Community mourns death of Dr. Frank Cadenhead

"I urge you to live a life worthy of the calling you have received." These words found in the book of Ephesians, seem to sum up the life of Dr. Frank Cadenhead, Jr.

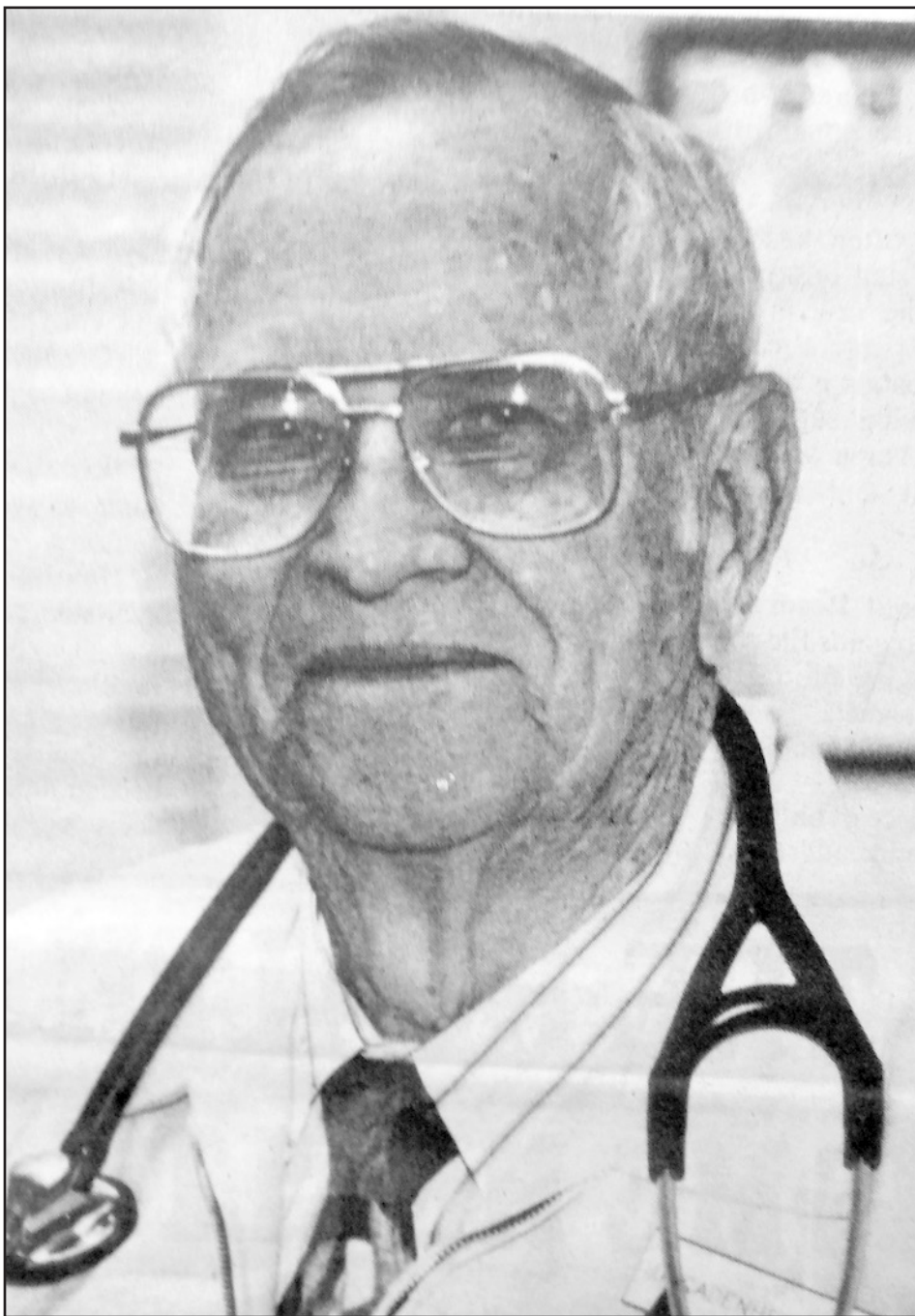
Anyone who knew the quiet spoken and gentle spirited Dr. Frank, knew he was very committed to his calling as a Christian, a family man, a doctor and an active member of the community.

Dr. Frank knew at an early age he wanted to be a doctor, following in the footsteps of his father, Dr. J.F. Cadenhead, who had a practice in Weinert. His preparation to that end began when he finished high school at the age of fifteen, and then enrolled at Hardin-Simmons, graduating in three years with a degree in chemistry and biology. From there he went to Vanderbilt University Medical School in Nashville, Tennessee where at the age of twenty-one, he earned his medical degree. During this time, he was also a member of the Air Force Reserve.

After finishing school, he was sent by the Reserve to San Antonio for an internship, where he met a young nurse from Mississippi by the name of Billie Buntyn. They married and spent the next sixty-eight years together, raising a family of two sons and two daughters.

Dr. Frank was later stationed at other Air Force bases, where he made the rank of captain and was named Chief of Medical Staff.

In an earlier interview with Mary Kaigler for the Haskell Free Press, he said he returned to this area, to assist his ailing father in his practice. His plans of

opening a practice in Alpine changed when on July 1, 1947 he began practicing medicine locally, as he joined Dr. Ernest Kimbrough at Haskell.

In the following decades of practicing medicine, Dr. Frank commented that through the years, he had treated almost everything imaginable. He was amazed

at the breakthroughs in medicine that occurred during his lifetime.

For more than forty years, he worked in surgery, obstetrics, and saw patients in his office and the hospital. He said the most pleasurable part was delivering babies. He estimated that they number between 2500 and 3000, extending into second and

third generations. Another favorite part was surgery, at which he was very skilled.

In 1978, he was joined at the Haskell Clinic by his son, Dr. Wayne Cadenhead. Dr. Frank said that association was one of his greatest joys and honors as a father.

Dr. Cadenhead received many honors and recognitions throughout his career,

including being awarded the prestigious Keeter Award for outstanding service. He was also recognized by the Taylor, Jones, Haskell County Medical Society for "a lifetime of exemplary commitment and service to family, patients, church and community." He and his wife were also named Citizens of the Year in 1991. He served many years on the Board of Development for Hardin-Simmons University.

Although a skilled and successful doctor, Dr. Frank felt his family and his church were his most rewarding things in life. He served as a deacon of the First Baptist Church since 1955, and was very active in church missions. He and Billie made many mission trips where he served as a doctor and surgeon.

He was very proud of his children, grandchildren and great grandchildren, and enjoyed taking pictures of his family, which he shared with family and friends.

Dr. Frank Cadenhead retired in 2000 from his role as doctor, after fifty-three years of compassionate care of his patients. He continued to enjoy reading and keeping up with medical advancements.

He told Kaigler in that interview, that he was convinced that nothing in life is a coincidence, believing instead that there is a plan, a reason and a purpose for all that happens. Dr. Frank Cadenhead knew what his calling was, and this community and the surrounding area, as well as those he helped on mission trips, were the beneficiaries of the life he truly lived "worthy of his calling."

Indians scalp the Seymour Panthers, 49-14

The Haskell Indians defeated the Seymour Panthers 49 to 14, in a district contest held at Indian Field.

Head Coach Grady Benton said of the game, "We were backed into a corner in a must win situation and we had no choice but to fight our way out. We challenged each other to soul search and to focus on our individual responsibility to the team."

The Indians had forty-two carries for 280 yards rushing and 155 yards passing for the night.

Leading the ground attack were Lane Burson with 13 carries for 86 yards, Dylan Hanson with 14 carries for 105 yards, Kellen Parks with 2 carries for 30 yards, and Devon Barrios with 5 carries for 46 yards.

In the air, Hanson

completed seven of seventeen passes for 121 yards, Alec Roewe threw two passes for 3 yards and Parks completed one pass for 31 yards.

On the receiving end of those passes were Parks, catching four passes for 32 yards; Sam Fouts, one pass for 34 yards; Henry Smith, two catches for 62 yards; and Burson, one pass for 24 yards.

Coach Benton continued, "I am very proud of my guys' response and what they stand for. Human nature is to blame others when things don't go right. My football program refused to make excuses, stepped up and took individual responsibility for a poor performance against Electra, and responded like champions this week. There is nothing more pleasing as

a coach than watching your team do everything possible all week to earn the right to win and then be rewarded for that effort."

This win brings the Indians' record to 4-3 overall and 1-1 in district play.

Dr. James Frank Cadenhead

Dr. James Frank Cadenhead lead a blessed and wonderful life for almost 91 years and left this world to meet his Savior and Lord, Jesus Christ, Friday morning, Oct. 17. Funeral services were held Tues., Oct. 21, at the First Baptist Church in Haskell with Rev. Greg Gassaway officiating. Interment was at Willow Cemetery in Haskell under the direction of Smith Family Funeral Homes.

Dr. James Frank Cadenhead, Jr., was born Nov. 7, 1923. He was the first born of two sons to Dr. James Frank Cadenhead, Sr., and Jewel Cadenhead of Weinert.

Dr. Cadenhead, Jr., started school a year early, skipped a grade in elementary school, and graduated from Weinert High School at the age of 15 years.

He entered Hardin Simmons University in Abilene. Due to the war efforts, he attended college during the summer and winter and graduated at the age of 18 years. He then

entered Vanderbilt Medical School, again attending summer and winter, and graduated from medical school at the age of 21 years.

He was in the air force doing an internship in San Antonio, where he met and married Billie Jayne Buntyn prior to being transferred to Goodfellow Air Force Base in San Angelo. In 1947 he was released from active duty with the assistance of the honorable Omar Bureson to return to Weinert to help care for his father who was terminally ill with cancer.

Dr. Frank originally began his practice in Weinert and Haskell—splitting his time between each town. This soon became a full-time practice in Haskell, in the Haskell Clinic where he shared facilities with Dr. Kimbrough, Dr. Williams, and Dr. Nail. Dr. Nail soon left and Dr. Thigpen joined the clinic. Dr. Williams retired and Dr. Colbert joined. Dr. Frank's son, Dr. Wayne Cadenhead, joined the ranks and they were privileged to practice together for 20 years. At the age of 77 years and having served Haskell and the surrounding areas for nearly 53 years, Dr. Frank retired. He delivered children to children he delivered. The number of people who were delivered by Dr. Frank number in the thousands.

Dr. Frank and his wife Billie were active members of the community. He served through the Lion's Club of America for many years. He was a school board member of Haskell ISD for several terms as well as on the

board of trustees at Hardin-Simmons University.

Dr. Frank and Billie loved to serve the Lord. They were very active in First Baptist Church, Haskell, for 67 years where they were members. He was also involved in mission work around the world, including Mexico and Venezuela, both financially and personally. He was involved in medical mission work in Zaire, Rwanda and in Jibla, Yemen. He knew and corresponded with many missionaries around the world by mail and e-mail for years as long as his health allowed.

His love was Jesus Christ. His pride and joy was Billie. His secondary pride and joy was his children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren.

He leaves behind his wife of 68 years, Billie; four children, daughter, Diann Procter and husband Bill; son, Wayne Cadenhead and wife Yuvi; son, J.F. Cadenhead and wife Ann; and daughter, Helen Mary. He also leaves ten grandchildren—two grandchildren having gone before him, and eleven great grandchildren.

He was a God-fearing man who left behind a Godly legacy.

Serving as pallbearers for Dr. Cadenhead were Jeremy Cadenhead, Josh Cadenhead, Casey Cadenhead, Jason Gibson, Lon Biebighauser, Donnie Skiles, Joe Yates, Bill Procter and Charles Gibson.

He moved to Haskell in 1956, starting his coaching and teaching career. While in Haskell, he met and married his wife Janice Hester June 13, 1959.

While coaching in Haskell High School, he was the only coach to have won district titles coaching both the men's and women's basketball teams. After a few years coaching, Jimmy began a long career in farming and ranching from 1962 to 1986. He then returned to teaching by Janice's side at Haskell Elementary in 1986 and retired from Haskell ISD in 2000.

Throughout Jimmy's life, he touched many people. In addition to teaching in the Haskell School system for many years, he has been very active in the community and with their four children. Jimmy was scout leader for his sons scout troop and oversaw the earning of their Eagle Scout award. He was a member of the Jaycee's and served on the city council for a number of years. He was an Elder of the First Presbyterian Church, an active member of the Haskell County Retired Teachers Association, and even a member of the Haskell Flying Club. He loved spending time in the outdoors: camping in the mountains, fishing in East Texas lakes, and bird hunting on the family land northeast of Haskell. Born April 2, 1944 in Monahans, he was the son

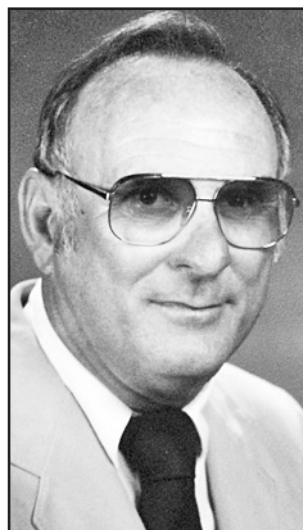

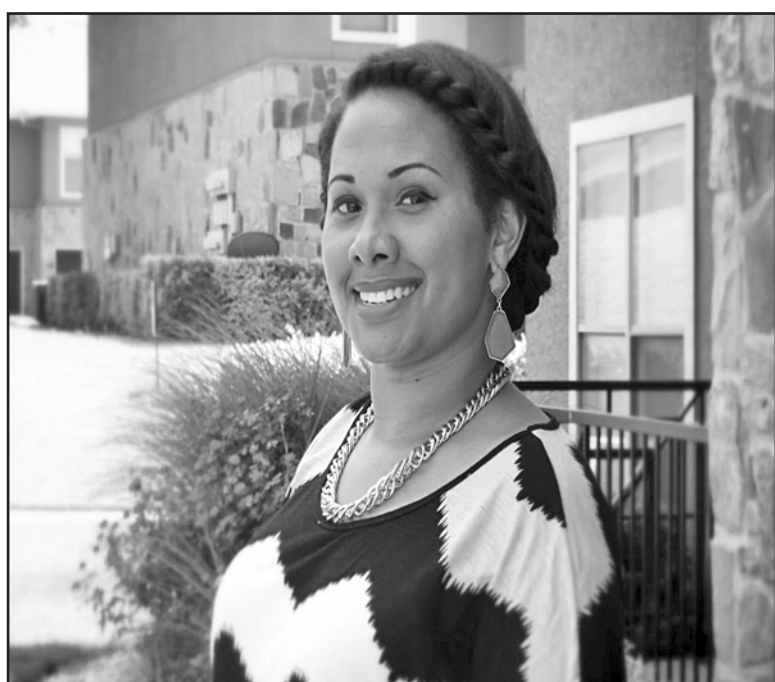

4-H'ers attend food show

Rolling Plains District 4-H Food Show was held Sat., Oct. 18 at the Wilbarger Auditorium in Vernon.

In the Food & Nutrition Project, 4-H members learn the importance of including foods from each of the basic food groups of MyPlate in the daily diet. They learn the principles of nutrition as they relate to health, physical fitness and appearance as well as acquiring and demonstrating skills in planning, purchasing, preparing and serving tasty, attractive and nutritious meals and snacks. 4-H is the youth development and leadership program of the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service.

Approximately 110 4-H members from 24 counties in the Rolling Plains District competed in the Food Show. Entrants competed in Senior, Intermediate and Junior Divisions. Each division has four food classes: Protein, Fruit and Vegetable, Grains, and Dairy. Contestants in the District event are all winners of their County Food Show. Senior Division winners in each category of the District Food Show will advance to the State 4-H Food Show next June in College Station.

The New/Ancient "Super Grain" Quinoa by Colton Hopkins Haskell County 4-H

Agent's note: Hopkins wrote this article and received special recognition at the District 4-H Food Show.

Nutrient-rich, whole grain quinoa comes from the South America Andes mountains. It looks like you pronounce it "Keen-noah," but the Inca Indians pronounce it "Keen-wah."

It is an ancient grain, like millet, amaranth, faro and sorghum. It is being named the "Super Grain" because it has twice the protein, iron and fiber of rice. It is gluten-free, like most all ancient grains are.

There is a saying, "What once was old is new again." This is true about many of our whole-grains which originated in ancient times. Quinoa is a sacred grain of the Inca Indians, with a history dating back thousands of years with a rich cultural tradition as the traditional grain of the Andes.

It is a good thing that this whole grain is not just ancient history because it is tasty, nutritious addition to modern meals. This super grain of the ancient world is wonderfully healthy and its unique flavor and texture will add a delicious twist to your favorite recipes. It is versatile, as well. It is good for side dishes, salads, entrees and snacks.

Native to South America, quinoa is a pseudo grain—actually a gluten-free seed, but used in cooking like a whole-grain. It does need to be rinsed and air dried to remove the naturally occurring bitter saponins.

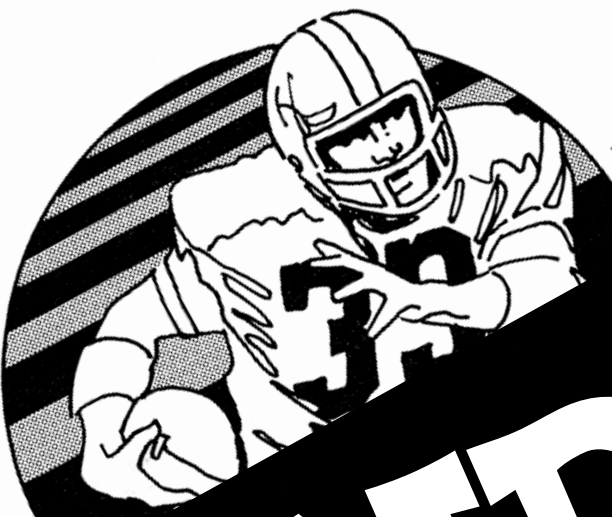

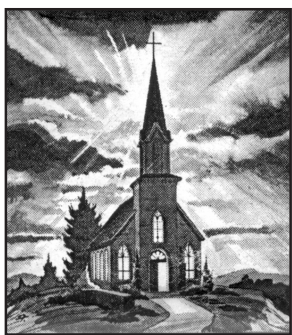

Early voting underway

With just under two weeks until the November 4 general election, campaigning is in full swing.

Although earlier U.S. District Judge Nelva Gonzalez Ramos of Corpus Christi ruled that the state cannot enforce the voter identification law, the U.S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals issued a stay on the injunction. The U.S. Supreme Court on Oct. 18 let stand the order, thereby allowing Texas' 2011 voter identification law to remain in force for the time being.

There will be several contested state and federal races. Vying to become the next Governor of Texas is Republican Greg Abbott, Democrat Wendy Davis, Libertarian Kathie Glass and Green Party candidate Brandon Parmer. Lieutenant Governor candidates from the two major parties are Dan Patrick, Republican and Leticia Van de Putte, Democrat.

The Attorney General's position is also on the ballot, with Ken Paxton, Sam Houston, Jamie Balagia

and Jamar Osborne hoping to win the office. Our state representative for District 68, Drew Springer, is unopposed.

Other contested races are Comptroller of Public Accounts, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Commissioner of Agriculture and Railroad Commissioner. In addition, voters will decide on Justices for the Supreme Court, Judges for Court of Criminal Appeals, and members of State Board of Education.

On the federal level, we will be electing a U.S. Representative for District 19, with Republican incumbent Randy Neugebauer, Democrat Neal Marchbanks and Libertarian Richard Peterson seeking the job.

On the ballot for U.S. Senator is incumbent John Cornyn, David Alameel and Rebecca Paddock.

There are no contested county races. Haskell County incumbents who have filed for re-election include Democrats Shane Hadaway, 39th Judicial District Judge; David Davis, County Judge; Belia Abila, County Clerk;

Penny Anderson, District Clerk; Tiffen Mayfield, County Commissioner Prec. 2; Neal Kreger, County Commissioner Prec. 4; Lynn Dodson, Justice of the Peace; and Pamela Norton, Party Chairman. Locally on the Republican ticket is Janis McDaniel, County Treasurer and Brian Burgess, Party Chairman.

Early voting will be held October 20 through October 31 at the Haskell County courthouse, Mon-Thurs. 8:30 to 5:00 and Fri. 8:30 to 4:30. They are closed for lunch from 12-1 p.m. The last day to apply for a ballot by mail is October 24.

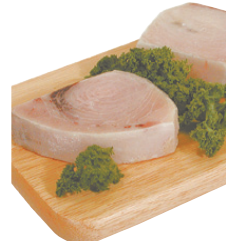
