Coming out of World War II, our leaders recognized the distinct capabilities of airpower. Air Force people like you have been demonstrating those capabilities daily for more than four decades.



Vho will you vote for this election?

OK, so now you have decided to make the big move. You're committed to vote and you've sent in the absentee ballot request. The only problem is, who do you pick to lead our nation for the next four

Information on the various candidates is available to help you make your decision.

The best source, bar none, is the candidate himself. If already an elected official, direct contact is easy. You can call or write directly to their office. I can assure you, they are not shy about responding to your inquiries. You can also call the voting information center. Commercially, the number is (703) 693-6500; the DSN number is 223-6500. In addition to leaving your own message, you can listen to recorded messages from governors, senators and representatives.

Now the tough part: What about those attempting to gain office? By contacting the local party office of those running, you can learn their names, addresses, phone numbers and positions on issues.

For the more obscure candidates, such as minor officials in distant lands with towns yet to be listed on the Rand McNally road map, you have to dig a bit more. Your best bet in this case is to look in local newspapers and magazines. Hometown family members are also a wonderful source of information, so now's a good time to call up good ol' Aunt Sarah. Remember her? She's the one with all the answers to world problems and is not afraid to tell you. Every family has an Aunt Sarah.

Finally, don't ask your unit voting representatives for candidate information. Sound odd? It's not actually; if we advised where candidate X stood on issue Y, we'd have to do it for every single candidate known to man. We simply don't have that kind of information. We'll get you registered, but you'll be the one making the decision. Your voice can be heard - just vote.

Some political involvement prohibited

Military personnel must be aware of some things they are prohibited from getting involved with in an election. They are:

☐ Allow or cause to be published partisan political articles.

☐ Serve in an official capacity or sponsor a partisan political club.

☐ Participate in any media or group discussions as a partisan advocate.

Conduct a political opinion survey.

☐ March or ride in a partisan political parade. ☐ Display a large political sign, banner or

poster on your private vehicle; however, a bumper sticker is permissible.

Participate in any partisan effort to transport voters to the polls.

☐ Attend partisan political events as an official representative of the Armed Forces.

Quality Air Force

In the Quality Air Force, the focus is on improving products and services by improving how work gets done (the methods) instead of simply what is done (the results).

An example of this is the Process Action Team recently started at the 64th Medical Squadron, led by Capt. Karen House, officer in charge of lab services. The team is looking at the procedures used to process lab results. This is a typical QAF attempt to improve the way in which work is done in order to better meet customers' needs.

We tend to think of organizations as places where countless tasks get done: putting labels on envelopes, tightening the screws on a component, calling customers and on and on. The QAF challenges us to look at these tasks in a new light, to think of them as steps in a process. Precisely how did the address get on the label? Where did the envelope come from and how did it get there?

We can define a process by grouping in sequence all the tasks directed at accomplishing one particular outcome. Examples are the steps in producing a product, hiring or training a new employee, or filling an order. In this light, we begin to see that every activity is part of a process, and there are thousands upon thousands of processes in every organization.

This idea may not seem as glamorous as other quality improvement concepts, but thinking in terms of processes is perhaps the most profound change that occurs during the transformation to quality culture. Whole new insights open up when you begin to see tasks as related series of events. You start to see how jobs throughout your organization are related. You can focus your thinking: since your organization works through processes, you can only improve your work by improving processes. Better processes mean

better quality, which means greater productivity.

Workers can define starting and ending points to a process, and figure out what has to happen in between to make the product or create the service they want. They will be able to focus on errors, waste, and other problems, and determine what data will help them improve the effectiveness of this collection of tasks. And they will have a better idea of where to look for solutions. "What do we want to get out of this process? What must we do to get from one point to the other? What do we do that is necessary to reach our goals? Which steps are unnecessary? Where do we run into problems?"

People who view work as processes understand how the quality of what comes out is largely determined by the quality of what goes in. How well employees can do their jobs depends on the quality of products or services they receive: an assembler depends on the parts manufacturers, typists depend on people who write the documents, the payroll manager depends on information from supervisors, and everyone depends on the policies, methods, tools, and equipment provided by managers.

If a series of related tasks can be called a process, a group of related processes can then be seen as a system. Selling a product, for example, is a system that involves thousands of interrelated processes. If a PAT feels overwhelmed by its assignment at first, perhaps it is being asked to study a system instead of a process. Unless such a team narrows the project's focus, it stands a good chance of getting mired down and never making any progress. A PAT should study only one process at a time; the only exception is where there are two or three processes that are so closely related it would be difficult to study them separately. 



New system to improve long distance service

Some recent changes in procedures for making long distance telephone calls will not only save the Air Force money, but will upgrade services and reliability.

One of the four scheduled upgrade projects involved moving long distance telephone service from commercial companies to the Federal Telephone Service 2000 system. The purpose of this network service is to combine all Department of Defense organizations under one long distance contractor. The new system offers the base a greater capability of conducting business using long distance service with 22 outgoing lines instead of two.

Another change is that after Sept. 8, base personnel could no longer dial 49 or 79 to receive a long distance outgoing line. The 79 access has been reinstated to make 1-800 calls. The other way to receive a long distance line is by dialing our local access of 89 plus an access code. Key personnel will receive an access code from their unit Telephone Control

Office so they can dial long distance.

The second upgrade, which occurred Monday, involved grouping our Defense Switch Network, formerly AUTOVON, lines into a large capacity digital circuit. As all the bases convert their lines, customers should notice improved clarity when using DSN.

The final two upgrades will involve Internal Switch Voice Service and the Armed Forces Network.

ISVS will provide Reese the capability to call anywhere in the world. This will accommodate personnel to make necessary communications in order to take on the mission at

AFNET is similar to the DSN upgrade, but deals mainly with regrouping our digital point-to-point circuits. This program will save the Air Force money and increase reliability of the system.

The bottom line is communications are moving ahead using the principles of economyof-scale to not only save money but upgrade



Training our own

Reese leads off in T-1A PIT

Reese entered its next phase with the Air Force's newest trainer aircraft, the T-1A, when it began training instructor pilots in the T-1A Sept. 8 following the "Start Training Readiness Review" held here Aug. 28.

The STRR looked at the status of the T-1A aircraft and related equipment and support systems. According to Lt. Col. Bob Futoran, commander of the Site Activation Task Force here, the T-1A Systems Programs Office from Aeronautical Systems Center and members of the McDonnell-Douglas team briefed command officials on the T-1A's status and readiness to begin IP

"We discussed what needs to be done on the aircraft, as well as the maturity of the simulators and courseware," Colonel Futoran said. "The end result was that although the system is still growing, there was nothing to stop us from beginning IP training."

Reese will conduct its own pilot instructor training until Randolph AFB, Texas, takes over responsibility. PIT at Randolph is expected to get their T-1As next spring, and they should begin training instructors in fall 1993.

In the meantime, Reese will train all instructors locally. The initial instructors will come mostly from IPs already at Reese, as well as IPs from Williams AFB, Ariz., which is closing.

The review was attended by representatives from the wing, Hq. ATC Operations, Hq. ATC Plans and Programs, Aeronautical Systems Center, McDonnell-Douglas, Beech Aircraft and Quintron.

Homestead regroups in wake of Andrew

Homestead AFB, Fla., will temporarily move to Shaw AFB, S.C., in the latest Homestead unit move following Hurricane Andrew which struck Aug. 24.

Homestead was virtually destroyed during the storm which packed winds in excess of 140 mph. The president announced Sept. 1 that Homestead

The 726th Air Control Squadron, would be rebuilt, however, cost figures and a timeframe for the reconstruction have not been determined.

> The 726th Air Control Squadron's primary function is air defense management and air traffic identification. They also assist in air rescue opera-

The unit will continue to provide

radar control for 9th Air Force operations as well as training for F-16s assigned to Shaw's 363rd Fighter Wing.

The 309th Fighter Squadron from Homestead has been moved to Shaw. Shaw was chosen as a relocation site because it has the facilities and space necessary for equipment storage and the necessary housing in the local area.

Homestead's 307th and 308th Fighter Squadrons have been temporarily moved to Moody AFB, Ga. The 31st Fighter Wing will remain at Home-

In its second week of relief operations, the Air Force continues to fly equipment and supplies into South Florida, which took the brunt of the storm and suffered an estimated \$30 billion in damages.

Air Mobility Command C-5, C-141, C-130 and KC-135 aircraft have flown 344 missions, transporting 4,645 passengers and 7,735 tons of cargo into the area. Meanwhile, in the Pacific, AMC is ferrying tons of relief supplies to Guam, which sustained heavy damage when Typhoon Omar struck Aug. 27. (Air **Force News Service)**







Sept. 25 — The Officers Open Mess will be the setting for this year's Cultural Show at 8 p.m. with a dance to follow. A brief cultural background on the clothing worn by a few representative Hispanic countries will be given. Students from the Texas Tech Mexican American Student Organization will serve as models.
