Mr. Neff has been superintendent of the Hamlin Schools for the past six years and is known as one of the foremost educators of the state. He will succeed Superintendent M. H. Brasher, who tendered his resignation to the Board several weeks ago on account of his health

Superintendent Brasher plans to move to Abilene where he will enter other lines of work for a while, in an effort to regain his health. The Haskell schools have enjoyed a very prosperous growth under the management of Superintendent Brasher and it was with regret that the Board accepted his resignation. The Board is to be congratulated on their choice for a surcessor to Mr. Brasher, in the person of Mr. Neff.

The prosecuting attorney of an Indiana town says the age of criminals has droped six years since 1913, the greatest number of crimes now being committed is traced to boys between the nges of 17 to 21. Possibly we have not felt the crime wave here as they have felt it in other communities, but there is one thing certain. that is, that if we hope to continue as a stranger to it we must give heed to strict and proper rules for rearing the boys of the community. Permitting them to "run wild" is sure to bring the crime wave to our doors, just as it has been brought to the doors of other communities.


