return for a second time.



The reorganization of Reese's 64th Civil Engineering Squadron has allowed quality improvements to be made in how we perform our peacetime and wartime missions.

In order to provide quality service, we have now decentralized the maintenance sections and have rearranged them geographically. Previously, the civil engineering maintenance shops were organized by craft. There were separate shops for carpentry, plumbing, sheet metal, electrical, heating and air conditioning and power production, to name a few. Unfortunately, most jobs required the services of two or more shops. Work orders had to be resubmitted and routed back through the system. This unwieldy procedure caused a considerable waste of time and resources, not to mention the frustration and aggravation for our people and our customers. The reorganization has solved these problems.

We essentially divided the squadron into three sections, facility maintenance, infrastructure support and heavy repair. These new sections are multi-crafted and are designed to provide our customer with one-stop services. Our craftsmen are undergoing exhaustive training to become qualified in the multifaceted craft disciplines. Now, the same craftsman who comes to repair the hole in your wall can also repair the light switch and the leaky faucet. Most maintenance jobs will be handled by the facility maintenance section, which is divided into three area maintenance units.

With each AMU assigned to provide services for a specific area, pride in ownership and stricter accountability in now possible. Our AMU's are providing one-on-one, personalized service to our customers. In doing so, we provide a greater level of customer service, with the same manpower and equipment resources.

The reorganization also enhances our wartime operational readiness. The wartime tasking of civil engineering calls for multi-skilled personnel and units similar to the ones formed under the new system. Our peacetime operations and training now mirror our wartime operations. This allows for a quicker transition from a peacetime to a wartime posture, and for an overall increase in unit

Is this new infrastructure meeting our goals and your expectations? An overwhelming majority of our customers say they are extremely satisfied with the new service. The newly formed AMUs are working hard to serve the needs of our customers. Please help us continue to improve our process by completing a customer service survey whenever one of our craftsmen completes a job for you.

'85/15 rule' says improve system, not the workers

There is a widely held belief that an organization would have few, if any, problems if only workers would do their jobs correctly. As quality management consultant Dr. Joseph M. Juran pointed out years ago, this belief is incorrect.

In fact, the potential to eliminate mistakes and errors lies mostly in improving the systems through which work is done, not in changing the

This observation has evolved into the rule of thumb that at least 85 percent of problems can only be corrected by changing systems (which are largely determined by management) and less than 15 percent are under a worker's control — and the split may

lean even more toward the system.

For example, a production line worker cannot do a top quality job when working with faulty tools or parts; a surgical nurse cannot do a good job with gloves that do not fit.

Even when it does appear that an individual is doing something wrong, often the trouble lies in how that worker was trained, which is a system problem.

Once people recognize that systems create the majority of problems, they will stop blaming individual workers. They will instead ask which system needs improvement, and will be more likely to seek out and find the true source of a problem. (Courtesy of the "Team Handbook")

Are you registered to vote?

As we approach the November presidential election, many people are beginning to take an interest in registering and voting. However, to vote, you must first register.

Registering is actually very simple and takes only about five minutes or less to do. The first step is to check your leave and earnings statement to determine what your legal state of residency is. If it is any other state than Texas, you must register to vote by absentee ballot. Contact your unit voting officer and they will get you the form and help you fill it out. You will get a response from your state within 60 days giving you confirmation of registration. Thirty days prior to election date, they will mail you the absentee ballot for each election you wish to vote in as identified on the registration application.

If the state of residency on your LES is Texas, and you do not live in Lubbock County, register to vote as previously described as an out-of-state registrant. You will be sent a registration confirmation card and absentee ballots from that county.

If Texas is your state of residency and you live in Lubbock County, you can obtain the proper registration form from Maj. Gary Tucker, wing voting representative, or 2nd Lt. Diane Higginbothem. This form will allow you to register by mail, however, you will have to vote in person in the precinct you currently live in. You will receive voter registration confirmation which will identify your precinct. You will need to take it with you when you vote.


Three sergeants return from NCO Academy



"It's rewarding to the individual," said the chief, "but it's also very rewarding to the Air Force."


During the course, the students learn leadership and management skills, personality traits, communication, leadership styles and management and supervisory skills.





Reese CFC goal set at \$82,000

The 1992 Combined Federal Campaign will kick off with an 11:30 a.m. luncheon Thursday in the Officers' Open Mess. Glenn Cochran, president, United Way of Lubbock, is the scheduled speaker.

After a thorough review of the base organizational manning levels, Col. David Love, wing commander, announced the wing's goal of \$82,000. Colonel Love noted that a reduction in the base's total worker population has resulted in the reduction from last year's goal.

"Based on Reese's high participation rates in previous CFCs (approaching 70 percent overall), I anticipate we will meet and very likely exceed this goal," said Colonel Love. "Our CFC is an opportunity for everyone at Reese to shine as they provide opportunities to and extend kindness toward members of our society who truly need us."

The CFC was developed in response to employee wishes for a single annual charity campaign, to reduce administrative expenditures, to permit voluntary payroll withholding for contributions and to better support charitable organizations. Through the CFC, wing members can provide assistance to a great number of people in a variety of ways. For example, many youth organizations, such as the Reese Youth Center, benefit directly from the campaign.

Donations may be made by cash, check or payroll deduction. Individuals can also designate the agency or agencies (up to five) that will receive the donation. Nearly 900 national agencies sand federations are listed in this year's CFC brochure. Many deserving Lubbock organizations, approved by the Lubbock Federal Coordinating Committee, are also included.

Undesignated contributions will be distributed by the United Way of Lubbock.

Certificates will be given to squadrons that have 65 percent total participation or 25 percent on level II (individuals donating one hour's pay per month for one year). Those individuals contributing at level II will also receive a CFC mug.

The campaign will run through Oct. 30.
