The Spur National Bank has been active for several years in boys and gorls club work, and is now harvesting. returns from work as a large number of the older club members have substantial bank deposits.

Mr. Lee says that one boy who started club work four years ago with a small, unsecured loan has on deposit today \$1.527 besides foundation stock for an excellent hog farm

Lee says he has been loaning money to boys and girls for four years on their personal, unsecured notes, the amount totaling better than \$4,000 and that he has never lost a dollar, most of the notes being paid before maturity and only in a few cases did notes run past



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



We haven't yet considered inspecfors regular duties, that of inspecting the retailers such as groceries, meat marekts, bakeries, restaurants, confectioneries, drug stores, produce houses, dairies, and all food handlers of every descriptios, and the large amount of propaganda work we try to lo along these lines.

One of the most important things the towns and cities have to cope with today is the milk supply. The day of the individual cow is rapidly passing. and we are depending on the dairyman for our milk. Milk is the vital food for babies and growing children and nothing is more susceptible to contamination and germ breeding. Quite often, inspectors receive S. O. S. calls to towns where there is a typhoid epidemic among the children and the matter is traced to the source of milk supply. So important has this become, that cities and towns of much size are putting on their own inspector for dairy and ment inspection, and in our work we always co-operate with these. The writer now has calls from several of these inspectors.

Another and no small part of our work is taking samples and shipping them to the chemist for analysis to see if there is any adulteration or misbranding. Thousands of samples of all kinds are shipped to the Department each year. At each town we visit we pick up samples of milk, ice cream and soda water and anything else of which an analysis may be desired, such as ground ments or canned goods, etc.
