Reese flooded with visitors at open house

Despite rainy weather that threatened to cancel parts of the event, Sunday's open house was attended by about 40,000 people.

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People from throughout the South Plains turned out to see the Thunderbirds, Army Golden Knights, F-15 demonstration and a variety of aircraft on static display. In addition, several demonstrations and displays on military history, current programs and Reese people and units were set up in Hangar 82.

One other highlight, the "Red, White and Blues" rock and blues concert, was part of the Reese open house for the second year in a row. Area performers went on later than planned, but were able to "rock the house" once weather improved at mid-afternoon.

Of course, the Thunderbirds were the main attraction of the day. Worries about cloud cover cancelling the program went away as the skies cleared after a morning of rain. The Thunderbirds dazzled the crowd with their high-speed, aerobatic maneuvers.

Their performance was preceded by the traditional inspection party of wing and local officials. It included Col. Bill Henny, wing commander; Joe Price, president of the local Air Force Association chapter and a Friend of Reese; Don McBeath, Lubbock County judge; Byrnie Bass, chairman of the board of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce; see "Open house", Page 9



percent," said Brig. Gen. Charles T. Robertson Jr., director of Air Force personnel plans.

General Robertson is urging commanders to understand the advertised vulnerability numbers and counsel accordingly.

The number of additional losses needed hasn't changed; the Air Force still needs 7,500 officers to accept either VSI or SSB to meet end strengths and avoid a RIF. As of May 18, 4,209 officers and 23,630 enlisted members had applied.

Because the officer response to the VSI-SSB offering has been slow, eligible officers in the 1980 to 1985 year-groups remain as vulnerable now as when the incentive program first started, General Robertson said. While the 1980-1984 year-groups are most vulnerable, officers in the 1985 year-group face a 75 percent vulnerability risk.

Based on the number of applications received so far, estimated

vulnerability for the 1986-1989 year groups has been reduced from the previously announced

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37 percent to approximately 30 percent.

When the April 15 deadline passed for the original VSI and SSB offer, the Air Force was nearly 3,800 officer applications short with only 50 percent of the volunteers needed having applied. Phase two was initiated with hopes of meeting both the officer and enlisted requirements while reducing or eliminating any reduction in force requirements.

Prior to today's deadline rapidly approaching, General Robertson said, "We are confident we will avoid an enlisted RIF." But it's a "virtual certainty" that an officer RIF will be necessary, and a board has been tentatively scheduled for July 20 at the Military Personnel Center, Randolph AFB, Texas.

The last Air Force RIF was in 1974 with those officers affected leaving the service in 1975.

While still exploring alternatives, General Robertson said the point was made right from the start that failure to meet end strength figures would probably have to result

□ SSgt. Jim Leonard of the Reese CBPO said that about 22 officers at Reese could be affected if there is a RIF. However, there have yet to be any officer applications for phase two of VSI-SSB.

in RIF actions.

"We've looked at it from as many angles as we can. About the only option left is a board."

The RIF board will consider active-duty reserve officers for involuntary separation. Selected officers will have to separate from the Air Force by Dec. 31.

Those with at least six years of total active federal military

service by Dec. 31 will be eligible for separation pay. All officers selected will be eligible for transition benefits.

"The whole drawdown has obviously generated its own brand of turbulence, concern and speculation in the field," General Robertson said.

Those impacted include not only RIF eligibles but people affected by selective early retirementboards, reduced highyear-of-tenure and other early release programs — both voluntary and involuntary.

"Because of the broad range of options available, everyone's particular level of impact has been different. Commanders need to understand and deal with each case individually," General Robertson said. "The primary focus of our effort has been, and should be, on reducing the impact on that relatively small percentage of the force affected by involuntary reduction programs. For the remainder, the majority of our people, their primary concern should've been only whether or not to sign up for VSI or SSB."

The Air Force goal is to continue to "make it as painless as possible by soliciting as many volunteers as possible," General Robertson said.

Nearly 28,000 people have applied for either VSI or SSB since the program started, with more than 25,000 applications approved as of May 18. Of the 4,209 officer applications received, 3,532 have been approved, while 21,981 of the 23,630 enlisted takers have been accepted.

Officers applying for VSI total 2,191, with 2,018 opting for SSB. Enlisted SSB takers number 21,105, with 2,525 choosing VSI.

Applications for VSI-SSB are still being accepted on a first-come, first-served basis. Enlisted skills will be closed as their targets are met.

General Robertson said his concern is with the RIF-eligible officers in the high vulnerability year-groups and urged them to "reconsider the reality of the drawdown and to think twice before passing up the extra benefits of VSI-SSB and then being forced to settle for the lower benefits associated with involuntary separation." 

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


