

☐ Keep children out of the "traffic path" and check for their location before moving any hot or heavy item. Avoid deep-fat cooking when young children are present.

☐ Be sure to inform baby-sitters as to the safe use of any cooking appliance and caution them relative to procedures to prevent burn injuries when preparing meals.

☐ Elderly adults should be cautioned of the danger in lifting heavy pots of hot liquids from the stove that can fall and cause serious injury.

☐ If a sleeve catches on fire, immediately cover the burning sleeve with a towel, go to the sink and run cold water over the towel and sleeve.

☐ Children should not be allowed to use cooking or heating appliances until they are mature enough to understand safe-use procedures and tall enough to safely handle items and reach cooking surfaces.

☐ Periodically check all handles on appliances and cooking utensils to ensure that the handle is tightly fastened and will afford proper thermal protection.

☐ Where possible, arrange the kitchen so that hot items are not carried across the room or over areas where children may be present. The sink and cooking appliances should be adjacent to rather than opposite from each other.

Other fire safety items that should be adhered to are:

☐ Keep all appliances in proper working order, with all electrical cords free from any damage, cracks, breaks, splices and bare wires.

Heat producing appliances should have the thermostat properly set for the intended heating need and be properly positioned and supervised to prevent injury.

☐ Always unplug portable appliances such as coffee pots, toasters and crock pots to avoid possible electrical fires.

Automatic timers for coffee pots are not recommended due to the possibility of forgetting to unplug when leaving the home for extended periods of time.

Weep combustibles (paper towels, pot holders, food cartons) away from any appliance which produces

Housing offers alternatives

New program provides option for NCOs in unrenovated units

Many recent questions concerning base housing have prompted officials to take actions to minimize inconvenience to residents and personnel on waiting

The long standing rule of "first come first serve" has caused a situation where some families already living in base housing and therefore not on a waiting list are living in unrenovated three-bedroom units, while some new personnel with no children were moving into renovated three-bedroom units.

According to Maj. Per Korslund, base civil engineer, some categories of the base housing waiting lists are still long, but some lists, particularly the NCO 3bedroom list, are short enough to offer some personnel a new option.

"In an attempt to improve living conditions, more senior NCOs living in unrenovated houses will have the opportunity to move into renovated houses as the units become available," said Maj. Korslund. "This will also free up some of the units that have been designated as airmen's quarters."

Therefore, any technical sergeant qualified for a three-bedroom unit who is living in an unrenovated unit and is willing to do a self-help move at no cost to the government, will get a chance to go on the renovated three-bedroom waiting list.

According to Major Korslund, anyone in this category will need to sign up at the housing office by March 15, 1991.

Those choosing to participate will be placed on the waiting list in rank order as of midnight, March 15,

"As the units become available, these people will be offered two units. If the member declines both units, the member will be taken off the list permanently," he added.

"Additionally, those families on the two-bedroom list will still have an opportunity to get a three-bedroom house, but it will most likely be unrenovated," said the major. "If personnel on the two-bedroom list would rather have a renovated unit, they have the option of waiting for a renovated two-bedroom unit."

As the renovation winds down, other adjustments will be made depending on the need and housing assets.








The Reese Legal Office announced the following developments on the tax scene:

☐ The phrase "Desert Storm" written at the top of tax returns, envelopes or other tax correspondence will alert the Internal Revenue Service to the taxpayer's entitlement to

☐ The IRS will no longer require the special power of attorney (IRS Form 2848) or a general power of attorney to authorize someone besides the taxpayer to file a return. The revenue service will accept a signed statement from the taxpayer that authorizes another person to act on his or her behalf, even if tax matters are specified in that authorization.

In addition, if a spouse of a person at Desert Storm cannot get a signed authorization, the IRS will accept a written statement explaining that the spouse is serving in a combat zone. Such a statement should be signed and attached to the return.

Polls show flood of support

U.S. forces deployed to Operation Desert Storm have seen countless examples of the overwhelming public support they enjoy from their fellow Americans. But how do their fellow Americans feel about the war itself?

In polls conducted before the cease-fire by major American newspapers, the answer remains generally the same. Though the war effort does not rank quite as high as support for deployed service members themselves, the marks are still impressive.

For example, a Feb. 14 USA Today telephone poll of 601 American adults on various topics dealing with the Gulf War showed strong support for the allied effort.

When asked if they back President Bush's decision to start the war, 81 percent of those polled supported the decision, while 15 percent were opposed.

A similar Washington Post-ABC poll asked whether people approve or disapprove of the United States going to war with Iraq. Support remained steady. Seventy-six percent of those polled approved as of Jan. 16, 83 percent approved Jan. 18, 75 percent ap-

proved Jan. 27 and Feb. 10. And polls held Feb. 12 and Feb. 14 showed public approval of Operation Desert Storm at 78 percent.

Pollsters also asked about war coverage and received surprising results. When a Times-Mirror survey asked Americans whether they thought the military should increase restrictions on news reporting in the Gulf, the majority was in favor of tougher restrictions.

However, reporters protested, saying censorship could distort the public's view on what's really happening.

Seventy-eight percent believe the military is not hiding embarrassing issues, and is telling everything it can to the media. Of those surveyed, 57 percent said the military should increase control over the media. Only 16 percent said military censorship was a bad idea.

According to a poll on the media's coverage of the war, 50 percent of the people said they couldn't stop watching the coverage of the war on television. Twenty-one percent said they had trouble concentrating on their work and normal activities and 18 percent said they were suffering insomnia.

Approximately one-third of Americans restricted how much coverage of the war they let their children watch. Public opinion on broadcasting news from Baghdad censored by the Iraqi government showed 45 percent disapproved and 43 percent approved.

The support by the American people has been overwhelming, according to Secretary of Defense Dick Cheney. In a recent press conference, he said, "It has been, frankly, more extensive than I would have anticipated a few months ago. The extent to which the country has sort of pulled together behind the force that have been deployed to the Gulf, behind our young men and women in uniform, and President Bush's policy, has been something truly to behold."
