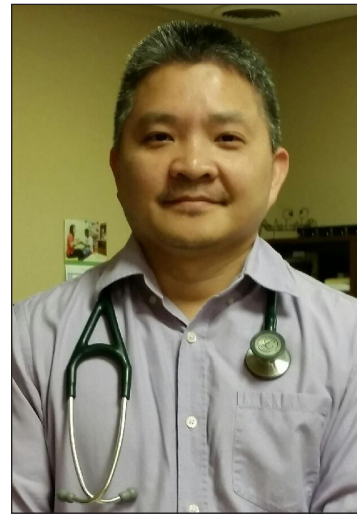
Hayden Scott Helton

The event is free of charge and we welcome everyone in the area to come out and enjoy a great evening!

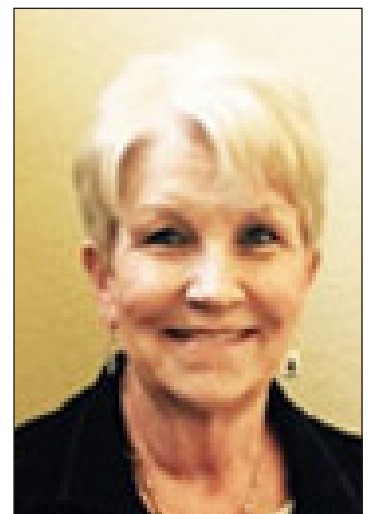
Co. Historical Committee’s Red River Wars Summit

You are invited to attend the Red River War Summit on June 26th and 27th in Old Mobeetie, Texas, hosted by the Wheeler County Historical Commission. The purpose of the gathering is to provide an educational and entertaining community event as well as create a commemorative tourism initiative to inform communities and travelers about the clash between two cultures that became known as the Red River War. Partners in organizing and promoting this event include the Panhandle Tourism Marketing Council, the Panhandle Plains Historical Museum and the Texas Plains Trail Region.

Part one, held on Sunday

June 26th is the event to kickoff, celebrate and announce to the world that the history of the Red River War campaign is alive and ready to move forward, leading to Monday’s workshop. Native American, U.S. military and Texan storytellers and historical re-enactors will dramatically recount the history and events leading up to the 1874-75 Red River War Campaign. This family friendly day will be held in the Old Mobeetie Arbor / Old Fort Elliott, starting 5 PM on June 26th with a tour, chuck wagon dinner, Native American Blessing and Storytelling by moonlight.

Not all mosquito types transmit the Zika virus. It is primarily transmitted through the bite of an infected Aedes mosquito (A. aegypti and

FSA Funding Available For Farm Ownership And Farm Operation

USDA Texas Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director, Judith A. Canales, reminds producers that FSA offers targeted farm ownership and farm operating loans to assist underserved applicants as well as beginning farmers and ranchers.

“Each year, a portion of FSA’s loan funds are set aside to lend to targeted underserved and beginning farmers and ranchers,” said Canales. “Farming

USDA defines underserved applicants as a group whose members have been subjected to racial, ethnic, or gender prejudice because of their identity as members of the group without regard to their individual qualities. For

USDA Announces Development Of Streamline Crop Reporting

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) today announced that farmers and ranchers filing crop acreage reports with the Farm Service Agency (FSA) and participating insurance providers approved by the Risk Management Agency (RMA) now can provide the common information from their acreage reports at one office and the information will be electronically shared with the other location.

This new process is part of the USDA Acreage Crop Reporting Streamlining Initiative (ACRSI). This interagency collaboration also includes participating private crop insurance agents and insurance companies, all working to streamline the information collected from farmers and ranchers who participate in USDA programs.

Monday June 27th will be a collaborative strategy workshop for analyzing how the story of the Red River War might be best told and effectively imparted through coordinated outreach efforts extended to the public. Strategies will be devised for implementing interpretation, education, and promotion benefiting museums, sites, and communities within the Red River War region. The strategy workshop will begin at 9am in the Old Mobeetie Jail Museum Visitors Center Conference Room.

This important day of hands-on sessions will be spent working on the Red River War project and discovering how institutions can take part. The Red River War project would benefit from input provided by area museums, marketing professionals, visitor bureaus, chambers of commerce, historians and educators to help create a tourism experience in the area. Those experienced in these areas and who can help devise partnerships and marketing initiatives are needed and welcomed to join in this effort. farm loan program purposes, targeted underserved groups are women, African Americans, American Indians and Alaskan Natives, Hispanics, and Asians and Pacific Islanders.

Underserved or beginning farmers and ranchers who cannot obtain commercial credit from a bank can apply for either FSA direct loans or guaranteed loans. Direct loans are made to applicants by FSA. Guaranteed loans are made by lending institutions who arrange for FSA to guarantee the loan.

FSA can guarantee up to 95 percent of the loss of principal and interest on a loan. The FSA guarantee allows lenders to make agricultural credit available to producers who do not meet the lender's normal underwriting criteria.

"During fiscal year 2015, Texas FSA obligated \$157.6 million in loans and guarantees to assist 1,592 targeted underserved and beginning producers," said Canales.

The direct and guaranteed loan program provides for two types of loans: farm ownership loans and farm operating loans.

Farm ownership loan funds may be used to purchase or enlarge a farm or ranch, purchase easements or rights of way needed in the farm's operation, build or improve buildings such as a dwelling or barn, promote soil and water conservation and development and pay closing costs.

Farm operating loan funds may be used to purchase livestock, poultry, farm equipment, fertilizer, and other materials necessary to operate a successful farm. Operating loan funds can also be used for family living expenses, refinancing debts under certain conditions, paying salaries for hired farm laborers, installing or improving water systems for home, livestock, or irrigation use and other similar improvements.

In addition to customary farm operating and ownership loans, FSA now offers Microloans through the direct

loan program. The focus of Microloans is on the financing needs of small, beginning farmer, niche and non-traditional farm operations, such as truck farms, farms participating in direct marketing and sales such as farmers' markets, CSA's (Community Supported Agriculture), restaurants and grocery stores, or those using hydroponic, aquaponic, organic and vertical growing methods. Microloans are available for both ownership and operating finance needs. To learn more about microloans, visit www.fsa.usda.gov/microloans.

Repayment terms for direct operating loans depend on the collateral securing the loan and usually run from one to seven years. Financing for direct farm ownership loans cannot exceed 40 years. Interest rates for direct loans are set periodically according to the Government's cost of borrowing. Guaranteed loan terms and interest rates are set by the lender.

To qualify as a beginning producer, the individual or entity must meet the eligibility requirements outlined for direct or guaranteed loans. Additionally, individuals and all entity members must have operated a farm for less than 10 years. Applicants must materially or substantially participate in the operation.

For farm ownership purposes, the applicant must not own a farm greater than 30 percent of the average size farm in the county at the time of application. All direct farm ownership applicants must have participated in the business operations of a farm for at least three years out of the last 10 years prior to the date the application is submitted. If the applicant is an entity, all members must be related by blood or marriage and all entity members must be eligible beginning farmers.

one location, the data that's important to both FSA and RMA will be securely and electronically shared with the other location," said FSA Administrator Val Dolcini. "This will avoid redundant and duplicative reporting, and we expect this to save farmers and ranchers time."

"Accuracy in crop reporting is a key component for crop insurance, because an error in this information can affect premiums or claims. This is going to greatly improve efficiencies and reduce mistakes," said RMA Administrator Brandon Willis.

Since 2009, USDA has been working to streamline the crop reporting process for agricultural producers, who have expressed concerns with providing the same basic common information for multiple locations. In 2013, USDA consolidated the deadlines to 15 dates for submitting these reports, down from the previous 54 dates at RMA and 17 dates for FSA. USDA representatives believe farmers and ranchers will experience a notable improvement in the coming weeks as they approach the peak season for crop reporting later this summer.

More than 93 percent of all annual reported acres to FSA and RMA now are eligible for the common data reporting, and USDA is exploring adding more crops. Producers must still visit both locations to validate and sign acreage reports, complete maps or provide program-specific information. The common data from the first-filed acreage report will now be available to pre-populate and accelerate completion of the second report. Plans are underway at USDA to continue building upon the framework with additional efficiencies at a future date.

Dolcini also reminded farmers and ranchers that they can now access their FSA farm information from the convenience of their home computer. "You can see your field boundaries, images of your farm, conservation status, operator and owner information and much more," said Dolcini.

The new customer self-service portal, known as FSAFarm+, gives farmers and ranchers online access to securely view, print or export their personal farm data. To enroll in the online service, producers are encouraged to contact their local FSA office for details. To find a local FSA office in your area, visit <http://offices.usda.gov>.

possibly A. albopictus). These mosquitoes are mainly found in South Texas and along the Texas coast, but are also present in other parts of Texas, especially urban environments. They typically lay eggs in and near standing water in things like buckets, bowls, animal dishes, flower pots and vases. They live indoors and outdoors.

Contracting Zika

Even if you don't know you're infected, mosquitoes that bite you could transmit the virus to others. Mosquitoes may pick up certain viruses, such as Zika, from biting a human who has a Zika infection. The mosquito takes a blood meal from the human and takes in the virus in the human's blood. Then, after about 7-10 days, the mosquito may pass the Zika virus to other humans when biting them. The illness is usually mild with symptoms lasting several days to a week.

Most Texas cases of Zika are related to travel. People were bitten by an infected mosquito while traveling to areas where Zika is being spread and then diagnosed after returning home.

Although rare, the Zika virus may also be among the causes of Guillain-Barré syndrome, a condition in which your immune system attacks part of your nervous system. The Zika virus also can be spread from mother to child, if the mother is infected with the Zika virus during pregnancy.

The Zika virus has been linked to birth defects such as microcephaly, a condition where a baby's head is much smaller than expected and can cause developmental delays.

There have not been any reports of pets or other kinds of animals spreading or contracting Zika.

Sexual contact, blood transfusion

The Zika virus can also be spread through sexual contact and blood transfusion. In known cases of sexual transmission, men had Zika symptoms and spread the virus to sex partners. Research shows the virus might persist in semen longer than in blood; studies to determine the duration of persistence in semen are not yet completed.

To date, there have not been any confirmed blood transfusion transmission cases in the United States. The best way to protect the U.S. blood supply is to screen blood donors using the donor history questionnaire and asking about recent travel to areas with active transmission of Zika, according to the American Association of Blood Banks. That's because there is no screening test or vaccine available for Zika at this time. The FDA recommends that individuals at risk for Zika virus infection postpone blood donations for four weeks. Details about the FDA's response to Zika is available on their website.
