## Another Oil Test To Be Drilled in Haskell County

E. C. Quade of Rule Route 3 was in the city Monday and called around to see us while here and renewed for the home paper. He stated that arrangements were being made to drill a test well on his farm which is located between Rule and Rochester, known as the old Scott farm. Several years ago Mr. Quade dug a well to the depth of about 80 feet and a flow of surface oil was struck which came in such quantities that Mr. Quade was forced to dig another well for his water supply. It has been reported that quite a number of wells have had the same oil showing in that section. We understand that a large acreage has been leased and it is thought that satisfactory results will come from the sinking of the test in that section.

## FAMOUS BRITISH ACE WILL FLY IN HASKELL SATURDAY AND SUNDAY

LIBERTY MOTORED AIRPLANE WILL BE HERE SATURDAY AND SUNDAY AND STUNT FLIGHTS WILL BE FREE TO THE PUBLIC; PASSENGERS WILL BE TAKEN



Capt. Lowell Yerex, Famous British "Ace"

An aeroplane, piloted by a famous British war hero, will swoop down upon Haskell Saturday and Sunday. It will be flown by Captain Lowell Yerex, an aviator who is known the nation over as one of the most conservative and safest commercial pilots, and will be the means of transportation for scores of Haskell's more venturesome spirits, as well as a thrilling sight when the pilot and Roland Steinhart "Diavolo" pull off some hair-raising stunts. Diavolo is known as the world's master daredevil. He has performed for several years as a movie daredevil, and among his most thrilling and death-defying stunts are changing from plane to plane in mid-air, parachute drops, wing walking, standing and balancing on plane, and hanging from the plane with one hand. His marvelous feats will be performed over the field Sunday afternoon at 3:30.

Manager Robt. H. Gray of the Western Aviation Company, was in the city this week spreading bills and posters in scores of windows, announcing the coming of the noted ace and movie stunt flyer.

During his two days stay here, Capt. Yerex will carry passengers on trips to the clouds, using the latest type 4-passenger plane, which is driven with a 220 horsepower Liberty motor. Capt. Yerex has been piloting commercial planes for three years, in that time carrying more than 10,000 passengers in his planes without a single accident or mishap. He is credited throughout the Western states as being the safest aviator operating commercial planes.

The engagement here was secured by J. F. Kenedy, local agent for the Texas Company, which company brought Capt. Yerex to Texas to demonstrate the use of Texaco products, which are used exclusively for the motor.

## W. C. ALLEN ANNOUNCES FOR RE-ELECTION AS SHERIFF

We are authorized this week to announce W. C. Allen as a candidate for re-election as Sheriff of Haskell county, subject to the action of the Democratic primary in July. Mr. Allen needs no introduction to the people of the county. He is well known all over the county as a peace officer with an enviable reputation. Mr. Allen makes the following announcement of his candidacy: "To the Voters and Citizens of Haskell County:

"Two years ago, I was solicited by a large number of good citizens of Haskell County to make the race for Sheriff, notwithstanding I had voluntarily given up the office and retired to private life. I made the race at that time on account of the solicitation of many good men and women; and, after a clean race against three men, I received more votes than all of the three together, at the first primary, and was installed into office after the general election. When I went into the office, at that time bootlegging and the manufacture of intoxicating liquor was not an uncommon thing over the county. At a heavy expense to myself, I equipped the office and purchased automobiles for the purpose of running these and other law violators out of the county or putting them in the pen. To what extent I have succeeded, I am willing to leave it to the court records of this county. No bootlegger has been acquitted whose case has been tried where the Sheriff, District and County Attorneys have worked up the testimony. And it is my opinion that, at this time, there is not an active bootlegger, or still, in operation in Haskell county, and what liquor is now being drunk in Haskell County, in my opinion, is being brought in from other counties. Many petty thefts of turkeys, automobile casings and chicken and cotton thieves have been captured and convicted, and this industry has been brought to a standstill. The theft of automobiles has continued, to some extent, but we had to say that not an automobile owner has been without the use of his car for more than thirty hours after the theft, except in one instance when the road was so muddy that the car could not be brought in. I acknowledge that I have had great assistance from other officials of the county and would not have been able to accomplish as much as I have without their help. With this short statement of my stewardship during the past two years, I again enter the race for the office of Sheriff of Haskell County for one more term, and I wish to state that it is my present intention to resign from the office after the expiration of one more term, should I be elected. This office belongs to the people and they can give it to whoever they think will serve them best. If you endorse my past record and wish the continuation of the same and a full and fair enforcement of the law, without fear or partiality towards any class or set of men, then I solicit your support at the coming primary. I feel that the expense of maintaining the office and the enforcement of law and order will be less the coming term than it has been this term, and as the duties of the office are now such as will prevent me from seeing all the voters in person I solicit your support and influence through this announcement.

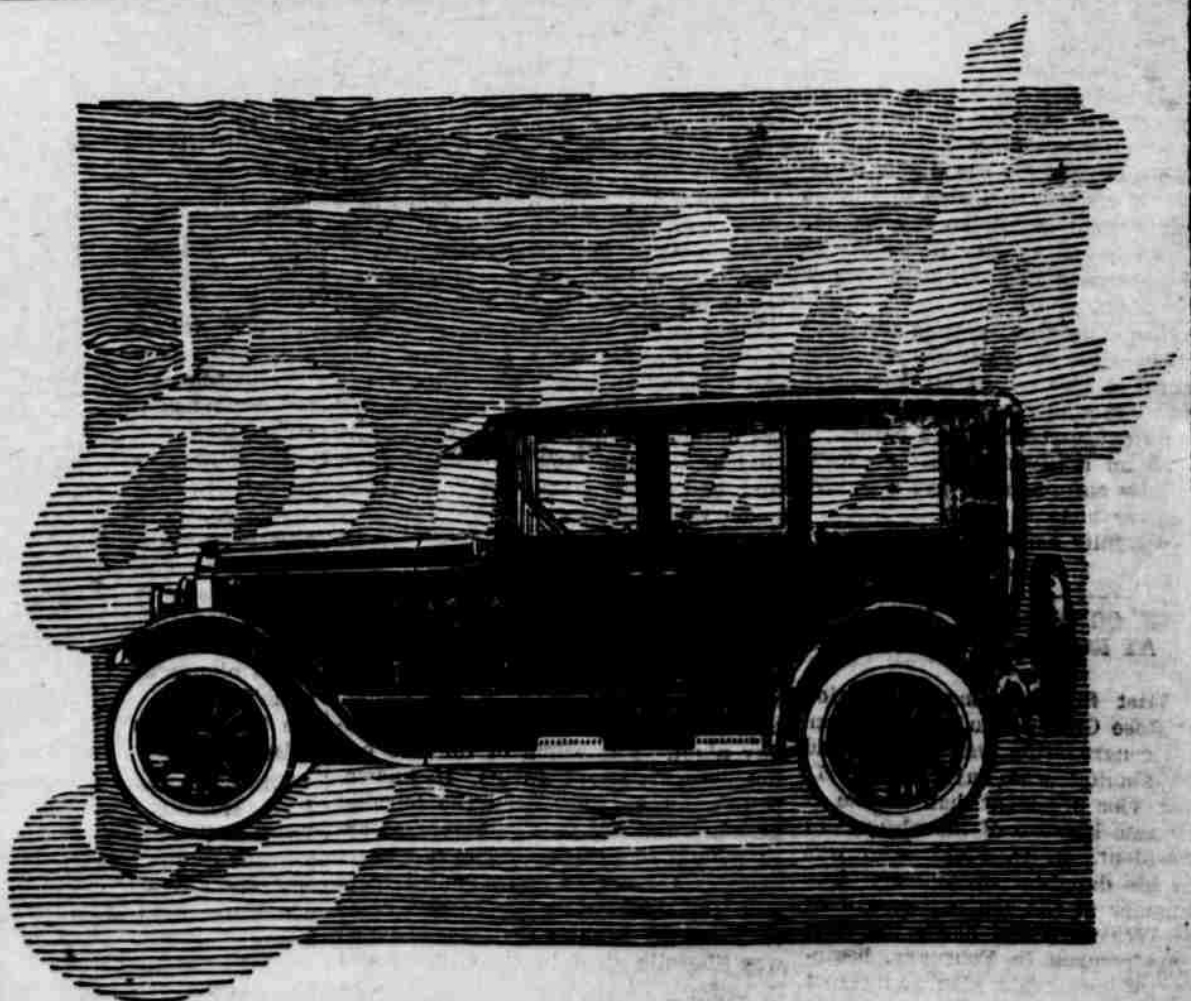




