



Texas again leads state in new corporate projects

Texas once again has topped the list for new and expanded corporate facilities added in a year, according to Site Selection Magazine. With 1,028 new projects in 2022, the state had more than the next two states combined – Illinois and Ohio.

"Texas truly is America's economic engine, and we stand apart as a model for the nation," Texas Gov. Greg Abbott said, according to The Dallas Morning News. "When choosing where to relocate or expand their businesses, more and more innovative industry leaders find themselves at home in our state."

Two projects valued at \$8.5 billion each helped snare the state's top spot: a chemical plant in Orange and a liquified natural gas plant in Corpus Christi. They were followed by a \$5 billion silicon wafer plant in Sherman.

"The Lone Star State's economy is larger than that of Canada, South Korea and Australia," Site Selection said in its March issue.

New court system for businesses proposed

A new court system devoted solely to settling business disputes is being proposed by the state's top three elected officials, though it has its share of critics as well. The Austin American-Statesman reported Abbott, House Speaker Dade Phelan and Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick in separate announcements proposed the creation of a specialty business court, modeled after the Chancery Court of Delaware. The court has been in existence for more than two centuries and has been emulated by a few dozen states. The specialty business court has been listed as a top priority of legislators during

Abbott said the court would provide consistency in applying state law when businesses end up court disputes. A high-powered lobby group, Texans for Lawsuit Reform, is backing the plan.

"Businesses today know the same case with the same facts can produce wildly varying outcomes simply based on which part of the state it's filed in and which judge is hearing it, and we know attorneys are telling their clients not to litigate in Texas because of this unpredictability," TLR spokeswoman Lucy Nashed Cafrelli said in the Statesman story.

The judges for the business court would be appointed by the governor, according to House bill 19, filed last week. The president of the Texas Trial Lawyers Association called that problematic.

"The bottom line is that Texans value electing their judges," San Antonio attorney Laura Tamez said.

Child fatalities drop in last fiscal vear

The number of children in Texas who died due to accidents, maltreatment and unsafe sleep declined by 27% in the last fiscal year. The Texas Department of Family and Protective Services reported 182 children died due to abuse and neglect in the state during fiscal year 2022. The most common causes of fatalities involving neglect were drowning, unsafe sleep, physical neglect and medical neglect, DFPS reported.

Children 3 years of age and younger comprised almost 80% of all confirmed child abuse and neglect fatalities over the past 10 fiscal years. However, in the past three years, there has been a marked increase in fatalities involving older children. In all confirmed cases of abuse and neglect, parents were the most common perpetrators.

College students join fight to end DUI deaths

With spring break approaching, the Texas Department of Transportation is joining with students at Texas A&M in a peer-to-peer program focused on highlighting the dangers of driving while under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

One person in the state dies every 7 hours and 41 minutes in a DUI-related crash, according to TxDOT. During spring break of 2021, Texas had 874 alcohol-related traffic crashes with 31 deaths and 107 serious injuries. TxDOT is partnering with U in the Driver Seat, a peer-to-peer program led by A&M students that is focused on saving lives by preventing DUI-related crashes. Student leaders from around the state are joining

the campaign and urging fellow students to always find a sober ride.

"Our message to students is this: Help keep yourself and others safe by finding a sober ride, taking a cab, using a rideshare, or simply staying put," said Marc Williams, TxDOT executive director.

TPWD celebrates park centennial with grants

As Texas state parks mark their 100th anniversary, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is awarding the largest sum of grants in the program's history. The agency is distributing more than \$2.8 million to create 55 new grant-funded partnerships across the state to promote conservation and recreation.

The Community Outdoor Outreach Program (CO-OP) was established in 1996 to introduce under-represented audiences to outdoor recreation, conservation and environmental education. Among the projects approved are students monitoring water quality along the Rio Grande, communities of color learning about the cultural history of the Buffalo Soldiers while hiking at Fort Davis State Park, and breast cancer survivors learning to fly fish in the state's rivers.


The grants are funded through a portion of Texas' sporting goods sales tax.

Daylight saving time starts Sunday

Spring is approaching, and so is daylight saving time, which starts at 2 a.m. Sunday, March 12. Clocks jump ahead an hour, so if you forget to adjust the time you are liable to show up for church an hour late and miss the service.

The first two countries to use daylight saving time were Germany and Austria in 1916. They did so to save fuel used for artificial lights during World War I. The United States followed suit in 1918.




When Helen Keller was 19 months old in 1882, she caught a fever that seized her eyesight and snatched her speech.


Five years later, 20-year-old-Annie Sullivan "...arrived at Ivy Green, the Keller family estate...and began working to socialize her wild, stubborn student and teach her by "[using a finger to] spell out words in Keller's hand," according to History.com. "Keller went on to learn how to read, write and speak. With Sullivan's assistance, Keller attended Radcliffe College...graduated with honors in [1904"], morphed into a public speaker, an author, and "even formed a vaudeville act [with Sullivan] to educate the public and earn money. [Sullivan passed away in 1936] Helen Keller died on June 1, 1968 at 87 leaving her mark on the world by helping to alter perceptions about the disabled."



Small Town Cookin' By Jeri Lynn White

"Eat Your Noodles" Day

March 11th is National "Eat Your Noodles" Day. So just in case you don't have a go to recipe for noodles, I found one that looks interesting. If you like egg rolls, you will enjoy this twist as a noodle dish.

EGG ROLL NOODLES

www.chelseasmessyapron.com

INGREDIENTS

- 3 packages (3 ounces EACH) ramen noodles, seasoning packets discarded (Note 1)
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil, divided 1/2 large yellow onion very thinly sliced
- 1/2 tablespoon EACH: finely minced garlic and finely minced ginger (~2-3 cloves garlic, and ~1 inch piece ginger)
- 3/4ths of 1 pound of ground pork (Note 2)
- 1 large red bell pepper, cut into very thin strips (~1 heaping cup)
- 3 cups green cabbage, thinly sliced 3/4 cup matchstick carrots SAUCE
- 1/2 tablespoon cornstarch 3 tablespoons lite soy sauce
- 1/3 cup low-sodium chicken broth 2 teaspoons sesame oil
- 1 tablespoon EACH: light brown sugar, rice vinegar
- 2 tablespoons oyster sauce
- 1/2 tablespoon Sriracha sauce, optional
- 1/4 teaspoon white or black pepper, ground
- Garnish with: 3-4 green onions, a few drizzles of sesame oil

INSTRUCTIONS

SAUCE: Start by whisking together the sauce. In a small bowl, use a fork to whisk together the 1/2 tablespoon cornstarch with 1 tablespoon soy sauce. Once smooth,

add in the remaining 2 tablespoons soy sauce, 1/3 cup chicken broth, 2 teaspoons sesame oil, 1 tablespoon light brown sugar, 1 tablespoon rice vinegar, 2 tablespoons oyster sauce, 1/2 tablespoon Sriracha sauce, and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Whisk until smooth and set aside.

VEGGIE PREP: Prepare the rest of your veggies because the cooking goes quickly! Halve an onion and very thinly slice the half. Finely mince the ginger and the garlic. Thinly slice the cabbage. Remove the stem and seeds from the red pepper and slice it very thinly. Thinly slice the green onions.

RAMEN: Discard seasoning packets. Follow package directions to cook the ramen noodles, cooking for 1 minute less than the package directs. Drain noodles and immediately toss with 1 tablespoon vegetable oil. Set aside.

COOK PORK: Heat a wok or large, deep sauté pan (12 inches minimum) over high heat. Add remaining 1 tablespoon vegetable oil and swirl to coat. Once the oil is shimmering, add in the onion. Reduce the heat as needed and cook for 3-4 minutes and then reduce the heat to medium high. Stir in the ginger and garlic, cooking for 30 seconds to a minute or until fragrant. Push the onions to the edges of the pan, return the heat to high, and add the ground pork in the center of the

pan. Let it cook for 30 seconds without touching. Then, use a wooden spoon to break apart the meat into crumbles and cook until it's no longer pink, about 5-7 minutes. Integrate the onions, garlic, and ginger into the pork.

COOK VEGGIES: Reduce the heat back to medium high. Add the red pepper, chopped cabbage, and matchstick carrots. It will seem like a lot, but it cooks down quickly. Stirfry for 2-3 minutes and then add the noodles and the sauce. Continue to cook, tossing everything vigorously with tongs for about 2-4 more minutes or until sauce is absorbed into the mixture and the veggies are all crisp tender.

FINISHING: Taste and add additional soy sauce, Sriracha, and salt and/or pepper as needed. Top with green onions and enjoy while hot. Drizzle additional Sriracha or sesame oil on individual plates if desired.

Note 1: Noodles: Alternatively, use 9 ounces of chow Mein noodles.

Note 2: Ground Pork: We usually get packages of 1.5 pounds of ground pork, so we save half of it for another recipe or to make these noodles again! If you only have a 1- pound package, you can throw the whole thing in if preferred (as opposed to the 3/4ths a pound the recipe calls for). This will simply make for a slightly meatier dish.

Gas prices predicted to spring forward

Average gasoline prices in Texas rose 7.2 cents last week to an average of \$2.93 per gallon, according to GasBuddy's survey of 13,114 stations in Texas. Prices in Texas are 10.3 cents lower than a month ago and stand 77.6 cents lower than a year ago. According to GasBuddy price reports, the cheapest station in Texas was priced at \$2.29 while the most expensive was \$4.17 per gallon.

The national average price of gasoline has risen 3.5 cents per gallon in the last week, averaging \$3.36/g today. The national average is down 6.5 cents per gallon from a month ago and stands 69.3 cents per gallon lower than a year ago. The national average price of diesel fell 4.6 cents last week and stands at \$4.34 per gallon.

"The national average rose last week as the transition to summer gasoline has now started across the entire country. The higher cost of these various blends is being passed along to motorists, as we see every year ahead of the

summer driving season," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.

Summarizing his weekly report, De Hann continued, "Some regions are moving to the required summer gasoline in different steps than others, and the fragmentation of required blends absolutely plays a role in these price increases. Logistical challenges in making the transition during a time when refiners are also doing maintenance work can create hotspots and lead to noticeable jumps in prices during the spring. While we may not see weekly increases, the overall trend will remain upward through much of the spring. By Memorial Day, most of the nation will be transitioned to their respective required blend of fuel, and gas prices could ease, but a \$4 per gallon national average remains possible by then."

GasBuddy data is compiled from more than 11 million weekly price reports covering over 150,000 gas stations across the country.

The folks at the 6th St. Church of Christ would like to extend a heartfelt "Thank You" to our community. For the better part of 30 years, we have supported a clothing work that benefited two children's homes. It started with the Medina Children's Home in Medina, Texas, who later joined forces with the Boles Home in Quinlan, Texas to form Arms of Hope. Through your generous donations we have been able to send thousands of pounds of clothing to this organization that serves children in need and single mothers trying to make ends meet. The clothing and

other items over the years have served in three basic ways. Who knows, maybe you can give your kids a crash course in booking bets on the games and earn some money for a two-week vacation this summer. Then if anyone asks what you did over spring break, you just tell them you made your children do "math enrichment."

Where Are You Going For Spring Break?

Parmer County, Texas - Spring Break in Texas is a very popular time for young adults and college students to head to the beach. We want to remind everyone when you are making plans for Spring Break, make sure a sober driver is top priority.

This can be a particudangerous and deadly time on Texas roadways. Each Spring Break, too many young, promising lives are cut

short due to the fateful and regrettable decision to get behind the wheel and drive drunk.

In an effort to stop this deadly trend, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service's Watch UR BAC program and The Texas Department of Transportation (Tx-DOT) are partnering to raise awareness on impaired driving during the Spring Break holiday. The message is for everyone to arrive at

their destination sober, safe, and smiling.

Even one life lost is too many. This campaign reminds young adults to know how they are getting home before they start drinking. There are many ways to find a sober ride home, such as asking a friend or family member to be a designated driver, taking mass transit, or using a rideshare service.

"We want everyone to have a happy and safe Spring Break, one that they will remember for years to come, but for all the right reasons," said AgriLife Extension Family and Community Health Agent Wendy Case, Parmer County. "We've partnered with TxDOT to help remind drivers that even one drink before driving is when impairment begins. Under no circumstance is it ever OK to drink and drive. This behavior is illegal, it is deadly, and it is selfish. Do everyone a favor: If you will be drinking during Spring Break, or for any occasion, plan ahead for a sober ride."

In Texas, it is illegal for anyone under 21 to state's legal limit for inbreath alcohol concenover the age 21. Law enforcement officers can a BAC below .08 with on the driver's behavior.

Drivers under the influence of alcohol may face up to \$17,000 in fines and fees, jail time, and could lose their license.

Watch UR BAC and TxDOT also strongly encourage partygoers to exercise caution in overdosing on alcohol. Know the signs of an alcohol overdose and when someone needs emergency medical care. If any of the following signs after drinking are observed, do not hesitate to request emergency assistance:

- Unconsciousness
- Vomiting
- Seizures
- Slow breathing
- Slow heart rate
- Clammy skin

- Delayed responses
- Low body temperature • Skin or lips turning blue
- Paleness

Celebrate with a Plan

This Spring Break, the Watch UR BAC program and TxDOT urge drivers to designate a sober driver before heading out. If planning on drinking, plan how to safely travel without driving.

AgriLife Extension Family and Community Health Educator Wendy Case, Parmer County, reminds drivers to follow these tips for a safe night on the roads:

• Remember: It is never OK to drink and drive. Designate a sober driver, or plan to use public transportation or a ride service to get home safe-

- Suspect a motorist on the road is driving drunk or intoxicated? Call 911 immediately.
- · Have a friend who is about to drink and drive? Take their keys away and make arrangements to get them home safely.
