



Reese jets won't have far to go for Top Flight IV, as the base plays host to the competition. Members of the 64th Logistics Squadron's fuel flight refuel a T-37. Several wing agencies will provide support during Top Flight IV.

Reese to host Top Flight IV

Aircrews and maintenance personnel from seven ATC flying wings will participate in Top Flight IV here Nov. 12 and 13.

Reese's selection as the host site for Top Flight IV was announced by ATC officials earlier this week.

"Hosting Top Flight provides a tremendous opportunity for this wing to demonstrate to its peers — the other ATC flying wings — the type of professionalism that thrives here. This kind of competition generates enthusiasm and esprit de corps throughout the command," said Col. David Love, wing commander.

Reese will host pilots from across ATC. Participating bases include Reese; Columbus AFB, Miss.; Mather AFB, Calif.; Williams AFB, Ariz; Vance AFB, Okla; Laughlin AFB, Texas and Sheppard AFB, Texas.

T-43 and T-41 participants will not compete at Reese. Evaluators will judge the T-43s at their base, but Mather's T-37 pilots will compete here. The 1st Flight Screening Squadron's T-41 aircraft and personnel will be evaluated at Hondo Airport, Texas

Approximately 46 pilots and aircraft and 58 maintenance personnel will participate in the two-day event. The Reese con-

tingent will include: four pilots from the 54th Flying Training Squadron and four from the 35th FTS. There will also be 10 maintenance personnel from Lockheed on the team.


"We will find out who will be selected to represent the 64th Flying Training Wing on Monday," said Lt. Col. Phillip Romanowicz, Reese's Top Flight IV coordinator.

"Since the flight commanders and pilots are selected randomly, Top Flight truly tests how our people operate day-to-day," said Lt. Gen. Joseph W. Ashy, ATC commander. "With the quality people, training and aircraft we have in ATC, I expect the competition to be spirited and keen. Each year teams exceed previous levels of performance while creating new and higher standards to shoot for. We wish all participants good luck ... you are all winners."

The arrival competition will be on Thursday with the aircraft inspection competition slated for late Thursday afternoon. The remainder of the competition will be on Friday, said Colonel Romanowicz.

According to ATC officials, Top Flight has three objectives. It focuses attention on the flight

Military, civic groups come together for parade

The 1992 Veteran's Day parade, set for Saturday, will feature many active-duty military, veteran's and civic organizations

The U.S. 4th Cavalry, Legion of Honor, Ex-POWs, Order of Purple Hearts and Veterans of Foreign Wars are but a few of the more than 35 groups involved in the parade. The Reese Color Guard will lead the parade.

Tools for making decisions

Last week's Quality Air Force article described "brainstorming." The result of a brainstorming session is a list of ideas. If this list is too long, the team can boil it down using one of the decisionmaking tools.

Then try this tool:

Pairwise Ranking

Force Field Analysis

Nominal Group Technique

Multi-Voting

How to select a tool for making decisions

If you need to... Find the important items in a list

(for group use)

Prioritize items in a short list (for group or individual use)

Prioritize the items in a list

Measure your process against another Benchmarking Identify significant influences

Multi-Voting

What it is:

Multi-voting is a quick and easy way for a group to find the items of the highest priority in a list. This technique helps you:

· Prioritize a large list without creating a "win-lose" situation in the group that generated the list.

· Separate the "vital few" items from the "trivial many" on a large list.

How to do it:

Empower. Give each team member a number of votes equal to approximately half the number of items on the list (e.g., 10 votes for a 20-item list).

Vote. Have the members vote individually for the items they believe have high priority.

Compile the votes given to each item. You can put a mark beside each item for every vote it receives.

Select the top four to six items. Discuss and prioritize these items relative to each other. If you can't establish the top four to six, remove from the list the items that have the fewest votes and then conduct another vote.

Multi-Voting Example

Members of a system program office attended a lot of meetings at different locations around the country. The meetings were not always as productive as they might have been, so the division chiefs called a meeting in hope of improving the situation. A brainstorming session produced the following list:





Roundup, photographer win ATC honors

The Roundup and a member of its staff took first places in the annual ATC newspaper contest.

The Roundup took first place in its category among other command newspapers that average less than 24 pages each week. In addition, Sgt. Greg Spraggins took first place in an individual category for photos supporting a story. He also took second place in sportswriting.


The contest was judged by three journalistic experts - Dr. David Nelson, professor of journalism at Southwest Texas State University; David Tarrant, military reporter for the San Antonio Light; and retired Col. Charles Tucker, former director of advertising and publicity for Hq. Air Force Recruiting Service.

Judges' comments about the Roundup included praise for the "consistent style" of the paper and cited features as "the strongest part of the paper.'

Sergeant Spraggins' work received equal praise. In addition to the way he matched his photos to the stories they accompanied, they cited his innovations.





Construction projects continue on base

By now you have noticed construction on base is proceeding at full speed. Several of these projects are proceeding on schedule and several more will begin in November. These will affect access to some facilities and close some of our normal routes.

Construction will begin Monday on a project to repair Haye Drive (the road from the Industrial-or Golf Coursegate to Hangar Line Road; see map at right). This project will be divided into two phases. During both phases, thru traffic will be blocked. During Phase I, the only access from the industrial gate will be to the golf course parking lot. Traffic to MWR logistics and recreational vehicle parking must use Perimeter Road north of the water and waste plant. Upon completion of Phase I, Haye Drive will be closed from the perimeter road to Seventh Street. During Phase II, traffic entering the industrial gate will have access to the golf course parking lot and MWR facilities. Construction will last approximately 120 days. Please note, all traffic to the base must enter and exit using the main gate. Allot extra time accordingly.

Construction will also begin on a project to re-route Seventh Street (see map at right). Phase I of this project will close Seventh Street from "C" Street to "E" Street. Phase II will be from "E" Street to Gilbert Avenue. An opening will be provided to allow traffic access to Reese Manor and Bldg. 629 during both phases

of construction. Traffic to the main exchange and commissary will enter and depart from Gilbert Ave. Access to the park and playground will be from "G" Street during Phase I, and "C" Street during Phase II. Please drive carefully in these areas.

Alteration of Hangar 70 and repair of South Hangarline Road will decrease parking in the area around Hangars 52 and 70. Alternate parking for affected areas will be provided at the parking lot located at the intersection of 1st Street and Hangarline Road. For further information, please contact engineering flight at 3916.

On Nov. 16, work will begin on a project to resurface six hangar floors. Hangar 52 is slated to be the first facility for resurfacing. This facility will be done in two phases due to the volume of traffic in the building. After completion of Phase I of Hangar 52, the following schedule will be followed: Hangar 82, Phase II of Hangars 52, 50, 60, 92, and 70.


The floors being resurfaced will not be in use during the process and because of safety considerations, the facilities should not be entered by base personnel while work is in progress. Civil engineering is coordinating this project with the wing aircraft maintenance organizations. Personnel working in these facilities should contact their supervisors if they have any questions.


A major roofing project will also begin in the family housing area (see map at right). This project will involve reshingling the roofs on 77 houses. In addition, 34 of these units will have their carport roofs modified with a gable-end roof.

Every effort will be made to reduce the impact to the residents. Occupants will be notified at least two days in advance before work starts on their house. During the dates of construction, please: remove all personal items from carport and

driveway (attached carports only), secure any pets, and do not ask the contractor to do additional work on your unit. If you have any questions, please contact the family housing office at 3912.

Dear Carolyn:

My child was treated the first week in October in an local hospitals in Lubbock. additional information, Even though I met my family deductible in August, I was charged for the deductible again. How can I be charged for another deductible?

The CHAMPUS deductible is applied on a fiscal year basis, or Oct. 1 through Sept. 30. Therefore since your child received care the first week in October, the charges were applied towards your 1993 deductible.

Dear Carolyn:

My wife was recently seen in the emergency room at Reese and transferred downtown for additional treatment. I don't

understand why I am responsible for any portion of the bill when my wife was seen at Reese first. I am retired Air


When any dependent or retiree is transferred to a civilian hospital for additional treatment the charges are the patient's responsibility. The hospitals in Lubbock will file Primary Health Insurance, CHAMPUS or Medicare for you, but the patient will be responsible for their cost share. The only patients Reese AFB is responsible for paying for is the active duty person. If you need please feel free to stop by the CHAMPUS office.

Dear Carolyn:

I recently took my child to a civilian pediatrician for immunizations and CHAMPUS did not pay, but rather disallowed the charges. The CHAMPUS handbook says immunizations are covered. My child is 3.

Immunizations and well baby care are covered by CHAMPUS, but only when the child is under 2 years of age. After a child turns 2, this is no longer a benefit under the CHAMPUS program.





Wee Care offers help

As most child development centers, baby sitters and schools will not accept children who are ill, working couples and single parents are often faced with the unattractive option of losing time from work to care for their child at home. The 64th Medical Squadron's Wee Care Program offers an alternative to lost duty time.

Wee Care is a space-available program open to all eligible beneficiaries, ages 6 weeks and older, who are ill and unable to attend school or child care. It is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Children are "admitted" to the hospital during the parent's working hours. They are then discharged from the hospital or if additional days are anticipated, released on pass to go home with their parents.

Children on pass simply return to the hospital the following duty day.

While in the hospital, children are closely observed and cared for by skilled nursing personnel. Meals are provided.

Medication is administered.

Admission to Wee Care requires that children be evaluated by a medical provider. Monday through Friday from 7:30 to 8:30 a.m., parents may bring their child to the Pediatric Clinic without an appointment. Any other time, the child may be evaluated through the emergency room.

For each day of care, the sponsor will pay one day's subsistence, at the current inpatient rate. Payment upon admission is encouraged, since the business office closes at 4 n.m.

Parents should bring to the hospital those things they normally take to day care for their child and perhaps a special book, toy or blanket to help make their child more comfortable in the new surroundings. Schoolwork may be provided as well. The staff sets time aside for work, play and rest. Parents may visit or call the ward at any time to check on their child.

The Wee Care program is yet another way the 64th Medical Squadron reaches out to meet the needs of the Reese community.

IM teams vie for grid title


The 54th Flying Training Squadron "A" and 35th FTS "B" have both advanced to the championship game in the intramural flag football league.

The game was scheduled to be played Thursday at 4:45 at the base's outdoor sports complex.


