Friona will receive a \$62,869.80 February tax allocation payment

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar announced last week that he will distribute \$1.3 billion in monthly sales tax revenue to local governmental entities. The total is a 9.3 percent increase over the total amount in February 2022. Cities will receive \$855.7M, transit systems will get \$280.8M, counties get \$80.2M, and special purpose districts will get \$121M. These allocations are based on sales made in December by businesses that report tax monthly; October, November and December sales by quarterly filers; and 2022 sales by businesses that report tax annually.

The City of Friona will receive \$62,869.80 in sales tax allocation for the month of February. This payment is a 8.09% decrease from the \$68,403.80 received in February of 2022. For the first two months of 2023, Friona has received \$116,775.01 which is a 14.48% decrease from the YTD amount in 2022. The Friona Economic Development Corporation (FEDC) will receive \$15,717.45 of the allocation for its operating budget.

Council reviews Community Center renovation ideas

The Friona City Council met in regular session on Monday February 13, 2023 at 6:30 p.m. in the City Council Chambers at 617 Main in Friona, Texas. The meeting began with roll call, an invocation, and the Pledge of Allegiance.

The session opened with an opportunity for public comment. Marie Samarron addressed the council concerning the possibility of installing speed bumps on 4th Street. There are no intersections in the 3-block stretch and speed as well as safety for children has become a concern. Interviewing residents on the street for their input and checking on costs involved were among the areas of agreement.

Also, Mayor Pro Tem Alan Monroe read a proclamation declaring February as Black History Month in Friona. The proclamation from Mayor Lewellen was presented to Melodie Graves (see photo above). Mayor Pro Tem Monroe pointed out that Friona has the distinction of being the first school in the State of Texas to integrate.

The regular session began with the reading and approval of the Minutes of the January 9, 2023 meeting. Council members got to review

plans and artist's renditions concerning the Community Center Renovation Project. Some of the features include outdoor seating, handicapped parking areas, front door drop-off area, and concealment of trash bins and A/C units. Drawings and renditions will be published when available.

Motions to call for a City Officers' Election as well as joint election agreement with FISD and Parmer County Hospital District were approved. This may be the first joint election agreement ever between the city and the hospital district.

Abbott issues disaster declaration, seeks fed help

Gov. Greg Abbot has issued a disaster declaration for Texas counties affected by the early February ice storm and is seeking a federal declaration as well for areas in Southeast Texas affected by rare January tornadoes. The ice storm caused considerable damage to property and power outages in the affected areas. The declaration for ice-storm damaged counties includes Denton, Hays, Henderson, Milam, Smith, Travis and Williamson counties.

"Through this disaster declaration, we will be able to provide additional assistance to Texans and communities who have experienced property damage and localized power outages from this ice storm," Abbott said.

The ice storm brought tree limbs snapping and crashing onto power lines. More than 170,000 Austin households were without power for several days, with some going more than 10 days without power.

Abbott also requested a presidential disaster declaration for counties in Southeast Texas hit by tornadoes and severe storms in late January. That request includes Harris, Jefferson, Liberty

and Orange counties. If that request is granted, residents and businesses in those counties would have access to federal loans and grants.

Religious freedom bills draw bipartisan support

Three bills have been filed in the Texas House aimed at improving Texans ability to practice their religions. The Austin American-Statesman reported that state Rep. Salman Bhojani, D-Euless, filed the bills to expand the state's list of optional holidays to include more religious holy days; prevent standardized tests being given on those days; and ensure that religious leaders of all faiths can legally perform marriages.

Bhojani, one of the state's first Muslim legislators, was joined at a news conference by Republican state Rep. Jacey Jetton, R-Richmond, who is Christian, and fellow Muslim state Rep. Suleman Lalani, D- Sugar Land.

"As legislators, it is our duty to ensure that Texas is the religious freedom state, where we can practice our faith with pride, where we can pray in a church, synagogue, mosque, temple, jamatkhana or gurdwara, where we can love God by any name," Bhojani said.

Plan to ban TikTok on stateowned devices released

Abbott last week also announced a security plan to ban the use of the popular video app TikTok as well as other software on all state-issued devices, as well as personal devices used to conduct state business. Abbott contends the Chinese-owned company can harvest data from TikTok user's devices and poses a security risk to Texas.

After Abbott issued the initial order in December, The University of Texas at Austin banned Tik-Tok on all its Wi-Fi networks. The latest security plan also includes other lesser-known apps, such as WeChat. A number of hardware manufacturers are also prohibited from being used by state agencies and employees.

TikTok, which is known for its short videos, is owned by the Chinese company ByteDance and has more than 86 million users in the United States.


Motions to approve an FEDC incentive agreement with TW&M Properties LLC concerning the housing project west of Legacy Pointe Senior Apartments and







Diesel prices down again

Average gasoline prices in Texas fell 10.9 cents last week, averaging \$2.95 per gallon, according to Gas-Buddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 7.3 cents per gallon higher than a month ago and stand 18.3 cents per gallon lower than a year ago. According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$2.27 while the most expensive was \$4.17 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline has fallen 7.3 cents in the last week, averaging \$3.37 per gallon. The national average is up 10.9 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 10.2 cents per gallon lower than a year ago. The national average price of diesel has fallen 7.3 cents in the last week and stands at \$4.53 per gallon, the lowest level since March 5, 2022.

"For a second straight week, the national average price of gasoline has declined, alongside the price of diesel which has fallen to its lowest level in nearly a year," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.

While diesel prices likely have a long way to fall as inventories continue to improve, gasoline prices in some areas have gone up in the last weeks as the transition to summer gasoline is just around the corner. In addition, GasBuddy data shows that gasoline demand has risen for the third straight week, a trend that will likely continue as we gradually see temperatures warm and the heart of winter moves to the rear view. Also, refinery maintenance season will soon be in full force, likely putting upward pressure on prices. On average, gasoline prices rise between 35 and 85 cents per gallon between March and Memorial Day, so motorists seeing prices fall should enjoy the declines while they last." GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

Handling Anxiety and Worry, pt 2

If you had a stroke or a heart attack, you would get to the ER asap. If you had a flat tire, you'd go to the tire shop pronto. If you had some tax problems or questions you'd find an accountant, but what is your plan of action when cares, worries and anxieties hit?

1 Peter 5:7 gives you a plan of action when you may struggle with anxieties and the cares of life. This verse says, "casting all your anxieties on him, because he cares for you." Notice that when the cares of life begin to crowd in on your soul, you are to go to the Lord with them. You can cast your cares and anxieties on him. This is much better than having a 10 step plan, or some other method that calls you to pull yourself up by your bootstraps, but casting your cares on the Lord is an invitation to lean on his presence, power and promises as you walk life.

Casting your cares on the Lord begins with prayer that lays those cares bare before the father and confesses the sin of being anxious, but it does not simply stop at prayer. Such drawing near to the Lord also grows faith and trust in the Lord by standing on his promises in the Bible, and living in light of those. Further, casting cares on the Lord involves surrounding yourself with other believers who can build you up in the Lord and be praying for you. In the end, casting your cares and anxieties on the Lord is not an effort to rid yourself of these burdens for the sake of an easier life, but it is an intentional clinging to the Lord in light of the trials and challenges before you, knowing that Christ himself is your peace (Eph 2:14) and that only Christ can calm the storm that anxiety, worry and fear churn up.

All public schools required to have an IPM program **By Susan Himes**

"This year it is more important than ever that IPM coordinators for their schools are aware of new rules and law changes they must adhere to," said Janet Hurley, AgriLife Extension integrated pest management specialist, Dallas, and school IPM training instructor.

All public schools in Texas are required under Texas Administrative Code to adopt, implement and maintain a school IPM program, but Hurley said many school districts are still not implementing their IPM programs to the letter of the law.

The Texas law requires each school board adopt an IPM policy that follows all legal requirements for pesticide use. The schools must make their policy available for the public to review. Importantly, each district must designate an IPM coordinator who ensures compliance with the IPM policy.

"In addition to our in-person classes, we also offer a six-hour school IPM course or the one-hour school IPM refresher course online," Hurley said. Participants may register for online trainings at https://tx.ag/OnlineSchoolIPM.

2022 Was Another Record Year for U.S. Farm Exports

The American agricultural sector posted its best export year ever in 2022 with international sales of U.S. farm and food products reaching \$196 billion, Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced today. Final 2022 trade data released earlier this week by the Commerce Department shows that U.S. agricultural exports increased 11 percent, or \$19.5 billion, from the previous record set in 2021.

"This second consecutive year of record-setting agricultural exports, coupled with a record \$160.5 billion in net farm income in 2022, demonstrates the success of the Biden-Harris Administration's efforts to create new and better markets for America's agricultural producers and businesses," Vilsack said. "We're strengthening relationships with our trading partners and holding those partners accountable for their commitments. We're making historic investments in infrastructure to strengthen supply chains and prevent market disruptions. We're knocking down trade barriers that hamper U.S. producers' access to key markets. And we're continuing to invest in export market development programs, partnering with industry to bring high-quality, cost-competitive U.S. products to consumers around the world."

The value of sales increased in all of the United States' top 10 agricultural export markets - China, Mexico, Canada, Japan, the European Union, South Korea, Taiwan, the Philippines, Colombia and Vietnam, with sales in seven of the 10 markets (China, Mexico, Canada, South Korea, Taiwan, the Philippines and Colombia) setting new records.

"While we remain committed to our established customer base around the world, we are also setting our sights on new growth opportunities in places like Africa, Latin America, the Middle East and Southeast Asia. Overall, there were 30 markets where U.S. exports exceeded \$1 billion in 2022 - an increase from 27 markets in 2021 demonstrating the broad global appeal of American-grown products," Vilsack noted.

The top commodities exported by the United States in 2022 were soybeans, corn, beef, dairy, cotton and tree nuts, which together comprised more than half of U.S. agricultural export value. International sales of many U.S. products including soybeans, cotton, dairy, beef, ethanol, poultry, soybean meal, distilled spirits and distillers' grains - reached record values.

"At the end of the day, agricultural trade is all about opportunities - for America's farmers and ranchers, for our rural communities, for the U.S. economy and for our global customers. We extend our gratitude to the Americans across the agricultural industry who create and support those opportunities by growing, processing, selling and shipping our farm and food products to the world," Vilsack said.


