STAMPEDES

You could probably say I went to a few too many cowboy movies when I was a kid, and you might be right. For those of us who grew up without TV, that movie on Saturday night was something we really looked forward to. They all had a few things in common. Cowboys liked to sing, the trail drive cook was always a gripey old guy, the bad guys wouldn't start shooting till the song was

finished, bullets ricocheted a lot and it was always the bad guy who got ran over by the stampeding cows. When I was about nine years old, I did get involved in a chicken stampede once. It happened one morning when I opened the door to let the chickens out for the day. My dog ran in and scared them off the roost and they all tried to get out at once. The only thing I got out of that was one small scratch, a few feathers and a good bit of dust. It makes you feel better, if you aren't the only one to get scared and stampede. My friend Billy and I went to work for an outfit, to do some work on a boiler in a gas plant one time. The first thing the boss told us to do was to take a cutting torch and bottles outside, because they were too close to another boiler. I accidentally knocked the oxygen bottle over and it fell against the acetylene regulator and broke it off. I hadn't got around to shutting the valve off yet, so it was spewing out acetylene. It immediately caught fire and Billy took off, with me on his heels. We ran for about a hundred yards before we stopped. Our boss simply walked over and closed the valve. We both figured he'd fire us, but he never mentioned it. Years later, I went to work for Texaco oil Co. in a refinery in Amarillo. After a three-day orientation about all the hazards in a refinery, I finally went down to the operating unit to work. They were just finishing up a unit they'd been working on, and were testing some equipment. One of those was a big engine that ran on natural gas. All at once, there was a really loud boom, and away I went, as fast as I could run. After about a hundred yards or so, I looked back. Nobody else ran, just me. That really makes you feel silly. Turns out, it was the engine backfired and blew the muffler off. Everybody but me knew that. Later on, I got to see some new guys do the same thing. We even came up with a name for it. We called it, "the solitary stampede." Somehow, you feel vindicated when you're not the only one to do that.

Mustang Season Ends

We all know about upsides and downsides. The upside to the Mustangs area playoff game last Friday night in Seymour was outscoring the Hamlin Pied Pipers 28-14 over the last 18-30 of the game. The downside, a major downside at that, was the final 66-34 score that ended the Mustangs 2016 season. Five turnovers, a blocked punt and six personal foul penalties doomed the Black and Gold on the night. They refused to give up however, battling stubbornly to the end, turning a 46 point deficit and single digit point total into 34 points.

Hamlin capitalized on a blocked punt and a fumble kickoff return to build a quick 14-0 first quarter lead. The Mustangs would respond with a 28 yard TD pass from QB Holden Guest to WR Traylen Drake. The lanky wideout would make a beautiful leaping catch around the ten yard line and lope effortlessly into the end zone on the play. But the shotgun snap would get away from the two point attempt and Wheeler trailed 14-6 late in the first quarter.

That would be as close as the Mustangs would get for the remainder of the game. Hamlin would go on to build a 31-6 halftime lead, and extend that lead to 52-6 with 6:29 left in the third quarter.

The Mustang offense would finally kick into full gear from that point forward. Five ball carriers would combine to rush nine times for 75 yards on the following possession.

Drake would finish the drive on a rugged 25 yard TD run. WR Ivan Lopez ran in the two point conversion. The Pied Pipers would return the ensuing kickoff 56 yards for a TD but Lopez responded to that with a 76 yard TD return of his own.

A defensive stop gave Wheeler possession at their 23 with 11:07 to play in the game. The Mustangs covered the 77 yards in 7 plays, highlighted by 26 yards Guest to Lopez and 37 yards Guest to Drake passes. Guest would plunge in from a yard out to close out the drive.

With 7:59 remaining in the game the Mustangs would begin a drive at their 36. Four plays later, facing a fourth and 11, Guest would explode for 28 yards to the Hamlin 37. On the next play he drilled a pass to Drake for 18 yards to the 19. A pass interference penalty against Hamlin three plays later gave Wheeler a first and goal at the two. Guest completed the drive on the next play to close out the scoring on the night.

It certainly was not the ending to the season that anyone involved wanted to be sure. But a ton of credit needs to be extended to the players and coaches for continuing to battle in the face of an insurmountable deficit. QB-OLB Holden Guest closed out his season and high school career with another impressive performance, accounting for 320 offensive yards (145 rushing, 175 passing) and three TDs while also causing a fumble that shut down a Hamlin drive inside the Mustangs five yard line. Senior WR Traylen Drake caught eight passes for 119 yards and a TD and his lone carry resulted in a 25 yard score. Fellow senior WR Ivan Lopez brought in three passes for 56 yards and returned a kickoff 76 yards for a TD. It was a solid 7-5 season for the Mustangs and we commend the departing seniors on their effort and look forward to 2017.

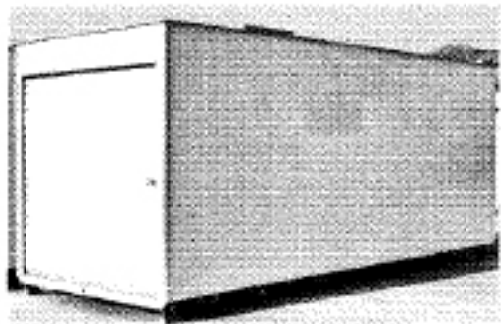

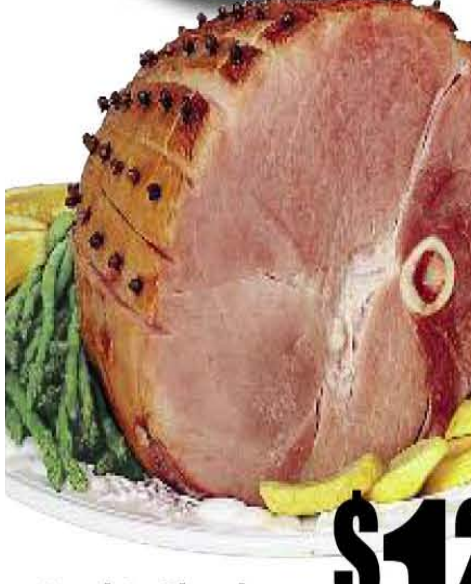

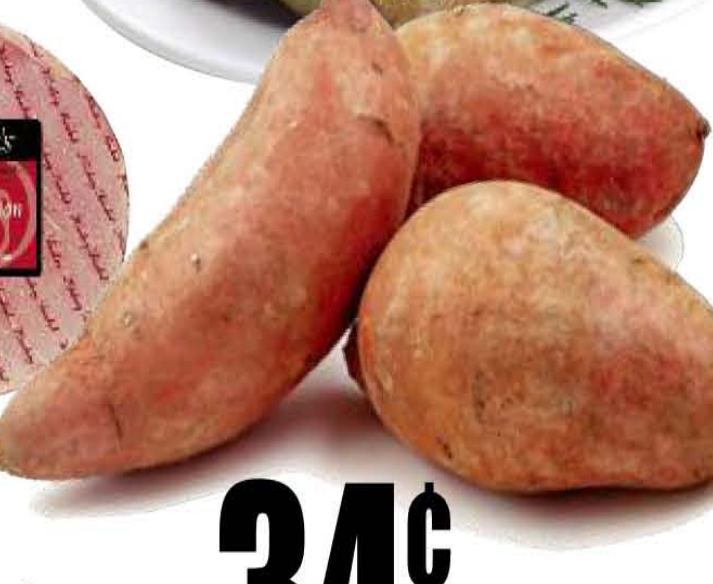
