




The annual Festive Foods program will be presented Tuesday, October 29, in the Silverton School Homemaking Department beginning at 11:30 a.m.

Rheumatologist To Present Program Nov. 7



Silverton scored with about 3½ minutes remaining in the first half on a pass from Cal Brannon to Grabbe which covered nine yards. Grabbe added the PAT, and the Owls led for the first time in the contest, 16-14.

Dawson scored again with 46 seconds remaining, kicked the PAT, and regained the lead

Neal Edwards began the third quarter by taking the opening kickoff 81 yards for a score. Grabbe added the PAT, and the Owls were ahead to stay, 24-22.

There was no more scoring in the third period, and the Owls owned it all in the last quarter.

Todd Reagan carried a 14-yard touchdown and Grabbe kicked the PAT.

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
