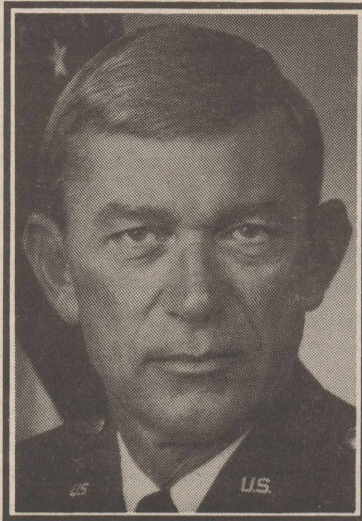


Colonel Henny heading to Maxwell

Colonel Love is currently assigned to Hq. ATC, Randolph AFB, Texas. Colonel Henny is being reassigned to Maxwell AFB, Ala., following three years at Reese as a group and wing commander.

"The thing that will stand out most in my mind, when this tour is over, is the people," said Colonel Henny. "This wing has the most professional, hard-working, friendly people around, and it's because of them that Susan and I have enjoyed our time here as much as we have."

Col. Kenneth Hess, 64th Support Group commander, will replace Colonel Love as deputy chief of staff for personnel at

Hq. ATC. Col. Robert Brooks, special assistant to the wing commander for T-1A integration, will assume command of the support group.

Colonel Love is a native of Texas and a 1967 graduate of Texas Tech University. He also holds a master's degree from Webster University. His professional military education includes Squadron Officers School; the advanced staff course at the Royal Air Force Staff College, United Kingdom; and Air War College.

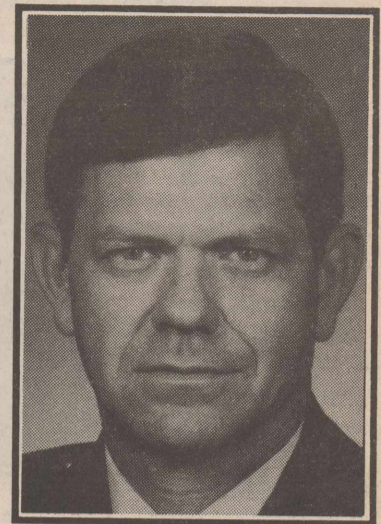
The colonel earned his commission from Officer Training School in 1968 and graduated from UPT at Williams AFB, Ariz., one year later. His assignments since have included Rob-

ins AFB, Ga.; McCoy AFB, Fla.; Carswell, Laughlin and Sheppard AFBs, Texas; the Pentagon; and overseas assignments in the United Kingdom and Taiwan.

Colonel Love is a command pilot with more than 4,000 flying hours in the C-141, C-130, B-52D, T-38, Jet Provost and Hawk aircraft. This includes 400 combat hours in Vietnam in the C-130.

His military decorations include the Legion of Merit, Distinguished Flying Cross, Meritorious Service Medal with two oak leaf clusters, Air Medal with two oak leaf clusters, Air Force Commendation Medal with one leaf cluster and Republic of Vietnam Cross with gallantry.

The colonel and his wife, Darlean, have two daughters, Amy and Angela.

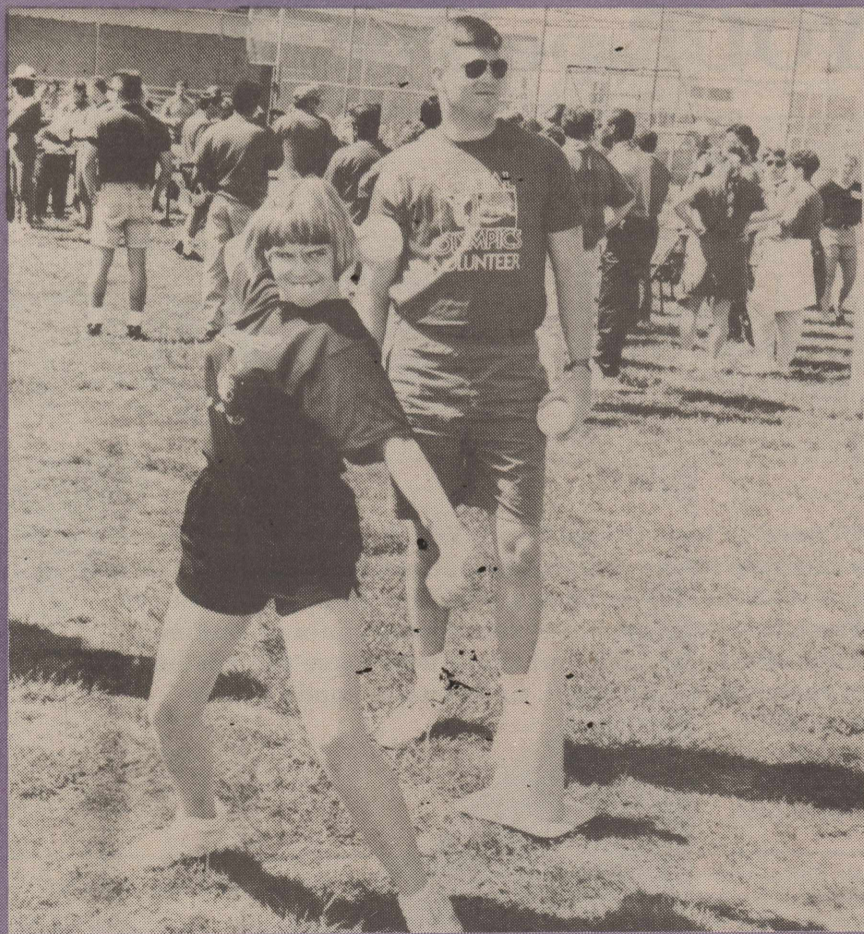

The T-1A is the newest trainer for student pilots who will be flying transport, tanker and heavy airlift planes when they graduate from the year-long flying training program.

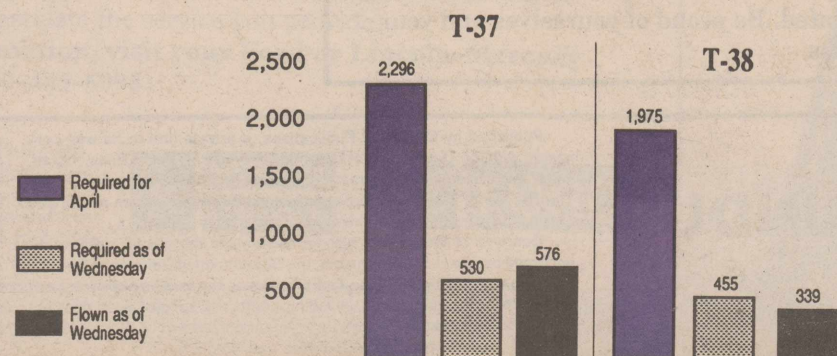
This will be the first public display of the T-1A during an open house.

Quality improvement

Our quality improvement program is up and running at Reese Air Force Base and we want to give you an update on our progress. We have provided awareness training to 125 of our quality personnel and have more training sessions programmed during the next month. If you have not scheduled your unit for training, take the time to do it now. The more people we train the better our program will be.

We are completing the formal stages of a quality improvement team on the aircraft cannibalization process and will be briefing the results next week. Once we have completed that briefing we will provide you with the details of this Quality Improvement effort. The efforts of this team resulted in some significant improvements to the process that we studied — we reduced our T-38 CANN rate from 5.1 in October to 2.6 in March and our T-37 CANN rate from 2.6 to 1.1 during the same time — and we haven't finished yet. We will continue to meet once a month to ensure that the actions we took are still valid and we are still meeting the standards set.

As people become trained, we will be looking at areas where we can implement teams to improve our work processes. We solicit your ideas on areas that can be improved. Take a few minutes to look around your work area. Is there something that you and your co-workers can do to improve your work processes? Remember that no idea is too small or too large to be reviewed and the process doesn't have to be "broke" to improve it.

Quality improvement at Reese will only work if each individual takes the time to understand the principles and apply them in their everyday jobs. We can accomplish much more as a team than as individuals. Your ideas are important, so don't hold back — give us a call at 6592 or better yet stop by our office on the second floor of Bldg. 800 and let's talk. We can make a difference!

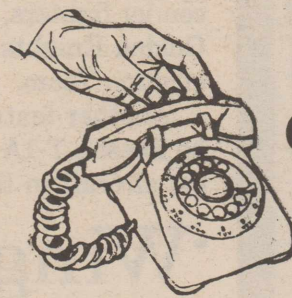

Sergeants association wins division award

"Community service" takes on a new meaning when it comes to the Reese chapter of the Air Force Sergeants' Association.

This year's efforts by AFSA Chapter 1068 were rewarded recently when the group received chapter of the year honors for Division 10 in the under-500-member category.

The chapter is primarily involved in community service and humanitarian projects around Reese. Some of the group's involvement has included assisting with youth programs such as Camp Blue Yonder and Special Olympics. Other contributions include constructing a new flag pole for the professional military education center and sponsoring awards for the NCO and airman leadership schools.

"The level of participation shown by our active-duty and retired members has been tremendous this year," said 1991 Chapter President SMSgt. Michael Braskett. "With the recent transition from military to civilian maintenance and fuels management, over 200 of our active-duty members were transferred from Reese. Despite this loss, we've still managed to slightly increase our membership."

One of their most labor-intensive projects is the upgrade and maintenance of the Wolfforth Cem-

etery. The Reese chapter volunteered to take over the job when a caretaker could not be found. After discovering several veterans interned there, they organized

the first-ever Memorial Day ceremony at the cemetery. The event was well attended and received a great deal of local press coverage.

The chapter set itself apart from the competition through its high level of activity and the willingness of its members to contribute to the team, according to 1992 president MSgt. Joe Slack. "It's great to see people put aside their own personal needs to work as a team and make Reese a better place to live.

"Two groups that we would like to specifically thank are the auxiliary and the retired members," said Sergeant Slack. "The retirees comprise over half of our membership, and the auxiliary was an instrumental part of all our activities and the award nomination package."

Presently, the chapter has 493 members consisting of retired and active-duty NCOs and members of the AFSA auxiliary. Meetings are held on the third Thursday of every month at 7 p.m. in the Reese Enlisted Open Mess.

"We would like as many people as possible to get involved," said Sergeant Slack. "That way there is always a fresh group of people that can continue our work when the active duty members move on to other assignments."

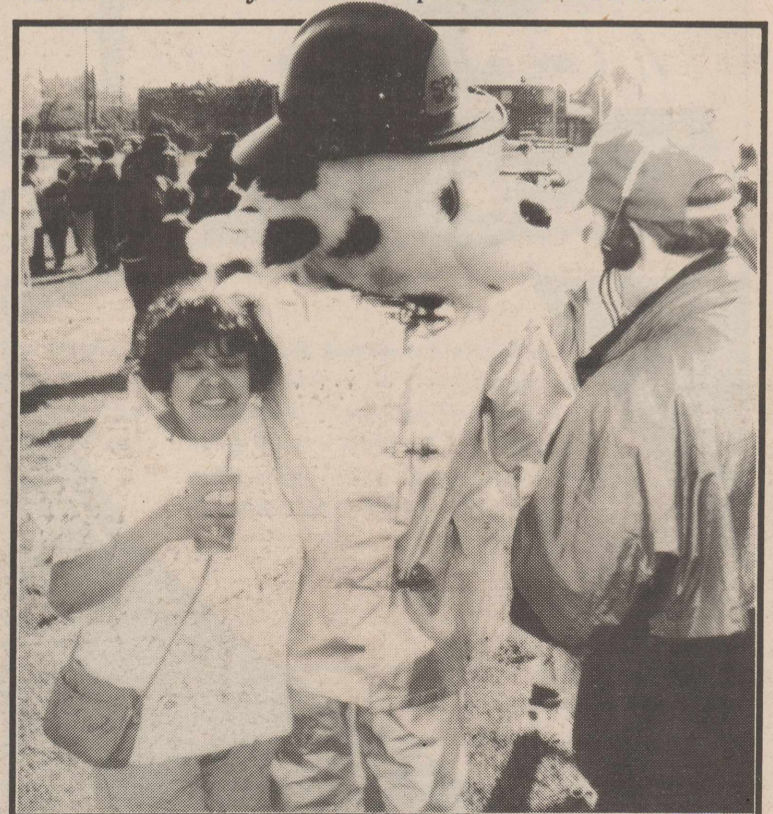
teer. "They get a lot of satisfaction and enjoy it out here. I think if I can make one of them smile, then I've done my job here."

April brings change in weather

Is Mother Nature sexist?

From the annals of severe weather trivia at the Center for Disease Control in Atlanta, Ga., comes the following tidbit — by all accounts she is!

Between 1968 and 1990, 85 percent of the fatal lightning strikes occurred to men. In 1990 alone, she electrocuted 67 men and only seven women. One third of these deaths were outdoor, work-related accidents, while the other two-thirds were recreational. Florida just eked out Texas as the national leader in lightning fatalities.

On a more serious note, April signals the change to springtime convective weather patterns. Some of these systems are real lambs but others come in like roaring lions. April is the season we begin to have a dramatic increase in thunderstorm activity, some of which can be severe.

Additionally, the number of West Texas tornado reports increases significantly. The period of maximum tornadic activity begins in mid-April and lasts through mid-June, although they may occur during any month of the year.

April is the time of year to increase our awareness of the dangers of thunderstorms and

how to take that extra precaution that might protect us from becoming another weather-related fatality. As a severe thunderstorm approaches, take cover inside a building or in your car. If you are caught out in the open, avoid trees and bodies of water. As a last resort, take cover in a ditch or ravine but stay out of the water flowing through the bottom of them. Finally, do not wait for the thunderstorm to move directly overhead before taking cover; lightning can strike up to 10 miles away.

Other weather phenomena we can expect during April include average high and low temperatures of 74 and 47 degrees, respectively. The all-time records are a scorching 101 degrees and a chilly 19 degrees. We can expect 1.11 inches of precipitation, mostly in the form of rain; however, April snows are not uncommon. Our winds average 12 knots or about 14 mph from the south-southwest to the southwest. The highest wind speed recorded during the month was 62 knots (71 mph), which occurred during a thunderstorm. We have an average of five thunderstorm days during the month, but this number may vary significantly in any given year.

Have a safe and exciting April. And if you are a man, don't fool with Mother Nature. See you next month.

Four get Article 15 punishments

Four Article 15 punishments were served in the last quarter at Reese for dereliction of duty, disobeying a lawful order and driving while intoxicated.

According to the Reese Staff Judge Advocate Maj. Edmund Bloom, commanders imposed punishments based on factors such as the seriousness of the offense and prior service and disciplinary record.

□ A first lieutenant was ordered to forfeit \$300 pay per month for two months and was reprimanded for dereliction of duty for violating Air Force Regulation 60-16, "General Flight Rules," and ATC Regulation 51-4, "Primary Flying, Jet" (Article 92, Uniform

Code of Military Justice).

□ A first lieutenant was ordered to forfeit \$300 pay per month for two months and was reprimanded for dereliction of duty for violating AFR 60-16 and ATCR 51-4 (Article 92).

□ A sergeant was reduced to airman first class and ordered to forfeit \$500 for driving under the influence of alcohol and wrongful appropriation (Articles 111, 121).

□ An airman first class was reduced to airman, ordered to forfeit \$215 in pay and assigned 14 days extra duty for disobeying a lawful order and failing to follow fire prevention rules (Articles 91—disobeying the lawful order of an NCO — and 92).

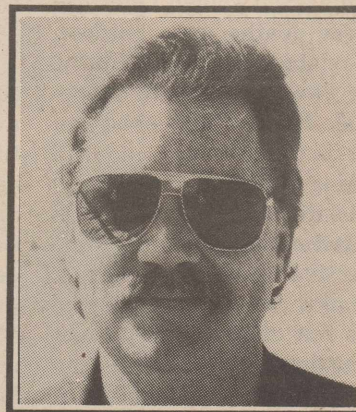
mission maker.

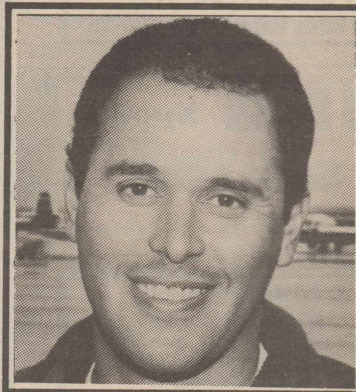
"As a former Air Force pilot, I wish you luck as you begin a new journey," Colonel Reed said.



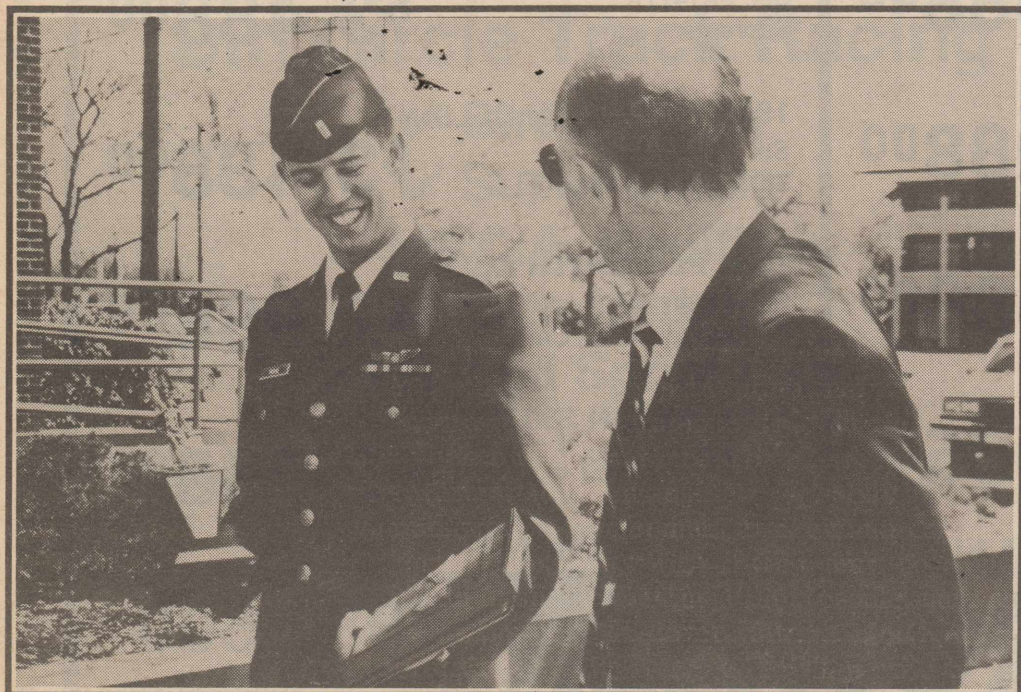

What are you doing?

Proper behavior takes more than just 'staying out of trouble'

During the past few years the social pendulum has swung toward greater individual liberty. Unfortunately, this freedom has been accompanied by a loosening of moral restraints and the abdication of personal responsibility.

This has been encouraged by various studies which "prove" that an individual's actions are sometimes caused by mental impairment, faulty genes, a chemical imbalance or a deprived childhood and hence can't be blamed on the individual. For example...

Do you have a drinking problem? Alcoholism is a sickness and you really can't help yourself. Have you caused a serious accident while drunk? Sue the bartender who sold you the drinks. It was his fault you had the accident because he should have known you weren't fit to drive. Has your child dropped out of school and joined a gang? Blame the teachers. It's their fault because "Junior" thought school was boring and a waste of time. Your income doesn't match your expenses? Society is to blame for your inability to support yourself in the style which you would like to become accustomed to. Declare bankruptcy and leave your creditors holding an empty pocketbook.

Recently, there have been signs that the pendulum may have reached the limits of permissiveness and is beginning to swing back toward greater restrictions on individual freedom.

Because a steadily rising percentage of tax dollars is being spent on the consequences of personal immoderation, moral laxity and misbehavior, more and more Americans are beginning to believe in the need for much stricter accountability in individual behavior.

This belief is being translated into public law. In a dozen states, students who drop out of high school for reasons other than financial hardship face revocation of their driver's licenses. In California, authorities can hold parents responsible if their children engage in gang activities. States are also tightening laws aimed at collecting child support payments.

What does this have to do with us here at Reese? As guardians of American liberty, haven't we all been trained to shoulder responsibility?

Sad to say, but for some of us this indoctrination didn't take. If training alone could produce individuals who were fully aware of their responsibility for their actions and who thereby avoided wrongdoing, there would be no need for the Air Force Office of Special Investigations. Unfortunately, there are

many military and civilian personnel imprisoned in penal institutions who allowed personal desire to override their consciences.

Even if we are honest, dependable individuals who wouldn't think of stealing, never abuse our children and always pay our debts, how often do we turn a blind eye to the misdoings of others? Do we report thefts of government property, or do we simply shrug it off because "it's only a small item and isn't worth reporting?"

Do we report shoplifters to management or do we turn the other way because we don't want to become involved? Do we fail to report suspected child abuse because we're afraid of ruining someone's career? If we suspect a contractor is cheating the government, do we bring our suspicions to the attention of the OSI, or do we avoid taking any action for fear of being condemned as a "whistle blower?"

Think about it. Being a responsible citizen not only means avoiding activities which are unlawful or harmful to others; it also means protecting innocent people or saying tax dollars by reporting criminal behavior to the proper authorities.
