Lt. Col. Stan Osborne said that after a year of testing the combined MWRS organization, Air Force headquarters has announced the new structure.

"The challenge now is to find the best way to fit our personnel and programs into the new organizational structure," Colonel Osborne said. "Sorting out personnel decisions is a major task this summer."


Squadron members are providing solid continuity throughout these changes, he added.

"People are doing great handling their day-to-day jobs during reorganization," he said.



Quality Air Force

At the hospital we started our transition from quality assurance to quality improvement in February of this year. The focus now is not only monitoring the quality of care we deliver, but instituting improvement processes that exceed standards.

This means we will continue our monitoring and evaluation as before, but we won't stop once we see standards are met. We now try to improve the process and/or outcome. Simply stated, we will strive to make it better.

We start with identifying our customers and their needs. Our ultimate customer is the patient, but we also serve hospital staff members who order and receive supplies used to deliver patient care. These supplies range anywhere from medication and dressings to printed forms.

Second, we monitor customer satisfaction by encouraging the completion of questionnaires for our patients. Also, our departmental staff meetings include a specific agenda item on "continuous quality improvement." Here ideas for quality improvement are solicited from all of our workers. Suggestions from our customers (patients and staff) are looked at carefully. Throughout this process inter-unit collaboration is fostered—which, in itself, can be a positive experience. The most promising ideas will eventually flow to the hospital quality council where the opportunity for cross-functional quality improvement teams exists.

Recently an opportunity for improvement was identified by our clinics during a routine self-inspection. It was determined the part of the medical record that summarizes the health condition and treatment of the patient was completed only 50 percent of the time. The typical patient of the 64th Medical Squadron is seen by many different providers while his or her civilian counterpart may only see a single provider over a period of time. The outpatient record is the sole vehicle for providing continuity of care for the military patient.

When the health care summary is missing or incomplete, the provider must spend a great deal of time reviewing the medical record for all past conditions. This is time-consuming, causes appointments to run late and is an inefficient use of the provider's time. It is a well-recognized problem Air Force wide.

A process action team was formed comprised of personnel who handle and use the record. Over a sixMedical Records Documentation

month period the process was examined from all perspectives and evaluated and changed several times to attain the outcome illustrated in the accompanying graph.

As shown in the graph, we improved our completion rate from 50 percent to greater than 90 percent in five months.

Although meetings of the process action team are no longer required, the monitoring of this area will continue through regular monthly audits.

General McPeak cites NSA

On Sunday, we celebrate an anniversary that will draw little attention, but that had dramatic impact on those of us wearing Air Force blue today.

When we think of the birth of the U.S. Air Force, we usually focus on Sept. 18, 1947, the day Executive Order 9877

defined our roles and Stuart Symington was sworn in as our first secretary. But our genesis really occurred two months earlier, on July 26, when the National Security Act was signed into law.

That law designated that a national military

establishment, headed by a civilian secretary of defense, provide unified direction of the armed services. It also provided for a third military department — the Air Force.

The Air Force was created largely as a result of airpower lessons learned during World War II. Over the past 45 years, we have demonstrated repeatedly the wisdom of forming a separate air arm within the Department of Defense.

Today, we are building a new Air Force anchored firmly on the foundation laid 45 years ago, but tailored to a mission for the '90s and beyond — defense of the United States through control and exploitation of air and space.

You note there was little fanfare on Sunday. But during these times of turbulence, it is well to remember that our heritage is rooted in a document — the National Security Act — that dramatically changed the organization of airpower and opened the door to the evolution of the world's finest air and space force. Use your head! Helmets save lives

As we continue making progress in our thinking about safety, we get smarter about preventing injuries.

For example, most of us approaching 40 years or older did not wear seat belts when we were kids. They were not available and their value was not known. Now, most of us use seat belts routinely and insist that our children use them from day one. The results of this change in thinking are dramatic — the number of "seat belt saves" increases every year and the deaths due to car accidents continue to decrease.

Now is it time to make another change to your safety awareness which can save your life and the life of your child. Simply put, always wear a helmet when you bicycle. The value of a helmet when riding a motorcycle is well known and as a result is mandatory in most states. With this knowledge, we should not allow ourselves or our children to ride bicycles without helmets.

More than 1,200 deaths last year were attributed to biking accidents, and an additional 500,000 biking injuries were treated in emergency rooms. Seventy-five percent of these deaths involved head injuries. In addition, many accidents which did not result in death ended up causing permanent brain damage. Two-thirds of these accidents happened to our youngsters.

Wearing a helmet would prevent 95 percent of the deaths and tremendously reduce other injuries. Knowing that we can prevent a majority of the injuries, what is your excuse for not wearing a helmet? Cost should not be a factor; a certified protective helmet can be purchased for as little as \$30.

Place a value on your child's life and think how much you would pay to bring them back to life. Inconvenient to use, bothersome—the same excuses for not wearing seat belts and the same answers apply. Use the helmet from the start and use it regularly. It will become a habit. If you wear a helmet and set the example, it will become the accepted thing to

Guam airman gets death sentence

ANDERSEN AFB, Guam — A security policeman has been sentenced to death for the murder of a fellow Air Force cop.

SrA. Jose F. S. Simoy was given the death penalty July 22 in a court-martial where he was convicted in the murder of Sgt. Stacy E. Levay, 29. Both Airman Simoy and Sergeant Levay were assigned to the 633rd Security Police Squadron.

Airman Simoy was also sentenced to forfeit all pay and allowances, and be reduced to an airman basic.

Sergeant Levay died New Years Day from head injuries he received in the Dec. 29 robbery of an Andersen commissary cashier he was escorting to the bank.

The trial record will undergo a legal review by the judge, prosecution and defense attorneys, and the 13th Air Force staff judge advocate.

If approved, the findings and sentence are automatically reviewed by the Air Force Court of Military Review, the U.S. Court of Military Appeals and the U.S. Supreme Court.

Jurors were unanimous in sentencing Airman Simoy to death. The unanimous vote is necessary for a death sentence, under the Uniform Code of Military Justice.

Before the death penalty can be carried out, the president of the United States must review and approve it.

Airman Simoy is being held at the U.S. Navy confinement facility in Guam pending his transfer to a prison in the United States. (Air Force News Service)

General Ashy wins NAACP honor

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas — Lt. Gen. Joseph W. Ashy, Air Training Command commander, received the 1992 NAACP Roy Wilkins Renown Service Award July 15 at ceremonies in Nashville, Tenn.


Each year, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People recognizes military service members who have made outstanding contributions to Department of Defense equal opportunity policies and programs.

General Ashy was cited for his leadership in advancing equal opportunity and treatment for all Air Force personnel, and for providing positive role models for American youth.

"Recognizing that the success of tomorrow's Air Force stems directly from the attitudes, skills and abilities of today's youth, General Ashy directed the development of an aggressive, multi-faceted advertising campaign," said Brig. Gen. Michael G. Vergamini, deputy chief of staff for recruiting service and commissioning programs. "The campaign is organized to provide positive role models and a 'stay in school' message for minority youth."

Two cornerstones of the campaign are an Air Force poster series and an electronic media campaign aimed at black youths. The art posters, featuring portraits and narrative descriptions of the accomplishments of six famous, African-American airmen, are now on display in communities, schools and churches. In addition, a sus-

tained newspaper and radio campaign encourages young blacks to continue their education. The campaign ads were placed in more than 60 black-owned newspapers, and more than 350 black-owned radio stations continue to air the radio message as a public

service announcement.

To personalize the message of Air Force education and training opportunities to minority communities, General Ashy oversaw the creation of proactive programs to involve black general officers and second

lieutenants directly with minority youth and community leaders. Black general officers now regularly receive updates of current information about recruiting programs and requirements for their use in speaking engagements and media interviews.

At the same time, 16 newly commissioned minority officers - named "Gold Bars" because of the gold-colored lieutenant's rank — were selected to return to their hometowns and universities as recruiters. Working directly with high school students, the Gold Bars make sure that minority youth are fully aware of Air Force college scholarship opportunities. In addition to encouraging and counseling students, these young officers provide credible evidence that success is directly related to education, and that the Air Force can help provide that education.

Initial Air Force human relations training was also reviewed last year. Based on this review, General Ashy directed an increase in human relations education for all technical and flying training students. Also, officer trainees in Air Force ROTC and the Officer Training Group now receive current social issues as part of their training.

"General Ashy recognizes the importance of instilling the values of human interaction in basic trainees and new officers," said Maj. Gen. Lawrence Day, deputy chief of staff for technical training at ATC headquarters. "It's absolutely critical to military cohesiveness and teamwork. Military pro-

fessionals work in a constantly changing physical and cultural environment — he or she simply has to adapt to be effective. That's why General Ashy asked us to review the program last year." (ATC News Service)

ATC wins Air Force Award Command cited for flying safely

RANDOLPH AFB, Texas (ATCNS) — Air Training Command has earned the Chief of Staff Special Achievement Award for fiscal year 1991 for its outstanding flying safety record.

Periodically, this award is given by the Air Force chief of staff for various accomplishments, not necessarily flying safety, according to Lt. Col. Gregory V. Wootton, chief of ATC flight safety. "This past year, however, our flight safety record continued a trend of several consecutive low mishap years which, in the training business, is especially impressive," Colonel Wootton said.

"Your command's flying safety record contributed immeasurably to the overall success of the U.S. Air Force's best safety record in history," Gen. Merrill A. McPeak, Air Force chief of staff, wrote in his congratulatory letter to Lt. Gen. Joseph W. Ashy, ATC com-

mander.

ATC achieved a 0.15 Class A mishap rate while flying more than 611,000 hours, according to ATC safety officials. A Class A flight mishap is one involving a fatality, \$1 million or more in property damage, or the loss of an aircraft.

The command's flying safety record has been consistently low the past four years, yet ATC has

averaged almost 20 percent of the AF's total flying hours.

"This achievement is the direct result of hard work by quality people," General Ashy said. "All flying wings can be proud of this."



'Marriage of convenience' continues for MWRS

WASHINGTON — Blessed by senior leaders last year, the "marriage of convenience" between services and morale, welfare and recreation organizations is moving full-throttle toward becoming reality, the director of morale, welfare, recreation and services said.

While the Air Force scored high marks for MWR's support in Desert Shield and Desert Storm, planned cuts in military authorizations in MWR made a repeat performance in the future a dim prospect, Brig. Gen. Normand G. Lezy said.

Services also received high marks for Gulf War support.

What was needed was a union with some other functional area. It was a role services seemed to fit, with a wartime requirement that showed a shortfall on the enlisted side while MWR had a surplus.

The possible melding of the two could provide "the authorizations we needed, take care of the MWR and services readiness issue, generate customer service improvements, and provide MWR and services personnel with greater opportunities for personal and professional growth," General Lezy said.

A joint MWR-services-civil engineers team was assembled to determine if there was any merit, from an Air Force standpoint, to the integration.

Based on a general positive consensus, plus the potential for improving MWR's readiness capability, the team briefed Air Force officials and got the OK to move ahead with the integration.

Last year, MWR was moved out of the personnel structure as part of the overall Headquarters Air Force reorganization going on at the time. By January, Pentagonlevel MWR and services functions were integrated as well as the major command-level functions.

Progress is continuing on track and some of the bases have already set up integrated squadrons. Most of the base squadrons will integrate by the end of the fiscal year.

A major change resulting from the integration is the transfer of responsibility for

prock Cafe," Colonel Osborne said.

The future holds continuing changes and improvements for the unit and its facilities. The new auto hobby shop is due to open in the next few weeks, the casual bar in the enlisted open mess will be converted into a sports bar, the youth center renovation should be complete in September, and the bowling alley's new lanes should be done "very soon."

Other facilities subject to improvements in the future include the golf course clubhouse, the officers' open mess casual bar and the softball and little league baseball field complex.

dormitory management.

Civil engineering will provide policy while individual squadrons will assume responsibility for their dorms. Related manpower issues have not yet been decided.

One integration issue not yet resolved is management of linen exchange programs. Should it be done away with? Should the Army and Air Force Exchange Service handle it as a contractor? Or maybe are there other options? That is the question officials are trying to answer.

The overriding concern in both issues is to look at how MWR and services provide service to Air Force people, General Lezy said.

"We want to be sure we're working smart, so we take care of them the way they need to be taken care of."

The integration was designed in phases to allow time to put together a game plan before moving down to base level, General Lezy said.

"That's where the rubber meets the road, where we interface with our customers. We wanted to make this as transparent as possible to them to avoid any degradation in service."

Training for MWR and services people is undergoing major changes due to the integration.

A new 3-level course is being developed that incorporates both traditional MWR areas as well as services areas. Also, a 5-level career development course is being designed. Both should be available by next year.

A 7-level course is being created that will also incorporate MWR and services information

Currently, all services' training is done at Lowry AFB, Colo., which is scheduled for closure in 1994. MWR does not have an entry-level course. The plan is to move all enlisted courses to Lackland AFB, Texas.

The first combined Air Force Institute of Technology MWR and services squadron commanders course was recently held at Wright-Patterson AFB, Ohio, and both the MWR and services entry-level courses for officers have been integrated.

Combining civilian training, where it makes sense, is also being looked at.

A key issue in the integration is developing a training and education road map that defines "where we are today, where we need to be tomorrow and in the next three to four years," General Lezy said.

"We're making sure what we're doing dovetails with what General McPeak (the Air Force chief of staff) is working on, on a much broader scale, in the year of training. I think we're in pretty good shape."
