FOUR OIL TESTS FOR THIS COUNTY

Mr. D. B. Kouri arrived on the ground Sunday morning with his new and up-to-date Rotary Rig, with which he will drill two wells on the Baldwin Ranch just six miles from Haskell. He has started erecting his derrick and will start in soon. Mr. Kouri states that he will drill these wells to a depth of 3500 feet unless oil or gas is found at a lesser depth and is to give a big barbecue on the ground in a few days to celebrate the breaking of the ground.

The well known Mr. S. S. Kouri who has always believed in the future oil possibilities of this County and who lost a well by bad luck, on the Ballard ranch, where he had some elegant showings of both oil and gas, will soon start in two new wells, one just off setting the old hole that he lost. They have the most attractive reports on all of this territory from some of the best Geologists in the country and they certainly believe in the oil possibilities of Haskell County and Haskell County believes in them. Mr. C. C. Rank who is carrying on the activities of drilling a well on the Fred Quade track, fifteen miles west of here and represents the D. O. Galloway interests of Ft. Worth and Dallas has returned and informs us that he will resume operations at once as he now has all of his repairs and his rig will be as good as new when he starts again. This rig having been down on account of repairs caused by the hard drilling they found at a depth of about six hundred feet.

UNOFFICIAL RETURNS FROM DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY; LARGE NUMBER VOTES POLLED

In the Democratic Primary last Saturday, Bruce W. Bryant of Haskell, defeated Walter S. Pope of Anson for District Judge, by a decisive majority. Judge Bryant carried every County in the District, according to unofficial reports. In the race for County Judge, J. G. Foster was elected over B. E. Lee. Chas. M. Conner was re-elected Tax Collector over W. E. Kirkpatrick. Mike B. Watson was elected Tax Assessor over his two opponents R. S. Denison and Floyd Gauntt. Allen A. Heathington was elected County Superintendent of Public Instruction over his opponent Lee Humphreys. In the Sheriff's race W. C. Allen is leading his nearest opponent J. C. Turnbow by 243 votes. These two will be in the run-off. The run-off for Commissioner of Precinct No. 1, will be between J. S. Abarnatha and F. A. West. For Commissioner of Precinct No. 4, the run-off will be between O. L. Darden and L. C. Phillips. Wayne Perry was elected Commissioner of Precinct No. 3, and Ed Howard, Commissioner of Precinct No. 2. Mart Clifton and J. W. Quantlebann are the two leading candidates for Public Weigher of Precinct No. 1. C. H. Hudson appears to have been elected Public Weigher of Rochester over his two opponents. On unofficial count M. F. Medley has defeated Chas. Barton for Public Weigher at Weibert. The following is the unofficial vote received by each candidate.

199,726 NEGRO PUPILS ENROLLED IN TEXAS

Negro pupils enrolled in Texas schools the last term numbered 199,726 according to a report issued today by the department of education. The total negro population of school age was 228,297 and the number of negro schools is 2427 with a total value in buildings, grounds and furniture of \$5,312,088. Salaries paid to negro teachers totalled \$2,359,408. There are 5,337 negro teachers holding certificates in the state.

Clarence Gilmore has a large lead over his opponents for Railroad Commissioner. Weaver will probably be his opponent in the run-off. In the Comptroller's race the run-off will be between Terrell and Baker. Cureton is leading Wear for Chief Justice of the Supreme Court by a large plurality. Len A. Smith is leading for Railroad Commissioner (4 year term) with Nabers in second place. Jno. T. Robison is apparently re-elected as Land Commissioner.
