Reese team tackles Top Flight III

No, this is not a re-creation from Desert Storm. It is a simulation of the time-on-target test several Reese members are participating in as part of Air Training Command's Top Flight III at Randolph AFB, Texas, this week.

The two-day competition tests the command's pilot training wings in both flying and maintenance capability. The Reese team consists of two four-man teams of instructors and two five-man maintenance teams.

Col. Bob Negley, wing vice commander, was on hand Tuesday morning to encourage the competitors to do their best. "This event is a one-time snapshot," he said. "It's a chance for the UPT wings to gauge their effectiveness in a nothreat, no-pressure environment."

Representing Reese at the current competition are "D" flight of the 35th Flying Training Squadron, "F" flight of the 54th FTS, and T-37 and T-38 crew chiefs from Lockheed.

While most of the maintainers were chosen some time in advance, the eight instructor pilots were

From my perspective

In assessing the results of the voluntary separation incentive and special separation benefit offering that closed April 15, the Air Force had to come to grips with the unfortunate reality that voluntary separations from the initial

eligible pool of officers and enlisted members fell short of the target.

On the enlisted side, we came close, with over 21,000 applications — 88 percent of the 24,000 goal. On the officer side, it was a different story, with applications approaching only half of the 7,500 target.

From the beginning, Air Force leadership has worked to achieve necessary force reduc-

tions through voluntary loss measures to the maximum possible extent. A reduction in force has been strictly the option of last resort. The hard question faced by leadership April 15 was whether we reached the point of picking up that bitter pill. As in the case of most hard questions, the answer was yes and no.

Given the significant shortfall on the officer side, as well as the lead times required for RIF board scheduling, notification and so forth, it was obvious that we could wait no longer to announce preparations for an officer RIF board in July.

However, those lead time requirements also afforded us a window of opportunity to minimize RIF requirements through an expanded VSI-SSB offering between the end of April and the end of May.

On the enlisted side, we estimate that, if the response is as favorable as it was in the original offer, this expanded offer should get us to the end-strength reduction target.

Based on discussions with Air Force people around the world over the last several months, we anticipate a range of reactions to the recent VSI-SSB-RIF announcement.

For many new VSI-SSB eligibles, it is the opportunity they have been waiting for. Each person who accepts the offer reduces the number of involuntary separations which may be required.

For those most vulnerable to a RIF or those who believed the Air Force would never have to conduct a RIF, the RIF board announcement comes as a jolt. I can tell you this announcement never would have been made if we had any other choice. The new VSI-SSB offer provides a last opportunity to avoid our mutual worst case scenario.

However, if the response in this expanded VSI-SSB isn't equal to or greater than the response to the first offering, we will not be able to avoid an officer RIF.

The coming months will require hard decisions from Air Force people and their leaders. As we work our way through this difficult period, the secretary of the Air Force and chief of staff are personally involved and committed to exploring all possible alternatives with the best interests of Air Force members in mind. Quality Air Force

What can quality improvement do for me as a flyer?

This seems to be the question that we flyers have been asking ourselves as we are being exposed to more and more people extolling the virtues of that program we call "QI" or "TQM." The answer to that question may surprise you. As a flyer, quality improvement is already at work in many of our daily tasks and its potential is virtually unlimited.

Why then is there this sudden push to attend awareness classes and implement QI in our squadrons, if we are already using QI? The answer is that while we unconsciously use QI in our everyday jobs, by learning and placing a greater emphasis on the basic concepts behind it, we can take things one step further and improve our jobs to an even greater magnitude.

Quality improvement is based on four themes. 1. Satisfy the customer. 2. Manage by fact (measure). 3. Focus on the process. 4. Empower the people

These four themes are used in QI to continually improve whatever process we are focusing on. There are numerous examples of each of these four basics at work out on the flightline and in our individual flights every day.

One example of satisfying our customer is the training IPs provide to their students. This satisfies two customers, one internal and the other external. The internal customer is the student who is trying to progress through UPT. The external customer is the gaining command to which the students will eventually be assigned.

We manage by fact (measure) every day. After each sortie, grades are given for each of the accomplished maneuvers. These grades are not arbitrary but are defined by definite parameters (for example, an 'excellent' fix-to-fix must be within certain measurable tolerances). Students are also measured on academic tests, emergency procedures quizzes and checkrides, as well as other performance areas.

The third theme of QI is focus on the process. As pilots we focus on the process every flight. We prebrief the sortie so we know how it should progress. We focus on airspeeds, departures and specific maneuver parameters of the items we wish to accomplish. Afterward, we evaluate mistakes and examine ways the flight could have been improved. Safety meetings and professional enhancement program briefings are two more examples of how fliers focus on the process. These programs have been developed to improve the safety of our flying.

The empowerment of people is displayed on the flightline by flight commanders running their flights, IPs teaching flying techniques to their students and students performing solo flights. We can see then, that QI really does play a major role in our everyday activities.

Many of us tend to put down QI as a program that will never work. We tend to focus on the larger problems over which we have no control—the shortage of flying hours or the availability of assignments, for example.

Instead, we should divert our attention toward the things we can control, whether it's our approaches, our aircraft systems knowledge or our teaching techniques.

Thus, we should not look at QI as an additional duty. Instead it is simply taking the same things we already do and applying them in a more organized manner so that we may continually improve our job—flying







New aircraft will replace T-41 trai

WRIGHT-PATTERSON AFB, Ohio The Air Force has selected the team of Slingsby Aviation Limited of Great Britain and Northrop Worldwide Aircraft Services Inc. of Oklahoma for a new "enhanced flight screener" aircraft to replace the aging Cessna T-41 trainer.

The Air Force plans to buy 113 of the commercial off-the-shelf enhanced flight screeners, a variant of the Slingsby Firefly aircraft. Face value of the contract awarded April 29 is \$54.8 million, Aeronautical Systems Division officials said.


Contract specifications call for an acrobatic, piston-driven aircraft with side-by-side seating, dual stick controls and a normal cruise speed of 178 mph.

Air Training Command and the Air Force Academy currently use the T-41 Mescalero, a military version of the Cessna 172, to screen prospective pilots for specialized UPT.

Improved screening will eliminate earlier those not suited to Air Force flying and save the Air Force more than \$1 million annually with each 1 percent reduction in attrition.

Delivery of the first enhanced flight screener is scheduled to take place in January at Hondo, Texas, with ATC receiving a total of 57 aircraft. The Air Force Academy will receive the first of 56 aircraft in August 1993.

Student pilots are to begin training in the new aircraft in October 1993, Maj. Denny Grady, ATC program manager, said. Final delivery is scheduled for August 1995. (Air Force News Service)





New fire chief arrives

CMSgt. Joe Johnson has only been at Reese for a couple of weeks, but he is already in a position to feel some heat.

The Alabama native is the new base fire chief, having shipped in from RAF Upper Heyford, England. Speaking about the fire protection mission, the 26-year service veteran said the biggest part of fire prevention is combating complacency.

"That's what causes accidents and fires," he said. "People think that it's something that only happens to some-

"Because of the (fire) inspection system in the Air Force, people don't see fires but maybe once every several years. So they don't think about."

The chief said he is pleased to be at Reese.

"The people here are very friendly, including the people downtown," Chief Johnson said. "The guys in the station have been really helpful too." He added that it was nice to be back in the states and that he hoped to stay at Reese for a while.

Thunderbirds coming here

The Thunderbirds will be the featured attraction at the Reese's May 24 open house.

The team will be in its ninth different type of demonstration jet, the F-16C Fighting Falcon, for the show. Since August 1982, the Thunderbirds flew the A-model of the Fighting Falcon. The squadron was also the last active-duty unit to make the transition.

The open house will also feature the Army Golden Knights parachute demonstration team and numerous aircraft displays.

Tips offered to prevent abuse

Military installations, local communities and children's groups work together to combat child abuse. Prevention is the most effective part of the program, said JanaLee Sponberg, an analyst with the Department of Defense Family Policy, Support and Services Office. The themes for activities this year are "Partners in Prevention" and "Winning Ways for Military Families.'

There are more than 1.5 million dependent children in the military. About 20,000 of those children were involved in cases of child abuse in 1990, Ms. Sponbergsaid. Almost onehalf of these were substantiated.

Prevention is easy; listen to your children, nurture them, tell them about strangers and what to do if someone bothers them, she added.

A few other easy-to-follow child safety tips include:

☐ Take time to listen to your children.

☐ Know who your children's friends are.

☐ Take a few minutes out when stress levels get high.

☐ Use words that help, not

☐ Teach your children how to answer the telephone if they are home alone.

☐ Teach your children not to talk to, nor accept anything from, strangers.

☐ Teach your children about secrets and that some secrets need to be told.

Do not place your child's name on clothing.

☐ Do not let your children play alone on a playground or go to a public place - like a rest room - alone. (American Forces Information Service)

Child abuse isn't something that happens to other people." It can happen everywhere, and Reese parents are just as susceptible to this problem as others.

"The daily stresses that people have to deal with are often greater in a military family," said 1st Lt. Abbie Luck-Shafer, base family advocacy officer. "Most parents want to do the right thing by their families, they just don't always know

The lieutenant said the tion, call 3739.

family advocacy program *exists in part to prevent maltreatment in the home and can help parents cope with child-raising problems. Teaching parents some of the alternatives to physical punishment is one example.

"It's the Air Force's job to help prevent child abuse," said the lieutenant. "It's also against the law if you don't report cases of child abuse or maltreatment."






