AF aligns pilot production with force structure

Already heralded for its performance in Operation Desert Storm, the Air Force pilot corps may become even more proficient as the service moves to more closely match its flying force with the fleet it flies.

On March 6 Air Force officials announced undergraduate pilot training program changes that parallel plans to eventually reduce the number of aircraft in the Air Force inventory by more than 25 percent. This includes the projected diversion of approximately 330 flight-school bound fiscal 1990 Air ROTC graduates to non-flying specialties.

Col. Bill Henny, 64th Flying Training Wing commander, said the decision to streamline the UPT program is a positive initiative taken to enhance combat capability and career opportunities while transitioning to a smaller, more efficient Air Force.

For example, the Air Force plans on reducing its tactical fighter force from 36 wings to 26.5 wings by fiscal 1995.

"As the number of aircraft draws down," said Colonel Henny, "You must maintain an equitable crew ratio. The changes in UPT will help us (the Air Force) sustain our Desert Storm level of proficiency by ensuring that aircrews get the flying time they need."

The reduction in force structure, combined with a reduction in non-flying staff requirements, will decrease the Air Force pilot requirement from more than 21,000 in fiscal 1990 to 16,500 by the end of fiscal 1997.

According to Air Force officials, this decrease in cockpits will trim the UPT production rate starting in fiscal 1992. The Air Force-wide fiscal years 1992 through 1995 rates will be reduced by as much as 270 graduates per year.

There are approximately 350 fiscal 1990 ROTC commissioned lieutenants currently awaiting entry into UPT. The decreased fiscal 1992 rate will only allow 30 of these officers to attend UPT. A board is meeting at Air Training Command headquarters, Randolph AFB, Texas, to select these 30 individuals.

Additionally, there are 1,070 ROTC cadets

who are UPT candidates scheduled to graduate in fiscals 1991 through 1992. Air Force ROTC headquarters will convene a board to select 590 cadets to receive flight school training. Individuals not selected to attend UPT will have the option of entering the Air Force in a non-rated career field or requesting a release from their service obligations.

ROTC scholarship cadets, however, may have to repay their scholarship costs to the Air Force if they wish to leave the service. In addition to the ROTC pilot accession reductions, similar reductions are being made in the Officer Training School, active-duty non-rated and navigator to UPT programs.

Another primary factor in reducing the UPT rate is the Air Force's desire to continue flying those pilots in deactivating units with less than nine years of continuous flying. There are approximately 1,500 pilots in this category and they will be absorbed into the remaining flying squadrons, the Air Force said.

Other avenues being addressed to ensure younger officers continue to fly include restricting the return of field grade officers to the cockpit and possibly grounding those officers with approved separation or retirement dates.

The Air Force will also place a limited number of young pilots in Air Reserve Component squadrons so they can continue to fly for another three years.

Other actions required to accommodate pilots from deactivating units include deferring 700 fiscal 1991 and 1992 UPT graduates to

non-rated duties for 24 to 36 months after graduation from UPT. During the remainder of this year, up to 400 UPT graduates will be placed in non-rated jobs. The other 300 will come from fiscal 1992 production.

The Air Force Military Personnel Center

and ATC are developing a gameplan for the 700 UPT graduates that will be placed in non-rated duties. MPC and ATC officials will be traveling to each ATC UPT base to brief students and offer them various options to help

From my perspective

As Air Training Command moves closer to the time for implementing Specialized Undergraduate Pilot Training, interest in the arrival of the T-1A Jayhawk is on the rise. Many of you would like firm dates so you can accurately plan your activities related to SUPT targets, so while the information in this column is current now, those of you whose planning requires accuracy should keep track of schedules on a continuing basis. Lt. Col. Claude Branscome (RMA) is the wing point of contact for implementation of SUPT. The Site Activation Task Force, led by Lt. Col. Bob Futoran, is responsible for coordinating all Air Force and contractor efforts related to SUPT implementation at Reese. Both of these people are excellent sources of current information.



One of the biggest events of the year at Reese will be the arrival of the first T-1A Jayhawk this fall. A lot of effort is being exerted to ensure that the aircraft shows up on schedule this September. Once the aircraft arrives, it will undergo acceptance checks. When these are finished, the Qualification Operation Test and Evaluation Team will start dedicated QOT&E, which is scheduled to run through January 1992. The purpose of dedicated QOT&E is "to evaluate the operational effectiveness and suitability of the T-1A aircraft and simulator and identify deficiencies that would impact student pilot training." In other words, the team will evaluate how effective the aircraft is for training students as well as how easy or difficult it is to maintain.

In February 1992, the follow-on OT&E team will begin their evaluation. They will continue to collect some of the same types of data that was collected for QOT&E, evaluate modifications, refine estimates and make recommendations on how best to employ the system. "System" is a key word here because unlike the QOT&E Team the FOT&E team will evaluate the entire training system, including aircraft, simulator and syllabus, and will also look at actual student training with the new system. FOT&E should be finished in late 1993.

In April 1992, the initial cadre of 23 instructor pilots will begin flying Jayhawks at Reese (after factory training) to increase their proficiency and ensure that instructor and student training procedures are properly developed and integrated into the Reese environment. They will then train the first class of T-1 instructor pilots starting in June 1992. These instructors will begin training the first class of student pilots in the T-1 during September 1992. With the start of this class, Reese will have begun the advanced phase of SUPT for the command.

It will take a lot of work and preparation by a lot of people to make this program start smoothly. For example, Lockheed people will have to become proficient at maintaining the aircraft, operations will have to develop procedures to handle the new aircraft safely and effectively with the T-37 and T-38, and there will be a lot of construction associated with the aircraft and simulator. Almost everybody at Reese will be affected to some degree, and everybody's contribution will be important.

America's new heroes

Twenty-three years ago, a soldier in Army uniform hobbled through Grand Central Station in New York, clutching a cane with one hand, his dad with the other. He had just returned from Vietnam, where he had been so badly wounded by bullets and mortar fragments that he had received last rites. As he slowly wended through the station, a well-dressed woman swept out of the crowd to greet him in the spirit of the time: with filthy shouts and a vile stream of spit.

That incident left an imprint so deep on John Wickham that he, like many other officers of his generation, dedicated himself to restoring the reputation and esprit of the armed forces. Wickham rose through the ranks to win four stars and to serve as Army chief of staff before retiring. The task of rebuilding was not easy, especially during the 1970s, when drugs and desertions were everywhere and cutbacks created a "hollow army" whose planes wouldn't fly and ships couldn't sail. But in the late Carter years and then in the Reagan years, the turnaround came, and today, Wickham and company can take enormous pride in what they have achieved.

America now has a new military — and suddenly, gratefully, it has new heroes, too. President Bush's State of the Union address was less a speech than a happening, as his audience exploded in wave after wave of applause for the troops. A Washington Post poll reveals that public confidence in the military has soared to 85 percent, far surpassing that of every other institution in our society. Even the protestors have decided to oppose the war but support the warriors.

The extraordinary accuracy of precision-made weapons is obviously part of

the allure. They restore our faith in American technology after years of watching helicopters fall from the skies, the cost of a military toilet seat hit \$600 and a forlorn soldier in Grenada had to call collect to the States so that he could communicate with troops down the beach. But the heart of the transformation is in the people themselves — the calm, decisive manner of Generals Colin Powell and Norman Schwarzkopf and the cool professionalism of the men and women in the field. Col. Ray Davies summed it up, watching F-15 pilots in Saudi Arabia: "It's like the Dallas Cowboys in their heyday. They weren't a real emotional

team; they just got the job done."

Today, smart weapons are now matched with smart people. Today's officer can expect to spend at least 18 months of his first five years in the classroom. A study by the Center for Creative Leadership in North Carolina found that 88 percent of brigadier generals have at least a master's degree, compared with 19 percent of top corporate executives.

Among enlistees, 98 percent are high-school graduates, compared with 75 percent among civilians of comparable age. To stay in the service, a recruit must also go back to school: The Army demands a year of additional training, for example, before a soldier can fire a Patriot missile. Scholar Larry Korb points out that because the force is all-volunteer, enlistments last longer (average of four years vs. two under the draft) and re-enlistments are up (50 percent vs. 10 percent). As a result, enlistees stay in a unit long enough to bond with their compatriots. Moreover, the military has lifted racial bars so that African-Americans

can rise to the top — without benefit of racial preferences.

There are lessons here for all of us. If our military is successful because it provides equal opportunity and achieves personal loyalty within the ranks, why can't our major companies? If military officers learn how to compete by re-educating themselves, why can't our CEOs? Training, good management, discipline, community: These are the values that should take root across the nation.

We should not welcome our new warriors because we want a new militarism. Exactly the opposite. In his book "Iron John," poet Robert Bly writes of our loss of heroes since the 1960s. We need to regain them, he says, so that in admiring their best virtues, each of us growing up can eventually become an "inner warrior," able to stand up for what is right in a decent, peaceful society. Tips to help lower cholesterol

Several factors have been linked to heart disease. Among them are high blood cholesterol levels, high blood pressure, diabetes, family history of heart disease and obesity.

The following may raise the risk of heart disease: smoking, stress, physical inactivity and excessive consumption of fat, saturated fat, cholesterol and sodium.

If you have decided that eating moderate amounts of fat and cholesterol is right for you, you'll need to know which foods are sources of fat, saturated fat and cholesterol. Most of the total fat and saturated fats in the American diet comes from fats and oils, meat and poultry and dairy products. Most of the cholesterol we eat comes from eggs, meat, poultry, shellfish and dairy products.

Cholesterol is found only in animal products. Don't be taken in when you see products such as cooking oils advertised as being cholesterol-free, because all vegetable

oils are cholesterol-free. Vegetable products can be high in fat; especially saturated fat.

Although coconut and palm oils are cholesterol free, they are extremely high in saturated fat, which is a major contributor to elevated blood cholesterol levels.

Also, unsaturated liquid oils which have been hydrogenated (a process of adding hydrogen) become more saturated. Examples of hydrogenated oils are stick margarines, vegetable shortening and in foods containing these fats. Reading food labels carefully can help you avoid these oils.

The National Institutes of Health recommend that you aim for a blood cholesterol level no higher than 200 milligrams per deciliter. If you have a diagnosed cholesterol level above this limit, you may benefit from a therapeutic diet. Your physician can refer you to the Nutritional Medicine Clinic for a cholesterol restricted dietary instruction.

All Reese active duty members, dependents and retirees can have their blood-cholesterol levels checked at the 64th Flying Training Wing Hospital laboratory at any time. No appointment is needed.

How much light is right?

If you are like most Americans, you overlight your home. More than 16 percent of the electricity we use around the house goes into wasted lighting.

If you turn off unnecessary lights, or dim the lights you are using, you can save yourself or the government quite a bit on your electric bills each year.

Here are a few ways to save electricity and money inside the home:

□ Light-zone the house and save electricity. Concentrate lighting in reading and working areas and where it's needed for safety (stairwells, for example). Reduce lighting in other areas, but avoid very sharp contrasts.

□ To reduce overall lighting in non-working spaces, remove one bulb out of three in multiple bulb fixtures and replace it with a burned out bulb for safety. Replace other bulbs throughout the house with bulbs of the next lower wattage.

□ Consider installing solid-state dimmers or high-low

switches when replacing light switches. They make it easy to reduce lighting intensity in a room and thus save energy.

□ Use one large bulb instead of several small ones in areas where bright light is needed.

□ When buying new lamps, consider the advantages of those with three-way switches. They make it easy to keep lighting levels low when intense light is not necessary, and that saves electricity. Use the high switch only for reading or other activities that require brighter light.

□ Always turn three-way bulbs down to the lowest lighting level when watching television. You'll reduce the glare and use less energy.

□ Use fluorescent lights whenever possible. They give out more lumens per watt. Consider fluorescent lighting for the kitchen sink and countertop areas. Fluorescent lighting in these areas is pleasant and energy efficient.

□ Keep all lamps and lighting fixtures clean. Dirt absorbs light. (Strategic Air Command News Service)

and the flying training ("top stick") award.

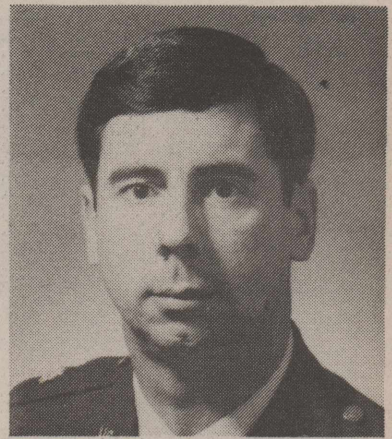
The academics award for the class was earned by Capt. Phillip Hoover. Captain Hoover was also a distinguished graduate.

Captain Lloyd Beasley captured the leadership award.

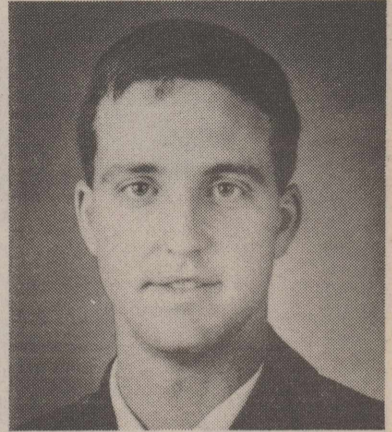
Second Lt. Bryan Radliff was awarded the citizenship award, while 2nd Lt. Eric Cain was chosen as the class's outstanding second lieutenant.

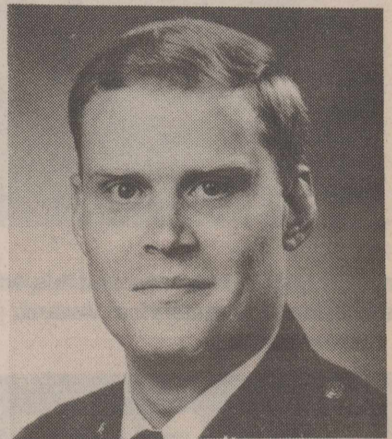

the Air Force meet its goal.

"You can't sustain a healthy force with too many pilots," added Colonel Henny. "Just as you can't sustain the force with too few. These changes will allow us to produce pilots based on what the Air Force can absorb."

The colonel explained that producing fewer pilots than required is actually healthier than producing too many. This allows the Air Force to maximize utilization of the pilot force.

"These rated management actions

are necessary now if we are going to maintain a stable and combat-ready force in the future," said Colonel Henny.

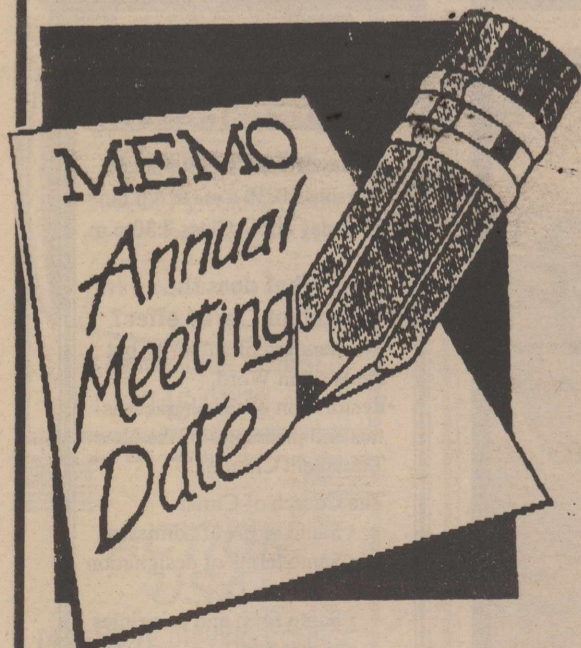

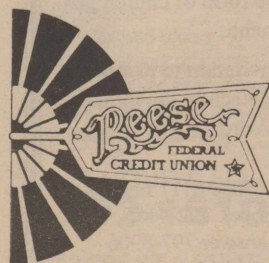

AF Assistance Fund drive underway

Reese's 1991 goal set at \$14,944

About \$18 million went to more than 28,000 Air Force people in interest-free loans or grants from the Air Force Aid Society in 1990. Also impressive was the \$64,327 that helped 113 people in the Reese community last year.

The money, used in emergency situations, paid for rent, food, utilities, funeral expenses and other essential services. Additionally, over 95 percent of the emergency assistance went to technical sergeants and below last year.

The Air Force Aid Society (AFAS), the official charity of the United States Air Force, continued to live up to its charter of helping Air Force people in times of financial need. Through the end of 1990, AFAS sections reported 1,000 cases of financial emergencies attributed to Desert Shield, and it continued throughout Desert Storm.

The mission of the Air Force Aid Society remains unchanged...to help Air Force people and their families. As world events and local economic shifts occur, the society will be there to help and explore new ways to help Air Force people.

The true thanks and appreciation from donations comes from the nearly 29,000 people assisted in 1990 and the hundreds of thousands who have been helped over the past 48 years. Your donation does make a difference.

The society also offers other services for Air Force people. It is offering academic assistance to Air Force members and their families. One program is the AFAS Academic Grant. Under this program, students may receive a \$1,000 grant to help them defray undergraduate college costs.

Legal warns of conflicts

Everyone who is a member of the military will eventually leave in one way or another. When they do, the Reese Legal Office warns that there are many "legal landmines" for the unwary, some of which carry criminal penalties.

Legal officials said that Air Force Regulation 30-30, which covers some of these laws, prohibits people from participating in their government capacity in any matter that

they, their family, or an actual or potential future employer has a financial interest.

The regulation also discusses rules for pursuing employment. It states that people cannot participate in any matter on behalf of the government involving an organization with which that person is pursuing a job or has an arrangement concerning future employment, when that organization has a financial interest.

Legal officials added that this employment issue deals with both employment after leaving the Air Force as well as off-duty jobs while still with the service. Anyone with questions on this issue should call legal at 3505.

Rental discrimination illegal

The Fair housing Act of 1988 requires all landlords to discontinue discrimination of children in all of their rental properties. Effective March 12, 1989, children will be accepted in all rental housing in the United States.

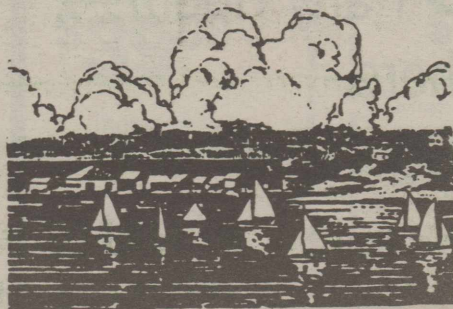

On this Day...

The following dates mark significant events in ATC and Air Force history.

March 13, 1961

Class 62-F reports to Air Training Command's seven undergraduate pilot training bases. This is the first class to receive all phases of undergraduate training at a single base and is the outcome of a reorganization of UPT and the end of contract primary flying training.

March 16, 1916

Capt. T. F. Dodd, pilot, and Captain Foulois, an observer, in a Curtiss airplane, make the first American military reconnaissance flight when they fly from Columbus, N.M., over Mexican territory in pursuit of Pancho Villa.

March 17, 1961

ATC receives its first T-38 Talon, tail number 195.

March 23, 1960

The last class of officers enters pilot pre-flight training at Lackland AFB, Texas. The ground training course was shortened and integrated into pilot and navigator courses at other bases.

March 26, 1941

The Air Corps Technical Training Command is established at Chanute Field. The Technical Training and Flying Training Commands merge July 7, 1943, to form the Army Air Forces Training Command, the predecessor to ATC.

March 30, 1962

Twenty-five students in Class 62-FZ complete a T-38 test program at Randolph AFB. These are the first students to receive their wings at Randolph, excluding Class 42X, an experimental program in 1942.

Construction of Lubbock Army Flying School now Reese Air Force Base, Texas began in late 1941. The base has been known by several names: from June 26, 1941, until February 6, 1942, it was the Air Corps Flying School, Lubbock; then the Lubbock Army Flying School until April 26, 1943. At that time, the name changed to the Lubbock Army Air Field.

The base retained that until it was closed on December 31, 1945. On October 5, 1949, the base was officially reactivated as a multi-engine pilot training base, with the name Lubbock Air Force Base. This was quickly changed to Reese Air Force Base, and a formal dedication ceremony was held January 22, 1950, to officially recognize the new name.
