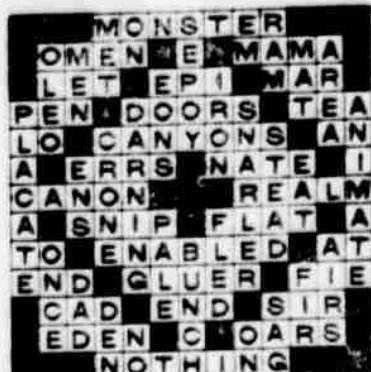

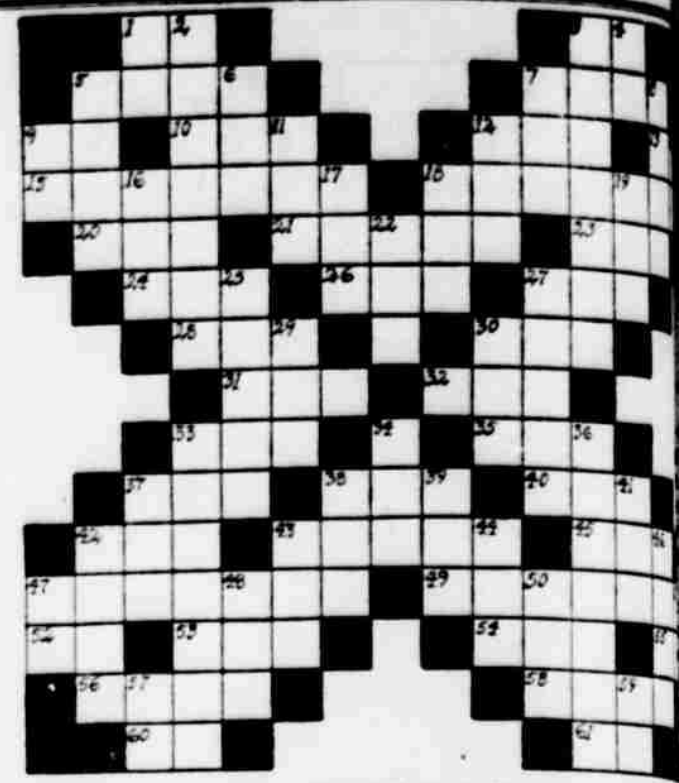

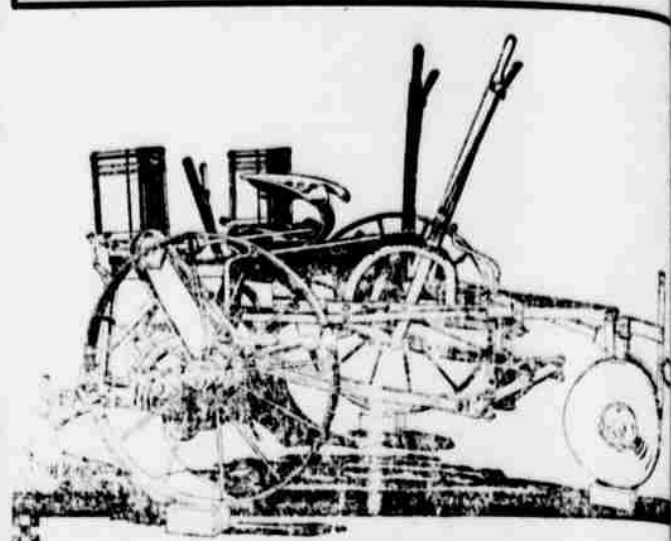
In Memorium
